U. S. DESTROYERS TO TURKISH COAST

SENATOR'S BODY LAID TO REST

(By Associated Press)
THOMSON, Ga., Sept. 28.—The body of Senator Thomas E. Watson came home today, and was buried here. Thousands of Georgia's backwoodsmen joined with prominent officials and political leaders of the state in paying tribute to the deceased statesman.

Reports from Rev. C. W. Hardon, who left for Colorado a few days ago, says that he is well pleased with what he found, and has decided to remain in the Rocky Mountains, having accepted the pastorate of a Methodist church at Durango, Colorado. Durango is a nice little city of some five or six thousand people.

Secretary Denby today announced the names of twelve United States destroyers which had been ordered to proceed at once from Norfolk, Virginia, to Constantinople. The date of the departure of the destroyers has not yet been announced.

The Greek revolution with the abdication of King Constantine in favor of Crown Prince George, has so far been bloodless. Insurgent troops are occupying the capital, the provisional revolutionary committee announced, and stated that they will assume full power.

Turkish Nationalists have notified the allied high commissioners that they will not tolerate the fortification of certain points in the neutral zones.

Turkish cavalry is advancing on Asmalsjalmi Tiltpe, apparently with the object of isolating the British advanced posts.

LONDON, Sept. 28.—The British government today took a grave view of the situation in the Dardanelles. The situation is regarded as so critical as to overshadow the revolutionary developments in Greece. Opinion is freely expressed by those high in British authority that there is greater prospect of fighting between the British and Turkish Nationalist forces than at any previous time.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 28.—Former King Constantine, of Greece, who abdicated yesterday, is reported to have been imprisoned by the revolutionary forces in Athens.

ATHENS, Sept. 28.—It is reported that a section of the revolutionary army is imbued with the idea of a republic and that accession to the throne by King George may be accomplished only with some difficulties.

MARTIAL LAW FORCE IS CUT

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 28.—Adjutant General Barton and the military authorities at Denison were ordered today by Governor Neff to reduce the military force on martial law duty at Denison one half, cutting it from 250 to 125 men. The order calls for the reduction to be made by September 30th.

WRECKED CAR FOUND BY THE ROADSIDE

A Maxwell car was found standing by the road side just across the Santa Fe at the forks of the Ballinger-Coleman and Ballinger-Winters roads Thursday morning, by motorists coming to town early. Damage to the car indicated that it had turned turtle, the wheels being smashed and the top of the car damaged. The number of the highway plate on the car showed that the car was registered by J. M. Compton, at Lorraine, in Mitchell county. The owner of the car was perhaps out arranging for repairs, but the car had not been moved up to a late hour Thursday. No one reported an auto wreck, and if anyone was hurt it has not been reported.

TWO BANK BANDITS KILLED; 3 WOUNDED

EUREKA SPRINGS, Ark., Sept. 28.—Charles Price, age 25, the wounded bandit, who with four companions was shot down following a daylight robbery of the First National Bank here yesterday, was still alive today. He was reported dead in the first reports of the robbery and killing of the bandits sent out by news correspondents. Physicians today say the man has a slight chance for recovery.

Two other wounded bandits are in a local hospital. No word has been received from relatives of the two dead bandits who were shot down in the battle between the yeggs and citizens when they attempted to escape with \$74,000 in cash and securities from the bank.

A half dozen citizens who engaged the bandits in the gun fight escaped injury, while two of the bandits were killed and three wounded. E. G. Smith, cashier of the bank, sounded the alarm when the bandits began robbing the bank, by stepping on a section of the bank floor which pressed the button that connected with the burglar alarm.

WAR VETERANS MAY RETALIATE

DES MOINES, Iowa, Sept. 28.—Among the important business matters before the Grand Army of the Republic in its annual convention here is the consideration of a proposal to retaliate with resolutions against a statement made by the Confederate veterans in their reunion a short time ago, that President Lincoln was responsible for the war of rebellion. The proposition to retaliate with such resolutions has lost much of its appeal to the Northern fighters. Commander in Chief Pitcher made it known that he did not believe that the Confederate encampment resolution to be the actual sentiment of the Southern soldiers, but only the product of a small minority which slipped into the records during an interval when the convention hall was practically deserted.

