INSANE MAN HELD FOR MURDER

(By Associated Press)

LUBBOCK, April 24.—T. H. Moore, a Terry county farmer, who was shot preceding the capture of Will Ward yesterday, is near death in a hospital here, and no hopes were held out for his recovery late today.

FT. WORTH, April 24.—Closely guarded by officers, Will Ward, "pegleg" cowboy who is alleged to have ambushed Dr. S. H. Windham, prominent physician and ranchman of Tahoka, and wounded two other men, is being held in the jail at Brownfield today. It was announced this afternoon that the two ranchmen who were wounded by Ward will recover.

Ward surrendered yesterday after a battle with possemen at a dipping vat where he had taken refuge. The young man had been employed on the Windham ranch for a month prior to the shooting of Dr. Windham and no reason has been assigned for the slaying of Dr. Windham. Windham was shot while driving from Tahoka to his ranch in his car, and when found his body was a few feet from the car with the engine of the car still running and the lights turned on.

MRS. JAMES L. PHILLIPS BURIED AT SANTA ANNA

Mrs. Mattie Holliday and daughter, Miss Mildred, Mr. and Mrs. S. P. Hathaway, Mrs. H. R. Bradford and Miss May Miles went to Santa Anna Wednesday to attend the funeral of Mrs. Jas. L. Phillips. Mrs. Phillips died at 5:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon after a long illness, and she was laid to rest in the cemetery at Santa Anna at 4:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon following the funeral service which were conducted at the Presbyterian church, a large crowd of sorrowing friends attending the funeral.

Mrs. Phillips will be remembered in Ballinger as Miss Ida Miles. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Miles, and lived in Ballinger for many years. She is survived by a husband, three children, her parents, two sisters and a brother. The eldest child, a daughter, lives in Houston. Two sons, ages 4 and 14 years, were with their mother when death came. The bereaved sisters are Mrs. V. L. Grady, of Santa Anna; and Mrs. J. D. Norwood, of Waco; and a brother, Hayden, all of whom were present at the funeral. Frank Miles, father of the deceased, recently underwent an operation for appendicitis, and was not able to attend the funeral.

The many friends of the family in Ballinger are grieved and extend condolences to the bereaved family and relatives in their sorrow.

BALOONS RACE IN HIGH WIND

SAN ANTONIO, April 24.—Driven Northward by a wind ranging in velocity according to different altitudes at from 25 to 100 miles per hour, the seven balloons which left here yesterday in the national elimination race, were strung out over Oklahoma and Arkansas this morning, according to dispatches received here. None of the balloons could be identified at the height which they were traveling by witnesses.

GERMAN LEADER DIES IN WRECK

(By Associated Press)

BERNE, Switzerland, April 24.—Dr. Karl Halff Erich, eminent German financial authority, and his mother were killed in the collision of two express trains near Bellinzona yesterday.

While minister of the interior and vice-chancellor during the war, Dr. Erich favored the prosecution of the war to the utmost. He opposed the payment of reparations and also disapproved of the report of the financial experts recently made under Dawes because he claimed that the plan was too burdensome for Germany to assume. He established the Rentenmark which the experts planned to replace with new gold currency.

BIG DELEGATION TO FIREMEN'S CONVENT'N

Sixteen men, including the racing team, the fire chief and two delegates, will leave Ballinger on May 13th for McKinney, where they will attend the State Firemen's Convention which convenes in McKinney on May 14th. The local fire company is working hard in getting their team in trim to compete for first money in the reel races. The boys are practicing daily and have made some good time. The firemen's convention coming on the same date of the Chamber of Commerce convention at Brownwood will rob Ballinger of several men who would no doubt help to make up the crowd to the Brownwood meeting, but from all indications standing room on the special train from Ballinger to Brownwood will be at a premium.

EXPERTS TO FILM SOUTH SEA BIRDS

(By Associated Press)

PAGOPAGO, American Samoa, April 24.—R. H. Beck and J. G. Corrsin, of the Whitney Expedition studying bird life in the South Seas, have returned here after a trip through the islands in which they obtained specimens and photographs of all the types of birds found here. The expedition is operating under the auspices of the American Museum of Natural History.

Thus far trips have been made to the Marquesas, Society and Cook groups as well as a few isolated islands.

PIONEER PREACHER SPEAKS TONIGHT

Dr. Powell, who is to lecture at the Baptist church tonight, arrived in the city Thursday. Dr. Powell finds things here to refresh his memory and cause him to become reminiscent. He was one of the first, if not the first Baptist ministers to preach in this country in the early days. 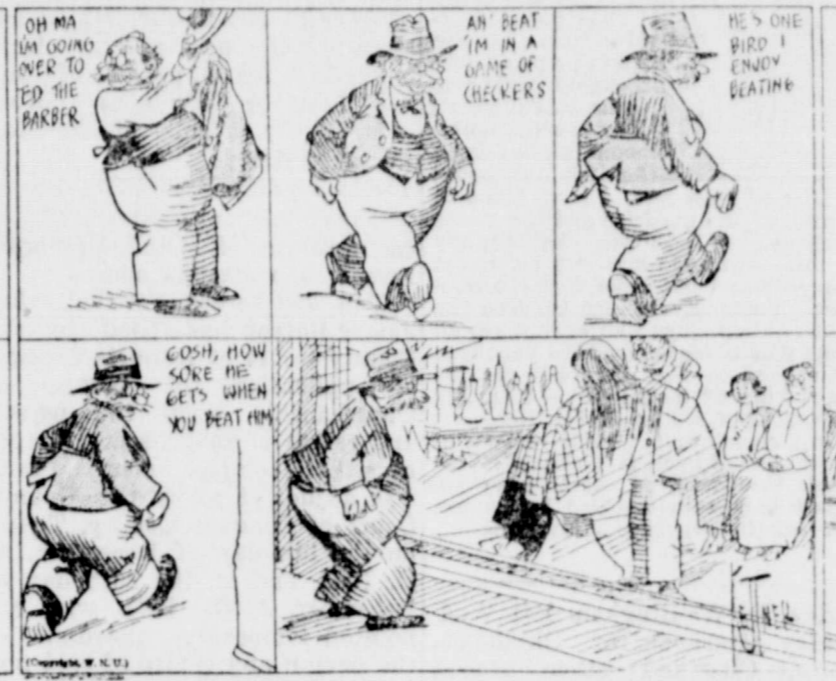

