STORM OVER WEST KILLS 9 PEOPLE

STORM DOES DAMAGE; PLAYS MANY PRANKS

Following a dust storm which turned day into night, and which came up suddenly from the West about three o'clock Friday afternoon, three-tenths of an inch of rain fell in Ballinger in almost as many minutes. The rain came in torrents and was driven by a hard wind which did minor damage to persons and property.

The rain was not general, extending only a short distance South of Ballinger. Heavy downpours were reported at Norton, Bronte and Ft. Chadbourne, Northwest of Ballinger, while on Valley Creek, West of town but nearer the county site, no rain was reported.

The wind which preceded and accompanied the rain caused minor damage in Ballinger. People who were caught out were first covered with dust and then drenched with water. J. C. Bair suffered a broken hand when he cranked his car in a rush to get out of the storm.

The Wells Fargo express wagon, which was standing at the Santa Fe station, was picked up by the storm and turned bottom-upwards, the big horse being jerked over on his back and entangled in the harness.

A new warehouse at the Independent Oil Company station which was being constructed by Bartlett & Bridwell, was pushed off its foundation by the strong wind, and otherwise damaged.

Several autos which were caught standing on the streets were "unroofed" either in part or wholly, and several losses of window glass were reported around town.

As the shower of rain passed over the sky was left besmirched with dust, which was apparently carried about the clouds by the sandstorm which came ahead of the rain, and within an hour the

dust was blowing again, but in a much milder way than the severe storm which preceded the rain.

CAR PARKED IN FRONT OF REPAIR SHOP UNTOPPED

Windstorms have been known to do some very freakish capers and good men's reputations have been endangered by telling of these freaks of nature.

The storm here Friday pulled a stunt that is worth recording. A motorist had parked his car in front of Hirschfeld's auto top and paint shop on 7th Street. The strong wind took the top of the car completely off.

"That's like the fellow who broke his leg falling up the hospital steps," remarked a passer-by.

SNOW SLIDE KILLS FIVE

SALT LAKE CITY, March 29.—Four or five persons are missing and are believed to be dead in a snowslide in Provo Canyon, South of Salt Lake City today, according to reports received here.

Fifty persons are said to have been caught in the slide but all but four or five were rescued.

CHICAGO, March 29.—Nine persons are dead, and property damage is heavy in a score of towns in the Northwest, Central West and the Mississippi Valley.

Some places are virtually isolated today as a result of tornadoes, blizzards and storms which began yesterday with heavy rainfall accompanied by gales which struck points in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, causing eight deaths and injuring more than 70 people in Shawnee, Oklahoma. One boy was killed by lightning at Goff, Kansas, and four persons were injured at Vernon, Texas.

