FORTY MEN LOST AT SEA IN JAPANESE SUB

(By Associated Press)
SASEBO, Japan, March 19.—All hope for the rescue of any of the four officers and forty men who are buried at sea in Submarine 43 of the Japanese navy has virtually been given up. The vessel went down suddenly today following a collision with the warship Tatsuta during minor maneuvers outside the harbor of Sasebo. Efforts to bring the craft to the surface are being made but the naval authorities have no hope of rescuing the crew and officers of the undersea boat alive.

NEWS NOTES FROM NEIGHBORING CITIES

Sam Woodward of Coleman, sold to Irion and Upton county ranchmen this week 2,250 head of bred ewes for \$10 per head.

Dr. Harry Mays, self-styled divine healer, has disappeared from San Angelo, where he was under \$500 bond to answer to charges filed in the county court of Tom Green county.

Mrs. Joe Chance, age 77, and for forty years a resident of San Angelo, died at her home in that city Monday.

Ward Bowden, a twelve year old boy was injured seriously when an auto struck him while he was going home from school for his lunch. A Nash car, a Chevrolet, a Dodge and a Ford were wrecked as a result of the accident.

Miss Ione Branch, age 18, student in Howard Payne College, died at her home in Stiles Sunday morning.

Wolf hunters engaged in a three-day wolf hunt in Jones county this week. Two hundred hounds were assembled for the big drive.

Abilene is recovering from an epidemic of measles. The greatest number of cases reported at any one time was 365. The number sick has dropped to 85.

Eight building permits, totaling \$29,300 cost for the week were issued at Abilene, making the total building permits \$40,000 for the present month.

Winters is to hold four elections within the next few days. The people are to vote on sewer bonds, \$1 school tax, city officers and school trustees. The present school tax is 50 cents.

Irrigation was the big question up for discussion before the Robert Lee Chamber of Commerce at a recent meeting, but the talk was all against the proposition, Robert Lee folks being against damming the Colorado River near Bronte.

U. S. MARINES RUSH LANDING IN HONDURAS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 19.—The landing of a force of 167 sailors and nine officers from the Cruiser Milwaukee at Amapala, Honduras, is being rushed today from that port to Tegucigalpa, the Honduran capital, where it was reported that wild disorder prevails.

The landing of the American marines was requested by American Minister Morales for the protection of the American legation. The report said that the American consular offices were fired upon by drunken soldiers, and declared the Honduran ministry had lost control of the soldiers.

Consular advices from Tegucigalpa also said that many innocent persons were being shot down and that looting was rampant. Losses estimated at \$400,000 have been suffered. The losses sustained were principally by British, Chinese and American merchants.

PROPOSE PROBE COTTON MARKET

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 19.—Another investigation by the present congress was proposed today, and has to do with cotton marketing. Representative Aswell, democrat, of Louisiana, proposed a resolution calling for an investigation by the agricultural department into the conditions in the cotton trade to determine whether there is "a concerted movement by persons, or associations, to destroy cooperative marketing associations."

Walter Barnett and Edward Wilkerson, two sixteen year old boys who ran away from their home in Omaha, Nebraska, six months ago, reached the end of their resources at San Angelo this week. The officers took charge of the boys and notified their parents who wired money for their return. The boys' parents had not heard from them since they left home six months ago.

Deputy game wardens in neighboring counties are receiving both Bob Whites and Mexican quail and releasing them in the country in an effort to restock the section with quail.

Recent Land Deals By a Local Firm Total \$66,000

\$1,000 RURAL BAPTIST CHURCH

Within a short time Rannels county can boast of a \$10,000 rural church. Dirt was broken Monday for such a building at Drasen where the Baptists have let the contract for a \$10,000 church. Dr. Alvin Swindell and Rev. M. C. Golden, of Ballinger, took part in the dirt breaking ceremonies.

The new church is to be 40x60 feet, with a basement. The basement will be constructed of concrete, while the building will be of lumber, constructed in modern design and conveniences for Sunday school and church work. The Drasco Baptist church is perhaps the largest rural church organization in the county, having a membership of between 175 and 200. Rev. John M. Riddle, senior in Simmons College, is the pastor, and preaches twice each month at Drasen.

The building will be near the site of the old building, which is a small structure, and which the congregation has outgrown. The material in the old building will be utilized in the construction of the new church.

Drasco is nine miles North of Winters and about 28 miles North of Ballinger. It is in the center of a prosperous country, thickly settled by a high class of citizenship most all of whom own their homes.

