SOME SECTIONS GET HEAVY RAIN

Tonight thunder storms—cooler—Saturday unsettled; strong southerly winds and squall becoming northwesterly.

Rain ranging from light showers to four and three-quarter inches fell over Runnels and adjoining counties Thursday night. The heaviest rain was at Bronte, where it is reported four and three-quarter inches fell. On the West the rain was light, a quarter of an inch fall being registered at Miles, half an inch at Rowena, three-quarters at Olfen, and light at Paint Rock. Norton reported two inches, Winters one inch, Ovalo two inches, Bradshaw two inches, Abilene two inches, Brady sprinkle, Wingate 3.75, Brownwood 2.50, Fort Chadbourne 3 inches, Wilmeth 3 inches, Eden, Leaday and Menard, sprinkle, San Angelo, half inch.

Hatchel got three-quarters of an inch, Talpa half an inch, Santa Anna and Coleman big rains. The precipitation at Ballinger was recorded at one-third of an inch.

Where the heavy rain fell and packed the ground, fresh planting will suffer, and some crops may have to be planted over. Where the lighter rains fell great benefit will result, the precipitation being sufficient to speed the sprouting of seed and bringing up of crops. As will be observed from the general reports, the heaviest rain was confined to the smallest area while the country at large received rain sufficient to be of much benefit.

A considerable rise came down the Colorado River early Friday morning, the heavy rains in the Norton and Wingate sections bringing the first high water of the spring season.

FARMER KILLED BY LIGHTNING

2 KILLED IN STORM AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, April 25.—Fritz Henkle age five years, was killed and his ten-year-old sister probably fatally hurt, and parents of the children, Mr. and Mrs. Fritz Henkle, were injured when a wind storm destroyed a farm house near Colton, Travis county, early today.

A negro was reported killed and several Mexican laborers were injured by the storm in the same vicinity of the Henkle home.

BOUNDARY CASE REPORT READY

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 25.—The boundary commission in the Oklahoma-Texas Red River case today presented to the supreme court their report showing the survey and location of the boundary along the Big Bend area, including the Red River oil wells.

The commission also presented reports showing survey and location of the medial line of the river in the vicinity of the oil wells. The court ordered that all exceptions to the report must be filed within four weeks. Chief Justice Taft said that the purpose was to enable the court to close up the matter during the present term as far as possible.

MAN HELD FOR HOUSTON MURDER

HOUSTON, April 25.—Charges of murder and arson have been filed against J. B. Warren, a Houston man, in connection with the death of E. W. Flagler and Mrs. Ethel Raab.

Flagler's body and the body of the young nurse were found in a burned apartment house here Tuesday, and an investigation showed that the rooms in which the fire originated had been saturated with kerosene. Flagler's body was found on a couch in one part of the house, and Mrs. Raab's body was found in a kneeling position near a window in another room.

Jealousy is believed to have been the ruling passion behind the crime.

SPECIAL TRAIN FOR BALLINGER

After one day's work by the three committees appointed at the mass meeting held Tuesday afternoon at the Maeroy Theatre, enough tickets have been subscribed to insure a special train to Brownwood on May 14th. The committees met with success and encouragement on every hand and practically every business house in Ballinger agrees to close for the day and let all employees attend who desired to do so. Some firms even bought tickets for their employees.

The Santa Fe has been notified to have a train here ready to leave at 6:00 a. m., Wednesday, May 14th. This does not mean that the ticket sale is closed, but tickets will be sold until the last minute or as long as passengers can get aboard the train. Five, big high-backed chair coaches and a baggage car will be delivered here by the Santa Fe and the carrying capacity of such a train will be about 500 persons. Many enthusiasts are predicting that the special will be loaded to the guards.

The committees reported the sale of about 125 tickets and with the fifty musicians will make the number of passengers to date about 175. Secretary Motley of the Y. M. B. L., who spent Wednesday in the Norton section reports that many persons are coming from that community to join the special train of Ballinger boosters and will make the trip with the Ballinger delegation. Many people in Ballinger have not been seen and those desiring to go are requested to notify on of the committees or phone the office of the Y. M. B. L. and let them have your name for as many tickets as you will want.

As the committee went the rounds subscriptions for expense money to transport the band were taken, and while a greater part of this money has been raised a small deficit is expected to be found but this will be raised with ease it is said and the band of fifty-odd pieces will accompany the boosters.

