## WAGES WAR ON CROOKED DEALS

(By Associated Press)  
MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Aug. 28.—The promise of legal protection for the American public against dishonest business was made here today by Assistant Attorney General Seymour, in charge of the anti-trust prosecutions of the Department of Justice. Such promise was made by Mr. Seymour in an address before the National Association of Attorneys General.

Seymour criticized severely those who speculate in foodstuffs and the promoters of fake stocks and other worthless securities, and paid his respects to trade associations operating to increase commodity price or decrease competition.

## GETTING READY FOR COURT TERM

District Attorney Walter U. Early was here from Brownwood Tuesday looking over the evidence compiled by investigations into criminal cases which will probably be called for trial at the coming term of court, and investigating the killing of F. J. Kuhn at Rowena last week.

Mr. Early was in conference with the sheriff's department while here, and familiarized himself with the testimony in several criminal cases. He stated that the state would do everything possible to mete out justice to the slayer of Kuhn, and assured the friends of the dead man that there would be no delay in the trial of the case on the part of the state.

There has been considerable feeling among the Rowena people over the murder of Kuhn, and it was feared that mob violence might result, but some of the leading citizens of Rowena and the older heads appealed to those who were worked up over the tragedy to permit the law to handle the case, and the threat of lynching has subsided, and the negro will be handled by the courts as the evidence in the case justifies.

Mr. Early spent a few hours here and returned home Tuesday afternoon.

## MORE AID FOR RUNNELS ROADS

Engineer Pirie is at home from Austin where he represented Runnels county before the State Highway Commission in making application for aid on highway work in this county.

Mr. Pirie reported that the commission granted aid in the sum of \$1845 for two bridges in this county, and the work will be under way at an early date. \$3000 was appropriated by the highway commission for a concrete bridge on the Ballinger-Point Rock road spanning Fuzzy Creek. This stream gets up during the rainy season to the point where travel is frequently delayed until the stream recedes. A high water bridge of the permanent modern kind, and which will serve for a long time, will be constructed at this crossing.

\$1845 was appropriated by the highway body for a concrete bridge on the branch East of Miles on the Ballinger-Miles road. This is also another little stream which delays travel when rainfall is sufficient to put out water, and a high water bridge will end the trouble.

Engineer Henry Porter and Mrs. Porter are at home from their vacation, and Mr. Porter will push plans for the new route for the Ballinger end of the Ballinger-Winters highway.

## SETS NEW RECORD FOR FAST FLYING

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Aug. 28.—Capt. Lowell Smith and Lieut. John Richter, seeking aviation records for endurance, speed and distance in flying, broke the world's record for speed in a flight of 3,000 kilometers today when they completed the sixtieth lap of their course. The time was 20 hours and 11 minutes.

The best time made in other contests was 26 hours and one minute for the sixtieth lap. The two aviators in their contest today made an average of more than 93 miles per hour for twenty hours and eleven minutes.

## BELGIANS BACK UP FRENCH NOTE

(By Associated Press)  
PARIS, Aug. 28.—The Belgian government in its reply to the last British reparations note, stands with France on the principal points of contention for maintaining the legality of the Ruhr occupation which has been established by previous action of the allies, including Great Britain. Belgium is in agreement with France that evacuation of the Ruhr valley is impossible on the simple promise of Germany to pay.

The reply was given out at the Belgian embassy here today, and the note dwells particularly upon the justice of Belgium's claims to priority in the reparations payments, and points out that thus far Belgium has received only two million gold marks more than Great Britain.

## TAKING STEPS TO SUPPLY COAL

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Governors and governors' representatives of anthracite coal consuming states are conferring here today. They adopted a resolution submitted by Governor Cox, of Massachusetts, pledging co-operation with the federal fuel administrator Wadleigh in efforts to supply the nation with fuel in the event of a hard coal miners' strike.

## BUDDIES GATHER AT GALVESTON

GALVESTON, Aug. 28.—Several thousand Legionaires members of the women's auxiliary of the American Legion are on hand today for the opening session of the fifth annual convention of the Texas Department of the American Legion and the third annual convention of the Texas American Legion Auxiliary.

Among the speakers who will address the meetings today are Senator Morris Sheppard and Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis. The program of work for the ensuing year will be offered for the approval of the convention. The program was framed by the executive committee and includes vocational rehabilitation, hospitalization efforts and more activity by Legion posts in non-partisan and non-political civic matters, the stimulation of mental and physical development in schools, the teaching of preventative diseases, medicine and sanitation in the schools of the land.

ANOTHER SAMPLE OF TEXAS LEGISLATION

The attorney general has ruled that the state superintendent has no authority to purchase a certain book which will be used in the public schools during the ensuing term.

Following the attorney general's ruling Superintendent Marrs states that the patrons of the schools could buy the books in question, and there you are.

Somewhat has got this text book business in the middle of a muddle, and after six months of litigation, and after the Texas legislature spent much time, and money too, for whoever heard of a legislature that spent time which did not also spend money, investigating the awarding of the book contract, we still don't know where little Johnny's books are coming from.

