Cow, Sow and Hen Special Visited by Many People

If scrub hogs have feelings, the ears of those in Runnels county must have burned Tuesday morning when A. L. Ward of the A. & M. College gave the "razor back" and other inferior animals a piece of his mind at the Santa Fe railroad's "cow, sow and hen" train in Ballinger.

"The scrub is the chief cause of Texas having to send thousands of dollars out of the state each year for pork products that could be produced in Texas," declared Mr. Ward, who is swine husbandman at the A. & M. College. "Of 2,500,000 hogs in Texas, only 17,000 are pure bred. In other words, the scrubs lead the pure breeds 36 to 1. The government census shows that 289,000 Texas farmers are solidly for the scrub hog. The purpose of this train which the Santa Fe is running in co-operation with the A. & M. College is to build up sentiment in favor of better livestock, and my part of the program is to talk better hogs."

Mr. Ward pointed out that farmers who own herds of common hogs for pork production have been aroused by the hard jolt given them by the United States Department of Agriculture in the announcement that pure bred hogs have an earning capacity for pork production of 38 per cent greater than common or scrub hogs.

"No farm animal can manufacture as much meat from a given quantity of foodstuffs as the pig, provided the feeds are not too bulky," Mr. Ward said in conclusion.

Livestock farming should be looked upon largely as a means of guaranteeing at home a satisfactory market for crops most easily grown in any particular section of Texas, according to Geo. W. Grout, head of the dairy department at A. & M., who handled the subject of dairying at the meeting here. "Livestock farming," he said, "makes possible the utilization of by-products, such as stalk fields that might otherwise go to waste. It is also a means of using efficiently the available labor throughout the year."

"People who live on specialized farms, such as those devoted entirely to cotton or grain, work only part of the year; while on stock farms, there is something for every member of the family to do every day in the year. Naturally, a steady job pays better than an irregular job. Therefore, investigation indicates that stock farms, properly managed, are the most profitable."

"This train," Mr. Grout said, "brings to you examples of what other Texas farmers are doing. The Santa Fe railroad and the A. & M. College simply submit these demonstrations for the farmer's consideration. They offer one piece of general advice, and that is: Do not match your time against a scrub."

"The requisites for successful dairying are: (1) good cows; (2) proper feeding and management;

(3) sensible marketing of the product. Good cows may be selected from any of the regular dairy breeds that suit the fancy, but they must be heavy producers to return a profit. A cow that will produce 6.5 pounds of butter in a year will make more profit than 20 cows producing 150 pounds of butter in a year, with considerably less labor.

"The difference between a profit and loss is often determined by the intelligent mixing of a balanced ration. The dairy cow is a high geared machine and will not run in low gear profitably."

The last lecturer was Ross Sherwood, of the experiment station at the college. He said that the poultry business, if started on a sound basis, generally is a thriving business; at least a small plant in connection with general farming can be made a very profitable side line. It is a fact that a small investment in connection with the farm equipment for poultry production has given larger returns than most any other line of farming, the speaker contended.

"Good birds, given proper houses, a balanced ration, with plenty of fresh water, grit, oyster shell, etc., and houses kept clean and sanitary at all times with plenty of sunshine and fresh air, will prove profitable producers in the poultry business," Mr. Sherwood said. This holds true either as a side line or on the commercial plant.

Mr. Sherwood told of numerous instances in which a flock of good hens on the farm had saved the day for the farmer's family when crops had failed. He expressed the hope that the day would come when it would be impossible to find a Texas farm without a good poultry yard.

J. D. Tinsley, agricultural agent for the Santa Fe, in charge of the demonstration train, expressed himself as greatly pleased with the interest shown by the people of Ballinger and vicinity in the meeting. "We are convinced," he said, "that the farmers of Texas are going to change their methods of diversifying more in the future than they have in the past. The A. & M. College has an important message on the subject, and if the Santa Fe can be instrumental in carrying it to the door of the farmer, it will feel amply repaid for its effort. I am sure of satisfactory results in Runnels county."

Another member of the party was J. F. Jarrell, of Topeka, Kansas, editor of "The Earth," the Santa Fe's agricultural and industrial paper. "This is the 27th demonstration train I have been out with," Mr. Jarrell said. "I have never seen deeper interest than that which has been manifested since we started on the Texas trip a week ago—have never heard so many questions asked by visitors. The attendance has been very heavy—averaging about 4,000 a day."

The attendance at Ballinger was 2,000, that is, that number of men, women and children went through the exhibit cars.

