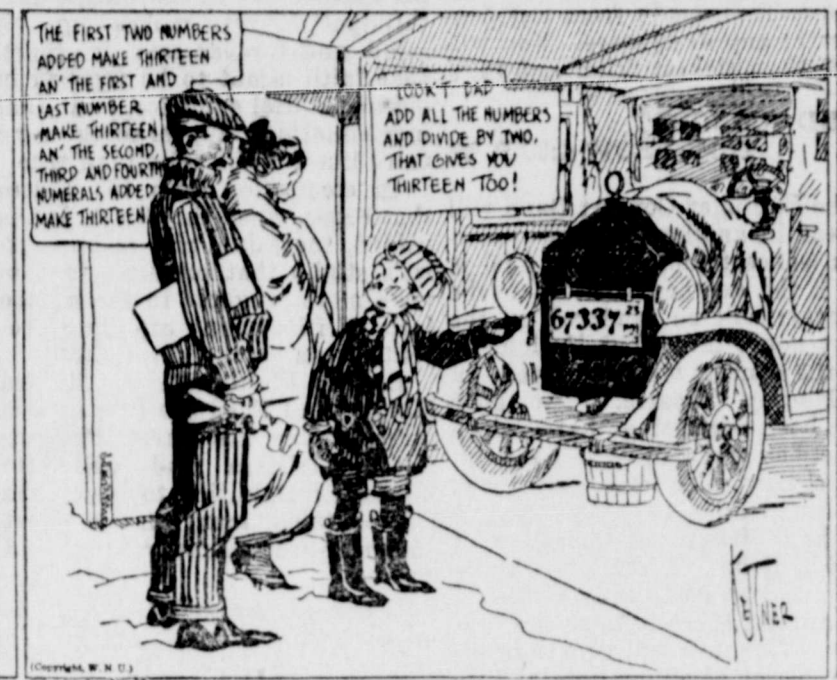

Girl Who Claimed Negro Killed Companion and Threw Her Over Bluff Arrested

(By Associated Press)

WACO, Jan. 13.—A writ of habeas corpus was issued in the Boucher case, seeking the release of Horace and Bernard Boucher, and sister, Naomi, who are being held in connection with the murder of Grady Skipworth.

WACO, Jan. 13.—State rangers, under Capt. Shumate, are today holding Horace and Bernard Boucher, brothers, and Miss Naomi Boucher, sister; in connection with the killing of Grady Skipworth near this city on the night of November 20th, according to local peace officers.

The whereabouts of the two men and girl could not be ascertained today, but it was authoritatively stated that they were in the custody of the officers. A complaint has been filed against the two brothers and sister charging them with the murder of Skipworth.

Miss Naomi Boucher accused a negro of killing Skipworth and then attacking her, declaring that the negro shot Skipworth to death and then dragging her to the roadside threw her over a steep bluff. A negro was recently identified by the girl as being the one who killed her companion and the grand jury returned an indictment against him.

On the night of December 20th, Grady Skipworth and Miss Boucher were out driving in an auto near Waco, in the vicinity of what is called "Lover's Leap," and at an early hour the next morning, the girl, footsore and weary from what she described to be the most tragic experience, appeared at a house and gave the alarm of how her companion had been murdered by a negro, how she had been attacked by the black and left for dead.

A posse was formed and a search started for the negro. Several suspects were held and carried before the young lady. She could not identify them, but finally a negro was found whom the girl identified as the murderer of Skipworth.

GERMANS ATTACK FRENCH FLAG

BERLIN, Jan. 13.—A French flag, hoisted by the troops occupying Essen, two miles outside of Essen, was torn down and destroyed, says a dispatch to the Vorwaerts today. The destruction of the flag resulted in the burgo-

MOB FLOGGS MAN AND WOMAN AT HOUSTON

HOUSTON, Jan. 13.—The authorities are expected today to obtain information from Bonnie Lee Harrison, age seven, who is said to have seen the mob of disguised men drag her mother from her home, cut off her hair and whip her.

The alleged whipping was administered to Mrs. R. H. Harrison, a widow, aged 39, on the night of January 5th. She admitted to the officers that she had been whipped, but had kept it a secret.

R. A. Armanda, aged 28, of Middletown, is also alleged to have been flogged by the same mob which whipped Mrs. Harrison.

GERMANS MUST PAY BY JAN 31

(By Associated Press)

PARIS, Jan. 13.—The allied reparations commission today postponed until January 31st the payment of five hundred million gold marks, due from Germany on next Monday. France, Italy, and Belgium voted for the delay. Great Britain's representative did not vote.

France requested that the Germans be granted the moratorium in order that the French might finish their preparations for the new moratorium plan. It was intimated that France was hoping that the moratorium would permit the Ruhr situation to take on definite shape, showing the extent of the apparent passive resistance policy of the Germans.

The commission also decided to inform the German war burden commission that a reply would be made in a few days to letters demanding a moratorium for 1923.

ATTY. ON STAND IN KU KLUX CASE

BASTROP, La., Jan. 13.—William B. Stuckey, a Mer Rouge lawyer, testified in the open hearing over the murder of Watt Daniels and Thomas Richards today. He declared that a theory had been advanced in connection with the attempt to kill Dr. B. M. McKoin, and that the theory was that McKoin "shot up" his own car in order to gain the support of the members of the Ku Klux Klan.

