Dr. Charles P. Steinmetz was probably the best known and most famous electrical engineer with the exception of Thomas A. Edison. His salary was said to have been set by himself each year, as allowed him by the General Electric Co. He emigrated from Germany a number of years ago, coming to this country after stepping awhile in Switzerland, and he was said to have left Europe because of the greater possibilities for electrical development in the United States.



COMMISSIONS AWARD BRIDGE CONTRACTS

The Runnels county commissioners' court was in session Wednesday and awarded contracts for bridges on the Ballinger-San Angelo road and on the Ballinger Paint Rock road. The Austin Bridge Company offered the best bids and was awarded contracts for building two concrete bridges between Rowena and Miles, and also for building a low water bridge on Fuzzy Creek on the Ballinger-Paint Rock road.

At the same time the Concho county commissioners' court approved a contract to the Austin Bridge Co. for the construction of a low water bridge on Little Fuzzy Creek on the Ballinger-Paint Rock road. This bridge will be built high enough to take care of a six foot rise, which will serve practically for all purposes as rises seldom get higher than that on the small stream.






