## 4 OF POSSE WOUNDED; MISTAKEN FOR BANDITS

(By Associated Press)  
TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Nov. 22.—Four members of a volunteer posse, organized to search for a supposed bank robber, were shot and seriously wounded by a posse headed by Sheriff Herman Weber in a gun battle at Cory, South of here this morning.

As the sheriff's posse was approaching Cory they were met by the citizens' posse, and believing them to be bandits the citizens' posse called for the sheriff's posse to halt. The sheriff, believing that he had been ambushed, opened fire on the citizens' posse, wounding four of them.

No bank had been robbed, but the two posses were searching for a party of men reported to have been acting in a suspicious manner in that vicinity.

## CLAIM WATERMELONS MAKE GOOD MOLASSES

RISING STAR, Tex., Nov. 22.—West Texas' latest agricultural development is manifested here in the making of syrup and molasses from watermelons. J. B. Banks, who lives in the Macedonia community near Rising Star, has developed a plan by which he has made several hundred gallons of excellent syrup from ripe watermelons. Mr. Banks used to live in the sugarcane district of Texas, and in a communication to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce he states that he is of the opinion that syrup made from ripe watermelons is superior in flavor to that made from sugarcane.

## TEXAS BANKS BUY U. S. PAPER WITH SURPLUS

DALLAS, Nov. 22.—Approximately one hundred million dollars, representing the surplus fund in many banks throughout Texas, as a result of the high price of cotton, has been invested in commercial paper and government securities, it was declared here today by financial leaders.

W. O. Connor, president of the Republic National Bank of Dallas, said today that the surplus of Texas banks is perhaps three-fourths as much larger than for any like period or year in the history of the state.

## DYE WORKERS IN AGREEMENT

(By Associated Press)  
DUSSELDORF, Nov. 22.—An agreement was recently signed between representatives of the Rhineland dye industry and the inter-allied high commission at Coblenz, involving 50,000 workmen, it was announced today.

Together with the reaching of other industrial agreements this will serve greatly to facilitate a resumption of work on the West bank of the Rhine, according to French authorities working on the agreement.

The dye plants, it is stated have agreed to deliver dyes to the allies on reparations account and in turn their export taxes were temporarily reduced so the dye factories could rehabilitate their finances.

## SCHOOLS TO LOSE ENGLISH TEACHER

The transferring of Highway Engineer Henry Porter from this district to Waco as the result of the State Highway Department taking over the state highways, and the reassignment of its engineers, robs Ballinger of one of her best school teachers. Mrs. Henry Porter has tendered her resignation, effective when the city schools dismiss for the mid-year holidays. Mr. Porter will probably be transferred to Waco at once, but Mrs. Porter will remain in the schools here until Christmas. She is English teacher in the high school, and the removal of Mr. and Mrs. Porter will not only be keenly felt by the schools, but their many friends will regret to see them leave this city.

## DR. COOK AND OTHERS TO SERVE JAIL SENTENCE

FT. WORTH, Nov. 22.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, of North pole fame; S. E. J. Cox, noted international aviator and oil promoter, and eleven others, who were convicted in the federal court yesterday and sentenced by Judge Killits to serve penitentiary sentences and pay fines ranging from one thousand to twelve thousand dollars, will have to remain in the Tarrant county jail for two months pending further developments in the case. It was stated today by the officers that the defendants in the mail fraud cases will have to spend at least two months in jail even if they succeed in making appeal bonds.

## 1924 Auto Seals Ready; How to Make Application

Tax Collector W. L. Brown has received notice that he will be supplied at once with a portion of the 1924 motor vehicle seals, and that the entire lot will be shipped to him by December 10th. All auto license taxes are due January 1st, 1924, and it is a violation of the traffic laws to drive a car on a public highway after that date without a 1924 seal. The tax collector says he expects to be ready to issue the 1924 seals by December 1st.

The new law passed by the last legislature makes some radical changes in the rules and regulations for registering cars, as well as making a big increase in the cost. Registration fees will be based on both weight and horsepower of a motor vehicle, and the fee will be much larger than heretofore. The auto license department has the weight of all passenger motor vehicles, but it will be necessary to weigh all commercial motor vehicles before a license can be obtained.

The number plates now in use will be retained by motor car owners, and new numbers issued only to those who register new cars. 1924 seals will be issued and these must be displayed on the front of autos. While there are several changes in the law governing the registration work, auto owners can obtain seals without any trouble or delay, if they will co-operate with the collector, and comply with the rules for making application.

Applicants must know the exact model and year in which their car was made in order for the clerk to ascertain the correct weight. Dig up your last license receipt if possible, as this will save much time for you and the collector.

