TEXAS WINS IN FAMOUS RIVER BOUNDARY SUIT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—An important decision was reached in the famous Red River boundary case today when the Supreme Court issued an order fixing the South cut bank of Red River as the boundary line between Texas

and Oklahoma. The court detailed that this rule would be followed in determining what constituted the cut bank, and the ruling gives Texas in substance much territory over which the controversy arose, and the decision is a compromise between the contentions of Texas and the United States.

The court announced that a commission of three would be appointed to locate the boundary under the court's jurisdiction.

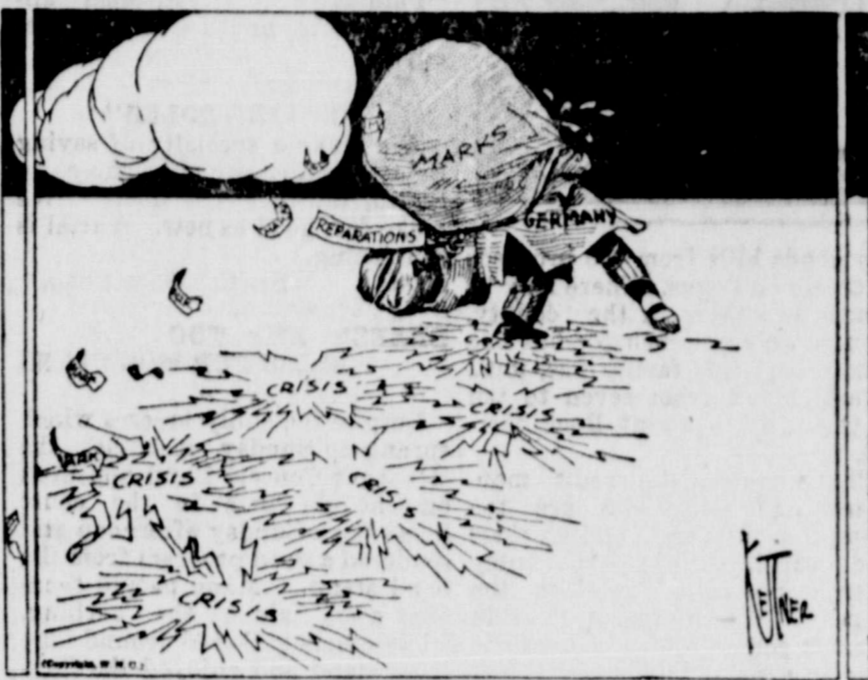

TWO IN JAIL FOR BREAKING IN CAR

A series of freight car burglaries culminated here Saturday night in the arrest of Claud Tuttle and Jesse West, both of whom are now in jail charged with the offense.

Tuttle and West were arrested at Tuttle's home Saturday night by Sheriff Flynt and Santa Fe Detective Will Futch following a raid made on a refrigerator car by Tuttle and West earlier in the night. Detective Futch and Wainwright Chastain, an employe of the Santa Fe, were guarding the car and caught the two men in the act of robbing the car, it was said, but the men made their getaway when the detective threw his flashlight on the men.

When arrested the two men put up a pitiful story of poverty, hunger, and sickness and stated that they had to steal to get something to eat as they were without funds and could get no credit. They made a confession to the officers, and related other burglaries which they had committed.

For some time the Santa Fe has been the victim of burglaries in the local yards. From time to time the seals on freight cars have been broken, and goods carried away, and the detective was put on the job here with the above result. The story is best told in the language of Tuttle, who made a confession, and West, who also made a similar confession to the officers Sunday:

"Saturday night, January 13th, I went to the picture show," said Tuttle, "and after the show I came home. When I got home I found my brother-in-law, Jesse West, there. After I got home Jesse and I went in the kitchen alone, and Jesse told me about a car being on the transfer track, which connects the A. & S. with the Santa Fe track near the oil mill, and he suggested that we go and see what was in the car. I did not want to go and told him so, but he insisted that we go. After we got there it was agreed that I should watch while he went and

GERMANY IN DEFAULT; WAR CLOUDS HEAVY

GOOSE CREEK FLOGGING TAKEN UP BY COURT

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, Jan. 15.—Judge Robinson, criminal district judge, today instructed the grand jury to ease up on investigation of petty thieving and burglary and devote their whole attention to running down those responsible for whipping Mrs. R. H. Harrison and R. A. Armada, of Goose Creek, ten days ago. Mrs. Harrison was the first witness called before the grand jury.

The woman was taken from her home, and flogged by a party of men, the men appearing at the home while Armada was calling on Mrs. Harrison, and Armada was also flogged, after the two had been questioned about their relationship.

Mrs. Harrison declared that Armada was nothing more than a friend to her and that he had called to bring her a basket of fruit while she was sick.

Mrs. Harrison had been separated from her husband about three months.

