## THREE PLEAD GUILTY; DRAW EIGHT YEARS

Three men were sent to the penitentiary within less than one hour in district court here Wednesday morning. Penalties were assessed aggregating eight years in the three cases, and it required less than one hour to accept the pleas of guilty, place the evidence before the juries, fix punishment and pass sentence.

J. H. Gray, white man, charged with burglary, plead guilty and the jury gave him the lightest penalty—two years in the penitentiary. Gray was charged with breaking in a barn in the Winters country, stealing harness and carrying it to Abilene where he attempted to sell it to second-hand stores. The man plead for mercy before the court. He told the court that he was 27 years old, had no education and had seen a hard life on the Mexican border. He promised to reform and live the right kind of a life if let off with the lightest punishment.

Luther Taylor, alias Will Jones, negro, plead guilty to passing a forged check at Winters. In a statement to the court the negro said that he had never been in any trouble before except gambling, and when the judge asked

### COOLIDGE WINS IN ILLINOIS

CHICAGO, April 9.—Illinois endorsed President Coolidge for the republican presidential nomination over Senator Hiram Johnson in the election yesterday. The latest figures from the primary give Coolidge 257,068, and Johnson 216,513. William G. McAdoo had no opposition for the democratic nomination in Illinois.

OMAHA, Neb., April 9.—President Coolidge is leading Senator Johnson, of California, in the presidential preferential primary held in this state yesterday. Coolidge receive 45,895 and Johnson 25,362 votes.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Further inquiry into the reports of "oil deals" at the Republican National Convention at Chicago in 1920 were made today by the Senate oil committee. J. W. Baughn, of Harlingen, Texas, formerly an oil operator in Oklahoma, told the committee that the late Jake Hamon, republican national committeeman from Oklahoma, told him that he "signed the check" that resulted in the nomination of Warren G. Harding for president. Baughn quoted Hamon as saying he would spend one million dollars, if necessary, to put Oklahoma in the republican column in the general election.

William Miller, of Columbus, Ohio, told the committee that he had no part in the collection or disbursement of the republican funds. J. B. French, of Oklahoma, testified Monday that Hamon told him he had given \$25,000 to Miller to pay headquarters expenses of the Harding committee at Chicago. The committee adjourned until next Friday.

canvass the entire town, asking the citizens to sign up for the number of tickets they will use. The plan is to go to Brownwood on the second day of the convention and to leave Ballinger about 7:00 o'clock in the morning, returning sometime that night. In addition to purchasing your ticket you will be asked to make a contribution to defray the expenses of the band and to buy a pair of made-in-Ballinger overalls and a big Palmetto hat at a cost of \$1.55 and wear them on the trip. Talk the matter over with other members of your firm and family and be prepared when the girls call to sign for the number of tickets you will use and for the other items mentioned above.

The band is planning to take about 60 musicians and with this bunch strutting their stuff down Brownwood's principal streets and about three hundred Ballinger citizens marching behind with pep squads pouring it on 'em we can let all West Texas know that we are alive and at the convention. The Junior Band and the Saxophone Band plan to enter the contest this year and both organizations are confident they will bring home the bacon.

As soon as 125 persons sign for tickets a special train will be chartered, and signs, banners and other advertising will be prepared for the trip. "Too" Most Misspelled Word in Dictionary

The little monosyllable "too" is the most misspelled word in the language, according to a study made by J. A. Lester of the Hill school, Pottstown, Pa. To find out which words are most frequently misspelled, Mr. Lester compiled a list of the 50 words most often found incorrect in the compositions written during a period of seven years by 2,414 candidates for college entrance.

This inquiry suggested to the teachers of London that a similar list might be compiled from the work of British pupils. As a preliminary to this study the 50 words that had stumped American students were tried out on British pupils. Teachers in all parts of England, Scotland and Wales dictated this list to 1,254 pupils in the elementary schools.

As a result of the test, it was found that British and American students misspell different words. The word "too," first on the American list, was forty-third in order of words misspelled by British pupils. "Together," another seemingly hard word for American pupils, is not a stumbling block to the British. It was fourth on the American list and forty-ninth on the British.

The only word which appeared among the ten most frequently misspelled by both American and British pupils was "committee." Whether or not to double the m's, t's and e's was evidently a puzzle to both groups.