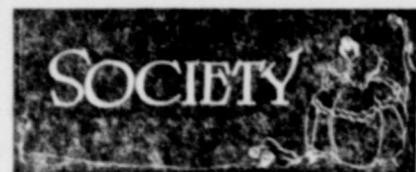
LEDGER TO INSTALL STEREOTYPE MACHINE

WINTERS, March 29.—This has been calamity week for Winters with death and destruction hovering around. M. C. Holland, proprietor of the Highway Filling Station at Bradshaw, died in the sanitarium here last night from injuries sustained when his auto truck turned over on him. Mr. Holland was driving his truck on the highway when he lost control of the truck and it turned over on him. His face and lower jaw were crushed to a pulp. 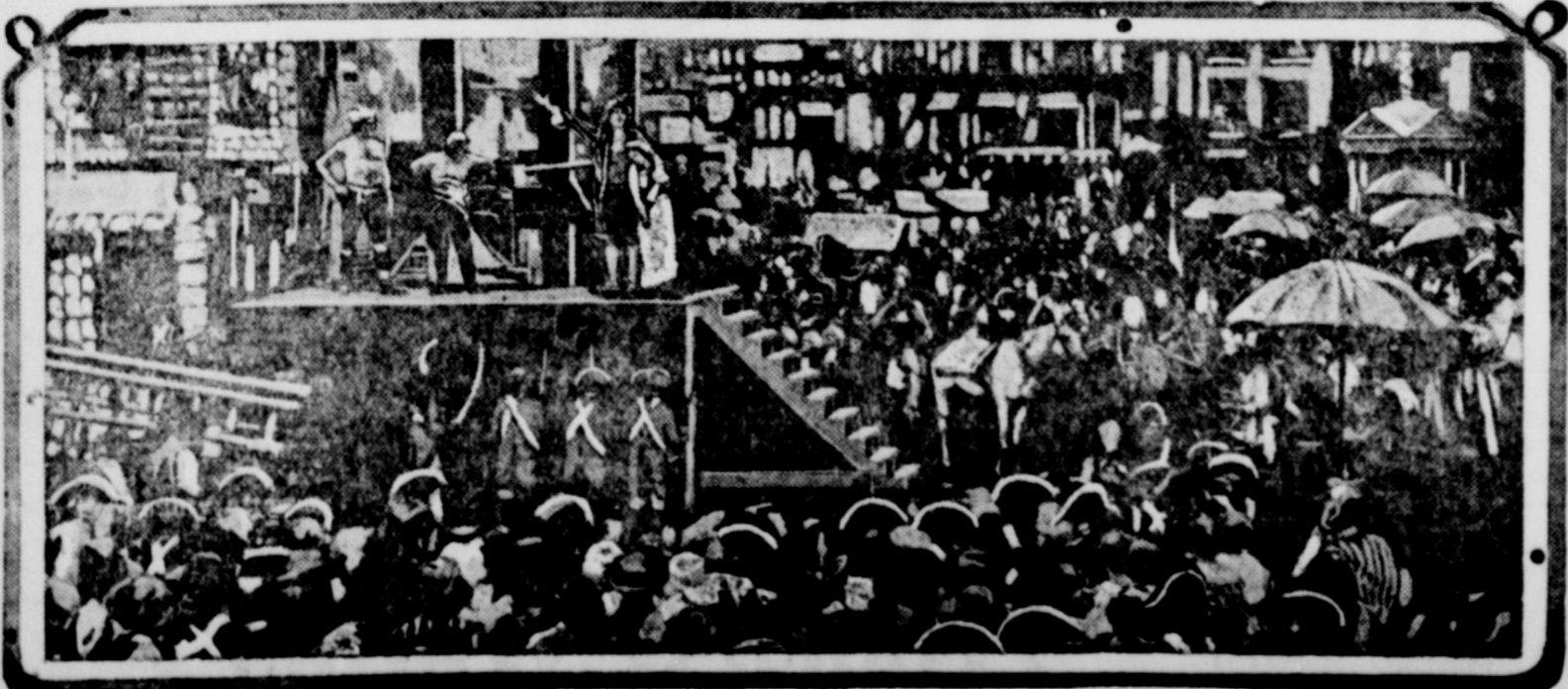

BROWN ALIVE AND OUT OF PRISON

It has been repeatedly reported here that George Brown, who was tried in Ballinger about twelve years ago and sent to the penitentiary for 99 years for killing his wife in Brown county, is dead. Brown is not dead, but is out of prison and making his home at Richland Springs, in San Saba county, according to a man by the name of Jamar, who was here Saturday.

Mr. Jamar came to Ballinger to adjust some trouble which his son got into by passing forged checks at Winters. The boy is alleged to have passed two forged checks, was caught and placed in jail here. He wired his father of his trouble and the father came and settled the matter by proving that the boy was only 15 years of age, was a kleptomaniac, caused by being wounded on the head several years ago. The father reimbursed the men who cashed the checks, paid all costs and carried the lad home.

Mr. Jamar when asked about George Brown stated that he was making his home in Richland Springs, living with a widowed daughter, was getting old and broken in health.

Brown was brought here from Brown county for trial, the case being transferred to Ballinger on account of the intense feeling there against him. He was charged with killing his wife on the Brown farm near Brownwood by striking her with an iron cudgel while she was asleep. The case attracted much attention.

The shooting took place nine

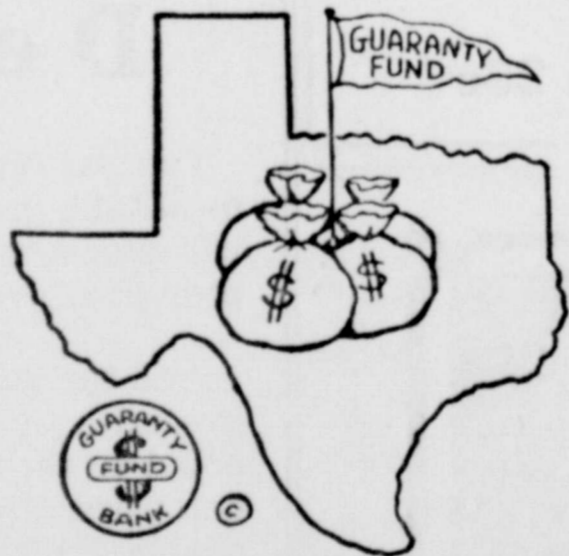
miles South of here between officers and alleged bootleggers.
