R. R. STRIKE INJUNCTION IS GRANTED TURKEY IS DETERMINING COURSE TO FOLLOW

STREET PAVING PLANS READY FOR APPROVAL

Plans and specifications for Ballinger's street paving will be submitted to the city commission early next week, probably Monday, according to City Engineer Jas. E. Pirie. Mr. Pirie stated Saturday morning that he was completing the plans and would have them ready for blue print by Saturday night, and that they would be submitted to the city commission as soon as the commission held a meeting.

To appease the minds of some of the citizens who were inclined to complain at the delay in street paving, the writer called on the members of the city commission and the city engineer Saturday morning, and as previously stated in this paper, the principal cause of the delay was charged to the Santa Fe railroad's failure to co-operate with the city in controlling the flood water which inundates a good portion of the business district which is to be paved, every time it rains.

"We have been pushing the work as fast as possible," said Commissioner R. T. Williams Saturday morning, "and we have been delayed on account of the drainage problem, and waiting for the Santa Fe to co-operate with us in this part of the work." Mr. Williams stated that it was a big undertaking, and coupled with the failure of the railroad to co-operate with the city the delay had been unavoidable.

"It is a big undertaking and should be done right," said Commissioner Doose, "and as a property owner and one who must help pay the taxes, I want to see the job done right." Mr. Doose stated the Santa Fe delayed in responding to the city's call on account of the shopmen's strike, and when the engineers did come here to confer with the city engineer that they could not agree and the original plan for paving had to be abandoned, and other specifications drawn.

Engineer Pirie drew the first plans and specifications with a view of the Santa Fe concentrating the flood waters on Ninth street, where the city would provide an outlet for conveying the water to the river, and thus protect the business district from the floods which are now turned into Broadway, Seventh and Eighth streets at the Santa Fe right-of-way. When the Santa Fe refused to do this the plans had to be redrafted to proceed

with the paving along another plan, and the city will deal with the Santa Fe on the drainage question later.

Mr. Pirie says that the plan to make the sidewalks on Hutchings Avenue five feet wider and those on Eighth Street three feet wider, will not add any to the cost as the expense of building the additional sidewalk will not be any greater than the cost of the street paving, or it will probably make the cost less.

The city commission will advertise for bids on different characters of pavement, and will then decide definitely which will be the best for Ballinger. Some are opposed to tearing up the streets during the rush of the fall season, believing that the hardships incident to the bad condition of the streets now would not be as great as the inconvenience caused by carrying on the work at a time when the farmers are marketing their cotton.

DENY CHARGES AG'NST RANGERS

AUSTIN, Sept. 23.—More than twenty-five affidavits from residents of the Thurber and Mingus coal districts in Erath county, denying the charges made by District President Wilkerson of the miners' union that the state rangers had intimidated the striking miners, were filed with Adjutant General Barton today by Ranger Captain Aldrich, who was sent to the mine fields to investigate the charges. The affidavits cover the charges that the rangers killed domestic animals and searched dwellings without cause and threatened the workers. These charges were all denied by the affidavits.

WRIT TO BE SIGNED ON MONDAY, VERY DRASTIC

(Associated Press Dispatch)

CHICAGO, Sept. 23.—Judge James H. Wilkerson today granted Attorney General Daugherty's petition for a nation-wide temporary injunction against the striking railway shopmen.

Judge Wilkerson said that the defendants could not deny knowledge of the responsibility for the widespread violence which has marked the strike. He held that the partial strike settlement has not affected the right of the government to obtain a nation-wide injunction, and he gave the attorneys for the defense until Monday morning to study the court's decision and prepare to argue the text of the injunction order which he will sign at that time.

Attorney General Daugherty has presented the government's proposed draft, which is even more drastic than the first restraining order which is now in force. The order will affect 250 officers and 400,000 members of the six shops crafts belonging to the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor.

Cox Says Wounded Nation Needs Democratic Doctor

(By Associated Press)

EL PASO—The largest taxpayer in El Paso is the El Paso Electric Railway. This company pays \$65,000 a year in city taxes and about \$100,000 more in state and federal taxes, according to its report today. The company is increasing its power plant by adding 2,200 kilowatt capacity.

THORP SPRINGS—Students have begun registering at Thorp Spring Christian College and the advance registration, according to President Arthur R. Holton, indicates a large enrollment.

CLEVELAND, Sept. 23.—Former Governor James M. Cox, of Ohio, Democratic nominee for president in 1922, was asked here today what the issue will be in the presidential campaign in 1924, said: "The people this year will be asked to elect a congress that will undo the present tariff monstrosity!"

"But we will not lose sight of another great question, and an international one," said Mr. Cox. "It will be more pertinent, however, in the great national forum of 1924, when the surgeon finds an injured man suffering from a severed artery of a broken leg, that he sews up the artery first. In the present instance, as bad as the international wound is, the domestic injury inflicted by the most incompetent congress in all history is even worse."

