LAND QUESTION CAUSE OF MEXICAN UPRISING

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, Oct. 19.—Gen. Emiliano Ortiz, former chief of rurales in the state of Hidalgo, has revolted, according to reports from Pachuca. The reports stated that Ortiz had fled to the mountains, taking with him fifty followers, where they have raised the flag of agrarianism, and will carry on a campaign for a uniform division of land in the republic.

No word has been received today of disorders in San Luis Potosi, where there is a controversy over the governorship. Developments are expected, however, as the consequence of orders given by Governor General Gutierrez to disarm the followers of the Cedillo brothers, who are reported to be advancing upon the city of San Luis Potosi in an effort to enforce the claims of Aurelio Manrique to the gubernatorial office which is held by Jorge Prieto Laurens.

MAN SENTENCED FOR DESERTING FAMILY

(San Angelo Standard)
Mrs. Vera Reed, deserted and left penniless in a tent on 24th Street last March while an expectant mother, was buried in Fairmount Cemetery at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning.

And almost at the same time, Judge J. T. Mathison, county judge, assessed a six months jail sentence and \$50 fine against V. B. Reed, the husband, when he pleaded guilty to wife desertion. Judge Mathison in pronouncing sentence advised Reed that he would be placed at work on the county roads as soon as possible. The fine with about \$30 costs attached and the six months sentence is equivalent to an eleven months sentence, according to officials, inasmuch as prisoners are allowed only 50c a day in working out their fine.

Reed appeared here on Thursday of last week after his wife died on Monday to claim a little daughter, whom he had left with the mother early in March. His inquiry at the local sanitarium where the mother died led to his arrest.

Reed told officials that he could not get work here.

Rev. John Carney, temperance lecturer and street preacher, accompanied by his wife, delivered a lecture on the streets of Ballinger Friday morning, giving his illustrated lecture and chalk talk. In classifying crime, sin and bad characters, Rev. Carney said the lowest down man in the world was the man who had no respect for his parents, and he said that ten tin horn gamblers on a jury would acquit a man of any crime that he might be charged with.

FATHER AND SON ARE KILLED FROM AMBUSH

VALDOSTA, Georgia, Oct. 19.—Shered McGill, age 65, and son, Talley, were shot to death from ambush near here today. The bodies of both men were found in the seat of a truck in which they were riding when they were fired on by unknown persons. The heads of both the men were pierced by bullets, and they were killed instantly.

RESIGNS AS GRAND MASONIC OFFICER

WASHINGTON, October 19.—Judge George Fleming Moore, past sovereign grand commander of the Supreme Council and Inspector General of the Scottish Rite Masons in Alabama, resigned from the supreme council today. His resignation was tendered after a discussion of the Ku Klux Klan by the council.

During the debate, Judge Moore was charged by members of the council with using his weekly publication, The Fellowship Forum, which is issued here, for furthering the aims of the Klan. A consideration of his resignation was postponed.

SLIGHT FROST HERE FRIDAY

The temperature dropped to forty degrees here Thursday night, according to the government weather bureau record as reported by Local Weather Observer E. M. Eubanks.

Reports from outlying districts indicate that a slight frost formed in spots, but the frost was not of the biting kind, and no damage in this section of the country was reported. The frost was light with a big dew drenching the country.

Cotton picking has been resumed throughout the county since the rain early in the week, and most of the gins are running on full time again. The staple is being tied out in a hurry and two weeks favorable weather will see most of the cotton out of the fields. The surplus cotton pickers are already leaving the country, auto loads of Mexicans and negroes leaving daily for their homes in East Texas, South Texas and the Rio Grande border sections.

60 YEARS FOR KILLING MAN

WACO, Oct. 19.—Clarence Johnson, charged with the murder of his father-in-law, Bruce Porter, on November 28th of last year, was convicted here today and given sixty years in the penitentiary.

NO END SOON TO GOV. NEFF AND GERMAN TROUBLE PARKER IN TILT OVER PRO LAW

(By Associated Press)
BERLIN, Oct. 19.—The reported dispute between the federal government and the government of Saxony will be solved by the federal government by displacing General von Mueller, commander of the Reichswehr in Saxony, whose mode of procedure is said to have been too harsh. This action will be accompanied by a rebuke to the Saxon government for its interference in politics of the republic, the reports said.

The Stresemann government is also confronted with another unpleasant prospect. It is reported that the government has decided to recall General von Lossow, commander of the Reichswehr in Bavaria, who appears to be unable to withstand the domination of Dr. von Kapr, the Bavarian dictator. Such action is expected to meet with strong opposition from the Bavarian government, thus increasing the already serious tension between Berlin and Munich.

