22 FLOATING SALOONS ON NEW JERSEY COAST

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—An immediate report has been demanded by the prohibition officials here from New Jersey headquarters concerning a dispatch describing the extensive landing of smuggled liquor on the New Jersey coast.

HIGHLANDS, N. J., Jan. 12.—A great rum fleet of twenty-two vessels is still standing off the coast of New Jersey today, and the ships are ready for business as usual. The prohibition officers last night captured four small boats attempting to take off liquor.

Whiskey, gin, champagne and wine are offered for sale, and it is said that keen competition has developed among the skippers.

YOUNG SELLING MANY ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANTS FOR RURAL HOMES

John Young, representing the Deleo lighting system, was in Ballinger Friday, and was feeling good over the receipt of a letter from the state distributor informing him that he led the field in business for October, November, and December, and was winner of a silver loving cup offered to the dealer selling the greatest number of light plants.

M. Young has eleven counties in his district and he stated that about two-thirds of his business for the three months named above was in Runnels county. This indicates that the farmers of Runnels county are equipping their homes with modern conveniences, installing electric plants for lighting and supplying power for other purposes. The winning made by Mr. Young speaks well for him and is also quite a boost for modern advancement in rural life of Runnels county.

LIMIT SOON FOR PAYING AUTOMOBILE TAXES

Tom Green county has set Jan. 20th as the dead line for driving an automobile without a number, and Coleman county has set Jan. 15th as the dead line. The final date has not been set in Runnels county, but it is expected that the highway authorities will instruct the officers to begin enforcing the law at an early date, and then the big rush for the tax collector's office will commence. Better pay now and avoid the rush. You had also better not drive your car in Tom Green or Coleman counties after the above dates without being equipped with a 1923 number.

HARDING NAMES FEDERAL RESERVE BANK PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—President Harding today nominated D. R. Crissinger, of Marion, Ohio, to be governor of the Federal Reserve Board. Mr. Harding also nominated James G. McNary, of Las Vegas, New Mexico, to succeed Mr. Crissinger as Comptroller of Currency; and Milo D. Campbell, of Cold Water, Michigan, to be "dirt farmer" of the reserve board.

BUREAU CUTS COST HANDLING COTTON HALF

DALLAS, Jan. 12.—The cost of storing and handling the cotton crop last year for twenty thousand members of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association, was cut about half from the expense of the 1921 season, D. G. Hill, head of the American Cotton Growers' Exchange, announced today.

"Principal among the contributing factors were the improvement of methods, field service, general office improvement and the more favorable warehousing contracts with the compress firms," Mr. Hill said.

NAMES MEMBERS IN KU KLUX RAID

BASTROP, La., Jan. 12.—Robert L. Dade, mayor of Mer Rouge, named Dr. B. M. McKoin, Capt. J. K. Skipworth, Kelly Harp, and Ed Ivey, as members of the Ku Klux Klan band which held up and disarmed Watt Daniels, W. C. Andrews and Harry Neelis, Mer Rouge citizens, near Gallion, Louisiana, several months prior to the kidnapping and murder of Daniels and Thomas Richards.

Dade testified that one Ku Klux Klan raid in which he participated he wore a black mask, and declared that all the other members of the party wore white hoods.

WOMEN WORKING MUST PROPERLY FOR FOUR BILLS STAMP ALL DEEDS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 12.—Efforts of women's clubs and organizations in Texas on legislative matters will be concentrated on five measures and these measures supported in every possible way under plans completed by the joint legislative council of five of the large women's organizations of the state.

The measures which will be supported by the council are: an emergency appropriation for the public schools of the state; a survey of the state penitentiary system; state assistance for work under the Sheppard-Towner act; strengthening of the state prohibition law; and an educational survey of Texas schools.

Regarding the educational survey, Mrs. A. M. McCaullum, secretary of the joint legislative council, stated the measure on this proposition will call for investigation of the entire school system, including grade schools, by non-interested parties. It is considered likely that the federal department of education may be called upon to supply national educators to make the survey. Such surveys under the direction of the national department have been carried on in a number of other states and with success, according to reports. The survey measure is not in opposition to the educational committee provided for by the last legislature, but an appropriation to enable the survey to be made will be asked for in the new measure.

Replies from the legislators in answer to questionnaires sent out on the joint council measures indicate that all of the bills will be strongly supported, according to Secretary McCaullum.

Parties making transfer of real estate are liable to prosecution if they fail to properly stamp deeds, paying the revenue according to the value of the property. Such information has been furnished to county clerks by the internal revenue department. All persons selling property should observe the law, and pay the revenue tax accordingly.

