## INJUNCTION HALTS ELECTION RESULTS

### NEGRO GIVEN 37 YEARS FOR MURDER OF KUHN

The jury in the John Smith, negro, murder case, returned a verdict of guilty at ten-thirty Wednesday morning, and fixed the penalty at thirty-seven years in the penitentiary. The case went to the jury at 3:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, and it was soon reported that the jury was hung on a question of penalty.

The negro was charged with the murder of F. J. Kuhn, on the Kuhn farm near Rowena, the killing resulting from a quarrel over cultivating a crop. Kuhn was badly beaten about the head, and was shot through the head with his own pistol, which the negro claimed that Kuhn tried to shoot him with, but was overpowered by the negro.

The negro escaped following the murder and was arrested the next day by Nolan county officers near Blackwell. Kuhn's friends gathered here in large numbers following the arrest of the negro and there were threats of mob violence, but the negro was carried from Sweetwater to Colorado, Texas, for safe keeping, and was not brought to Ballinger until feeling against the prisoner had subsided.

With two juries working district court continued to grind away on criminal cases Wednesday. While the jury in the John Smith, negro, murder case, was still deliberating, another jury was selected and the case of the State of Texas vs. M. Bahm, charged with manufacturing intoxicants, went to trial. Bahm is a Bohemian and cannot speak English, and it was necessary to swear in an interpreter. However, only two witnesses were placed on the stand, both being witnesses for the state.

Sheriff J. P. Flynt and Deputy Sheriff Goetz, of Rowena, who made the raid on Bahm's home near Rowena, both testified that a still was captured and four gallons of liquor found in Bahm's home. At the time of his arrest it was alleged that the defendant made a confession, and this confession was reduced to writing, and sworn to by the defendant, but the court held the confession was not admissible in the trial of the case as it was made in the English language through an interpreter.

The defense did not offer any testimony in the case, counsel for the state had not made out a case, and only offered a few character witnesses, who testified that Bahm was a law-abiding and peaceful citizen. The case went to the jury shortly after noon and other criminal work was taken up.

### CONVICTS SHOOT GUARDS IN DASH FOR LIBERTY

(By Associated Press)  
EDDYVILLE, Ky., Oct. 3.—Four convicts in the penitentiary here this morning staged a desperate attempt to break out. Led by Monte Walters, alleged murderer, who procured arms in some way, the four men opened fire on the guards, killing one of the guards and wounding four others.

The convicts were cornered in the dining room of the prison, where they kept up the fight with the forty guards by constant firing on them. The guards were soon reinforced by citizens, who now have the place surrounded, and the guards continued firing on the room where the convicts are barricaded, and unless the convicts surrender they will all be slain.

### POLL TAX PAYING SEASON WITH US

J. L. Kennedy, of Winters, holds 1923 poll tax No. 1. Mr. Kennedy was the first man to pay his poll tax. Of course Mrs. Kennedy got No. 2. Mr. Kennedy was not the first man to pay his taxes, however; R. L. Atkins, of the Wingate country, was the first 1923 property tax payer, but Mr. Atkins is above the poll tax paying age.

The tax rolls were approved by the Commissioners' Court last Friday, and immediately passed up to the tax collector, and Collector W. L. Brown began to sharpen his pencil for business. By Wednesday morning seven polls had been issued, and School Tax Collector W. T. Padgett reported that several school tax payers had kicked in.

Due to the fact that next year promises to be the warmest political campaign in the history of Texas, or at least the hottest in recent years, and as the country is in good condition financially, it is expected that early and heavy tax paying will result, and that the largest number of polls ever paid in this county will be issued.

### SAN SABA IS IN IRRIGATION FIGHT

Stuart L. Williams and Carl S. Guin are at home from San Saba where they had been in the interest of the creation of an irrigation district at that place. Mr. Williams is president of the State Conservation and Reclamation Association, and Mr. Guin is a member of the committee. Mr. Williams stated that a hearing was held at San Saba for an election to create a district at that place similar to the one voted upon at Ballinger some time ago. Up to the time they left San Saba the question had not been ruled on, but Mr. Williams stated that it was probable that the irrigationists had made an error in their petition and the election would not be ordered until the work was done over and a new petition prepared. He stated that practically the same opposition had developed against the project that was made in the Ballinger campaign.

### TEXAS LEADS ENTIRE NATION IN DIVORCES

WASHINGTON, October 3.—One divorce to every 7.6 marriages in the United States last year is the record disclosed by the Census Bureau's marriage and divorce survey just completed. The survey just completed is the first made since 1916 when there was only one divorce to almost 9.3 marriages, showing that divorces are increasing at a greater rate in marriages.