TESTIMONY IN WHEELER CASE NO DECEPTION IN TEAPOT DOME

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Commissioner Fry of the general land office, testified today before the special Senate investigating committee that Senator Wheeler called at his office in the spring of 1923 with Solicitor Both, who said that Wheeler was "interested" in land cases of Gordon Campbell, a Montana oil operator for whom Wheeler is accused of acting as representative in federal land matters since he was elected to the United States Senate.

Spry told the committee that Wheeler said that he was only interested to such an extent as to see that Campbell got a "square deal."

William G. Feely, Washington attorney for Campbell, testified that under verbal contract he represented Campbell in land cases before the interior department, but said that he never had any consultation with Wheeler or his law firm on these matters, and he told the committee that Wheeler had nothing to do with the land matters which he handled for Campbell.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—J. O. Lewis, petroleum engineer, who testified that the Teapot Dome reserve would have been susceptible to drainage from nearby wells had not the government moved to have oil extracted immediately, was asked today by Senator Walsh, oil committee prosecutor, whether or not he had been guilty of deception in testifying as an impartial expert. Senator Walsh read a letter said to have been written by Lewis which he said showed months before he appeared that Lewis had taken the position in accord with every policy involved in the leasing. Lewis denied any deception, saying that he was impartial in his study and conclusions.

STORY OF LIGHTNING ROD

King George III Was Opposed to
 Franklin's Device and Ordered
 Points Made Blunt.

France has probably done more than
 any other nation to make the world
 safe against lightning. This is the cen-
 tenary year of a revised set of rules
 printed by the Academie des Sciences
 for the protection of buildings by con-
 ductors. The glory of discovery, how-
 ever, must be shared by other nations.
 Benjamin Franklin begins the story.
 "In 1745," he wrote, "I met at Bos-
 ton a certain Doctor Spence, who came
 from Scotland. He performed some
 electrical experiments before me." Then
 a little later, while in Philadelphia,
 the great American received from
 Mr. Collinson of London, a member
 of the Royal society, his first toy
 glass tube. "I seized eagerly on the
 chance of reproducing what I had seen
 done in Boston."

From these experiments to the fa-
 mous kite was an easy step, and from
 the kite to the lightning conductor the
 magic leap. Of course, the lightning
 conductor had a hard struggle for
 recognition. It was received churlish-
 ly by George III, who took his revenge
 on Franklin by ordering the substitu-
 tion of blunt ends for pointed ones on
 the Kew palace conductors.

Sir John Pringle, president of the
 Royal society, was invited by the king
 to back him up. Sir John replied that
 the "laws of nature are not change-
 able at royal pleasure." The offend-
 ing suggested resignation, and resign
 Sir John did. But the wits were on
 the side of the president:
 While you, great George, for safety
 hunt
 And sharp conductors change for blunt,
 The nation's out of joint,
 Frank in a wiser course pursues,
 And all your thunder fearless views
 By keeping to the point.

USED AS EXPLOSIVE

Will Blast Away Coal and Rock Almost as Effectively as Dynamite—Soaked in Liquid Oxygen.

We scarcely think of soot as an explosive yet it is now being used as such, and soot cartridges will blast away coal or rock quite as effectively as dynamite.

Of course, the soot has to be prepared for its new purpose, and this is done by soaking it in liquid oxygen. The finely divided carbon of which the soot is made up absorbs large amounts of oxygen, and the cartridge explodes owing to the instantaneous combustion of the carbon in contact with the oxygen.

A cartridge contains two ounces of lampblack, and this absorbs seven ounces of liquid oxygen, which is made quite cheaply from liquid air by allowing the nitrogen, which evaporates at a lower temperature, to boil away, leaving the liquid oxygen behind.

The advantages of the new explosive are many. It can be made at the spot where it is to be used, and is perfectly safe till the liquid oxygen is poured into the hole where the soot cartridge has been placed. No poisonous gases are set free by the explosion, and if the cartridge fails to explode it ceases to be a source of danger in about twenty minutes, when the oxygen has all evaporated and the cartridge is merely soot.

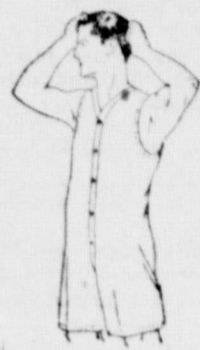

QUEENSLAND A COTTON LAND, PREMIER SAYS

(By Associated Press) MANCHESTER, England, Apr. 24.—Queensland's premier, E. C. Theodore, told a meeting of business men here that Queensland had millions of acres of land suitable for cotton production, and that Australia is free from those terrible pests which have made such vast inroads into the prosperity of cotton growing in other countries.

In 1919 there were 72 acres under cotton cultivation in Queensland which yielded 37,000 pounds of seed cotton. This year the acreage was 180,000 and the yield 50,000,000 pounds. In 1922 there were 1,600 growers and in 1924 there were 9,200. Cotton growing, the premier said, was, and would be become a white man's industry, each man cultivating his 20, 30 or 40 acres.
