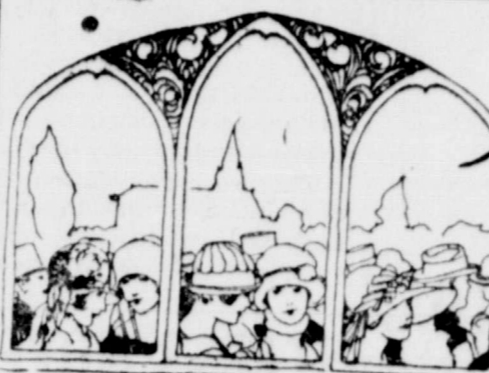

TOO MUCH MEXICAN IN OUR SCHOOLS

The present term of school is too near out to start a rucus, but if the school board does not take steps looking to the providing of a school for the Mexican children, and the segregation of the whites and the Mexicans, the patrons of the school should take a hand in the matter.

We realize that a lack of finances is responsible for present conditions in the schools, but it is poor economy to house the Mexicans with the white children, and with the continued increase in Mexican population, there is entirely too much Mexican in our schools.

It is a well known fact that the class of Mexicans who drift into this country from across the border are not the highest class citizens from our neighbor republic. In the main they are what we often class as 'greasers,' and to mix them with the white children in the school room and on the playground can be of no benefit to our own race.

We feel that it is to the best interests of our schools and to the best interests of society that the Mexicans be given a school to themselves. We do not associate with the Mexican population of this country, then why should we permit a mixing of the children in school.

COMMON SENSE IN LIFE PRESERVATION

When suffering from bad health people will spend much money for doctors, nurses and medicine and will give all they possess to regain health and prolong their life.

People in good health will crawl in an auto for an afternoon's joy ride and race with death by pushing their car to the highest speed, and then dash across a track in front of a train rather than spend a half minute waiting for the train to pass.

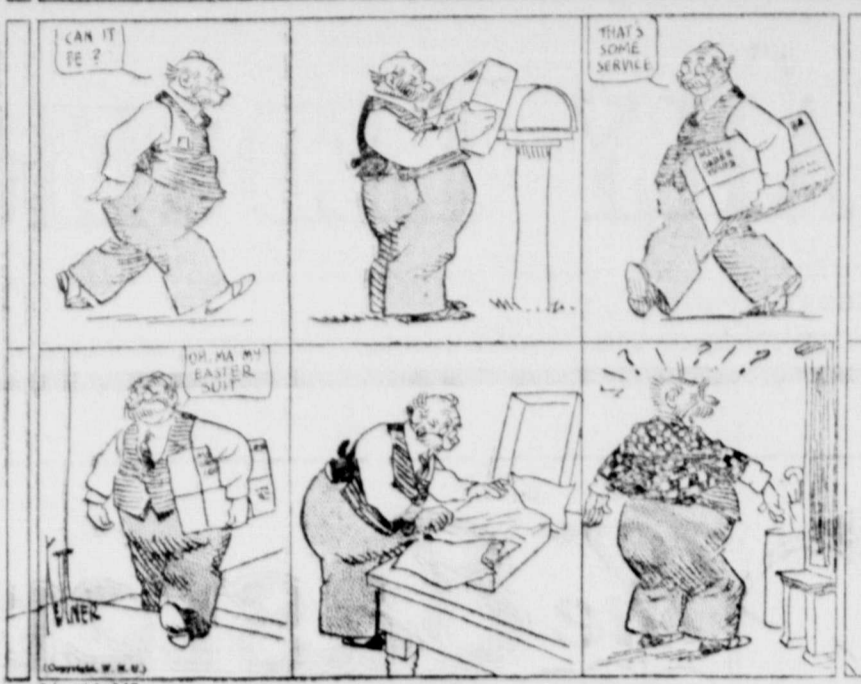
The psychology of this is hard to understand. To sum it up in a few words we might say that carelessness is a greater enemy to human life than disease.

DENIES BIG LOAN MADE IN POLITICS

(By Associated Press)
 WASHINGTON, April 11.—Returning to its inquiry into possible oil corporation contributions to the national political campaign funds the Senate oil committee today sought information about the three million dollar loan made by the Chase National Bank in New York in 1919, to William Thompson, formerly chairman of the ways and means committee of the republican national committee.

Declaring that his client was too ill to appear, William Wallace, attorney for Thompson, testified that the loan was secured by shares of Sinclair oil stock. But Wallace insisted that the loan had nothing to do with campaign funds. Wallace also denied that Thompson had borrowed large sums to wipe out the republican national committee's deficit after the 1920 campaign.

BROTHER DIES AT SAN ANGELO

News was received in Ballinger Friday morning announcing the death of Mr. Yearly, a brother of Mrs. A. K. Doss of this city, in San Angelo at 3:00 o'clock Friday morning. The funeral will be held Saturday at San Angelo. Mrs. Doss was called to San Angelo Thursday night, reaching there before her brother died.

COMMISSION O.K.'S REPORT ON REPARATIONS

 PARIS, April 11.—The reparations commission today officially approved the report submitted by the experts committee on the German reparations question. The recommendation of the commission is that the report be approved conditional upon the acceptance of it by Germany.

