## WAR IN GERMANY; DICTATOR NAMED

(By Associated Press)  
LONDON, Sept. 27.—Street fighting between communist, and a section of less extreme radicals is reported from Dresden where the parties are holding meetings and processions, says a Berlin dispatch to the Central News.

One man has been killed and five fatally wounded, and twenty others injured.

(By Associated Press)  
MOSCOW, Sept. 27.—Chairman Lavroff, of the Russian Karelian Border Commission, was killed, and two other members of the commission wounded by assassians at the frontier while they were returning from Finland, according to dispatches received here from Petrosavodsk.

BERLIN, Sept. 27.—An immediate proclamation that a state of emergency throughout German had been decided upon at a hurriedly called midnight session of the German cabinet, attended by General Von Seeckt, chief of staff was announced today.

Minister of Defense Gessler has been given executive authority to put into force any military and police measures which he might deem necessary in the circumstances. The action is construed as virtually placing Germany in the hands of a military dictator. The action was taken when the news of the appointment of Dr.

Von Kahr as military dictator of Bavaria was received in a proclamation issued intended to offset Bavarian manifest protesting the action of the Berlin government in called off the passive resistance in the Ruhr.

Bavaria's measures were wholly prompted by suspicious activities of guards of Adolph Hitler, national socialist leader.

## WORLD SHORT ON COTTON

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—The world's stock of cotton, visible and in spinners hands, on July 31st, end of the cotton year, were five million three hundred and fifty-nine thousand bales, as estimated by the International Federation of Cotton Spinners, the American Agricultural Commissioner at London reported today by cable.

This quantity is one million and forty thousand bales less than the estimate made by the Department of Commerce on September 10th.

## ENGINEER DIES IN COLLISION

(By Associated Press)  
OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 27.—John Fleenor, engineer of the Rock Island in charge of a freight train, was killed and several persons were injured near Concho, Oklahoma, early today when the train collided headon with passenger train No. 31, fast South bound for Dallas.

The crews of both trains declare that they were running under orders to proceed, and the blame for the collision has not been fixed. The engines of both trains telescoped, the baggage car demolished and mail car was thrown from the track. No other cars of the passenger train left the track.

## TWO KILLED IN JAIL DELIVERY

DALLAS, Sept. 27.—Peace officers in Dallas and nearby counties are today seeking several persons who are believed to be involved in an unsuccessful attempt to liberate the prisoners in jail here last night, in which two were killed and one wounded.

The dead are Charles E. Gaines, condemned postal bandit, and Willis Champion, assistant jailer, and deputy sheriff. Sidney Welk a convicted murderer, was wounded.

An automobile, said to have been driven by a woman, and which circled around the jail during the gun battle between the officers and two prisoners, is being sought by the officers.

## OKLAHOMA PLOT THICKENS AS NEW ISSUES CREEP IN

(By Associated Press)  
OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 27.—The state today is in doubt as to the official status of its lower house of the legislature branch, as the law makers prepared to take their cause in the conflict with Gov. J. C. Walton to the courts.

The legislators hold that they formally convened yesterday, notwithstanding the military interference. This presents an unprecedented problem which it will probably require court proceedings to untangle.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 27.—Military activities in Oklahoma were extended to the third county in the state today as preparations were being made by members of the house of representatives to institute injunction proceedings in district court to restrain Gov. Walton from prohibiting the meeting of the house members.

Fifty militiamen moved unannounced into the county seat of Wagoner county at noon, where it is expected that they will attempt to stop any court proceedings against Walton.

The attorneys preparing the injunction against Walton declared that they were girded for a battle to the supreme court on the question of the right of the representatives to convene themselves.

Walton apparently backed down again today, when he said "the fight is over so far as the house

is concerned." The governor stated that when court action was begun he probably would not appear or be represented before the court.

It was stated that sixteen persons had been named in grand jury indictments at Wagner for alleged participating in a flagging.

**WHAT PARENT-TEACHERS ASSOCIATION ARE NOT**

The organizing of a Parent-Teachers Association here a short time ago has raised the question in the minds of some as to the aims, purpose and benefits of such an organization, and in order that all who are interested in the welfare of our schools may know, The Ledger carried an editorial yesterday briefly stating what some of the things the parents could do to help the school. Following is an editorial published by the Texas Congress of Mothers, which gives further light on the Parent-Teachers Association and what it will do:

"They are not a grievance committee to whom shall be referred incidents affecting the individual parent and the individual teacher.

"They are not framers of school regulations.

"They are not to supplant the duties of the school trustees, but to supplement them.

"They are not dispensers of school positions.

"They are not advocates of persons, but of principles.

"They are not for the purpose of criticising the individual teacher's method of teaching.

If you are interested in knowing more about the Parent-Teachers Association, the best way to find out is to attend the meeting at the High School Auditorium Friday afternoon at four o'clock.

**WHAT IS NEWS?**

An item-making comparison with the amount of space given by metropolitan newspapers to recent prize fights with the attention given in the same papers to industry has made an impressive round of the country news papers. It has probably appeared in half the weekly papers in Texas. Part of the item is as follows:

"Contrast the publicity given to these events with the few lines that are sent out over the wire when a railroad places a \$50,000,000 order for equipment or material which will give employment to thousands of workmen for months; or when a hydro-electric plant, built at a cost of from \$25,000,000 to \$100,000,000, turns in the water that makes electric current for thousands of homes, farms and factories; or when a telephone cable is laid at an expense of \$35,000,000 from Chicago to New York for the better service of millions of people. Such event may be given a paragraph over the wires.

"And so it goes. Industry that furnishes the bread and butter and keeps the wheels of progress going is such an ordinary occurrence it is given scant attention and is not considered 'important news'."

With a few exceptions the big daily newspapers give prominent space to sensational events. The idea is that their readers want such news. A police raid on a

The seven gins at Winters are running on full time, according to reports from that city, and are not able to keep up even at that. Many wagons of cotton line up and wait for hours before their turn. The rush would be greater if pickers were available. The cotton is being moved as fast as the pickers and gins can handle it.

Tuesday of this week the Winters gins turned out 558 bales of cotton, and are tying out an average of better than 500 bales per day.
