DAUGHERTY RESIGNS FROM CABINET

NO CHARGES FILED AGAINST THREE MEN

L. S. and W. S. Proctor and Raymond Lanehart, of Norton, were the three men whom Sheriff Flynt had under surveillance in connection with the death of W. A. Tabor on the night of December 19th, when Tabor was killed by unknown persons near the J. N. Wells farm, about twenty miles Northwest of Ballinger. These were the three men whom the sheriff announced would be placed under arrest before sundown Thursday afternoon.

Lanehart and the Proctor brothers appeared in Ballinger late Thursday afternoon, and through their attorneys made a statement and stated that they were ready to make bond. They were accompanied to Ballinger by a number of Norton citizens, who it is said came here to go on the bond of the three men.

The state's attorneys, after receiving the statements made by the three men refused to file complaints against them, and the parties returned home. The statements were also presented to Justice of the Peace C. H. Willingham, who refused to take any action in the case, and the sheriff told the men they could return home, that he had no authority to hold them.

District Attorney Early was notified as soon as it became known that Lanehart and the Proctor brothers had made a statement, and he came to Ballinger at once, arriving here Thursday night. He was in conference with County Attorney Shepherd and Judge T. T. Crosson whom J. N. Wells has employed to assist in the prosecution, Friday morning. Later it was announced that the state's attorneys had refused to accept the statements of the men and that no action would be taken in the matter until the grand jury convenes next week.

"The information contained in the statements is not such as to implicate the parties making the statement," said one of the state's attorneys, "is exculpatory and attempts to exonerate the two men whom we already have under bond charged with murder in connection with this crime." The attorney stated that the men had refused to make any further statement, and that as far as the prosecution was concerned the matter would be passed up to the grand jury.

"Our clients have presented themselves to the state, made statements in which they admitted being present at the time of the shooting, and offered to make bond," said Judge A. K. Doss, one of the attorneys for the de-

She said that her husband was to have joined her here on March 18th. It is feared in Mexican circles here that the vessel on which de la Huerta was reported to have left Frontera aboard went down in a storm which swept the Mexican coast for several days.

A man was brought here from the Crews-Winters county Thursday and placed in jail charged with stealing harness. The stolen goods were recovered.

THIEVES RAID 2 MILES STORES

Sheriff Flynt was called to Miles Thursday to investigate two robberies. The hardware store of the Rogers-Coleman Co., and the Miles Hardware Co. store were raided by thieves Wednesday night.

The burglars got away with a small amount of cash, but no goods were missed from the two stores. The officers have made no arrest, but obtained a clue which will be followed up later.

DALLAS, March 28.—Dr. William Anderson, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of this city, died at his home here today after a brief illness with heart trouble. Dr. Anderson was well-known throughout religious circles of the South. He was 62 years of age.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty has resigned. His resignation was handed to President Coolidge this morning and Mr. Coolidge promptly accepted it.

Surrounded by an ever growing storm of criticism, and under the pressure of many of his ranking party leaders, the attorney general finally consented to follow Secretary Denby into retirement.

This clears the administration of the last of those cabinet members who have become the storm centers in the oil scandal and which precipitated investigations. A factor which had the greatest weight in bringing the question of Attorney General Daugherty's status to an acute issue, was the conviction on the part of President Coolidge, under existing conditions, that public business is not receiving the attention it merits in the department of justice.

NEW BUSINESS HOUSE TO GO UP

A new modern rock building, 30x120 feet, is to replace the galvanized iron building occupied by Hardin & Carr and the Woodson Barber Shop on the lot adjoining the Weeks Drug Store. J. Y. Pearce, who owns this lot, will begin within a short time the construction of the new building, and the new building will probably be ready for occupancy within ninety days. It will be finished up with modern metal, plate glass front, and drop awning.
 Mr. Pearce has rented the building to Sam Behringer, of San Angelo, who has acquired the Piggly-Wiggly rights for Rannels county. Mr. Behringer has been manager for the Wooten Grocery Co., at San Angelo since moving from Ballinger more than two years ago. According to the report he is to return to Ballinger to make his home.
 Hardin & Carr, tailors, and the Woodson barber shop will be forced to seek new quarters. It will not be necessary for them to move for some time, as the rock work on the building can be carried on without interference while they continue to occupy the stand.
 The new building will fill in the gap on the North side of Hutchings Avenue which has been occupied throughout the life of the town by a wooden or sheet iron structure, and the improvement will add greatly to that block. The steady growth in the town and continued development of the country is creating a demand for more business space, as well as a demand for residence property.