REPUBLICANS ON PEDDY PETITION

AUSTIN, Sept. 28.—The certificate of nomination of George E. B. Peddy was returned today to the state department with the signatures of nineteen of the thirty-one Republican state committee members.

Secretary Staples returned the certificate to Chairman Creager of the Republican committee last week for a lack of signatures of a majority of the committee members. Mr. Creager had sent the certificate in with only his name

and the name of the secretary of the Republican committee signed to same, and the law provides that a majority of the members of the committee must sign the certificate.

Secretary of State Staples said that he would accept the signatures as sufficient, but submitted the amended certificate to the attorney general. Attorney General Keeling is completing his opinion on the legality of Peddy's nomination, and it will be sent to the state department in a few days.

Three feet of this extension on Hutchings could be utilized for tree planting by curbing it off, and in years to come the space could be utilized as a side walk with nut bearing trees furnishing shade.

Of course there will be some opposition to such a plan, and some will find fault with the trees obstructing the side walks, etc., and others will say the trees will not live, will be broken down, etc.

Most any kind of a light frame work will protect the trees until they gain a year or two growth, and a few irrigations will start them to growing and little water will be needed thereafter. Look at our court house park for an example.

The trees furnishing shade around the Dooze building are another example of what could be done and they are not pecan trees either. The most popular parking place and loitering place for folks is under the shade of the Dooze trees, and with a row of thrifty, bearing pecan trees bordering the streets, Ballinger would soon become better known for its spirit of civic attractiveness.

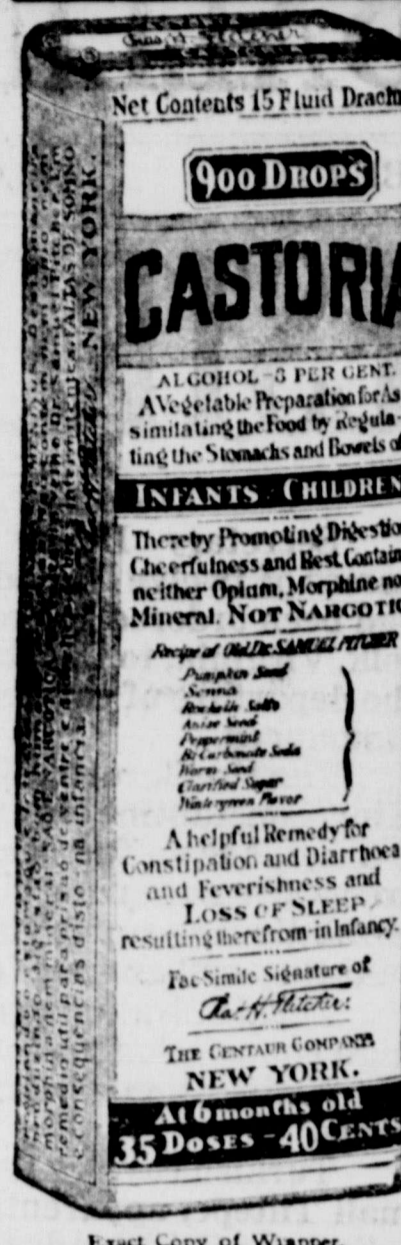

HISTORY OF BALL CHAMPIONS GIVEN

(By Associated Press)
 NEW YORK, Sept. 27. — "Giants in action as well as in stature," mused old Jim Mutrie, one day more than a quarter century ago as he sat observing the New York team, then an aggregation of six-footers, stride to victory as easily as a fairy-book man wearing seven-league boots would win a Marathon race.

