## MILITARY PUTS POLICE BACK ON JOBS

### Severe Penalties Will Stop Crime Wave Says Judge

"Law enforcement depends upon the action of good jurors," said Judge Woodward in his charge to the grand jury Monday afternoon. Judge Woodward appealed to the newly empaneled grand jury to make a clean sweep in their investigations of crime in this county, and to set a new record for law enforcement.

"Your county attorney comes as near having everything ready for the grand jury as any man I ever saw," said Judge Woodward, and he paid the usual compliment to County Attorney Shepherd.

"I notice in his report here," said Judge Woodward, "that you have eight cases for violation of the liquor law for investigation, and there is no excuse for such violations."

Judge Woodward stated that there were sometimes excuses for men falling out, getting mad and violating the law, but that there was no excuse for the bootlegger, the forger and burglar, and the judge urged the grand jury to go after such violators and indict them where the evidence could be had.

"There never was any man lower down than the man who makes the cursed stuff and sells it to his fellowman," said Judge Woodward in discussing the liquor law violations. "Such men deliberately violate the law and they know they are doing wrong, and I want to see the time come when the jurors will say to the bootleggers, burglars and forgers, if you come into this court we will set you afire."

Judge Woodward stated that he was opposed to mob law and was in favor of giving every man a trial. He referred to the recent murdering of a white man in this county and the threatened trial of the man who was charged with the crime.

He said that he regretted that laws were not such that he could come here and give the man a trial immediately, but that no man could be tried for a crime until the grand jury returned the bill, and he said that he would try to get the case off the docket in the quickest possible time after the grand jury returned the indictment.

Judge Woodward instructed the grand jury to look into the matter of the posting of road bonds by the commissioners' court, and to see that anyone who fails to do so, but that it was an important matter that should be enforced. He referred the jury with reports of various officers, and to see that they were being properly made, and to see that they were paying money to Dick Harry," said the court, "requires that it be the proper authorities, and that you look into it."

### GARAGE LOSES FIVE CASINGS

Thieves made a raid on the display rack of automobile casings at the M. G. Justice Motor Co. Saturday night, and got away with five casings while the garage man was busy waiting on customers.

Marvin Justice, proprietor of the garage, was making a sale and assisting in changing a casing for a Mexican customer, and while his back was turned five casings were stolen from in front of the garage. Mr. Justice missed the casings a short time later when he went to close his place of business.

Mexicans were suspected, and a raid made on a bunch of Mexicans camped in a wagon yard near the garage. A Mexican, believed to have been the one who got away with the casings, made a break for liberty when the officers appeared, and Chief of Police Pilcher chased him considerable distance, taking a shot at the culprit in an effort to halt him. The Mexican fell down in some weeds and sneaked away before he could be apprehended. Later two women, who were with the Mexican, made their getaway, but all were rounded up and released, as the stolen property was not found and no evidence could be had against the Mexicans.

### Texas Rains Causes Cotton to Climb Up \$1,500,000 for Text Books Will Stand

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Heavy rains throughout Texas and Oklahoma have caused a renewal of buying in the cotton market here this morning. This development ran the prices up to a new high level for the season. October futures reached as high as 29 cents. The gains amounted to from 80 to 110 points. Galveston cotton futures registered a gain of 100 points, which is equivalent to \$5.00 per bale, the first hour of trading there today, reaching 28.50.

### SAVE MORE ON STEAM GENERATED ELECTRICITY

(By Associated Press)  
DALLAS, Sept. 17.—Steam boilers that evaporate 300,000 pounds of water an hour, increasing steam pressure and temperatures and economy in fuel consumption, are steadily reducing the cost of steam generated electricity, according to information compiled by the Texas Public Service Information Bureau. These manufacturing economies practically offset increased costs of material and labor of recent years, it is stated. The evaporation capacity of boilers for electrical central stations has increased in recent years from 20,000 pounds of water an hour to 300,000 pounds, it is said. The information bureau has been collecting data regarding such manufacturing economies in Texas plants.

### STANDARD CUTS PRICE GASOLINE

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—The tank wagon price of gasoline has been reduced one cent per gallon in New England and eight Atlantic seaboard states by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey and the Gulf Refining Company. The new price ranges from eighteen cents in Washington, D. C., to twenty-one cents in Virginia cities where the state tax on gasoline is three cents per gallon. The Texas Company immediately announced that it would meet the reduction.

### MAJORITY FAVOR TAX FOR LIBRARY

The City Commission met Monday and canvassed the votes polled in the straw election to determine whether the city should levy a six cent tax in support of the public library. The returns show 154 for the tax and 114 against the tax, giving the library a majority of 40 out of 268 votes polled. The commission adjourned without taking any action in the matter, but will no doubt carry out the wishes of the majority and prevent the library from falling into the hands of private persons and utilized for other purposes than those for which it was intended.

### NEGROES KILL FOR-MER TEXAS MAN

ATLANTA, Sept. 17.—A man was shot down here last night by two negro highwaymen. He was identified today at Lawrence A. Hamilton, formerly an oil broker in Texas.

OKMULGEE, Okla., Sept. 17.—Gov. Jack C. Walton arrived here today unexpectedly in a special car attached to the regular train from Oklahoma City. The governor was still sleeping at a late hour but members of the party said that he would proceed later today to Henrietta to address the State Labor Convention.