EL PASO STUDENTS BAN ORNAMENTS

EL PASO, Oct. 19.—Beads, earrings, and bangles are tabooed among girls of the junior class of the El Paso high school during school hours. By their own vote, the 250 young women, and likewise the young men of the class, voted that these articles should not be worn during school. At social affairs, however, such ornaments are "in style."

Last year, the same class of girls voted to do without cosmetics of any sort during school hours. This year, they adopted resolutions against the use of "conspicuous cosmetics." Lipsticks and rouge will be used "in moderation" by the class this session, it is explained.

The class also sought to agree upon a uniform dress. It was decided to wear plain clothes, neat and inexpensive, with no specified style or color.

Parker, of Louisiana, opposed the resolution and left the meeting when the memorial was adopted.

4 COOKED TO DEATH WITH MOLTEN METAL

GRAY IS GIVEN DEATH PENALTY FOR MURDER

GREENVILLE, Tex., Oct. 19.—Clem Gray, charged with the slaying of Otis Ballard at Mt. Pleasant, was convicted by a jury at Mt. Pleasant today and given the death penalty, according to a telephone message received here from Sheriff Nix, who has been attending the trial.

Ballard was a witness against Gray in a bank robbery charge, and this led to the arrest of Gray, following the finding of Ballard's body weighted down in a creek near Mt. Pleasant, after the boy had been missing for several days. Burl Kemp, negro, charged with being an accomplice, detailed how Gray murdered Ballard with an iron bar, and how Gray made him—the negro—help sink the body in a creek. Gray went on the witness stand in his own behalf and denied the negro's story, and told the jury that the negro killed Ballard, and that he helped the negro hide the body in the creek because he was afraid that he would be accused of the killing.

TWELVE CHARGES AGAINST WALTON

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 19.—The legislature held only a brief session today, while the House investigating committee worked at top speed to complete by next Monday a report on the inquiry into the impeachment charges filed against Governor J. C. Walton. The disclosing of new evidence made it impossible to complete the report. It is claimed that the report will include at least twelve charges against the governor, as the leaders expected.

EARLY DECISION DUE IN IRRIGATION SUIT

It is reliably reported that a decision will be handed down by the court of appeals in the irrigation injunction suit by the middle of December. This is the suit filed by the opponents to the Colorado river irrigation project, and which tied up the work in the irrigation district until the court passes on the validity of the law under which the district was created.

The Ballinger court ruled in favor of the anti-irrigationists in the trial of the case here, and the irrigationists immediately appealed the case. Both sides are interested in the final outcome and will watch for the court's ruling.

FARRELL, Penna., Oct. 19.—A crane operator was roasted to death in his steel cage, and four other men were so badly burned that they died a short time later in a hospital, when a cable slipped and spilled seventy tons of molten metal at the plant of the Carnegie Steel Company here last night.

Semlee, the cranesman in the open hearth department hooked onto the giant ladle carrying the metal, the load traveling above the cage. As the load approached the elevated pouring platform, where four workmen were standing, the cable slipped and the seventy tons of molten metal splashed to the floor. The metal exploded, showering the men on the platform with the hot, molten slag and they were unable to escape, being practically roasted alive, while the crane operator in his steel cage was cooked to death in the boiling metal.

RULING GIVEN ON FIRE ESCAPES

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Oct. 19.—Notices are being sent out by State Fire Marshall G. W. Tilley of provisions of the new fire escape law which was passed by the last legislature.

Warnings are given property owners that unless necessary fire escapes are provided by that time, steps will be taken to compel required protection. Failure to comply with the act is made a misdemeanor, subject to fine or not less than \$20 nor more than \$50.

The new law was enacted as result of a decision of the Court of Criminal Appeals, holding a former fire escape law unconstitutional. The new law prescribes in detail requirements on various buildings as a means of escaping a similar decision.