Ever since they have been the "Giants" — professionally, competitively and financially. Jim was the "Daddy of the Giants" and had the right to attach a moniker to his figurative progeny, but when he uttered his now famous phrase he did it out of simple admiration. A reporter sitting near to him usurped the ministerial function and did the baptizing.

The Giants are now 40 years old. Mutrie brought the club into existence in 1883 by inducing John B. Day, a rabid fan of the sideburn days to finance his idea. Jim took the management and played the first seasons on old Polo Grounds, then on Fifth Avenue, gaining admittance to the National League in its initial year by replacing the Troy team.

On that "nine," figuratively and actually a "nine" with no substitute pitchers nor catchers, were "Buck" Ewing, Mickey Welch, Roger Connor, Pat Gillespie and Ed Haskins, all big muscular men. Mutrie remained as manager until Day sold his interests to Cornelius Van Cott in 1893. Van Cott didn't stick long, disposing of the franchise in 1895 after the club had finished fifth in 1894.

Andrew Freedman was the next owner, retaining control for eight years, but the club was unsuccessful, finishing in the second division in every year except 1897. In his eight-year span Freedman had eleven managers, including George Davis, Jack Doyle, Harvey Watkins, Arthur Irwin, Bill Joyce, Captain A. C. Anson, John B. Day, Fred Hoey, Buck Ewing, George Smith and Horace Fogel.

John Joseph McGraw, "Napoleon of Baseball," came to the helm in 1903 after he had lost both his heart and head in the old Baltimore Orioles, and finished second his first year. John T. Brush, builder of the present imposing edifice, sometimes called the Brush Stadium, was the owner then.

The following year McGraw's team won the pennant but refused to play the Boston Americans for the World's Championship. The refusal led to the formation of the former National Commission in the following year and it at once made mandatory a series of contests for the supremacy of the world. The Giants won the pennant again the next year and defeated the Philadelphia Athletics, four games to one, for the title.

Harry Hempstead, in 1911, succeeded his father-in-law, John T. Brush, as head of the club, and six years later gave McGraw a new contract which included stock in the operating company. Two years later Charles A. Stoneham, Francis McQuade and McGraw purchased the club from the Brush estate and Stoneham became the president.

FAN WILL RID BED-ROOM OF MOSQUITOS

(By Associated Press)
 CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—If you are subjected to boring mosquitos a home remedy is offered which tests have proven is more effective than swatting and other methods of extermination.

When bothered in your bedroom at night, remove a screen from the window, place an electric fan inside the room about six feet from the window facing it, and turn on the current.

The stiff breeze will draw the mosquitos into its path and will be too strong for them to repel. They will be blown from the room and will be unable to fight their way back against the air current. In a short time the entire room will be cleared of the insects.

This method was devised by a Western Electric engineer after watching the method used to remove the last traces of air from vacuum tubes used in radio.

LONDON DEALERS REPORT SHORTAGE OF DIAMONDS

 LONDON, Sept. 28.—Somebody is cornering the diamond supply of the world, according to British importers of the stones. All over the world the best and largest diamonds are vanishing, and London dealers are scouring the continent in the attempt to obtain stones to satisfy the demand which has suddenly sprung up for the finest gems. But they have small success for a mysterious shortage exists at a time of unprecedented demand.

"Diamonds will soon become the currency of the world if money continues to depreciate at the rate of the last few months," one dealer said recently. "Rich Americans are buying all the stones they can secure. There is an unlimited demand for two grainers up to the six-grainers from America, and Japan is buying largely. Fine small stones are also very scarce."

"The Germans are hanging on to their diamonds like grim death. They will not sell at any price, and regard their diamonds as the only real securing left them. The same spirit obtains in other countries."