The Oklahoma City police department, which was taken over by the military authorities yesterday, was returned to the civil authorities this morning when Mayor Cargill served notice on Col. Key that unless Chief of Police Frazier was reinstated, the entire police force would be retired by the city and the policing of the city would be left in the hands of the military.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 17.—The military courts' inquiry into the activities of the Ku Klux Klan were in operation today in two of the largest cities in Oklahoma, Oklahoma City and Tulsa.

The Oklahoma City city court summoned as the first witness, Campbell Russell, former chairman of the State Corporation Commission.

There was no indication in any other city that military rule had been extended to all corners of the state. Creek county, which with Oklahoma county, was put under absolute martial rule Saturday night by Governor Walton, is still without a vestige of military authority.

Adjutant General Markham arrived by airplane from Tulsa today, and conferred immediately with Col. W. S. Key, commanding the troops here. It is indicated that Russell was called before the court of inquiry as a preliminary to the actual opening of the investigation into the alleged floggings that have been executed or directed in Oklahoma county.

No interruption of the regular civil court procedure occurred except that the special grand jury which was summoned to meet here today was forbidden by the military authorities.

The judge said that any good citizen who knows that the law is being violated should let it be known, and not slip around and tell the officers about it, and then ask the officers not to say anything about it. "Let's clean up things for one time," said Judge Woodward, and he appointed W. B. Currie foreman of the grand jury and sent them to their room. The grand jury went into session as soon as District Judge J. O. Woodward completed his charge, and the county attorney, C. P. Shepherd, turned over to the inquirers the evidence which had already been taken in a number of felony cases filed in justice court and in which cases the defendants are either in jail or out on bond to await action of the grand jury.

Felony cases pending on complaints filed in the justice court since the last term of court, are as follows:

State of Texas vs. J. C. King, charged with forgery and passing forged instrument in writing. King is charged by complaint in the justice court with passing a forged check on A. Krauss, a merchant at Winters. King is out on bond.

State of Texas vs. E. B. Payne, charged with manufacturing whiskey. Payne is out on bond.

State of Texas vs. Henry Connor, charged with manufacturing whiskey. Connor is out on bond.

State of Texas vs. — Buckner, charged with manufacturing whiskey. The defendant is a negro, and is still in jail.

State of Texas vs. Jim Irvin, alias "Devil," charged with selling whiskey. The defendant in this case is out on bond.

State of Texas vs. Joe Lockett, charged with seduction. Lockett has not been arrested, having left the state before the officers apprehended him.

State of Texas vs. Ford Laxson, charged with forgery.

State of Texas vs. Manuel Benaneis Rodriguez, charged with selling whiskey. Defendant is out on bond.

State of Texas vs. H. M. Malaney and Claud Mills, charged with selling whiskey. Both men are out on bond.

State of Texas vs. Frank Wimberly, charged with robbery by assault. Defendant is out on bond.

State of Texas vs. John Smith et al, (three negroes), charged with the murder of F. J. Kuhn. All three negroes are in jail.

(By Associated Press) EL PASO, Sept. 17.—T. A. Bray, president of the El Paso Humane Society, has taken two problems to the city council. He would like to see something done to prevent bull fights in Juarez from being advertised in El Paso. He also seeks to have a law passed which will stop the practice of cropping dogs ears and tails.

Bull fights, Bray holds, are barbarous and degrading. A dog's intelligence was not improved by cutting his ears or tail, he contends.

"Some persons seem to think it helps a dog's looks to cut his ears and tail," the Humane Society head said. "It used to be thought that horses' tails should be cropped too, until laws were passed prohibiting such action. It is cruelty to animals to cut a dog's tail or ears, just the same as to crop a horse's tail. There are laws against cruelty to animals and torturing dogs by trimming their ears or cutting their tails should be unlawful."

SANTA FE WILL BUILD TERMINALS

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Sept. 17.—Excavation for freight terminals, said to embrace features never attempted before in a similar project and involving an expenditure of more than \$5,000,000, is under way in the heart of the business district of Dallas.

The project, launched by the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway, includes a nineteenth-story office building, and one ten-story and two eight-story warehouses, all linked together by a five-track underground rail system, connecting with the Santa Fe lines.

The office building, fronting 135 feet on Commerce street, will extend Southward 200 feet to Jackson street. It will be of steel and concrete construction, finished with marble, granite and stone.

The ten-story warehouse, directly South of the office structure, across Jackson street, will have a ground area of 161 by 200 feet and will contain 335,290 square feet of space.

On the ground floor will be located local offices of the Santa Fe, restaurants, and drug stores. The nineteenth floor will be surrounded by a six-foot balcony, giving outside access to offices through French doors.

The ten-story warehouse, directly South of the office structure, across Jackson street, will have a ground area of 161 by 200 feet and will contain 335,290 square feet of space.

The fourth unit, also a warehouse of eight floors will face 150 feet on Young street, running back 171 feet to Marilla street. It will be used for cold storage and other industrial purposes under leases, said to have been signed.

The warehouses will be of face brick over steel and concrete. The total floor space of the terminal system will be more than 1,000,000 square feet.
