SAYS GREATEST MENACE TO GOV. IS DISHONESTY

(By Associated Press)

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 20.—A betrayal of the people's trust by high government officials presents a greater menace to democracy than bolshevism, or any other alleged evil influences, William G. McAdoo, candidate for the democratic nomination for president, declared in an address delivered from the platform of a passenger train here today.

"There can be no government with such corruption in the high places," Mr. McAdoo said. "This is the question which is affecting the life of the American nation, and we must bring honesty back to our government," said McAdoo in the brief address as the train on which he was a passenger stopped here.

SENATOR GREENE GROWS WORSE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The condition of Senator Frank Greene, of Vermont, was described by attending physicians today as being "not quite so favorable" for the recovery of the senator.

Mrs. Greene has been summoned to her husband's bedside, and it was apparent that those in attendance believed that the end might be near.

Senator Greene was shot down on Pennsylvania Avenue within three blocks of the capitol by prohibition enforcement officers who were chasing alleged bootleggers. The senator was walking with his wife when he was hit by a bullet from an agent's gun.

Mr. Farris died in Houston, where he was carried for treatment after becoming ill about a month ago.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 20.—Mrs. Lula Markwell, imperial commander of the Women's Ku Klux Klan since the formation of that organization, announced today that she had resigned, and that Miss Robbie Gill, of Little Rock had been appointed as her successor. Mrs. Markwell gave no reason for resigning.

DAUGHERTY WONT QUIT; COOLIDGE BACKS HIM

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Attorney General Daugherty has no intention of resigning, and today he reaffirmed to President Coolidge his determination to stand firm and not resign under pressure being brought to bear from certain sources.

It was said today by those closely associated with the attorney general that he and the president had found themselves in complete accord and perfect harmony.

In a statement handed out to the press today the attorney general denied the charges made in the Senate yesterday by Senator Wheeler, democrat, of Montana, concerning the administration of the department of justice.

Senator Wheeler charged before the Senate yesterday that Mr. Daugherty was "mixed up" with those who obtained money for their services in connection with cases pending before the department of justice.

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NEWS FLASHES

Walter J. Crawford, a prominent Texas attorney, and manager of the Hobby gubernatorial campaign in 1918, died at his home in Beaumont late Tuesday.

Gov. Pat Neff will leave the state Thursday morning and go to Denver, Colorado, where he has accepted an invitation to speak before the all-state conference on good citizenship. Mr. Neff will speak in the Rocky Mountain city Saturday night, his subject being "Obligation and Opportunity of Citizenship."

Norman Lawson, brother of Miss Louise Lawson, the Texas girl who was found murdered in her apartment in New York recently, will not go to New York to assist the police in solving the murder mystery. Lawson has wired New York detectives that a New York attorney will handle his sister's \$30,000 estate.

COOLIDGE WITHDRAWS CHRISTIAN'S NAME

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Opposition in the Senate to the appointment of George Christian, secretary to former President Harding, as a member of the federal trade commission, has resulted in the withdrawal of Mr. Christian's name. President Coolidge withdrew the nomination of Mr. Christian today, and will make another nomination for the place. Mr. Christian requested the president to withdraw his name in order to settle the controversy.

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NEW HIGHWAY ENGINEER NAMED

AUSTIN, Feb. 20.—Gibb Gilchrist, of Wills Point, Texas, was today appointed State Highway Engineer to succeed Captain J. D. Fauntleroy, who tendered his resignation yesterday. The highway engineer receives the highest salary of any state office, receiving \$9,000 per year.

Capt. Fauntleroy has been with the state highway department for two years.

