80 KILLED; 230 HURT IN GERMAN RIOTING

LONDON, Oct. 25.—A Central News Bureau dispatch from Berlin this afternoon says that a large band of communists are marching on the German capital, and de-clares that the police have rushed out to intercept them.

The message adds that the communists are assembling in strong force in the Lichtenberger district of Berlin, but that the police have surrounded the whole neighborhood, and are not allowing anyone to pass through the cordon.