VanPelt of this city, and with them came his mother, Mrs. F. A. VanPelt, who is a great great grandmother, and is nearly 91 years old. She will make her home here with Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Brown, who make up one family of the party.

In the party are seven families, totalling 37 persons in all. They are: Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Brown

and family, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Thos. C. Hall place, four miles from Ballinger on the Crews Ed Brown and family, Mr. and Mrs. Larkin Brown will be on the A. H. VanPelt place between Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Brown and Ballinger and Winters. J. F. family, Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Brown will be on the Luther Poe and family, Mr. and Mrs. Ferrell Brown and family, Archie Brown, and Mrs. F. A. VanPelt.

The entire family have been farming around Coosa, Georgia for many years and a short time ago sold everything they possessed in that state and began making arrangements to come to Runnels county. For some time A. H. VanPelt has been busy getting farms for the new settlers and at present he has secured places for all except J. M. Brown, who is the father of the big family. Oscar, Ed and Ferrell Brown will be on the VanPelt.

OFFERS BILL TO CURB KU KLUX

(By Associated Press)
 AUSTIN, Jan. 13.—Representative Fulger, of Marshall, introduced a bill in the House today, which if passed, would require all secret organizations in Texas to make public a list of their membership by filing a report annually with the county clerk in the county where such an organization is located. Fulger stated that the measure had been prepared in view of the Ku Klux Klan activity in Texas.
 A resolution against injecting factionalism into the legislature was introduced by Representative Moore, of Hunt county, following the introduction of the Fulger bill.
 Governor Neff recommended to the legislature that it act toward the calling of a constitutional convention, declaring that the new constitution was needed in order to handle the tax problems and and privileges. Mr. Neff also recommended that the legislature take up measures to provide good roads, perfect the educational system, preserve the flood waters and build factories.

CRUDE OIL GOES UP 10C BARREL

 TULSA, Okla., Jan. 13.—The Prairie Oil and Gas Company today announced an increase of ten cents per barrel on all grades of mid-continent oil, including Texas oils. The posted prices quoted forty-one degree Baumé gravity oil at \$2.10 per barrel or better. The Sinclair Company met the new price.

TREATS BOOZE STORY AS JOKE

 WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—Press dispatches describing the landing of a large quantity of illicit beverage by a fleet of rum runners off the New Jersey coast has been declared erroneous by an official report received by Prohibition Commissioner Haynes from the New Jersey dry headquarters.
 William R. Sanders, chief of the inspection division of the United States customs service in New York, characterized the denial of the rum running as laughable. He said that the capture of four heavily laden rum runners was all the proof that he needed to offer of the existence of the rum fleet.

ENDORSEMENT FOR W.T. A.&M.

The move on foot to establish an A. & M. College at some point in West Texas is gaining strength rapidly, according to Stuart L. Williams, who attended the conference at Fort Worth Friday. Mr. Williams returned home Saturday at noon, and gave a brief report of the meeting.
 There were thirty-seven West Texas towns represented at the meeting, and some of the state's leading educators and prominent officials were present, and the proposition received endorsement from all parts of the state.
 The proposition was given endorsement by Hon. Cato Sells, President F. M. Bradley of C. I. A., Mayor Cockrell of Fort Worth, Judge Samuels of Fort Worth, Lieut. Gov. Lynch Davidson, railroad officials, and representatives of the A. & M. at College Station.
 In discussing the proposition many reasons were advanced as to why the new school should be established, and the committee will go before the legislature to show why West Texas needs and deserves such an institution. Following are only a few of the high points touched on in discussing the demand for the school:
 First. West Texas has the largest number of high school pupils per 1,000 population in Texas.
 Second. West Texas has the greatest per cent of native born white American citizens.
 Third. The per capita of wealth is almost double that of East Texas.
 Fourth. Pays the highest per capita tax.
 Fifth. Some West Texas counties pay the state four times as much as they receive for education. Many East Texas counties received four and five times as much for education as they pay taxes to the state.
 Sixth. West Texas has only two state education institutions, the Canyon and Alpine Normal.
 West Texas was at one time offered the state penitentiary, but it was found that such an institution located in this part of the state would be unwise and impractical as transportation expenses in bringing prisoners here from the more thickly settled portion of the state would have been too heavy.
 The spirit and enthusiasm for a higher education and the progressive program carried out in developing the rural schools of West Texas deserves some encouragement from the state, and it was pointed out that a co-educational A. & M. located in West Texas would be one of the state's highest assets in her educational program.
 BEAUMONT—Strawberries and melons are being retailed here, shipped from Orange county. The berries are bringing 50 cents a box while the melons are selling for 45 and 50 cents each. Apples and oranges are also on the market.
 FT. WORTH—C. B. Spies, scout executive, and a party of thirteen Boy Scouts have left for Wichita National Forest Preserve, near Lawton, Oklahoma, where a week's period of camping and hiking to camp. Albert Newberry, of woodcraft was planned.

 PARIS, Jan. 13.—The allied council of ambassadors decided to make energetic representations at Kovno to induce the Lithuanian government to bring pressure to bear on a group of Lithuanians who are menacing Memel, and the ambassadors council is of the opinion that the Lithuanian government is able to stop the movement if its acts promptly and vigorously.