WAR PICTURES REVIVE THE WAR SPIRIT HERE

The spirit which swept the old U. S. A. in 1919 held a large audience in its grip at the Maeroey Theatre Thursday night, and the singing of songs of war time days revived the war spirit in the hearts of those who witnessed the moving pictures showing here under the title of "America's Answer."
 Miss Lois White led a chorus of boys and girls in the singing, the boys and girls being dressed in Red Cross and soldier uniforms. Several songs by the high school boys and girls were sung preceding the picture program.
 The war pictures consisted of motion photographs made during the World War, presenting actual battle scenes on land, sea and in the air, and they were approved by the war department before being sent out. The sinking of giant steamers by German U-boats made up a part of the pictures which were taken by German government cameramen, and shows the enemy in action. These were perhaps the most interesting part of the program, as they were the first German war scenes shown here.
 The war picture will be presented again tonight, and the local post American Legion is sharing in the proceeds from the show.

 WASHINGTON, March 28.—Will Hays, former chairman of the republican national committee, will be recalled before the Senate oil investigating committee. A request for his appearance has been made by Senator Walsh and a subpoena has been issued for him.

Hays has already denied that he received any money from Hamon. He made this denial in a telegram sent to the committee today.

HAM AND LIQUOR FOR DAUGHERTY

(By Associated Press)
 WASHINGTON, March 28.—Walter Miller, former valet for Attorney General Harry Daugherty, testified before the Senate investigating committee today that Armour & Company sent "hams, bacon, and that sort of things" to the home of Mr. Daugherty as gifts. Miller also testified that whiskey was brought to Daugherty's apartment, and that a week's supply was kept on hand.
 On cross examination the witness said that he did not know that the goods from Armour had not been paid for, only that no bills came with them.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—Former Representative V. Olcott, of New York, was called before the Senate committee investigating Attorney General Daugherty today, to tell of a conversation he had with a "visitor" at his office in which he was told that he would be "expected to pay \$10,000 when his name was sent to the Senate for a federal judgeship."

Olcott says that the visitor's name was Wayne Wilson, and that he believed that Wilson was with the National Surety Company. "Neither directly nor indirectly did he tell me that he was representing anybody in the department of justice," Olcott said.

fendants, "and that is all we have to say." Judge Dess stated that it was now known who the men were, the officers had their names, and it was up to the law to take whatever course it saw fit to follow. "We certainly advised our clients not to make any further statement than already made and turned over to the state's attorneys," said the counsel for the defense.

The three men who appeared here Thursday afternoon and made two separate statements, W. S. Proctor and Raymond Lanehart made a joint statement in writing, and L. S. Proctor made a statement which varied only slightly from the statement made by the other two men. The statements dated March 26th, were made to Sheriff J. P. Flynt, and following is an exact copy of the two statements as signed by the men:

"To J. P. Flynt, Sheriff of Rannels County, Texas: "Reuben Cope and Paul Kirk are under bond charged with the killing of W. A. Tabor. We were present when the shooting occurred the night Mr. Tabor was killed, but we had nothing to do with the shooting, were not armed, did not fire a shot and we were present for no unlawful

purpose whatever and with no intention or expectation of any trouble whatever and did not expect any trouble whatever until Mr. Wells opened fire and began shooting into the crowd and directly toward us. We had no ill will or malice toward Mr. Wells or Mr. Tabor and we had no motive or intention to harm either one of them and did not expect that either one of them would in any manner be injured or that any trouble what ever would arise, and as law abiding citizens, and to do justice to the two men now under bond, we make this statement that you may know that we were present at the time mentioned.

"To J. P. Flynt, Sheriff, Rannels County: "Reuben Cope and Paul Kirk are under bond charged with the killing of W. A. Tabor. I was

present when the shooting occurred and I was there on a lawful mission and with no intent or expectation of having any trouble with anyone or between any of the parties present, and the first intimation of any trouble was when someone, whom I have since learned was J. N. Wells, began shooting into the crowd and directly toward me, and I thought he was trying to kill me and the others near me, one of whom was my brother. I never had any trouble with either Wells or Mr. Tabor, of any kind, and had no malice or ill will against either, and I did not commit any unlawful act on this occasion, and as a law abiding citizen and to do justice to the two men now under bond, I make this statement that you may know that I was present at the time mentioned.
