## PREPARING TO FIGHT OIL FIRE WITH STEAM

(By Associated Press)

CORSICANA, May 11.—The huge Hughes-McKie wildcat gusher, which has been burning wild since Wednesday afternoon, will be placed under control soon, it is believed and predicted by J. K. Hughes, president of the Hughes Development Company which brought in the well Tuesday night.

Twenty boilers have been brought to the scene of the fire and a complete battery of steam will be turned on the belching gusher in an effort to smother out the flames. The monster flame is fed by a constant flow of gas and oil and the flames can be seen for a distance of fifty miles.

The death list to date totals fifteen men, who were caught near the well when the explosion occurred which ignited the gushing oil and set the men's clothing saturated with oil on fire before they could escape. Some of the remains were not recovered from the flames, the bodies being completely incinerated.

## USING SKELETON BEFOR G. JURY

CHICAGO, May 11.—Members of the grand jury which is investigating the disappearance of Leighton Mount, a Northwestern University Freshman two years ago, and the recent discovery on an Evanston pier of a skeleton of what is believed to be that of Mount, went to Evanston today to view the bones. A party of physicians attached to the coroner's staff is also preparing to examine the bones.

As yet it is understood that no expert testimony concerning the skeleton has been heard by the grand jurors.

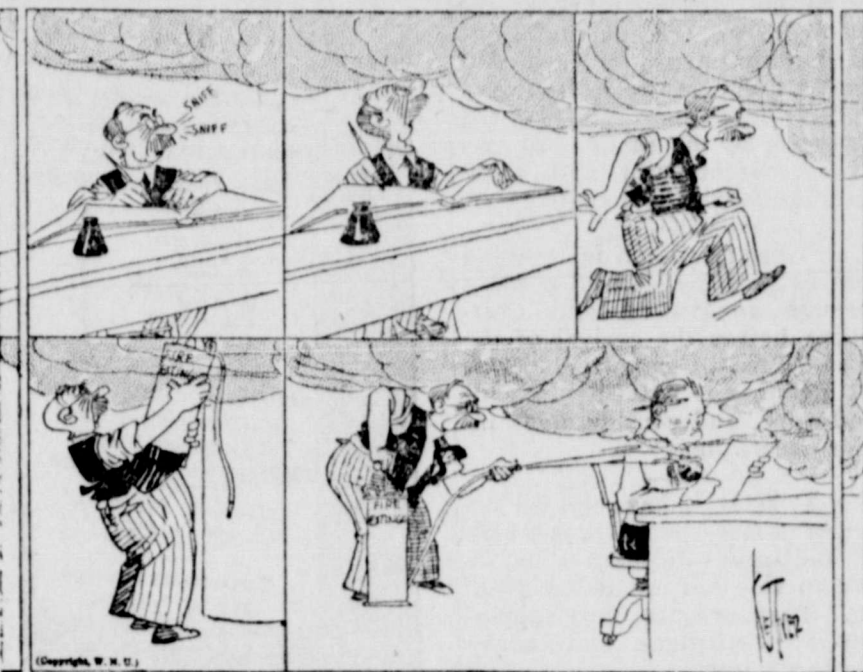

## NEFF OPPOSES PEN CONTRACT

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, May 11.—Governor Neff had no proposal to make to the Senate as a substitute for contracts made by the prison commission for employment of the inmates of the penitentiary when the Senate penitentiary subcommittee conferred with the state's chief executive today. Mr. Neff told the committee that it was expressly understood that the contracts signed by the commission would not become effective until approved by the governor and attorney general.

The attorney general held that the contracts were illegal.

AUSTIN, May 11.—Two Senate bills were engrossed in the House today. One authorizing the purchase of additional lands for the A. & M. College, and the other appropriating \$25,000 for the erection of a monument to the memory of General Sam Houston.

The committee on common carriers reported favorably the Senate bill increasing the salaries of state railroad commissioners from \$4,000 to \$5,000 per year.

A compromise agreement on the judiciary appropriation bill was reached, the members of the committee stated.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—Chinese government officials promised Jacob Gould Schurman, American minister at Peking today that the Chinese will consider a general policy for the extermination of bandits in China as soon as the present situation growing out of the capture of Americans and other foreign citizens by the brigands at Shantung is adjusted. The Chinese government assured the American minister that no time will be lost in handling the situation.

## \$83,000 CATTLE DEAL IN CONCHO COUNTY

THRILLS GALORE IN SENSATIONAL SCENIC COMING TO FOTOSHO

"Hunting Big Game in Africa with Gun and Camera," a Universal picture which will be shown at the Fotosho Theatre here three days, May 21st, 22nd and 23rd, is a drama of the wilds that forms as fascinating a story as any conceived by the master creators of fiction.

Sixty thousand miles of the dark continent were traversed by the expedition, headed by H. A. Snow, to obtain these startling views of all sorts of beasts from antelopes to zebras, including species seldom seen in museums or zoological gardens.

This is the same picture that ran for three months at the Lyric Theatre in New York.

All honor is due to Mr. Snow and his associates for the courage with which they faced not only the perils of charging animals but the even more prevalent dangers of disease and the constant privations entailed by a trip through hundreds of miles of waterless regions in blistering heat. Because the temperature during the day was so high that the film was melted as soon as it touched water, the photographers were compelled to do their developing at night in a special fliuver laboratory.

If one is impressed by the bravery of H. A. Snow, whose marksmanship on more than one occasion saved members of his party from death, what must be said for Sidney Snow, the photographer, who stuck to his camera grinding away with lions, leop-

ards and other preying animals skulking near enough for close-ups of the clearest definition!

In the midst of the most exciting adventures one suddenly realizes that during all the hazard the cameraman was there, cranking, cranking, cranking, without the comfort of a rifle butt pressing against his shoulder. Once, when an infuriated rhinoceros, charged straight for him, Snow remained with his apparatus until a moment before the ponderous beast smashed it to bits. Perfect pictures of one hunter firing three shots at the rhino without effect and then the discharge of another man's weapon bringing down the monster are given.

This particular thrill, keen as it is, is overshadowed by a battle with elephants. The party comes upon the crater of an extinct volcano, three miles in diameter. In the cup-shaped depression over-run with vegetation, hundreds of elephants roam, probably never before disturbed by man.

One of the elephants, evidently the leader, towers above the bushes like a prehistoric mastodon. Enraged by the intrusion, the elephants assemble in large groups, surrounding the hunters. One almost hears the thunder of their feet and their wild trumpeting as they lumber toward their quarry. From all sides they come surrounding the little party. A shot from a high-powered rifle sends the giant chief tumbling to the ground. The rest of the herd, in alarm, break and flee for the bushes.