It is very kind and considerate in the state superintendent to inform the patrons that they can buy the school books if they want them. The property owners, or the tax payers, of this state are paying so much per pay for free text books, and now they are told they can buy the books if they want them.

Free text books may be all right where the law is properly handled, and where the educational authorities, or those who have charge of the buying, do the thing right, but Texas has not found it that way. Who is to blame for the failure?

tion on the part of this plaintiff; that about 11 years ago plaintiff was engaged in the business of optometry and maintained an office in the city of Nashville, Tennessee and while engaged in said business the defendant being jealous and with out cause falsely accused plaintiff of having improper relations with the women who would visit his office and publicly accused him of infidelity to such an extent that this plaintiff was forced and compelled to give up the office work by virtue of the defendant's false and malicious talk that ruined him in his business and plaintiff was forced to do itinerary work going from town to town in said occupation in an effort to have peace in the family; plaintiff continued in the business of traveling optometrist coming home at intervals to be assaulted by the defendant; that defendant so continued to work until about two weeks prior to the said separation when the defendant met him with one of her fits of ill temper in an ungovernable

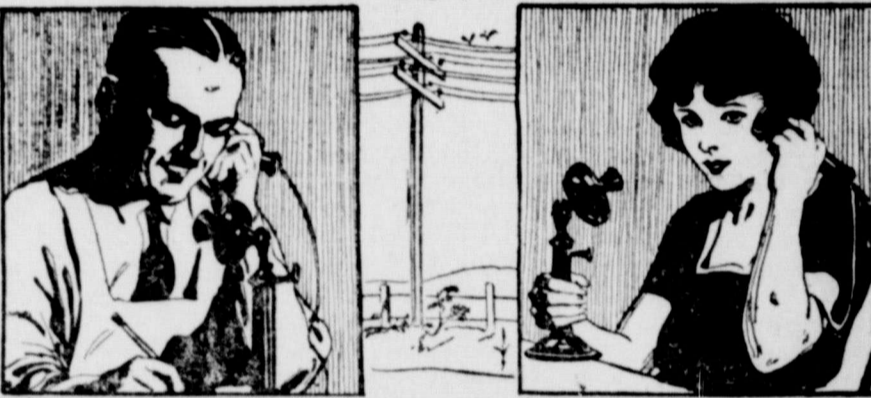

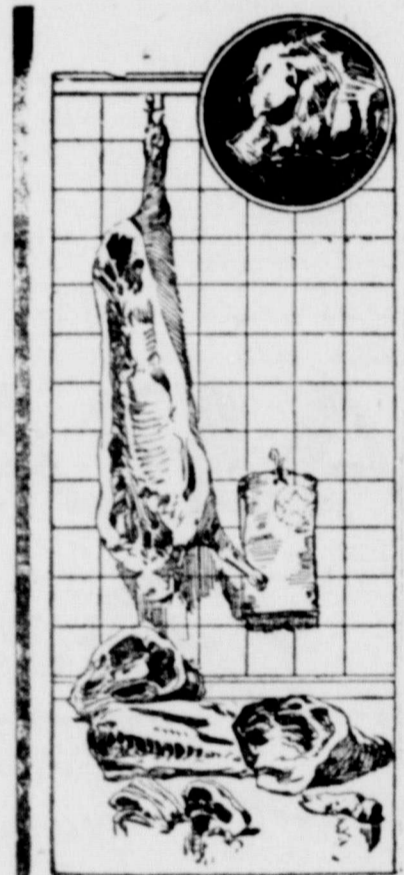

**COURT FACING  
BUSY SESSION**

With about eight liquor violation cases, one rape case and one murder case already waiting to be tried, and with about one dozen criminal cases, consisting of bootlegging, forgery and murder, pending on complaints filed in the justice court and awaiting action of the grand jury, the September term of district court at this city is facing a busy session. Court will convene on Monday, September 17th.

The murder case set for trial here at the coming term of court is the Robins case transferred to this place from Paint Rock. It will bring quite a number of witnesses here.

The recent murder case at Rowena will come before the grand jury, and it is probable that the indictment returned will be docketed for trial and the case disposed of at the September term of court on account of the nature of the case and circumstances surrounding it.

With speedy work on the part of the grand jury in returning indictments, it is also probable that some of the new bootlegging cases will come up for trial, and with the cases already docketed for trial, the court will have a busy criminal week.

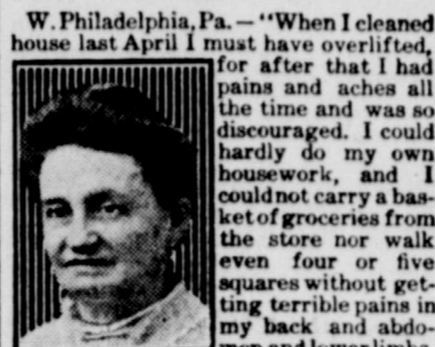

**NEW DESIGNS  
IN FORD CARS**

R. L. Harwell, local Ford dealer, returned home Sunday from Dallas where he went to confer with Ford headquarters men on business and meet with other Ford dealers. Mr. Harwell returns considerably enthused over the outlook for Ford business in Texas, and especially in his territory, as good roads create a greater demand for cars, and improvements just made in Ford designs increase the demand for Fords.