Notices sent to county clerks call attention to the law, stating that it "should serve to remove all doubt hereafter in the minds of persons who may not have the opinion that the amount stated as consideration, rather than the actual value of the interest or property conveyed, determines the amount in stamps to be attached."

"For instance a deed reading—'for consideration of \$1 and other valuable considerations,' you are advised that you should, by process of questioning, determine the value of the property conveyed, and fix the sum of the tax according to the value and not according to consideration. If this information is refused to you, then you may incur criminal liability should you go ahead and record the instrument."

The notice further declares that whoever signs such a document without the full amount of tax being fully paid is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall pay a fine of not more than \$100 for each offense.

AUTO CAR THIEVES TURN NEW TRICK

ENEMIES FIGHT ENEMY IN EUROPE

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Jan. 12.—The British and French governments are preparing to send warships to Memel, former East Prussian territory, on the Baltic Sea, which was internationalized by the treaty of Versailles, to maintain order in view of the invasion by the Lithuanians.

Dispatches today indicate that the Lithuanian irregulars have exchanged shots with the German guard. The curious spectacle of the situation is that the French and Germans are expected to begin fighting each as a common enemy, while both French troops and German police at Memel will resist the Lithuanian raiders.

According to a London dispatch the British government has joined France in protesting to the Lithuanians.

ESSEN, Germany, Jan. 12.—General Degoutte issued a proclamation from Dusseldorf today establishing a state of siege through out the newly occupied territory. It is stipulated in the proclamation that the German laws will remain in force.

HERE HUNTING STOLEN CARS

AUSTIN, Jan. 12.—Governor Neff addressed the legislature today. He pledged himself to fight the lawless element in Texas, and also advocated a program of taxing the special privileges and special rights interests, such as oil, light, and manufacturers, and declared his intention of working for the relief of the present tax payers.

Mr. Neff appeared before a joint session of the legislature, and was given an enthusiastic greeting both from the floor and the gallery. He said that he favored a more simplified form of government and administration, declaring that there were too many boards and bureaus.

The governor advocated a better school system, a system of state highways, and the maintenance of good roads throughout the state.

Representative Bryant introduced a bill in the House today proposing a state income tax. Other bills and resolutions offered in the House would abolish the State Livestock Commission, and the calling of a constitutional convention.

A resolution was introduced in the Senate which would condemn congressional action in requiring the state to participate in federal aid projects.

ARRANGING BUILDING FOR NEW GROCERY

Williamson will engage in the grocery business and will open for business as soon as the building can be put in shape. Mr. Williamson was formerly with the Jeanes Produce Company.

The building is being divided into three parts. The Southside Tailoring Company will continue to occupy part of the lower story. The new grocery will occupy the other part of the lower floor and the local National Guard company will maintain their armory and P. C. in the second story, or what was formerly the upper deck of the building.

WHILE the fancy of the designer of children's clothes lightly turns to thoughts of spring and he busies himself only with things for the new season ahead, the weather man continues to hand out a brand of temperature that discourages a belief in spring. Fancy stitching in simple designs, usually provides the ornamentation that is sparingly used on them. They are nearly all provided with fur collars that may be brought up about the throat in cold weather and fastened with a button.

Last Word in Heating System.

The advantage of hot-water heating has been ingeniously combined with the cheerfulness of the open-grate fire in a new heating apparatus which is adaptable for any width of fire-grate opening. It consists of a sectional boiler with hollow grate bars and an iron front and doors. The rear, sides and fire basket are hollow and filled with water connected to an expansion tank located in the attic. The usual system of piping to the various radiators throughout the house operates in the same manner as any other hot-water system. A coil is placed in the rear of the heater and connected to the regular hot-water tank and thus hot water is available at all times. The water gauge and thermometer are installed at a convenient point near the heater. As the grate opening (usually in the living room) is located on the first floor it requires a minimum of attention.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Majagua for Baseball Bats.

About two years ago experiments proved that Cuban majagua was ideally adapted for the manufacture of baseball bats. This hardwood is of tough fiber and it can be used for any purpose requiring material that will not break easily. Within the past year a growing interest has developed in the United States in the importation of majagua for the manufacture of baseball bats. For this purpose it is cut into pieces 38 inches long and 3 inches square. One firm exported to the United States during the past year 1,000 of these pieces.—Scientific American.

Long Air Record for a Small Boy.

When the air service between London and Paris was inaugurated William Sanderson, a boy living at Stonebridge Park, near London, accepted a job as assistant steward and he has held the place ever since, making the trips regularly without interruption. In that time he has traveled 25,000 miles.