SNOW COVERS WIDE SCOPE WEST TEXAS

SAYS DAUGHERTY FAILED SUPPRESS LOTTERY SCHEME

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 19.—Maco Stewart, of Galveston, Texas, a lawyer, testified that the department of justice was remiss in failing to prosecute and suppress lotteries. Stewart was heard by the Daugherty investigating committee again today.

On cross examination by Attorney General Daugherty's counsel, Stewart testified that the department of justice had prosecuted many persons for mail frauds and conspiracy. He admitted that some had been indicted where he thought they could not be convicted.

Stewart told the committee yesterday that a number of poor people in Texas had come to him with complaints of having been swindled out of their money. He said that he made a report of the swindling to Attorney General Daugherty.

More important witnesses who were to be examined today will not be called until later, examination of the important witness being postponed because of the illness of Senator Wheeler, who was kept at home today with a severe cold.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Harry Sinclair and his former secretary, G. D. Wahlberg, are to be called before the oil committee this week. Wahlberg will go on the stand tomorrow and Sinclair will be called before the investigators Friday, if he can reach Washington by that time.

The atmosphere at the Chicago republican convention in 1920 was surcharged with stories of "oil deals," the oil committee was told today by Tiffin Gilmore, deputy secretary of state, of Ohio.

Gilmore said that the oil operators proposed to throw their delegate support of Major General Leonard Wood if they were permitted to name the secretary of interior. Gilmore declared that he knew nothing about it at "first hand," but declared that it was common talk that the deal had been consummated between the oil operators and possible nominee.

James Darden was the next witness called. He told the committee how he got claims in Salt Creek field of the naval oil reserve. Darden said he got control through the ruling secretary of the interior during the Wilson administration.

FT. WORTH, March 19.—What is said to be the latest snow in the history of the weather record has traffic tied up at some points in Texas today.

Small craft warnings were ordered displayed on the remainder of the Texas coast.

The local members of the National Guard will assemble at the armory tonight at 7:30. Following the inspection and maneuvers at the armory the troops will march to a local cafe where they will enjoy an oyster supper.

Lieutenant McCarver was busy Wednesday getting things in order for the inspection, and for the oyster supper. Capt. Patterson arrived from Abilene during the forenoon and was in conference with Lieut. McCarver, who has had charge of the company here since Capt. J. M. Simmons resigned.

Capt. Patterson is making an inspection of the entire 142nd Infantry Regiment, and has already inspected all of the regiment except the first battalion. The troops are already looking forward to the annual encampment. If plans under way are carried out the encampment will probably be held at some point on the coast.

The demand for homes in the United States is greater than ever before in the history of this nation. For the benefit of the man who thinks the prohibition law is a failure, we might call his attention to the fact that eighty per cent of the cases filed in federal courts during the last four years have resulted in convictions. 115,000 cases have been filed and 192,411 resulted in convictions. The figures come from the department of justice which reports that 25,000 cases are still awaiting trial.

TEACHING KINDNESS

The enactment of a state law in Oregon requiring that kindness to animals be taught in all the public schools from 15 minutes to half an hour each week is attracting nation-wide attention.

The educators of our own state have been made to feel that such a lesson should be inculcated into the minds and make-up of Texas children. S. M. N. Marrs, state superintendent, has seen fit to say that we need more of the Golden Rule taught in our schools. Mr. Marrs says:

"Education in its broadest sense includes the training of the individual in order that good character may be the main result. We cannot have good character unless we observe the Golden Rule, and the observance of the Golden Rule should be made broad enough in its application to include animals as well as people.

"To this end I wish to endorse the teaching of humane treatment of animals as a means of instilling into the minds of children proper regard for the feelings of others. It is the function of schools to make this contribution to education, and the organization of local societies which have for their purpose the protection of animals and children will contribute very largely to the public uplift of social conditions."

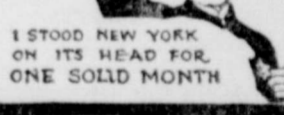

MARCH PROVING A WET MONTH

Weather Forecast — Tonight rain. Thursday partly cloudy.

Eight-tenths of an inch of rain fell in Ballinger Tuesday night, following a five-tenths precipitation Sunday afternoon, and a four-tenths rain earlier in the month, making a total of 1.60 for the month up to date.