Texas led the whole United States in number of divorces in 1922, with a total of 12,399, which was one for every five marriages in the state.

### YOUTH GETS 16 YRS. FOR MURDER

(By Associated Press)  
ABILENE, Tex., Oct. 3.—The jury in the case of Theodore Smith, the youth charged with the slaying of former District Attorney Joe Randal, of Jones county, returned a verdict of guilty here today and fixed the punishment at sixteen years in the penitentiary.

Randal was shot from ambush while returning to his home, the shooting taking place in Stone-wall county near Smith's home. The 17 year old boy went on the witness stand and testified that he fired the shot to kill a man by the name of Clark who he said "turned his father in to the grand jury" for selling whiskey. He said he did not know that Judge Randal was in the car with Clark. Randal was the attorney employed to defend the boy's father.

### COURT UPHOLDS F. B. CONTRACT

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, Oct. 3.—The State Supreme Court today upheld the validity of the co-operative marketing contract when it overruled a motion for a rehearing in the case of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association against J. C. Stovall, of Ellis county. This was a test suit on contracts made between the farmer and the cotton association to enforce the agreement to market cotton co-operatively.

Miss Anna Hiss, director of women's athletics, has announced several courses in riding will be offered under expert supervision. Credit will be given for the courses the same as other classes.

With the High School Classics

By MARGARET BOYD

"And if aught else great bards beside in sage and solemn tones have sung, ... Where more is meant than meets the ear!" —Penseroso.

"Well, the world has a million writers. One would think, then, that good thought would be as familiar as air and water, and the gifts of each new hour would exclude the last. Yet we can count all our good books; nay, I remember any beautiful verse for twenty years," wrote Emerson.

The classics, what Emerson calls "our good books," have, after all, changed little since Milton's day. He and succeeding writers have added a few volumes; but in general the classics of three centuries ago are the classics of today. Plato, the Greek tragedians, Homer and Shakespeare are writers whose works will endure as long as our civilization endures.

What causes a book to endure? Emerson says: "Only those books come down which deserve to last. All the gilt edges and vellum and morocco, all the presentation copies to all the libraries will not preserve a book in circulation beyond its intrinsic date. Blackstone, Kotzebue or Pollock may endure for a night, but Moses and Homer stand forever. There are not in the world at any one time more than a dozen persons who read and understand Plato—never enough to pay for an edition of his works; yet to every generation these come duly down, for the sake of those few persons, as if God brought them in His hand. . . . The permanence of all books is fixed by no effort friendly or hostile, but by their own specific gravity or the intrinsic importance of their contents to the constant mind of man."

Whatever other characteristics a classic may possess, it is safe to say of it that "more is meant than meets the ear." Children reading the classics in high school rarely enjoy them—what meets the ear is of less absorbing interest than the latest newspaper scandal, and high school pupils are usually too immature to get the meaning that does not meet the ear.

That meaning becomes clear only after one has lived with a book for a long time. One test of a classic is the number of times it will bear re-reading. "Julius Caesar," for example reveals new meanings on the hundredth reading, and would probably do so on the thousandth reading. It was of such books that Thoreau wrote: "It will be soon enough to forget them when we have the learning and genius which will enable us to attend to and appreciate them."

## MOST CARS GO WITH BEST ROADS

Special to The Ledger:— WASHINGTON, October 3.—By comparing the number of automobiles registered in a state with the population of the state, the number of persons per automobile is determined. According to statistics issued by the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce for 1923, California leads the country with 3.8 persons per motor car, while Alabama has only one car to every 26.1 persons.

The eleven states which follow Alabama up the column are Mississippi (23.1); Arkansas (20.4); Georgia (20.2); South Carolina (17.7); Louisiana (17.6); Tennessee (17.2); Kentucky (15.7); New Mexico (14.1); North Carolina (14); Virginia (13.8); and West Virginia (12.9).

The South is a prosperous section. It has money. It likes luxury as well as the North. It needs transportation. There is only one reason why the South doesn't have as many motor cars as the West, the Northwest or the North. It hasn't the roads.

A road is of no value without a vehicle, and a vehicle is of no value without a road. The two are a whole, a unit. True, there are vehicles running over poor roads, shaking themselves to pieces and costing more money to their owners in the long run than a good road would cost. But, as a rule, highways and cars go together, where the one is, the other comes.

The automobile cuts the cost of hauling, increases education, adds to the joy of living, makes for health, saves time, and promotes happiness. But as the automobile cannot work its wonders without roads over which to run, it is obvious that the step forward which will put the States in this country who have one car to five, six and seven families, into the column where one states with a car to every one or two families, is the step which leads to better roads and more of them.
