HAMON PUT UP MILLION FOR CHOICE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 27.—Al Jennings, former train robber, told the Senate oil investigating committee today that Jake Hamon had told him at Chicago in 1920 that Warren G. Harding was to be the nominee of the republican party for president. Jennings said that Hamon told him that Harding's nomination cost Hamon one million dollars. Jennings testified that Hamon told him that \$250,000 of the million dollars which he put up went to the late Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania; \$25,000 to Harry Daugherty, the present attorney general; and a like sum to Will Hays, former postmaster general. Hamon was quoted by Jennings as saying that he was to be secretary of the interior and was to share in the public lands. Hamon carried Oklahoma for Harding, Jennings said, and added that the committee told him that it cost Hamon a half million dollars to elect Harding.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—The story told by Al Jennings to the Senate oil investigating committee today was branded as "false and preposterous" in a statement by Leighton Taylor, former secretary of the late Senator Penrose.

SPECIAL TRAIN FOR B'WOOD CONVENTION

THREE MORE ARRESTS IN TABOR CASE

Sheriff Refuses to Give Out Names; Will Bring Prisoners Here Today

"Before sundown tonight I will have three more men under arrest in the Tabor case," said Sheriff Jim Flynt Thursday afternoon. "Can't give their names now," said the sheriff, "but just wait a few hours and you can get them."

Taking the officer at his word it is expected that the men held in connection with the killing of A. W. Tabor on the J. N. Wells farm about 20 miles Northwest of Ballinger, on the night of December 19th last year, will be increased to five. Two men are already under \$10,000 bond in connection with the killing of Tabor.

Further than to say that he had the "dope" on the three men which justified filing complaints against them, and that they were prominent citizens of the Norton community, and would be arrested before night, the officer would not disclose their identity.

The killing of Tabor was surrounded with much mystery, and for a time it appeared that the officers would not be able to pick up a clue which would lead to the guilty persons. Tabor, a son-in-law of J. N. Wells, was shot and killed near the Wells home about 8:00 o'clock at night. According to the story of the killing as related by Wells, a man called at the Wells home and stated that he was having car trouble and wanted help. Tabor and Wells went with the man where the car was alleged to have been "stalled" in the road near the Wells farm. Being suspicious of trouble Wells said he stuck his gun in his pocket. When the stranger, Wells and Tabor were approaching the car, Wells stated that persons at the car opened fire on them. He returned the fire and when the smoke of battle was cleared away Tabor was lying in the road dead. The car whirled around and drove rapidly away. Wells said that there were five persons in the car, including the stranger who called at his home for help.

It will be recalled that L. P. Kirk, of Abilene; and Reuben Cope, of Norton; were arrested a few days after the killing, and after an attempt to hold a hearing at Ballinger bond in the sum of \$10,000 was granted by the court and made by Norton and Abilene citizens. Cope was found in an Abilene hospital suffering from a gunshot wound in his leg. Kirk was later connected with the affair and came to Ballinger from Abilene and surrendered to the officers when it became known that charges had been filed against him and that he would be arrested. Sheriff Flynt was in charge of the investigation which led to the apprehension of Cope and Kirk.

Sheriff Flynt never let up on the case since the night he received a phone call to come to the Wells place following the killing on the night of December 19th. He has run down many wild clues and reports, but from time to time he has picked up evidence which he says will lead to the arrest of the other three parties who are alleged to have been in the party on the night of the killing. With the assistance of County Attorney Shepherd the sheriff has the case in good shape for the grand jury which convenes here next week.

The killing of Tabor attracted much attention, and owing to the mysterious phases and multitude of reports, the officers had a hard time getting a clue which would lead to the apprehension of the other three men who are alleged to have been in the car. The case became known as the "mystery killing," and for a time promised to go unsolved. However, Sheriff Flynt has proved himself equal to the occasion, and his success in ascertaining the identity of the other three men, and bringing them to justice, if they are guilty, is a feather in the officer's cap.

The grand jury will convene here next Monday and the evidence which the county attorney and sheriff have compiled in the case will be ready for the investigation and will greatly simplify the work of the grand jury. An array of distinguished counsel will appear in the case, prominent attorneys of Ballinger, Abilene and Coleman already having been engaged to either defend

the men charged with the death of Tabor or to assist the state in the prosecution. District Attorney Walter U. Early will be assisted by Judge J. F. Cunningham, noted criminal lawyer of Abilene; Judge T. T. Crosson and County Attorney C. P. Shepherd, of Ballinger. Kirk and Cope have employed Judges W. J. Cunningham, E. T. Brooks and R. W. Haynie, of Abilene; Judge Walter C. Woodward, of Coleman; and Judge A. K. Doss, of Ballinger. It is not known who the three men whom Sheriff Flynt said that he would arrest Thursday afternoon will employ to defend them, in case the grand jury returns bills in the case. Neither is it known what the defense of any of the men charged will be. It is expected that many witnesses will be subpoenaed here to appear before the grand jury in connection with the investigation next week.

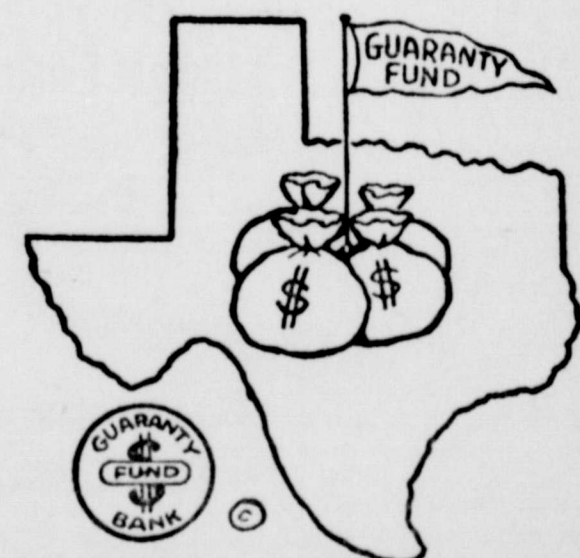