"Fords are now to come in new and improved body lines in all types," Mr. Harwell stated, and as announced Sunday by the Ford Motor Company. Mr. Harwell stated that the changes have just gone into effect and the new and various types of Ford cars are now in the course of production and will be put on the market as rapidly as turned out by the factory. In speaking of the new Ford, Mr. Harwell said:

"The new radiator sets an inch and a half higher than the former and has an apron at the bottom which joins a similar apron effect of the fender on either side, giving a highly finished appearance to the front of the car. The larger radiator also increases the cooling efficiency.

"Most conspicuous among the new types is the Ford coupe which is of entirely new body design and construction, resulting in a more trim exterior appearance, more comfortable arrangement and a greater luggage carrying capacity.

"From the dash there is a graceful sweep in the cowl to the radiator bringing a pleasing effect to the front. The doors are wide and open forward making access and

exit easy. They are heavily framed for rigidity and strength. The compartment at the rear has been enlarged to afford increased carrying capacity. The gasoline tank is under the seat, with divided cushions to afford easy filling of the tank from the right side making it unnecessary for the driver to leave his seat. Ventilator in the cowl and a visor over the windshield add much to the attractiveness of the car. A new rear fender of more sturdy character is also a feature.

"Interior fittings are of choice material and the arrangement of the deeply cushioned seat has been effected so that at the rear there is a small recess shelf for carrying parcels. The rear vision window is much larger and oblong in shape. Door windows have been equipped with revolving type window regulators and door locks are provided. Side windows are equipped with the lever type window lifters.

"Marked, too, is the improvement in the four-door sedan. Highly popular since its introduction a year ago, because of its low, graceful lines, the car now presents even much better lines and a sturdier appearance.

"This has been brought about by the installation of an entirely new cowl with a graceful sweep from the dash blending into the larger hood and radiator. The change also affords an increase in leg room for occupants of the front seat.

"In the open types, the touring car and runabout, the cowl has been enlarged and flows in a graceful curve to the higher hood.

"The result brings a most pleasing effect to the exterior appearance of both types. The improvement in the touring car which came when the one man top and slanting windshield were introduced, is greatly enhanced by the larger radiator, the car appearing lower and more attractive than ever. The effect on the roadster is likewise most appealing, giving it a more rugged and sturdy appearance."

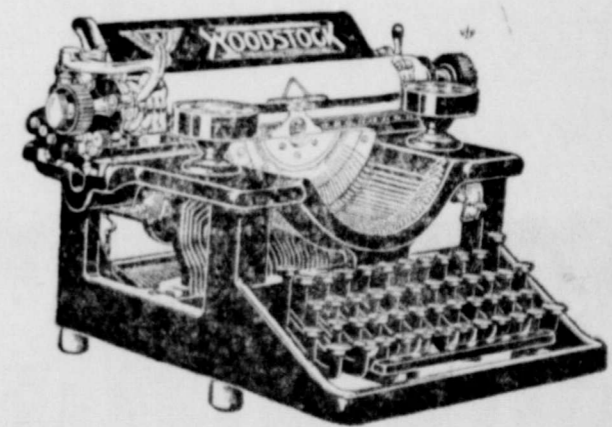

## MOVE TO REPAIR EIGHTH STREET

People owning homes and living on Eighth Street are somewhat aroused over the condition of their street, and have started a move to improve the thoroughfare.

The city commission has agreed to meet the property owners more than half way on street work, and E. Shepperd started out with a petition, or tentative contract to interest the property owners in some plan of relieving the condition of the street.

The city proposes to establish the grades, take care of the drainage and pay one-third the cost of graveling the street, said cost not to exceed \$20 per lot. The property owners are being asked to pay the other two-thirds cost of graveling the street after grades have been established.

In the absence of a permanent paving this appears to be the next best thing. With proper grade and a drainage system for taking care of the water, a good gravel street could be kept up at very little cost. A few loads of gravel from time to time in repairing would certainly be better than the rough condition in which the street is at this time.

Eighth Street should be one of the most popular streets of the city, and would be if it was passable, but there is no joy in riding on that street at this time, and people detour most any old way in preference to driving down Eighth Street in its present condition.

No doubt the property owners will fall in line and support any reasonable move for putting the street in good shape. The city is not in condition financially to build and maintain the street without the financial support of the property owners as above out-

lined. Mr. Shepperd reported Tuesday morning that he had met with splendid success in calling on the property owners. More than half of the residents on Eighth Street had signed up, and only one had hesitated to come in, and he said that he "would think about it."

Since the move has been put on foot to improve the street by graveling the surface, some of the property owners favor a more substantial character of paving, and it is possible that some plan may be adopted for putting down a paving which will be more lasting and will give the property owners and the city more for their money. Some favor a crushed rock base with tarvia finish, which it is claimed would cost but a little more money and would last many times longer than the gravel topping.