B. F. Brown was in the city from the Crews country Saturday. Mr. Brown says that the small grain crop put on a good growth during the warm weather of the last few weeks, and that those having fields of green have been profiting by the good grazing for livestock. Cates Rape Case Continued; Set for Second Week in May

District Judge J. O. Woodward granted a continuance in the Paul Cates rape case at 3:40 Monday afternoon, and set the case for the second day of May. The continuance was granted on motion of the defense which plead the absence of material witnesses.

The district court room at Ballinger was filled to overflow when district court convened Monday afternoon to take up the Paul Cates case. It was the largest crowd attracted here by any case since the famous Brown murder trial, and there were many women in the audience of spectators. The lower floor was packed and the gallery was filled to overflow.

The first move of the defense, when the case was called was a motion for a continuance. The state demanded that the motion be reduced to writing and the court granted attorneys for the defense time in which to prepare their motion, and it was about three o'clock when the motion was presented and argued before the court.

Due to the prominence of the parties involved this case is attracting more attention than any case placed on the criminal docket here in several years. Paul Cates, the 17 year old son of Dr. Cates, a prominent physician of Bronte, was arrested on Christmas evening, immediately following an alleged assault on Miss Onnes Tucker, the daughter of D. L. Tucker, of the Wilmett country.

When first arrested the boy was carried to Abilene and placed in jail. Later he was brought to Ballinger and the grand jury convening here the first week in January returned an indictment against the young man, charging

 It seemed certain today that Germany would be declared in default of the 1923 deliveries of merchandise at the meeting of the allied reparations commission, tomorrow, says a Paris dispatch.

Dispatches to the Lokal Anzeiger at Berlin reports heavy street fighting in Memel, and the Baltic area has been invaded by the Lithuanian irregulars. The Lithuanians are in almost complete possession of that area, the messages assert.

Bochum, in the heart of the great Hugo Stinnes steel works district, is occupied by the French today and the occupation of Gelsenkirchen has been completed.

A half hour stoppage of work at Essen was ordered today by the Germans as a protest against the French occupation, and a crowd carried out an anti-French demonstration outside the French headquarters with speeches and songs.

BERLIN, Jan. 15.—The German coal commission has prohibited coal owners of the Ruhr district from supplying coal or coke to France, or Belgium. The coal operatives have been notified not to deliver coal to the Belgians or French even if payment is offered for the fuel.

This action on the part of the Germans is expected to precipitate drastic action by the French government, and because of the repudiation of the coal magnates' agreement to resume coal deliveries the French have reinforced the occupational troops, according to advices coming from Essen.

The rupture between France and Belgium over commission control in Essen and German industrial centers is complete, says an Essen dispatch to the London Evening News.

Military penalties more severe and extensive than those contemplated yesterday are being put into effect today, the dispatch adds.

She had been visiting at the Elms home, and was en route to her home, walking down the road, when it is alleged that young Cates came along in a car and forcing the young lady to get in the car with him, he carried her to her home where no other members of the family were present, and committed the crime, it is alleged with which he is charged, and for which he was arraigned for trial Monday afternoon.

Judge A. K. Doss, of this city, has been employed to assist the state's attorneys in prosecuting the case, and Judges W. A. Wright, of San Angelo, and F. L. Snodgrass, of Coleman, are counsel for young Cates.

NICE GAMBLING CASE IS FILED AGAINST NEGROES

Deputy Sheriff Pete Speers and City Marshal Flynt, of Winters, brought nine negroes here Sunday and lodged them in jail on a charge of gaming. The negroes were caught in the game, according to the officers making the arrests. The officers were busy Monday morning filing charges against the negroes and arranging to prosecute the cases, it being reported that the defendants denied their guilt and acting on the advice of the man for whom they were working, would contest the cases.

ANTI-KLAN BILL REPORTED OUT

AUSTIN, Jan. 15.—The Senate state affairs committee today reported favorably the resolution offered by Senator Burkett, of Eastland, regarding the "hooded mob," and "masked political organization," and the resolution will go before the Senate for action. This is the resolution offered by Burkett endorsing Gov. Parker of Louisiana, for his stand in the Mer Rouge case.

A. J. Wirtz, of Seguin, was sworn in as member of the Senate from the twenty-first district. Measures introduced in the Senate included one bill by Senator Bowers, of Caldwell, proposing the abolishment of the Livestock Sanitary Commission, placing the work heretofore done by the commission under the agricultural department.

WACO MURDER IN MIDST OF MORE MYSTERY

DALLAS, Jan. 15.—Ranger Captain Shumate, who has in custody Miss Naomi Boueher and her two brothers, Bernard and Horace, who are held in connection with the murder of Grady Skipworth at Waco last November, was summoned today to appear before the Dallas county grand jury, and it is understood will take a Dallas man before the grand jury. Whether the summons was connected with the Waco affair or not has not been learned.