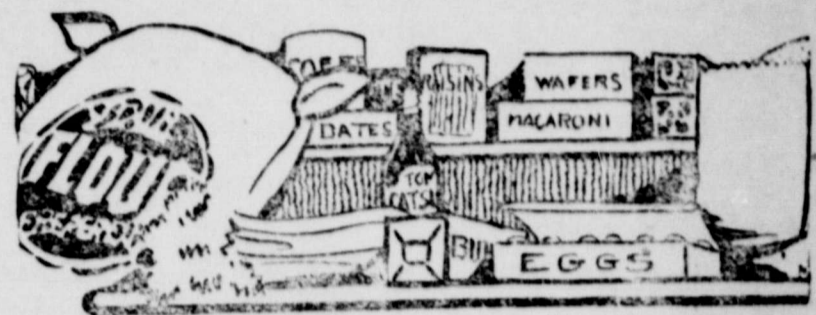

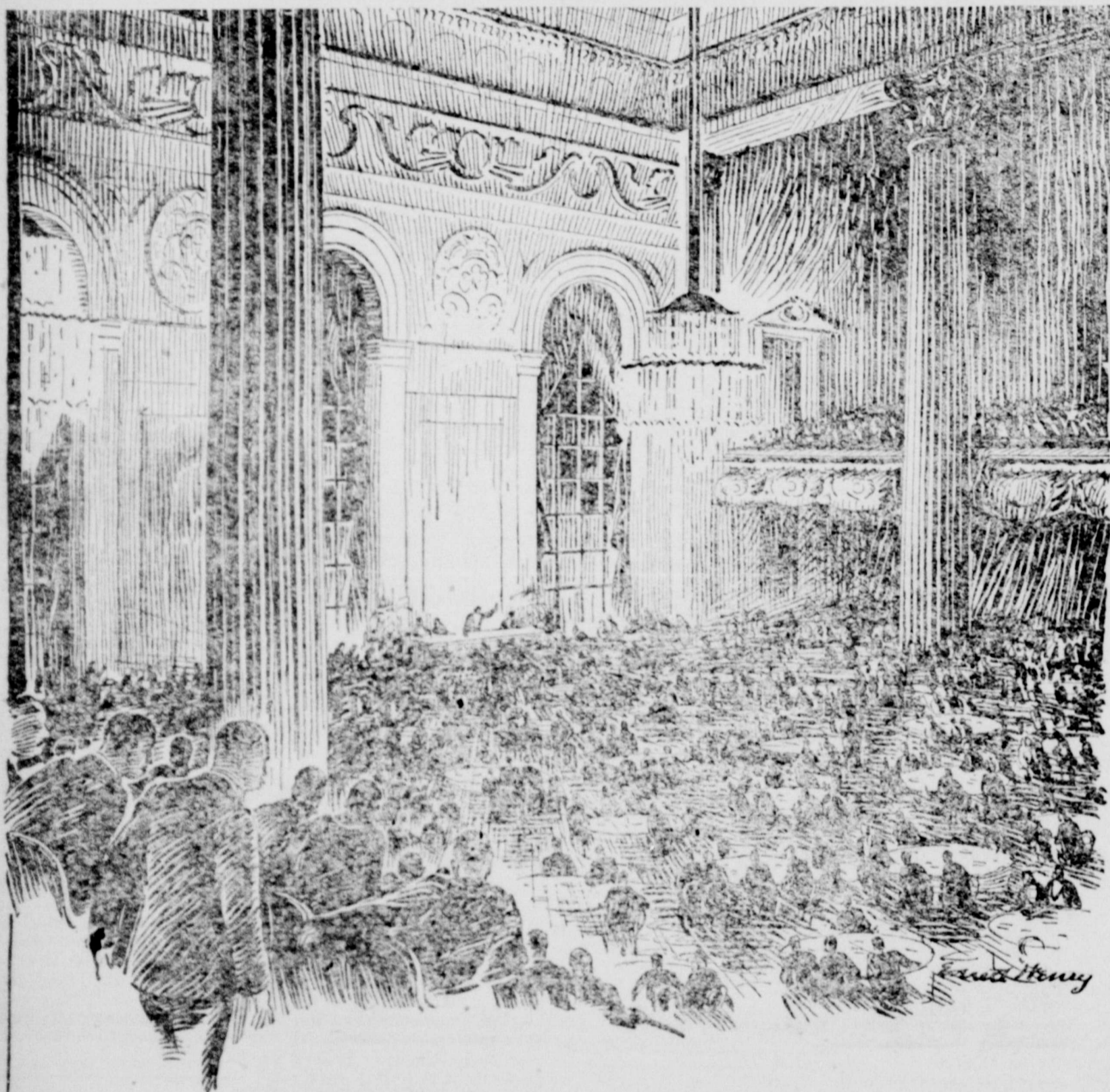

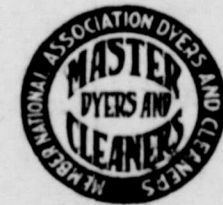