No comparison can be made of the spelling ability of American and British pupils, as the British elementary school children were, of course, much younger than the American high school graduates. This difference of age accounts somewhat for the dissimilarity in the misspelled words.

Long words were hardest for the British children, whereas the matter of length was not an index to those misspelled by Americans. The 25 words of the 50 which British pupils most frequently misspelled contained 229 letters, whereas the remaining 25 contained only 190. American pupils, on the other hand, misspelled about an equal number of long and short words. —Boston Globe.

BRADY ATTORNEY WILL BE IN RACE

The Ledger has been authorized to place the name of Evans J. Adkins, county judge of McCulloch county, in the political announcement column for District Attorney of this district. The district is composed of Brown, McCulloch, Coleman, Runnels and Concho. In his formal announcement in asking the people to elect him to the office Mr. Adkins says:

"I am 32 years of age and have lived in this judicial district at Brady, McCulloch county, Texas, for the last 30 years, where I attended the public schools and graduated from the Brady High School in 1910. I then attended Howard Payne College at Brownwood and graduated from that institution in 1912 after which I taught school for two years at Millersview in Concho county. I then attended the law department of the State University and after being admitted to the bar returned and went into the law office of my father, Joe A. Adkins, where I practiced law until I was elected County Attorney, which position I held for one term and then was elected to the office of County Judge, which position I have held for three terms being returned each time by the voters of McCulloch county by overwhelming majorities. I am a married man and have two children living, whom I hope to educate to useful citizens. I am a member of the Baptist church, the American Legion, Odd Fellow and Masonic fraternities and have always affiliated myself with that element of our citizenship that stood for the development of our natural resources and the betterment of rural conditions so that our producers might better obtain those things that they are justly entitled to. In refusing the earnest solicitations of my friends and not running for County Judge again but instead announcing for the office of District Attorney, I do so for two reasons. First, I desire to push forward and increase my sphere of usefulness believing that a man should always strive for something better until he reaches the limit of his ability and training. Second, I feel that my education and training have been such that I am qualified for the position which I seek and I have ambition to accomplish as much for myself, my family and my country as is in my power. If I am elected to the office of District Attorney, I will exert my every effort to see that every law is strictly enforced. Realizing that the greatest number of violations of the law today consist in the illicit manufacture, sale and handling of intoxicating liquor, I shall make an untiring effort to suppress these crimes and their attendant evils. I make this statement because of the fact that this question is paramount throughout our entire nation and the effectiveness of prohibition, for which our good women and Christian manhood have fought, will not be complete until the nefarious, home wrecking, man-killing and debauching bootlegger is forced to abandon his trade or safely locked behind our prison walls. the negro if he would make a good citizen and not violate the law again, the negro said "nothin' 'cept gamblin'." The jury gave the negro two years in the pen.

C. H. Glenn, a white man, charged with incest said there was "nothing for him to do except to plead guilty." "You don't have to plead guilty, and you can't plead guilty in this court unless you are guilty," said Judge Woodward. "I want to plead guilty," said the prisoner. The jury fixed the punishment in this case at four years in the penitentiary. In passing sentence on the prisoner Judge Woodward told him that the jury was very lenient with him, and said that of all crime the one with which the man was charged was the most horrible. "You got off light," said the judge. The prisoner's sister was the main state's witness in the case.

After deliberating from 5:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon until 10:00 o'clock Wednesday morning, the jury in the Pat Barnhill liquor case returned a verdict of not guilty. Barnhill was charged with selling liquor to L. Daniel, of Winters.

The court ran out of material upon which to grind at 10:00 o'clock Wednesday morning, and the jury was excused until 1:30 Wednesday afternoon. The grand jury is still in session. The three cases in which pleas of guilty were accepted Wednesday morning were cases in which the grand jury returned indictments Tuesday afternoon. The John Smith, negro, murder case, is set for Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. Smith is charged with killing F. J. Kuhn at Rowena last August. He was tried at the last term of court and given 35 years. The court granted a new hearing.

When court convened for the afternoon session Wednesday the jury was again dismissed until Thursday morning at 9:00 o'clock, no cases being ready for trial. Judge Woodward was on the bench to hear non-jury cases. The grand jury was still grinding.

**DEATHS**

Ollie Gerline Dunn

Birth of An Island.

