SENATE CONFLAB WITH COOLIDGE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 4.—The Senate legislative program was the subject of another White House conference today. The conference was attended by eight republican senators who spent some time conferring with President Coolidge.
The conference was held for the purpose of agreeing upon a concrete program for the remainder of the Senate session, and for adopting plans for speeding up legislation in order that congress might adjourn by June 1st.
The senators attending the conference said that the situation was discussed only in a general way. Mr. Coolidge was credited with expressing the hope that some sort of legislation of agricultural nature would be enacted.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Senator Lodge, republican leader from Massachusetts, was directly charged on the floor of the Senate today with pigeonholing President Harding's world court proposal in the foreign relations committee. The charge on Lodge was made by Senator Robinson, democratic leader from Arkansas.
During a denial of the charges, Lodge charged that the democrats had, by continuing the investigations, delayed important legislation.

SEEKS MISSING BROTHER HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Chief of Police B. W. Pilcher is in receipt of a letter from Mrs. L. Bosworth, of Moody, Texas, seeking the whereabouts of her brother, who was reported to her as having been hurt in an auto accident near Ballinger. Anyone knowing the whereabouts of the missing boy will confer a favor on Mrs. Bosworth by writing to her at the above address. Following is the letter which she wrote to the local police department:
"Dear Sir—I heard that there was a boy by the name of Harness in an auto accident near Ballinger some time ago. Could you tell me whether this was Keith Harness or not? Do you know where he went to from there as I think this is my brother and he has been missing since August 1921. I will thank you very much for this information."

MORE TEXANS TO TESTIFY AT OIL HEARING

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 4.—H. W. Ballard, of Los Angeles; John Smith, of Paris, Texas; and J. E. Baughan, of Harlingen, Texas; friends of the late Jake Hamon, of Oklahoma, have been summoned as witnesses by the Senate oil committee, and will be questioned regarding oil deals at the Chicago republican national convention.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Representative John Langley, republican of Kentucky, entered a plea of not guilty when arraigned in the District of Columbia supreme court today on conspiracy charges in connection with alleged liquor withdrawal permits.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—The Senate committee investigating the official acts of Harry M. Daugherty, former attorney general, today decided to go to Washington Court House, Ohio, to examine the books in the bank at that place with which Mal Daugherty, brother to Harry Daugherty, is connected. Mal Daugherty had refused to bring the books to Washington for the inspection of the committee. The date for the trip has not been fixed.

Secretary Weeks turned over to the committee the army air service records bearing on the charges of the failure of the attorney general to prosecute war time fraud cases which were brought to his attention. Mr. Weeks' appearance before the committee for questioning was delayed until later.

J. E. Dyche, formerly warden of the penitentiary, told the committee about narcotic prosecutions. He said that he kept after Heber Votaw, superintendent of the prison, for nearly a year trying to get him to send agents to stop drug trafficking. Votaw is a brother-in-law of the late President Harding.
Wm. J. Burns, head of the criminal investigation bureau of the department of justice, told the committee that his agents informed him "that Mr. Votaw stopped it." He said that he believed that the investigation would have reached "men higher up" if it had been allowed to go on. Burns said that it was "unquestionably true" that an "influential ring" was bringing drugs into the country.

AMERICANS TO GET A SQUARE DEAL

PARIS, April 4.—Premier Poincare and Ambassador Hetrick today formally signed the Syrian mandate treaty under which Americans are assured full equality rights in Syria and Lebanon.

SCHOOL SURVEY MUST BE PLAIN

FT. WORTH, April 4.—That the Texas School Survey which is now in progress must be thoroughly and plainly reported to the people was the demand of President F. M. Bralley of the College of Industrial Arts in an address made Friday morning before the fourth annual educational conference of the University of Texas. He spoke on "Putting the Findings Before the Public." The opening meeting was devoted entirely to the survey, with President Bralley, President G. O. Clough of the Texas State Teachers' Association and Professor H. H. Fling, of Commerce as the speakers. President P. W. Horn of Lubbock presided.

President Bralley made a plea that the facts about school conditions in Texas be given to the people in an attractive manner, "so framed as to enable the people to form definite conclusions, to make recommendations upon their own initiative, and to rise to the demands of society for the more efficient educational system." He insisted that the school system should be presented as a whole, so that there might be a clear picture in the minds of all of the schools as a unit. He further emphasized that the survey must set forth the facts as they are, in clear and simple language.

