## DAUGHERTY PROBE HALTED

(By Associated Press)  
CHICAGO, April 12.—Senator Wheeler, democrat, of Montana, chairman of the Daugherty investigation, said today that Mal S. Daugherty, brother of former Attorney General Daugherty, would be cited for contempt before the Senate, for refusing to permit the committee to investigate the bank books of his bank and obtain such data as was needed in the investigation of the attorney general.

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, April 12.—The Daugherty investigating committee, which encountered new legal obstacles yesterday in Ohio, spent today drawing up plans for its future procedure. The committee held no public hearing today.

Members of the committee who went to Washington Court House, Ohio yesterday to investigate the books in the bank of Mal Daugherty, brother of the former attorney general, were refused the privilege of seeing the books. Mal Daugherty defied the probers, and would not let them have the information which they were seeking.

The committee had not made known today what would be the next steps in the matter.

CHICAGO, April 12.—There are still many leads to be developed in the Senate inquiry into the administration of the department of justice, and the investigation will continue at least six weeks, according to a statement today which said "in spite of official opposition confronting the committee."

Senator Wheeler, democrat, of Montana, and chairman of the committee, gave out the statement, and he declared that the "ultimate result of the committee's course will depend on the attitude of the new attorney to a reorganization of the department."

## SAYS PINCHOT WANTED HENEY FOR COUNSEL

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Governor Pinchot, of Pennsylvania, suggested the employment of Francis J. Heney as counsel for the Senate committee investigating the internal revenue bureau, Senator Watson, republican, of Indiana, and chairman of the committee, declared today. Senator Watson said today that he had learned upon indisputable evidence that Gov. Pinchot had thrust himself into the controversy between Senator Couzens, republican, of Michigan, prosecutor for the committee, and Secretary Mellon.

Senator Watson said that he had informed Secretary Mellon that Gov. Pinchot had suggested Heney's employment and that it was this information which prompted Mellon's letter to President Coolidge, and which was transmitted yesterday to the Senate.

## SOLDIER BONUS BILL APPROVED

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, April 12.—The soldier bonus bill as passed by the House a short time ago was agreed to with minor changes today by the Senate finance committee, and ordered reported to the Senate.

The bill provides for cash payments to veterans not entitled to more than fifty dollars adjusted compensation and for twenty-year paid-up endowment life insurance policies to others.

## EVELYN NESBIT FIGHTS THAW

(By Associated Press)  
PHILADELPHIA, April 12.—Evelyn Nesbit, the divorced wife of Harry K. Thaw, today filed a petition to be allowed to intervene in the proceedings to determine Thaw's sanity. Thaw is to face a jury which will determine whether he is insane or not and the trial is scheduled to begin Monday.

Action on Miss Nesbit's petition has not been made. It is in the interest of the woman's 12-year-old son, Russell Thaw, that the petition was filed.

The petition sets forth that Thaw should not be released as he is mentally unfit, and will, if released, dissipate his own estate and his life's interest in his father's estate.

**Disease Control**  
One hundred thirty-five head of cattle were treated with the life time aggressin for blackleg in March.

On March 25th the County Agent was called out to the Meka farm, on the Colorado River, to inspect a herd of cattle that was afflicted with a peculiar disease.

These cattle were pastured on the low lands of the Colorado, land subject to overflow. After as thorough an investigation as could be made under existing conditions, it was found that the cattle were afflicted with encephalitis caused presumably from eating narcotic or poisonous weeds.

Proper relief remedies were prescribed and removal of the cattle from the overflow lands recommended.

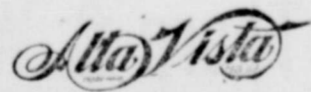

One of the prettiest sights was the gulls, which filled the air like so many feathery snowflakes. Their immaculate white bodies and soft wings tipped with black were delightful to see. They were masters of the air. There was a constant adjustment of wings to meet every air current that struck the rocks where we camped; but in a steady breeze the movement was too slight to see and they hung motionless, as if in a painted sky. They tacked straight in the teeth of the wind. I saw one retain perfect poise and at the same time reach forward with his foot and scratch his ear. A gull in his own country will steal and murder like a pirate. If a murre or cormorant left its home without a guard, these saintly looking sealangs swooped down to eat the eggs and young. The murre has a large, tough shelled egg which the gull's bill cannot penetrate. But these robbers know enough to pick it up, fly out, and drop it on the rock below or nose it along until it drops to the shelf below, when they can devour the contents. Oftentimes I have seen a gull pick up a young murre or cormorant not long out of the egg and swallow the youngster alive. The downward course of the young bird was marked by a bulge in the gull's neck. I have often seen a western gull act in a way that speaks well for his sagacity. I have watched him open clam and mussels at the seashore. His bill is unfitted for crushing the hard shell, but he will take a clam, rise to a height of 30 feet, and drop it to the hard sand and gravel below. If it doesn't break he will continue the performance. I saw one bird do this 15 times before he was successful.—National Geographic Magazine.