Volcanic energy may well be the basis of those ancient stories of a dead Atlantis. Authentic modern history tells us enough, indeed, to forbid too stern a scepticism. There, for example, is the island of Torca, which existed as a thing of beauty in the Indian ocean till one day in June, 1693. Early in the morning of that day its volcano burst into unusual activity. Within four days the mountain backbone of the island was a molten mass, which began to sink into the sea. Then came a central lake of boiling lava. On July 18 the last islander fled to Anboy, and the history of a once fertile island was finished. Perhaps the only captain who has ever been present at the birth of an island was a Russian, who gave his name to the apparition—Bogoslof. This little smoking horror came into being in the Aleutian isles on May 1, 1793; and to this day, although diminished from its original three-mile circumference, it still belches smoke and steam.

**Interest Grows in Services Downtown; Haven to Play**

The twenty minute downtown service Wednesday morning, which is a part of the revival program now being carried out by the Hendrick-Haven campaign, brought out quite an increase in the attendance. The service was held at the Dooze real estate office, and was the second service held at the business houses. The Thursday morning service will be held at the Maeroy Theatre, and those interested will make an effort to get Dale Haven to play the piano.

The Wednesday morning services at the church were also well attended, and the interest in the revival has shown an increase which is encouraging to those responsible for the campaign. The Tuesday night's service was well attended, the congregation being much larger than Monday night.

While only three days of the revival have passed, much visible good has already been accomplished. Mr. Haven has organized a band of children ranging in ages from six to fifteen years which will present a musical program that promises to bring out a record breaking attendance. The children are meeting for rehearsals at 4:00 o'clock each afternoon, and about one hundred children will make up the chorus.

"Religion is a fountain of youth. It brightens our faces and helps our lives."

"The most unreasonable thing in the world is not to be a Christian. It is the most reasonable thing to be a Christian."

"It is not right to lose your soul."

Dr. Hendrick's travels and many years experience in evangelistic work have greatly enriched his life and equipped him for helping his fellowman to see the bright side of life. His life is one of sunshine, and to hear him makes the down and out feel like taking a new grip on the old world, and enjoying the greatest age of the world.

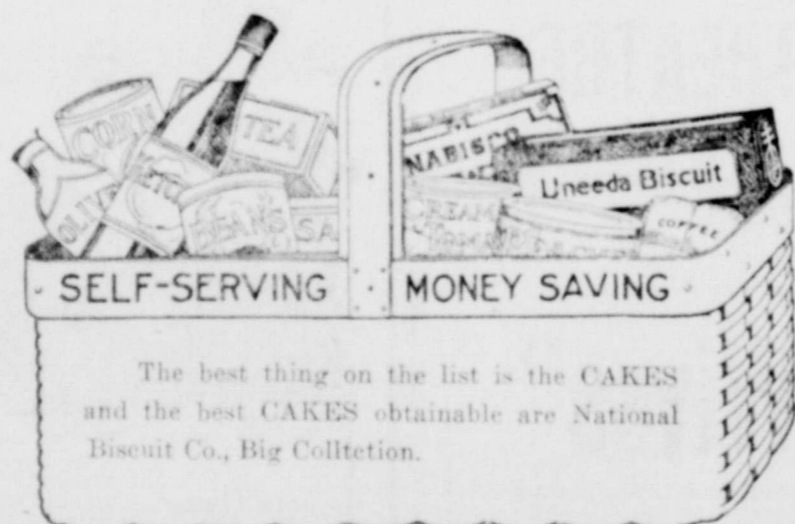

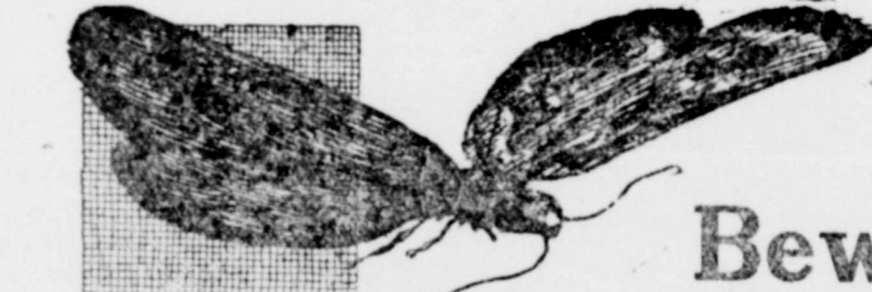