The value of pictures, good printing, graphs, and attractive arrangement of materials, the numbering of paragraphs, and such matters were stressed by the speaker as being essential to making the reports sufficiently attractive to get the attention demanded. He asked, also, that a corps of newspaper men, profes-

NEGRO DIES IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

(By Associated Press)
HUNTSVILLE, Tex., April 4.—Booker Williams, negro, convicted, and given the death penalty for slaying Andy Sulzer, commissary keeper at a lumber camp near Lufkin, on February 26th of this year, was electrocuted at the state prison here early today.
The negro confessed to the crime, saying that robbery was the motive for the slaying of the white man. An attempt was made to lynch the negro shortly after the killing, and a speedy trial and infliction of the death penalty resulted.

He was buried at Santa Anna Friday morning. Prof. Dewey Pierratt, formerly a teacher in the Ballinger schools, was also a brother to the deceased.

"TWIN" STORMS KILL AND DAMAGE IN NORTH TEXAS

DALLAS, April 4.—Two residences were destroyed and many outbuildings blown down by "twin" tornadoes, one from the Southwest and the other from the West, which met at Halsell, twelve miles Southwest of Henrietta yesterday, according to reports received here today. No one was injured in the Henrietta storm.

The storm which struck portions of Dallas county yesterday resulted in the death of J. E. Jacobs, age 65, a farmer living near Renner. This storm originated in Denton county, and swept part of Dallas and Kaufman counties. Thirteen persons were injured in the path of the storm.

The heaviest loss was at Richardson, fourteen miles North of here, and the total damage in the second storm is estimated at \$40,000.

PIONEER NEWSPAPER MAN DIES AT ABILENE

ABILENE, April 4.—S. L. Neely, age 74, a retired pioneer and West Texas newspaper man, died at his home here today. Mr. Neely was connected with newspapers in this part of the state for more than thirty years.

There are six names to choose

"To the School Patrons and
 Voters:

"Upon my return to town last
 night I found that the question
 of a future bond issue for the
 purpose of building a new High
 School had entered into the elec-
 tion of School Trustees, which is
 to be held tomorrow.

"As a matter of fact, the atti-
 tude of the board of trustees, on
 the subject, will have very little
 to do with the voting and issuing
 of bonds for that purpose. The
 burden rests on the tax paying
 voters, for the school law plainly
 states that when a petition signed
 by twenty or more qualified tax
 paying voters is presented to the
 board of trustees, the board of
 trustees SHALL order the elec-
 tion, and that when the election
 is carried in favor of the issuing
 of bonds by a majority vote, that
 the board of trustees SHALL is-
 sue bonds and proceed with the
 work as outlined in the petition.
 Therefore, as I stated, the power
 to vote or reject bonds, lies en-
 tirely in the hands of the people.

"Now, in order that the people
 may be informed about the condi-
 tions of our schools, I quote from
 the letter, which is on file in my
 office received from the Chief
 High School Supervisor of the
 State Department of Education,
 following the visit of the Super-
 visor to our schools last Decem-
 ber. This letter contains more
 than a typewritten page of rec-
 ommendations which must be car-
 ried out in order to hold our pre-
 sent affiliation, and which start
 as follows: 'That plans be made
 in the immediate future to pro-
 vide more room, equipment, and
 teaching force. A two-roomed
 frame building of recent con-
 struction has only partially re-
 lieved the congestion in the High
 School.' In this letter, our affil-
 iation in several subjects is
 threatened if recommendations
 made are not carried out. And it
 is up to the people, the patrons
 of our schools, to say what will
 be done about them.

"Since more than ninety per-
 cent of the boys and girls in our
 public schools will never go away

to college, must depend on what
 they learn here to make them
 strong and useful men and wo-
 men in the world, why shouldn't
 they get instruction in manual
 training, bookkeeping, typewrit-
 ing, home economics, public
 school music, art, gymnasium,
 and other subjects which would
 be of great benefit to them and
 which would stimulate their in-
 terest in schools? There are very
 few students in the High School
 who haven't time for one or more
 of those subjects. Needless to
 say an auditorium in the high
 school is very much needed.