STARTS MOVE TO SEND TEXAS UNINSTRUCTED

(By Associated Press)
 AUSTIN, April 11.—A contest over whether the Texas delegation to the democratic national convention will go uninstructed or instructed is expected to become an open issue from the opening of Governor Neff's speaking campaign at Cleburne on April 14th. Tom Love, the democratic national committee man, favors an instructed delegation and Governor Neff favors an uninstructed delegation.

 WASHINGTON, April 11.—Air pilots of the Honduran revolutionary forces have begun their bombing raids on Tegucigalpa. They have already killed a number of women and children. Four bombs were dropped near the ground where the members of the American landing forces from the cruiser Milwaukee were exercising. Dispatches to the navy department today from Rear Admiral Dayton made no mention of any casualties among the American forces.

The dispatches said that the aviators had evidently mistaken the Americans for their enemies, and made an effort to bomb the Americans through mistake.

MEASLES STRIKE IN FULL FORCE HERE

Breaking out here a few days ago, the measles started an epidemic which seems to be sweeping the city. It is the first siege of this disease to strike here in several years, and many children of the younger age are subject to the malady which is spreading fast, or which has already been scattered in almost every home where there are children who have not had the measles. It was reported Friday that twenty-three children in the primary grades were out of school in one room, and all the primary grades and some of the higher grades are already suffering.

Children are not permitted to attend school from a home where there is a case of measles, and this is detaining some from school who have already had the disease, while in some cases children not subject to the measles are being kept away from home in order that they might attend school. None of the cases of measles are reported serious, the illness caused by the epidemic running its usual course, but it is important that proper care in nursing be looked after in order to prevent complications which might prove serious.

Revival Attendance Breaks Record; More Seats Ordered

Thursday night had been designated as "Family Night" in the revival meeting, and it was a complete success. The crowd began to gather fully an hour before the time set to begin the service and they continued to come until every seat was occupied. Additional seats will be placed in all the available space throughout the entire building so that every one may have a chance to sit and not have to stand as many did last night. It was the largest crowd of the meeting, even exceeding the Sunday night's services.

Mr. Haven stated that his junior choir was the largest he had ever had, for the regular services, and that he expected to let others in yet for a day or two. There were 133 at the practice yesterday afternoon, and 154 present last night. These children will render the entire program of music at the service next Wednesday night. This will be the feature program, so far as local talent is concerned, and will be the greatest thing ever witnessed by the people of Ballinger.

Dr. Hendrick made good his offer to give to the youngest member of the largest family present one dollar. Mr. Esmond's little daughter, June, received the present. She is the youngest of a family of eight. Following this the children sang "Shine for the Lord Where You Are."

Using the words "What have they seen in thy house?" the evangelist preached the strongest sermon heard in Ballinger for many, many years on the subject of the "Christian Home."

The speaker has a rare fund of facts which he uses, as he alone can, in setting forth the actual conditions of so many homes and also in describing the ideal home—one which has the old-fashioned, level-headed, Christian mother. Many eyes were teardimmed as he so vividly set before his vast throng the altar scenes in many homes which he had known. Here, above all, one could see life through the burning-glass of vision, grim reality grasped with the naked strength of paternal love, and in that grasp was revealed the secret divine transfiguration.

But not only does the evangelist make use of his large stock of fine illustrative material, with its rush and inspiration, but he also gives evidence that, lying behind the swift movement and the vibrant passion, is a certain large stillness. Beneath the glowing eloquence are deep calms, and the shrewd, practical exposition hides unguessed realms of beautiful and mystic feelings. One discerns the marks of a seer as the speaker makes use of certain turns of thought and flashes of winged intuition that suggests a background of prayer. Whatever be the preacher's downrightness, his unsparing realism of touch and his disconcerting contempt of the respectabilities, his utterance, even at its blindest, is that of one who serves the sanctuary and lives by the altar.

The intellectual content of Dr. Hendrick's messages is such as to rouse the sermon-weary and gospel-hardened church-goers, and arrests the most careless and creedless—people who have not darkened the doors of the church for years. Those who think that ethical, social and creedless preaching is the only way to succeed in the pulpit, have had their point of view punctured and have been set to thinking that after all the historic creeds contain the meaning and the message of today the same as they did years ago. As one follows the preacher in his statements of the historic faith he is struck by his power of making this the basic fact of redemption. The evangelist argues that a man is

saved by the spirit of humble penitence and faith in Jesus Christ, the living, loving, Eternal Son of God.

The down town service Friday morning also brought out another large crowd of men, something like one hundred being present in the Rho-Mac Cafe and listened with interest to a twenty minute service. The services down town at 9:30 Saturday morning will be held at the Moody Music House. Mr. Haven will play for this service, and he will begin playing a few minutes before the hour of service, and those who wish to hear him should drop in before 9:30.

