### GREECE PAYS ITALY; TROUBLE NOW ENDED

(By Associated Press)  
 ROME, Sept. 29.—The Greco-Italian trouble resulting from the assassination of the Italian members of the Albanian boundary commission on August 27th has definitely been settled, and what threatened to throw the country into serious conflict has been averted.  
 Fifty million lira, the indemnity agreed upon by the council of ambassadors, has been paid by Greece to Italy. The amount was received today by the director general of the Bank of Italy from the Bank of Switzerland, and the payment of the indemnity closes the incident, Greece having already apologized to the Italian government.

A lira (when at par) is equal to about 19 cents in Uncle Sam's coin.

### ROWENA GINS ARE RUNNING FAST ALSO

Fred Keichle, cashier of the Rowena bank, was in Ballinger early Saturday morning, and hurried back home to get ready for the Saturday rush. Mr. Keichle reported that more than three thousand bales of cotton had been ginned at Rowena up to date, and the gins were running on full time. Rowena will receive more cotton this year than last, it was stated.

A message was received on Thursday afternoon by Mrs. C. L. McCartney announcing the death of Mrs. Bettie Brinkley of Lebanon, Tenn., oldest sister of Judge McCartney. Judge McCartney had been in Lebanon with his sister for several days before her death.—Brownwood Bulletin.

### DOUBLE SLAYING PARTLY SOLVED

(By Associated Press)  
 BEAUMONT, Sept. 29.—The double slaying of P. O. Rial and Miss Bessie Carl near here last September 1st is believed to be partly solved with the arrest of Verlie Adams, a 15 year old negro boy, who gave the officers an alleged description of the slayer. He told the police that the couple was beaten to death with an iron bar by another negro, who then shot Rial.  
 The police have spread a dragnet and expect to make an arrest shortly.

### COURT SAYS THAT PEOPLE CAN VOTE

(By Associated Press)  
 OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 29.—The State Supreme Court today denied the application from Gov. Walton for a rehearing on the appeal from the decision of the secretary of state that would have prevented a vote Tuesday on the initiated bill to prevent the legislature to convene itself to investigate the official conduct of state officials. This removes the last legal obstacle to the submission of the question. It will be voted on unless some new action to prevent it is instituted.

### COURT TAKES UP MURDER CASE MONDAY

John Smith, negro, charged with murdering F. J. Kuhn, druggist, farmer, and one of the most prominent citizens of Rowena, will be arraigned for trial here Monday when court convenes at 1:30.

It is expected that the case will be tried without delay, as it is one which aggravated the minds of the people of the Rowena country. A venire of 100 men will be here, and with others who are interested in the case it is expected that quite a crowd will be here to attend court.

The two negroes who were with Smith when Kuhn was killed are still in jail pending further investigation in the case. They were eye witnesses to the tragedy, but deny being in any way implicated. The confession of the negro Smith does not tally with the circumstances, and it is probable that there will be some sensational developments in the trial of the case. Smith claims that Kuhn got a pistol out of his car and attempted to shoot Smith, when Smith overpowered Kuhn and killed him with the white man's own gun. Kuhn had a pair of heavy canvas gloves on when his body was found, and friends do not believe that he would have attempted to use an automatic pistol with gloves on.

### ASSOCIATION NAMES MORE COMMITTEES

All those who come into the Parent-Teachers Association before its next regular meeting on the fourth Friday in October will be taken in as charter members. This was decided upon at the meeting held Friday afternoon of this week, and which was well attended. ### RAILROADS WANT MURDER SUSPECT 30,000 GERMANS SPIRITED AWAY

(By Associated Press)  
 MAYENCE, Germany, Sept. 29.—Franco-Belgian authorities operating railroads in the Rhineland and Ruhr districts opened a recruiting office here today with the object of engaging 30,000 German railroad men for these lines. All men engaged will be required to take an oath to obey the allied civil and military authorities.

This followed the official announcement at Berlin of the annulment of the ordinance suspending deliveries of any kind to France and Belgium.

### MORE RIOTING IN GERMANY

 DUSSELDORF, Germany, Sept. 29.—Rioting lasting several hours occurred in the suburbs of the city last night. Reinforcements came up and drove off the attacking party, and several members of the mob were severely wounded.

 MT. PLEASANT, Tex., Sept. 29.—The funeral of Otis Ballard, 19 years old, who was found murdered in Cypress Creek, six miles South of here yesterday, will be held today. A negro and two white boys who are suspected of implication in the murder, were spirited from Mount Vernon to Greenville last night. Thirty angry men who began pursuit of the officers who were taking Glen Gray, charged with bank robbery, to the Bowie county jail at New Boston, following the discovery of the Ballard boy's body, gave up the chase within four miles of New Boston. The Ballard boy was a material witness in bank robbery cases both in Titus and Upshur counties.

### DALLAS TESTS TRUTH SERUM

 DALLAS, Sept. 29.—Scopolamin, "the truth serum," was administered to Sidney Welk in the county jail here last night in an effort to learn how he and C. E. Gaines came into possession of the two pistols used Wednesday night in an attempt to break jail. Officers said that Welk spoke freely under the influence of the drug, but stopped with the assertion "we had good luck."

### COLEMAN YOUTH MEETS TRAGIC DEATH

E. M. Jones, age 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Jones, of Coleman, was killed in Vaughn, New Mexico, by a train Wednesday morning. According to a report of the tragic death of the young man, as given by the Coleman Democrat-Voice, he was en route to California with a train load of cattle, and it is presumed that he was either run down, or fell from the train while in the freight yards at Vaughn. His parents at Coleman were notified and the remains arrived there Thursday afternoon for burial.