**BRITAIN AS SEEN FROM AIR**  
Photographs Show Complete Preservation of Boundaries Between Fields of Ancient Celtic Inhabitants.  
Every day that passes suggests a new use for the airplane. The latest revelation comes from southern England, where photographs taken by O. G. S. Crawford show the complete preservation of the boundaries between the fields of the ancient Celtic inhabitants who dwell in England before the coming of the Romans and Saxons. From the ground almost all vestiges of the ancient system of division have long since vanished, but photographs from the air still show the ancient field boundaries as a kind of pattern seen through those of the present day. The air photographs reveal earthworks which the observer on the ground can scarcely see. The Celts appear to have made their boundaries of broad low banks in which they placed a good deal of chalk. Although the banks have vanished to a great extent, the earth where they once were retains a lighter color because of the mingling of small grains of chalk in the soil. A definite relationship can be seen between the fields, roads and the sites of ancient villages. Mr. Crawford even thinks that he sees evidence of an ancient system of irrigation. The boundaries are supposed to be from 1,500 to 2,500 years old.—From the Living Age.

### Data on Oil and Gas

The Department of the Interior has just issued bulletin 736 of the geological survey, which is made up of eight reports that have already been published as individual booklets. This bulletin will be of particular interest to geologists and oil and gas operators working in the Rocky mountains, mid-continent and gulf coast fields, for it contains the geological survey's reports on the geology and oil prospects in the Osage oil field of Wyoming, the Crow Indian reservation of Montana, the El Dorado oil field of Arkansas, the Madill-Denison area of Oklahoma and Texas, the Ranger district of Texas and the Brooks, Steen and Grand Saline salt domes of Texas. The bulletin is illustrated with maps, geologic sections and well logs, which should be of use to drillers and operators in the areas described.

### Tin Reduced to Fine Powder

While tin has been in use for a great many centuries, yet until recently vessels of tin are so rarely found by archaeologists as to be well-nigh unknown. This is not due to the fact that tin rusts, for the metal does not combine chemically with the oxygen of the air or that of water, but to the circumstance that a sort of decay does attack it, producing a change in its crystalline structure, the nature of which does not seem to be clearly understood. This ends in reducing the tin to a fine gray powder. The process proceeds much more rapidly at certain times than it does at others and seems to be transmitted from one piece of tin to another, almost like an infectious disease.

### Highest Cross

A cross, said to be the highest in the world, is that on the spire of the new Chicago Methodist temple. Towering 560 feet above the ground, the cross, twelve feet high and six feet wide, appears but a few inches in dimensions. Great flood lights will illuminate it by night, while the reflection of the sun upon the gold-leaf-covered arms will make it visible for miles in the daytime.

PIONEER IN PLAYING CARDS

Mexican Artificers of 1580 Became Imitators of the Spanish Invaders.

In 1580 the manufacturers of Pueblo and Oaxaca produced silk and woolen goods equal to the average of European standards, and, curiously enough, or perhaps as an indication of the habits of the Colonial Spaniards, playing cards were made in great numbers (9,000 dozen one authority states). In the Museum of the Indies in Seville, Spain, there is a pack of playing cards made in 1583. The faces of these cards are imitations of the European types, but the backs represent Aztec scenes and caricatures of the Spaniards. These were made from wood blocks, perhaps the first cut in the new world.

Of all the European races that came to the new world, Dutch, English, French and Spanish, the Spaniards had the most to give in matters artistic. For they had not only a reminiscence of a splendid and vigorous Gothic tradition, but the great enrichment of eight centuries of contact with the Moors, the recent conquest of their splendid cities and a far extended trade in the Levant.

Spain was peculiarly fortunate in the fact that her Argosies touched the most cultivated and highly civilized people in the new world. They were craftsmen equal to any that Europe knew. They had arts as highly developed as any brought to them by their conquerors. But it is the record of art history that the more highly developed peoples are they to borrow one from the other. The dramatic entrance of the Spaniards, their apparent justification of the ancient miracles recorded in native folk stories regarding the bearded white strangers from the sea, their unquestioned military strength and the interest that always be associated with the exotic, all strongly moved the native artisans and craftsmen to imitation.—M. D. C. Crawford in Arts and Decoration.