Captain Shumate telephoned Sheriff Stegall at Waco requesting the sheriff not to serve an order for Shumate's arrest, charging the ranger with evading a writ of habeas corpus granted the mother of Miss Boueher and brothers. Shumate asked that he be permitted to complete the investigation.

It is reported that Bernard and Horace Boueher have been separated, and placed in jails outside of Dallas, while the sister is in a private home in this city. Shumate admits that such report is current.

DENIES DEPUTY MADE ARREST

BASTROP, La., Jan. 15.—Fred Carpenter, sheriff of Morehouse parish, denied today that any commission had been issued to Capt. Skipworth, leader of the Ku Klux Klan, deputizing him as a deputy sheriff, or to any other man, to arrest Alonzo Braddock. Braddock testified last Saturday that he was seized by Skipworth and several others, and brought to Bastrop and turned over to Sheriff Carpenter.

examined the door. Jesse tried to open the door on one side of the car; he broke the seal, but could not open the door. Then we came on the other side of the car and Jesse broke the seal and opened the door. He went in this car and handed me out the cabbages. I stood at door and took three head of cabbage. He then got out of the car and just as he got out on the ground someone threw a flashlight on us and we ran. We ran towards town and in a few minutes we went home. In about thirty minutes three men came to my house and arrested us."

In his confession Tuttle tells of another burglary which they committed on Friday night when they broke into a freight car on the Santa Fe track near the Pierce Oil station and took one head of cabbage which they cooked at the home of one of the men. He also tells of stealing coal from a coal car about three weeks ago.

In their get-away from the car Saturday night West lost his hat, and this aided the officers in trailing the men to the house where they were arrested. Wainwright Chastain recognized the hat as belonging to West, and the officers immediately went to the home and made the arrest. The two men are being held in jail pending fixing of bond and to await the action of the grand jury. West and Tuttle are both young married men.

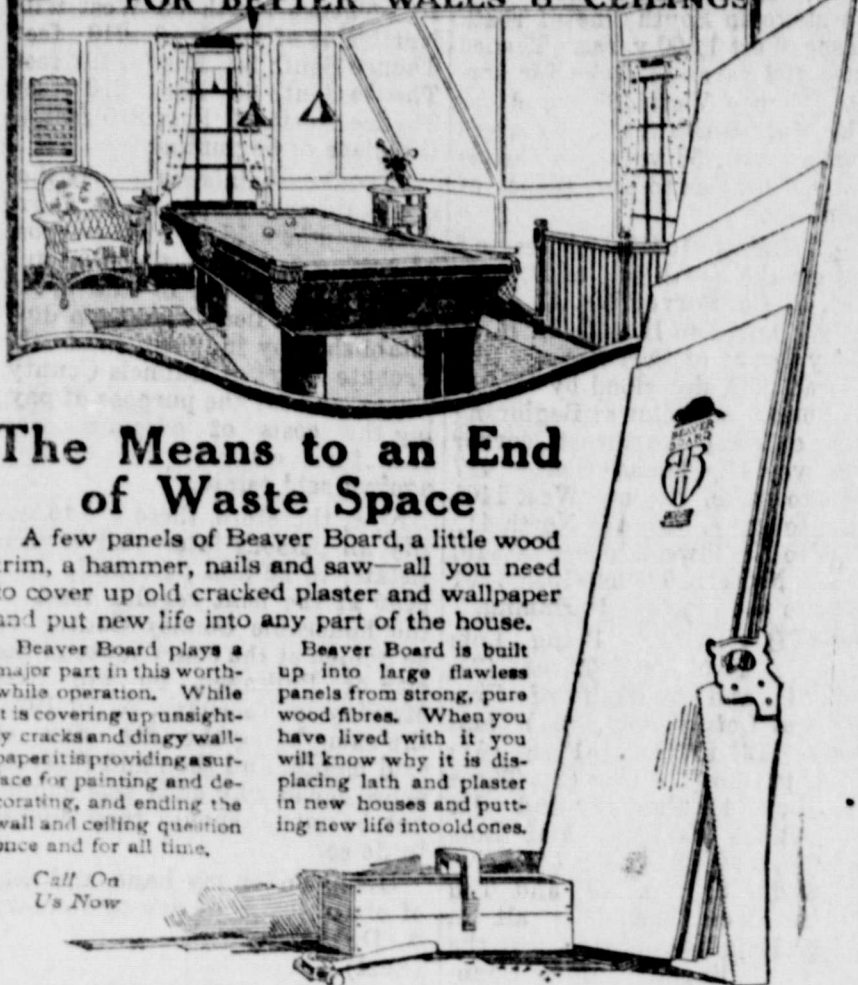
GET YOUR CREDENTIALS FOR CITY ELECTION, 1923