Snow and sleet flurries, heavy frost and freezes, with much cloudy and damp weather is making a wet month out of March, and the month is two-thirds reeled off with very little wind and no dust.

The year 1924 was ushered in over muddy roads, and the wet weather continues to hang on in Arkansas style. Farmers who did not get their land broken early in the winter are breaking on the between-showers system, getting in a few days plowing only when the ground dries up sufficiently for them to get in the field.

Only light showers fell in January, however, the total precipitation for the month amounted to about a quarter of an inch. February did a little better and also brought a foot snow which caused the terra firma to almost melt away.

Not in many years has this country entered the planting season with the ground as wet as it is at this time. The deep underground season caused by rains in November and December and part of October has been retained and added to by showers and snow from time to time.

From a standpoint of moisture the farmers surely have no kick coming at this time.

County Agent Advisory Board in Monthly Meet

The Advisory Board of County Agent, C. W. Lehmburg, which had been appointed by the Runnels County Commissioners' Court held their second monthly meeting, Tuesday, March 18th.

Responding to a call made by the court, February 13th, this board met at the court house in Ballinger, at which time the organization of the board was perfected and officers elected. A representative from the various communities over the entire county as well as representatives from the various communities over the entire county as well as representatives from each of the organized commercial organizations in the county compose the board.

The meeting Tuesday was held at Winters. In the absence of F. G. Rogers, of Miles, president of the board, John Heck, of Wilmeth, vice-president, presided at the session.

The reading of the minutes by Secretary J. C. Watts, of the February meeting were heard and approved, after which a report was made by County Agent Lehmburg, which immediately found favor with all members of the board and was unanimously adopted.

Chairman Heck, who had recently visited the Model Poultry Farm and also the Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth, gave a very interesting report. He made some important suggestions that will be helpful to the county agent and his advisory board in promoting their planned activities.

Among other important questions that came before the meeting was the proposition of community fairs and community fair booths as feeders for a county fair. In order to properly encourage the growing of better cotton, more and better feedstuff, livestock, poultry and every other local production the fair work was heartily endorsed by the board and much encouragement and support will be given to community work and community exhibits for the County Fair.

A publicity committee, whose duty it will be to see that the proper publicity is given the various activities of better county production was appointed. Those composing this committee are: J. D. Motley, Ballinger; J. C. Watts, Winters; F. G. Rogers, Miles; and John Heck, Wilmeth.

A motion was adopted instructing County Agent Lehmburg to investigate the cost and possibilities of securing a car of registered dairy heifers and a necessary number of registered sires, to be distributed over the county to club boys and other interested parties.

Bert E. Low, cashier of the Winters National Bank, addressed the meeting in the interest of diversified farming in Runnels County and in course of his discussion he gave many important reasons why farmers should diversify their production.

Big Spring of Fresh Sulphur Water in Sea

Bubbling up out of the ocean from a depth of 125 feet, a big spring of fresh sulphur water, two miles off the coast of Florida and eight miles south of St. Augustine, was recently surveyed by experts of the United States coast and geodetic survey. Long known to residents of St. Augustine and marked on charts, the spring has been the source of speculation for years.

A short time ago the government scientists anchored directly over the troubled waters of the sea spring and proceeded to investigate it. The water sampled was about the same temperature as the surrounding Atlantic, but the tremendous size and force of its geyserlike upwelling was plainly apparent at the surface. The ocean floor surrounding the spring is only about fifty-five feet deep, but the spring rises from a depression which measures more than 125 feet deep.

A strong odor of sulphur pervades the atmosphere around the spring and the force of the water was such that it was only with difficulty that the ship was prevented from being pushed away by the bubbling waters. Samples of the waters at various depths were secured and forwarded to the United States bureau of chemistry for analysis.—Kansas City Star.

TO MOVE SHEEP FROM MEXICO TO TEXAS

(By Associated Press) FT. WORTH, March 19.—Movement of sheep from Mexico into Texas is expected to increase rapidly in the next few months with the removal of the \$2 a head duty, according to Austin M. Waller, supervising inspector in charge of the district around Del Rio.

Due to the fact that Del Rio is an official dipping station, all sheep coming across the Mexican

border are dipped there before being permitted to go into the interior because of the danger of spreading sheep scabies.

During the last 12 months 18,631 head of sheep were dipped one or more times there and there were 6,800 head which were dipped twice, according to Mr. Waller's report made to headquarters of the Livestock Sanitary Commission here.