Lectures were illustrated by a three-car exhibit of dairy cattle, the large type market hogs and money making chickens and turkeys. A feature of the cattle exhibit was the champion Holstein bull of the United States, weighing more than 2700 pounds. This animal took first prize at the Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show this month. A Holstein cow with a record of 26,000 pounds of milk in one year also was shown.

"I want to leave this thought," said Mr. Tinsley, as he closed the meeting. "There is no doubt that farmers who keep a few milk cows, some brood sows, and a bunch of chickens, are coming through the depression in much better shape than are those who depend on the single crop of cotton, or wheat, or something else. We are not asking farmers to give up any crop they raise, but we do ask them to go in for dairying, hog raising, and poultry



9,761,818 BALES COTTON RAISED DURING 1922

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 20.—The American cotton crop for 1922 was placed at 9,761,817 equivalent to five hundred pound bales, by the Census Bureau in a final report on ginnings today. The report closes the count for the 1922 season.

The Department of Agriculture estimated the crop at 9,064,000 bales last December. The Census Bureau's report of 9,729,048 running bales, including 72,182 round bales, which are counted as half bales, and 32,786 American Egyptian bales, 5,125 bales of Sea Island cotton, and 8,864 bales which the ginner estimate were turned out after the March canvass.

The Texas crop for 1922 amounted to 3,125,752 bales.

Sheriff Harston announced that the inquiry made indicated that the man was killed when his car struck the abutment of the bridge and he was thrown from the car. It was at first thought that the man had been robbed and murdered.

The Seven Points in Good Citizenship

WHAT is the ideal citizen? The question was asked at the recent conference of eminent educators and welfare workers called in Washington by the secretary of war to consider the training of American youth for citizenship and the national defense. It was asked, and it was answered.

A committee of college professors, army officers, government experts, newspaper editors and directors of numerous welfare organizations, sixty persons in all, representing many shades of American thought and many diverse points of view, attempted to define ideal American citizenship. Or, if not to define it, at least to suggest a standard by which the quality of a man's citizenship may be measured. And these learned persons finally agreed upon seven points or specifications of the attitude of a good citizen toward his country. According to their report, good citizenship in a man is as follows:

The good citizen desires to create more than he consumes, striving to add something to the world's accumulated surplus of wealth, knowledge, or beauty; he loves his country and desires to fit himself for her service, to

WACO NEGRO GIVEN SECOND DEATH VERDICT

(By Associated Press) WACO, Mar. 20.—Roy Mitchell, negro, charged with slaying Mrs. Ethel Deneamp on the night of January 19th, was convicted today and given the death penalty. The jury was out less than four minutes.

The negro was convicted last week for killing W. E. Holt, Mrs. Deneamp's companion, and given the death penalty. He is now under two death sentences.

The crowd in the court room cheered this morning when the jury returned the verdict, despite the admonition previously given by the court.

The defendant showed no emotion and was calm when the jury announced the verdict, as was the case in the first trial. He refused to take the stand in the second trial, declaring that "it would do no good."

Three other murder cases against Mitchell are set for next week, and it is expected that he will face trial on all of them.

MAN SHOT AT GRANDBURY DIES

(By Associated Press) FT. WORTH, March 20.—Cecil Tarrant, who was shot Sunday night at Grandbury by Constable C. A. Carmichael, died in a sanitarium here today. George Tarrant, former county judge of Hood county, and father of the young man, was at his bedside. Constable Carmichael said that he shot Tarrant when the young man tried to escape after he had been placed under arrest. The Grandbury grand jury has started an investigation.

TOTAL DEATH IN BLIZZARD REACHES 9

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, March 20.—Rising temperature is reported today to be following the cold wave down the Mississippi valley and over the territory from the Rocky Mountains Eastward.

The death list from the March blizzard has been increased to nine. Two deaths have been reported at Rockford, Ill., three near Baxter, Colorado, one at Chicago, one at Waukesha, Wisconsin, one near Kutch, Colorado, and one at Whiting, Indiana.

Agricultural authorities today estimated that the damage to crops will run into millions of dollars.

The temperature in the Southwest remains low, and Lockhart, Texas reported the temperature at that place was 23 above zero this morning. Farmers in the Southwest declare that the loss to fruit and truck gardens would be heavy, but livestock damage was light.

MAY REORGANIZE DISTRICT COURT

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, March 20.—A resolution calling for a reorganization of the Thirty-Fifth District Court was among the resolutions filed with the secretary of state today, which the governor will be asked to submit at the special session of the legislature. The Thirty-Fifth District is composed of Brown, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch and Runnels counties.