"No town can ever do any bet-
 ter than the school system that
 it maintains, so let's work for the
 good of our schools and in so
 doing, give our children better
 advantages and make our town a
 better place in which to live.

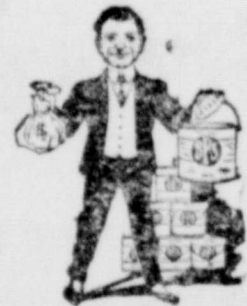

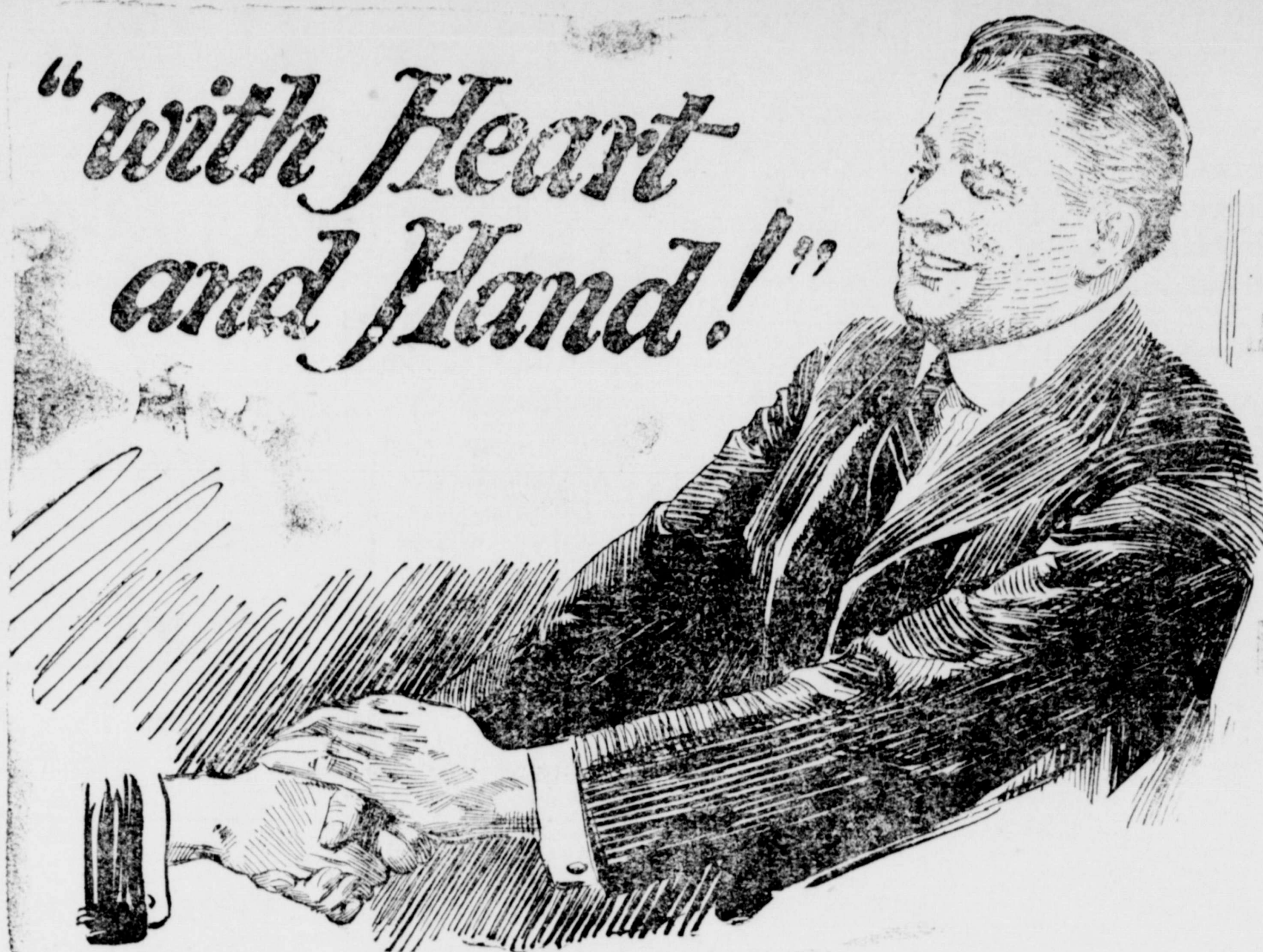