The deceased was known in Ballinger, and he was a student in the Ballinger schools a few years ago. He attended A. & M. College last year, and went to New Mexico where his sister lives in the summer, and had been working for the Radford Grocery Co. The trip to California with the cattle train, it is presumed, was taken as an adventure and to see more of the country.

The young man is the first to die in a happy family of eight children, two boys and six girls.

### THREE MORE BODIES TAKEN FROM STREAM

 CASPER, Wyo., Sept. 29.—Three bodies, two badly mangled, were recovered early today from the wreck of Burlington passenger train No. 30 which crashed through a bridge into Cole Creek, 15 miles East of here Thursday night. This makes five of thirty or more victims that have been recovered, two having been found yesterday.

### STORMS KILL EIGHTEEN IN NEBRASKA

(By Associated Press)  
 OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 29.—Eighteen people are known to have been killed as the result of heavy wind and rain storms that visited parts of Nebraska and Western Iowa late yesterday and last night. The death list had reached eighteen at an early hour this morning, with reports incomplete.

OMAHA, Sept. 29.—Three people are missing and more than a dozen seriously injured with property damage estimated at more than \$500,000, in the Nebraska-Western Iowa storm. The dead included five at Council Bluffs, Iowa, where a tornado struck last night. Eleven people were killed at Louisville, Nebraska, when a house was washed into a mill creek following a cloudburst. One man, a physician at Marquette, Nebraska, was killed when a car turned over during a blinding rainstorm.

Water today was running from three to six feet deep in the streets at Council Bluffs.

 Any one of the larger daily newspapers of Texas of same date carry more news concerning the Oklahoma disturbance than either of the papers coming from the seat of the trouble. This is also in keeping with reports brought back by people who have visited in Oklahoma.

While the feeling between the Klan and the Walton faction is pretty bitter, and while it would not take much to start a real rumpus, at the present time there is more racket than rumpus, and according to first hand reports from Oklahoma, business is moving along as though there was no military rule.

It is very evident from reading the papers that there are three sides to the Oklahoma controversy. One side is charging the Klan as being responsible for the trouble. Another side is charging the governor with it, while the third faction sees both the governor and the Klan as to blame.

**WAS IT A SKIN GAME?**

A message received at Coleman Sunday morning addressed to Mrs. D. W. Watson, announced the death of her brother, R. W. (Kit) Carson in Oklahoma City. The message was from Mrs. T. W. Stribbling of Dallas, who is a sister of Mrs. Watson. Mrs. Stribbling had received the message from a person in Oklahoma City who stated the body was held at an undertaking establishment in that city and asked as to what disposition to make of the body. Upon receipt of the message Mrs. Watson conferred with Walter C. Woodward who communicated with the undertaking company by telephone. Before talking to Oklahoma City, however, he got in connection with Teague, Texas, where Mr. Carson was employed at last account. The person at Teague informed Mr. Woodward that R. W. Carson had not been off his job but was at work up to midnight Saturday. That information created a doubt in Mr. Woodward's mind as to the accuracy of the report that R. W. Carson had been killed in Oklahoma City. When the Oklahoma party answered the phone call, he informed Mr. Woodward that \$300 was needed to defray the undertaker's expenses and send the body to Coleman. After further questioning Mr. Woodward concluded that it was a case of mistaken identity or else an attempted "skin game," and he directed that the matter be held in abeyance until further notice. Sunday night, telephone communication was had with Mr. Carson at Teague and he was very much alive after a day's fishing trip. Mr. Woodward has written the Oklahoma undertaker to find out the facts in the case, but up to last account had not received a reply.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

### RAISES FUND FOR CHURCH SCHOOLS

Schedules are now being arranged for the statewide Presbyterian movement for Christian education carrying with it a quota of \$1,350,000 according to announcement received by the local publicity representative in this city. It is planned to open up the work throughout the state at an early date and finish up if possible by July 1, 1924. According to information received there are about 40,000 Presbyterians in Texas and hearty support is being given the movement to strengthen their educational institutions. The apportionments are fixed as follows:

Texas Presbyterian College, Milford, \$40,000 for equipment, and \$100,000 for endowment.

Austin Presbyterian Seminary, Austin, \$100,000 for endowment.

Daniel Baker College, Brownwood, \$75,000 for equipment and \$100,000 for endowment.

All other institutions will use their apportionment for equipment as follows: Work at Normal school centers of Commerce, San Marcos and Huntsville, \$10,000; Presbyterian orphanage, Itasca, \$20,000; Tex-Mex Institute, Kingsville, \$25,000; Presbyterian School for Mexican Girls, Taft, \$20,000; Church for University students, Austin, \$100,000; Presbyterian work at College of Industrial Arts and North Texas State Normal, Denton, \$10,000; Presbyterian work at A. & M. College, College Station, \$40,000.

The remainder of the fund will be used for debts incurred by the institutions because of increased attendance and inability to care for the larger number by the colleges.

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Sept. 29.—A statewide industrial conference to discuss methods for development of industrial activities of Texas, will be held here Saturday, October 6, at the call of officials of the Texas Chamber of Commerce. J. Perry Burrus, Dallas, chairman of the industrial department executive committee, will preside at the conference.

The primary purposes, according to Burt C. Blanton, industrial engineer, follow: proposal for a state-wide service to establish industries, including a directory of manufacturers; co-ordination of state industrial activities, including those of state, county and city officials; plans for developing new industries by collection of data and investigation of sites, etc.; formulate plans for advertising Texas natural resources and manufactured products, and consideration of co-operation with a view to developing trade in Mexico and Latin American republics.