36 HOURS TO DETERMINE WAR OR PEACE IN EAST

(Associated Press Dispatch)

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 23.—Within thirty-six hours the world will probably know whether the Turkish Nationalists have chosen the course of war or peace. The Angora cabinet is meeting at Smyrna and is expected hourly to declare whether the Kemalists will await the peace conference which has been proposed by the powers, or invade Thrace.

The French government has sent a wireless message to Mustapha Kemal Pasha, requesting the Turkish leader not to take any action until the arrival of the special French emissary, it was learned this afternoon.

LONDON, Sept. 23.—The policy of Great Britain in the Near East is to establish the freedom of the Dardanelles under the supervision of the League of Nations, it was declared here by Premier David Lloyd George today. Lloyd George said that whatever steps the government had taken to strengthen the British military and naval forces in the Dardanelles and Bosphorus had been dictated by the anxiety felt by Great Britain over the freedom of the seas between the Mediterranean and Black seas, and to prevent "this exceptionally horrible war" from spreading over all Europe.

BRICK PAVING FOR WINTERS

Engineer U. Stephens reports the awarding of the contract for Winters street paving. The contract was awarded Friday to the Jones Construction Company, and calls for the paving of three blocks on Main and Postoffice streets with brick, at a cost of \$2.86 per square yard.

Mr. Stephens reports that seven bids were submitted on the work, some of the largest street paving contractors in the country, including one Connecticut firm, showing that contractors are ready and anxious to figure on contracts in this part of the country.

The contract calls for concrete base with brick paving, and the \$2.86 per square yard includes curbing, culverts, concrete base and brick finish, or a complete job according to specifications. This is a very reasonable figure for this class of work, according to Mr. Stephens.

The contract provides that work shall begin within five days after the material is delivered and the order was placed for the material Friday, and Mr. Stephens says that work will probably be underway by October 1st.

Winters receives aid in her street paving, the state and federal highway commissions appropriating \$2268, and Road District No. 2 of Runnels county appropriating \$3,780 to pay for the cost of a fifty foot strip through the town, and the city and property owners pay for the remainder of the paving for the three blocks, according to Engineer Stephens.

RUSSELL TO SPUD IN NEXT WEEK

The Russell Production Company will spud in its new well early next week, according to H. Giesecke, head of the local oil company. The derrick has been up for several days and the drillers are setting the rig and will soon be ready to spud in.

This well will be known as Russell No. 2, being the second well drilled by the Russell Production Company, the first being about two miles North of the new location and also two miles South of the field where the Gulf Production Company drilled three holes, one of which is furnishing gas for other development, and is also putting out oil when permitted to flow.

In the first well of the Russell Production Company the best showing ever made in West Texas was obtained. The drillers and geologists are of the opinion that a big pay field is somewhere nearby and Mr. Giesecke is about the most optimistic booster ever engaged in the oil business. He persistently contends that an oil field is going to be made out of the Russell field, which is located in the R. R. Russell ranch about fifteen miles Southeast of Ballinger.

The company has sufficient capital to push the new well down without delay and the eyes of the oil world will be turned in that direction.

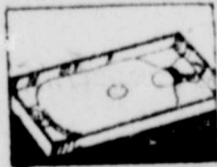

This was brought out today when the grand jury made its report. The grand jury returned a total of 214 indictments, including forty-four for murder.

TEXAS CATTLE ARE BEING DIPPED RAPIDLY
(By Associated Press)

FT. WORTH, Sept. 23.—More than 26,000,000 head of cattle were dipped in Texas during the last four months in the eradication of ticks, establishing what is believed to be a new national record, according to records of the Bureau of Animal Husbandry and the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission, made public this afternoon.

August exceeded all records, with a total of 7,013,373 head dipped or inspected. The work is being performed in 158 of the state's 252 counties.

CARLOAD COTTON PICKERS ARRIVE

More than a car load of cotton pickers unloaded in Runnels county Saturday at noon. About thirty Mexicans and negroes got off the train at Ballinger and the remainder went on to Rowlett. A solid car load of Mexicans was shipped in and fifteen or twenty negroes.

F. M. Jonas, who farms down the river, was in charge of the pickers arriving here, part of which went to J. L. Crockett. The hands were picked up at different points South of Temple, most of them being rounded up in Temple.

Picking is well under way in Runnels county, and the demand is keen for help. The picking period will be short, however, and hands will be plentiful a few weeks later. Fearing bad weather later the farmers are anxious to get their cotton picked and this creates a greater demand for help.

Eppright, who was accompanied by his wife and two children, had halted his automobile to pump up a tire. The pump was connected with the engine when his five year old son threw the machine in gear. The car moved off rapidly toward an embankment and Mr. Eppright ran after it and jumped on the running board just as it plunged over the edge. He was horribly crushed by the weight of the automobile and died a few months later.