A service for the men at the Methodist Church at 3:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon is being advertised. Dr. Hendrick will speak to the men at that hour. His sermon is different from others generally delivered to congregations of men only.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 11.—Senator Wheeler and Senator Brookhart, of the Daugherty investigating committee, arrived here this morning, and left immediately for Washington Court House, Ohio, by automobile. They will investigate the books in the bank of which Mal Daugherty, brother of former Attorney General Daugherty, is president.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The stay-at-home section of the Senate committee investigating the official acts of former Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty went on with its hearing today, with Senator Moses presiding, and with J. J. McGraw, of Tulsa, Oklahoma, on the witness stand.

Testimony given by McGraw was concerning the Miller Brothers Indian land fraud cases in Oklahoma. McGraw said that he had a general knowledge of the Miller Brothers' land deals, but had not been consulted by them in the deals nor had he directly financed these transactions in any way through his banks. He said that he knew Attorney General Daugherty and that the attorney general had told him that he was going to prosecute the cases.

COLORED SNOW CAUSES ALARM AMONG JAPS

(By Associated Press)
TOKIO, April 11.—A fall of "yellow snow" is reported from Niigata, on the Northwest coast of Japan. The inhabitants of the region are much disturbed, considering the phenomenon an omen of evil oport, but scientists have an explanation. They believe that clouds of the

yellow dust from the Gobi desert, which frequently are driven over North China and are especially well known in Peking, have been carried across the Sea of Japan in snowclouds.

Old inhabitants of the Niigata district recall that half a century ago there was a fall of "red snow" in that region.

JAPAN OBSERVES U. S. AGREEMENT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 11.—The famous "gentlemen's agreement" under which Japanese immigration into the United States was curtailed, has been reduced to concrete terms for the first time in the exchange of correspondence between Secretary of State Hughes and Ambassador Hanihara.

Japan has scrupulously observed the gentlemen's agreement and is prepared to continue to do so, the Japanese ambassador declared in a letter to Mr. Hughes.

SEEKS DISMISSAL OIL SUIT CASES

CHEYENNE, Wyoming, April 11.—Dismissal of the bill of complaint of the United States vs. the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing Company and the Sinclair Pipe Line Company is sought in a petition filed by the attorneys for the oil corporations in the federal court here today in answer to the government's suit against the Mammoth Oil Company.

Suit was brought against these corporations for the annulment of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve lease.

COMPOSED SONG AT AGE OF 6

Camille Saint-Saens Was One of the Most Interesting Figures in Modern Music.

All the world of music was saddened in December, 1921, by the announcement of the death of Saint-Saens, France's most distinguished living composer and one of the most interesting of all modern musicians.

In the sacred opera, "Samson and Delilah," Caruso in the role of "Samson," made one of the most sensational successes, and to him is due largely the recent popularity in America of this, Saint-Saens' greatest opera.

Camille Saint-Saens (1835-1921) is one of the most interesting figures in modern music. He was a "wonder child," for at the age of two years he began lessons and in six months had completed a whole piano course, under the tutelage of his aunt.

At seven he was admitted to the Paris Conservatoire as a pupil of the famous Halvey in piano, and later of Benoit in organ and of Charles Gounod in composition. When he was ten he played so remarkably well that his mother invited a group of prominent musicians to hear him, and in the same year, at their suggestion, he gave his first concert, playing Bach, Handel, Mozart and Beethoven.

All Europe raved over his genius. He played brilliantly in concert in all parts of Europe and England for more than 20 years.

At six years he had composed some little dances and a song, "Le Soir." At sixteen he wrote a symphony. In the history of music there is not a more versatile name than his. From this time on he composed all sorts of music, cantatas, chamber music, piano concertos, organ music, symphonies, symphonic poems and songs.—The Deaneator.

Gift of the Nile.
Africa is especially dependent upon irrigation and it has been pointed out that modern engineers have not devised any essentially new method of supplying thirsty lands with water. Reference may be made to the statement of Herodotus that Egypt is the gift of the Nile and mention may be made of the latest conclusion as to the source of the Nile floods. The observations of Lyons have finally demonstrated that the rains falling in the immense basin of the White Nile are of no importance to Egypt. From one to August the Nile rises and afterward sinks until once more the gods come down in the Blue Nile from Abyssinia. Egypt is simply a "riciated valley 780 miles long, and part from the delta, which is 100 miles long, this valley is nowhere more than 15 miles wide and in some spots is less than a mile.

COURT TAKES OUT FOR WEEK END

Holding that the plaintiff had failed to produce sufficient evidence to prove liability on the part of the defendant, the court instructed the jury in the Tad Richards' suit against the Winters Light Company, to return a verdict for the defendant. The case came to an end Thursday afternoon after the plaintiff rested and before the defense offered any testimony. Richards was asking \$3500 damages against the light company for loss of barn and contents by fire, alleging that electric wires caused the fire.

After disposing of the Richards case court recessed until Monday when the John Smith, negro, murder trial will come up and the negro will be arraigned for trial the second time for killing F. J. Kuhn near Rowena last August. A special venire has been summoned for this case.

After a two weeks' session the grand jury also took a recess Friday until Monday without returning any bills in the Tabor murder case which they have been working on. It is expected indictments will be returned in the case next week. The grand jury returned three indictments Tuesday of this week, and these have been tried and the parties indicted sentenced to the penitentiary.