If your car was registered in this county for 1923, and you have lost your receipt, copy the license number of your car. If your car was registered in some other county and you have lost your receipt, write the State Highway Department for a duplicate.

If your car was registered in some other state you must have the registration papers. If you have lost these write the highway department of that state for a duplicate.

It will be necessary to have the model and the year in which your car was made. If you don't know the model consult some dealer and get the information before you go to the collector's office.

There are as many different weights of Ford cars as there are differently equipped and designed Fords, and the collector must know what model and equipped Ford you want license for before he can issue the seal.

Truck operators must weigh their trucks and take the weight slip with them to the collector's office before he can get a license. Trucks are rated also on basis of weight and horsepower, and at a higher rate than passenger vehicles.

Jitney drivers will be hit hard by the new law. Operators of service cars, whether bus or passenger cars, will have to pay in addition to the weight fee and horsepower fee, a fee of \$4 per passenger the bus or car will seat. The man who operates a five passenger Ford jitney will have to pay in addition to the regular fee for passenger Fords, \$20.

## 126 INDICTED IN BIG LIQUOR SMUGGLING

## NEGRO HELD FOR MAKING LIQUOR

Chas. Robertson, proprietor of the Brick Hotel, a negro hostelry in this city, was placed in jail Thursday morning, and held for a time pending an investigation in a booze making charge. Complaint was filed in the justice court charging Robertson with violating the prohibition law.

The officers discovered in the negro hotel what was declared to be a crude still in operation, the discovery being made by accident. Someone stole a quantity of clothing, bed clothes, etc., from the home of C. B. Armstrong and Mr. Armstrong and Sheriff J. P. Flynt were searching the negro hotel for the stolen property when they stumbled upon the crude liquor making apparatus, and a quantity of fermented juice on hand which was declared to be intoxicating.

The sheriff's department has been busy all the week running down petty thievery. The stealing has not been confined to this city, as in the search officers have recovered property stolen at San Angelo and Abilene, and two men are being held in jail at San Angelo for disposing of stolen property here.

The sheriff has issued a warning to people who buy second-hand goods from strangers, taking it because they get the stolen goods at a ridiculously low price. Sheriff Flynt stated that there were several persons in Ballinger who had been taking big chances in such investments.

The officers have a pretty good clue as to the guilty party who made steals here the first of the week, but declare that the evidence is not sufficient to warrant an arrest.

## MOTHER AND BABY ARE SLAIN WITH HATCHET

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 22.—Mrs. Agnes Mudie and her little baby daughter were most foully murdered at their home near here some time yesterday. The body of Mrs. Mudie was found in a pool of blood with several cuts in her throat, by her husband last night, and near the body of the mother was her baby daughter, who had been struck dead by a blow from a hatchet.

The authorities express the opinion that the woman and child had been dead from six to eight hours when found by the husband and father on his return home from the day's absence. Police declare that they have no clue as to the murderer or murderers.

## MAN STARTS FIRE WITH GAS; BURNS TO DEATH

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—The entire Eastern section of the United States and as far West as Pittsburgh, is being combed by federal agents in an effort to stamp out liquor smuggling and selling.

**A BAD GUESS**

The cotton farmers of the South are now wondering whether the cotton reports put out by the government are a benefit or a detriment to the cotton industry of this country.

It is a question which is not clear in the minds of many farmers, and the census bureau is charged with making a bad guess this year, and the bad guess is said to be to blame for holding the price of cotton down.

The government's early estimate was for better than an eleven bale crop, and if the supply and demand is to be taken as a basis for market control, it must be admitted that the bad guess had something to do with holding the price down, because when it became known that the crop would be only about nine million bales, the price rapidly went up.

However, there are two sides to every question, and the federal authorities who have in hand the compiling of statistics from which the cotton reports and estimates are made, contend that if the government did not keep an eye on the production, consumption, etc., that the bears and speculators would step in, put out false information and control the market.

Be that as it may, the government certainly made a bad guess this year, and the farmers sold the bulk of the crop on a market fixed by the bad guess, and the South is short about a quarter of a billion dollars as a result of the over estimated yield.

## MAKING SURVEY OF INSANITY CASES

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 22.—Determining means for reducing the number of cases of insanity and feeble-mindedness in future years, adoption of proper methods of caring for the insane, and solution of the problem of how to lessen crime, is the work to be undertaken by the commission for the survey of the eleemosynary institutions of the state, according to Dr. A. Caswell Ellis, professor of education in the University of Texas, a member of the commission.

The commission has invited the national commission on mental hygiene to send a representative

to the next meeting and to cooperate with them in all feasible ways in matters relating to insanity and feeble-mindedness. A similar invitation has been issued to Dr. H. H. Hart, of the Russell Sage Foundation, seeking conference and co-operation in matters concerning other types and dependents.