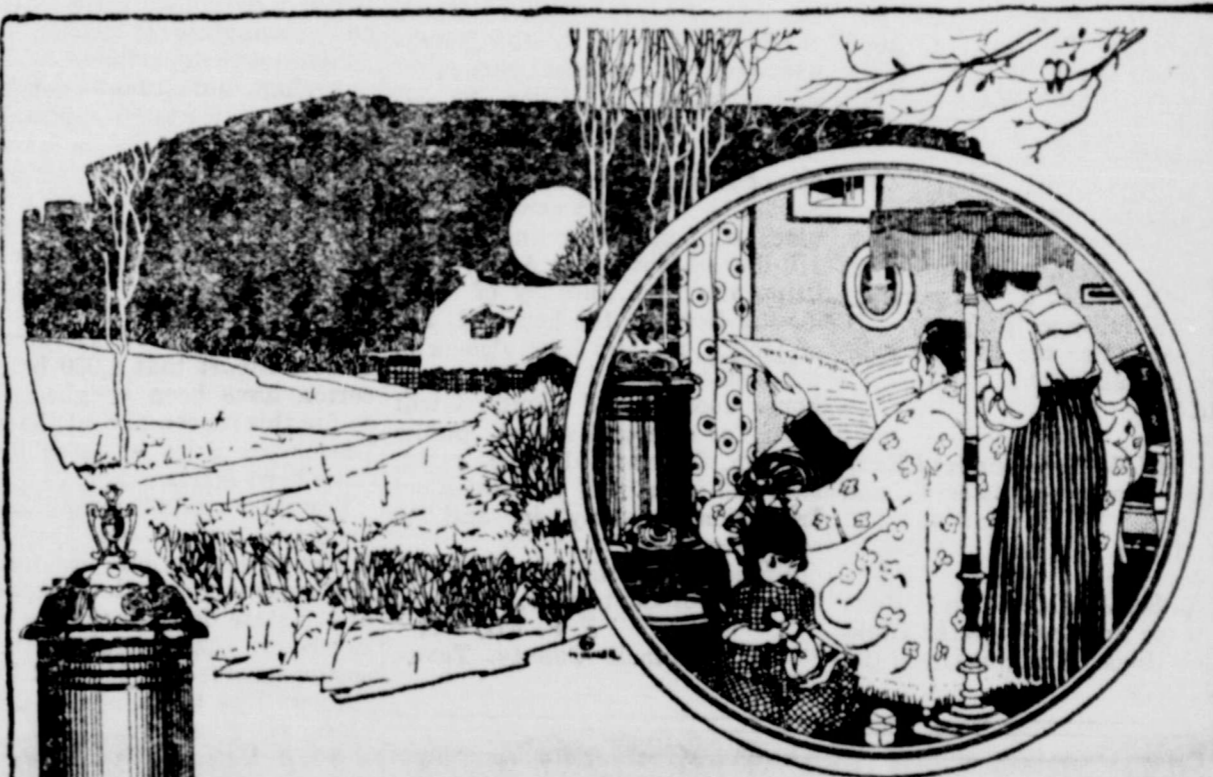

'CITY' COTTON CROP GETTING TOO LARGE

AUSTIN, Sept. 28.—"The city cotton crop in Texas is growing entirely too large," Charles E. Baughman, state commissioner of markets and warehouses, declared today, discussing so called public sampling of cotton.

"The state department has been receiving numerous complaints recently on cotton sampling and the sale of cotton by individuals who do not engage in the cotton industry," Baughman said. "Complaints have come from all parts of the cotton belt in the state on this action which reduces the farmer's profits on his cotton crop. From one Texas town has come a report that 4,000 bales of cotton have been weighed there so far this season and at the same time eight bales of loose cotton have been marketed."

Baughman said farmers and gin managers are asking for more thorough inspection of weights and measures and that inspectors of the state department are being asked to guard against "city" cotton producers. He said Texas farmers lose thousands of dollars each season as a result of such work.

YOUNG TURKISH PRINCES WILL BE TAUGHT ENGLISH

(By Associated Press) CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 28.—A special school has been instituted in the Palace of Yildiz in order to give the imperial princes of Turkey a special education and the benefits of modern instruction.

Professors have been engaged in France and the princes will be taught, among other things, four languages, French, German, English and Latin. Admission is confined to princes of royal blood and the children of nobles.