Gov. Neff filed with the secretary of state, with his approval, the Wood Senate bill passed at the regular session of the legislature, appropriating \$450,000 to meet the deficiencies of the state department funds incurred during the past two years.

A bill effective immediately was filed with the House resolutions committee asking Governor Neff to decline to accept the resignation of R. E. Thomason, of El Paso, as commissioner from Texas to confer with representatives of New Mexico and the federal government relative to the division of water rights. Mr. Neff has not announced his probable action in the matter.

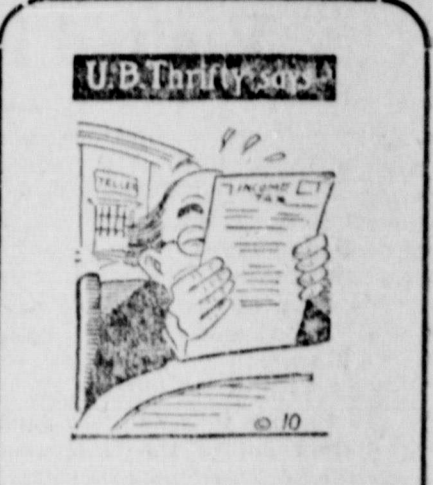

raising, at least to the extent of paying the family living expenses."

Those in charge of the train declared that the Ballinger crowd was the largest they had handled since the train started on the tour about ten days ago. By actual count more than two thousand people passed thru the train.

Winters was well represented, as well as other towns in the county. The First National Bank of Winters furnished transportation for a large crowd, and many others from that part of the county were here. The high grade livestock shown in the train created much interest even among those who are not engaged in such industry and no doubt much good will result from the campaign.

The speakers entertained two large crowds at the same time before the train was thrown open to visitors. People packed into the large waiting room of the Santa Fe passenger station, where the speakers addressed them, and at the same time those who could not get in the station were listening to a talk on dairying from the man in charge of that part of the work, who spoke from a flat car to the big crowd gathered on the pavement.

The train arrived here about five o'clock Monday afternoon, and at six-thirty the members of the party, including the trainmen, were guests of about sixty citizens at a dinner given in the Rhodes Cafe. No elaborate menu was served, nor formal program carried out. The dinner was staged as a get-together affair, and in order that the visitors might meet local citizens, get acquainted and learn that Ballinger was with them in their program and that this country is vitally interested in better live-

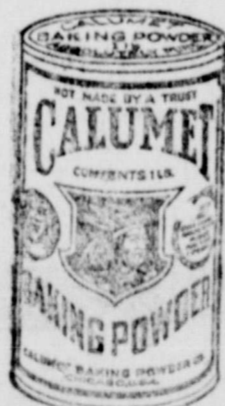

One car stolen at Ballinger last fall has been recovered, and at least one more will be recovered, according to Sheriff Flynt, who was notified a few days ago that Ballinger cars had been traced to Dallas, and from there to other points in the state where they were found.

A Ford stolen from J. H. Henderson of the Hatchel country last autumn, has been returned to Ballinger, and fully identified by its owner. The car was recovered at Granbury, after being "redistributed" from Dallas, where it was carried when first stolen. One arrest was made in connection with the theft, but the man made his escape.

Sheriff Flynt received notice that a Ford was held at Corsicana, which belonged to a Ballinger person. Three Fords are missing from Ballinger and there is considerable speculation as to who will get the Corsicana Ford. Mrs. R. A. Nicholson, Rufus J. Wheeler and C. P. Shepherd are all short a Ford. They were stolen several months ago, and the owners had long since given up and forgotten their losses, but it is expected that the Ford now being held at Corsicana will be restored to its owner, or to the insurance company, in case the owner carried insurance at the time the car was stolen, and have long since adjusted the loss with the owner.

The recovery of the cars, it seems, was brought about by the confession of a woman in the case. The woman is alleged to have "squealed," and in her story told where the various cars were purloined, and at least two of them were picked up at Ballinger. A description of the car being held at Corsicana will determine to whom of the three Ballinger persons it belongs.

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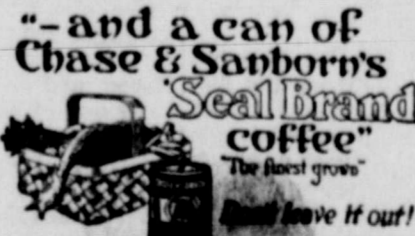