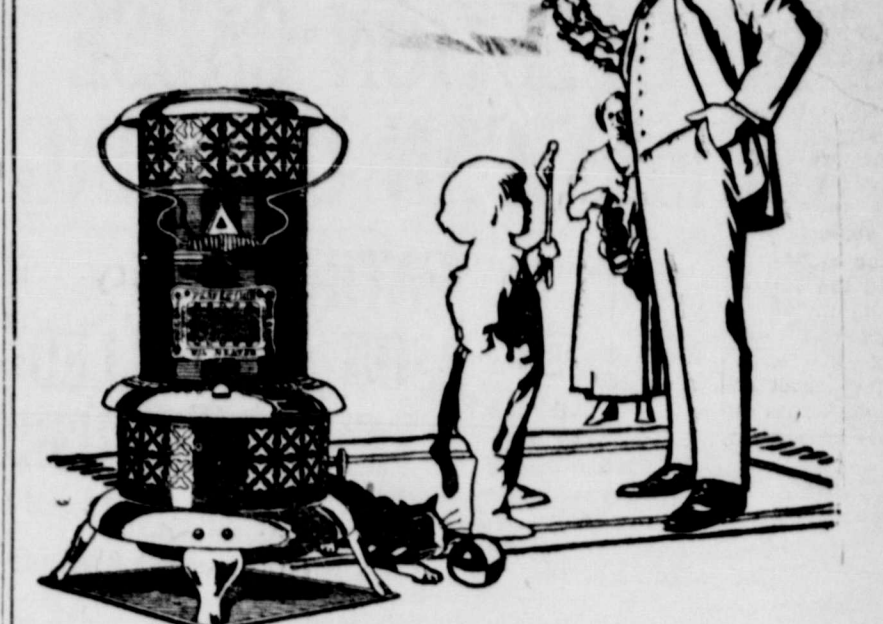

With the High School Classics

"The evil that men do lives after them; The good is oft interred with their bones."

—Julius Caesar.

It seems to us that good should be stronger than evil; just as light is stronger than darkness. Yet it is true, as Antony here points out, that the evil men do seems to outlast the good they do.

We all know that if we put a sound apple in the center of a barrel of rotten apples, the sound one will not make the rotten ones sound; but will itself become rotten. We know also that if we put a rotten apple in the center of a barrel of sound apples, it will soon spread rot to all the apples in the barrel. It is usually the same with schools and communities; one evil child or evil person will soon spread evil throughout the school or community, whereas one good child or good person will ordinarily have little effect on either.

A man may do a thousand and one good deeds and a single evil deed. If so, his community will give more weight to the one evil deed than to his thousand good deeds.

Long ago the Bible pointed out that the sins of the father should be visited upon his children to the third and fourth generations. Medical science has proved that this is true of the disease of the father, for certain diseases are inherited to the third and fourth generations, weakening all the descendants of the diseased ancestor.

What is true of disease is no doubt true of many other evils, and Maeterlinck spoke truly when he said: "There is not a gesture, a thought, a sin, a tear, an atom of acquired consciousness that is lost in the depths of the earth; and at the most insignificant of our acts, our ancestors arise, not in their tombs, where they move not, but in ourselves, where they always live."

Two things save the situation from pessimism: we struggle toward good, and not all good that a man does is interred with his bones.

Human beings do much that is evil; but they try to be good. Just as a plant tries always to get to the light and away from the darkness. What progress the race has made has been due to the good that was not interred with the bones of the doers. A Nazarene carpenter and a Hindu prince, for example, did good that has furnished inspiration for countless millions since their time. And although one good man in a community has little influence, a group of good men can save any situation, as witness the fact that Sodom and Gomorrah would have been saved had there been but ten good men in the combined cities.

Omar, as Post portrays him and as Tully writes him, is not the mere wine-bibber he is popularly conceived; instead we see him as a philosopher, poet and scientist of the highest order, whose pronouncements rank in dignity with the other leaders of philosophical thought, whose poems have a quality that has made them endure the test of time and whose scientific achievements include the inventing of the first practicable calendar.

Throughout the story of the film runs a truly beautiful tale of the love between Omar and Shireen, whom he loses thru the uxorious desires of the Shah of Shahs, only to be reunited after many years, finding happiness together after countless vicissitudes and hardships. 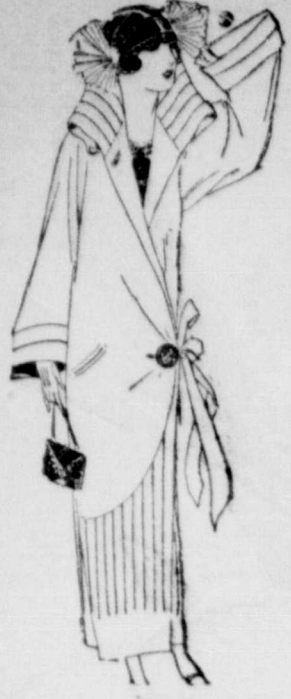