Those intending to make the trip are urged to notify some official at once so that in case of an overflow additional equipment can be secured from the Santa Fe to prevent overcrowding of the train. The boosters will be in Brownwood all day Wednesday, and as the second day of the big lay at the convention there will be some kind of entertainment all the time. The train will arrive at the convention city at 8:00 a. m. and will remain until midnight. The big parade of delegations will take place at 9:00 o'clock a. m. just in time for the Ballinger delegation to take part.

DOUBTS REPORT FROM HONDURAS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 25.—Officials were inclined today to accept the lack of any official report on casualties among the naval forces at Tegucigalpa, the capital of Honduras, which was reported yesterday unofficially from San Salvador, as a hopeful sign. The officials pointed out that in view of the disturbed conditions in Honduras it would not be unusual if exaggerated reports of the situation had trickled across the border into Salvador, and caused a report to go out that the casualties were greater than they were and the condition more serious than reported. The department has received no official accounting of the casualties.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The United States government has invited the participation of Costa Rica, Salvador, Nicaragua, and Guatemala in a peace conference at Amapala, Honduras, to settle difficulties over the revolution in Honduras.

CITY LIGHT PLANT IS MONEY MAKING MACHINE

Elsewhere in this issue of The Ledger appears a financial statement of the city's light and water department. While the statement is more of a summary, and does not give in detail the income and outgo of moneys made and spent by the two departments, the report is sufficient to convey to the minds of the tax payers of this city the fact that the light plant and water system are money making machines, self sustaining, and with proper management will pay for themselves and make it possible to reduce the cost of service.

The statement shows that the gross income for the light plant for the year covered by the report amounts to \$30,288.35. The operating expense for the year amounted to \$15,486.53, leaving a cash balance of \$14,801.82 which was appropriated in refunding a \$1,000 loan, making extensions and improvements, creating interest and sinking fund to take care of the bonds, with a cash balance of almost \$3,000.

It will be observed that nearly \$9,000 was spent in permanent

improvements, which add to the value of the plant, and increase its earning capacity. This is an item which will not be necessary this year, unless the city should make an unusually rapid growth which would call for enlarging and plant and extending the service.

The report fails to take into account the item of free lights for the city, which under the old schedule of prices, and with the present white way, would cost upwards of \$2,000. This is a saving to the tax payers, as the cost of street lights would have to come out of the pockets of the tax payers. However, there is a great need for an extension of the street lights. The residence districts are not lighted as they should be, but the city is working on street light extension plans at present.

The water works department shows a gross income of \$14,130.73, with a cash balance of \$1,851.03, the remainder of the money received for the year's business going for various items of maintenance, operating expense, etc. \$3,750.00 is charged to pumping expense, the light department furnishing the power for pumping at much less than was paid out for this item of expense when the water department operated a steam pumping plant.

The financial statement is only a report of the city secretary showing the amount received and the amount paid out by the two departments, and does not show the condition of bonded indebtedness, value of the city's utilities, etc., all of which would be valuable information at this time when there is a disposition on the part of some to discredit the wisdom of municipal ownership of public utilities.

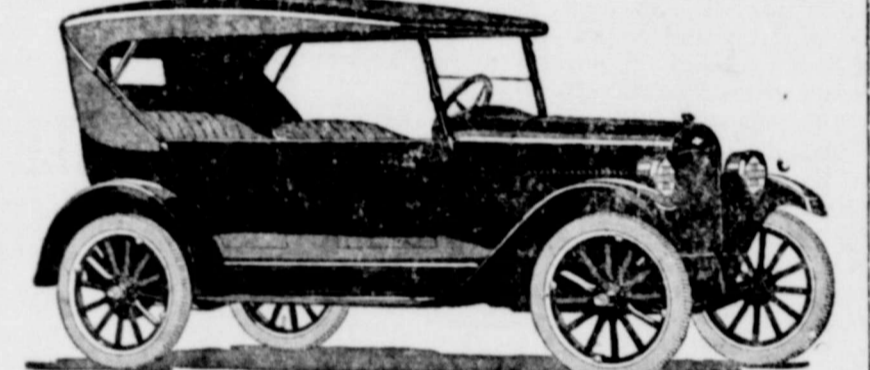

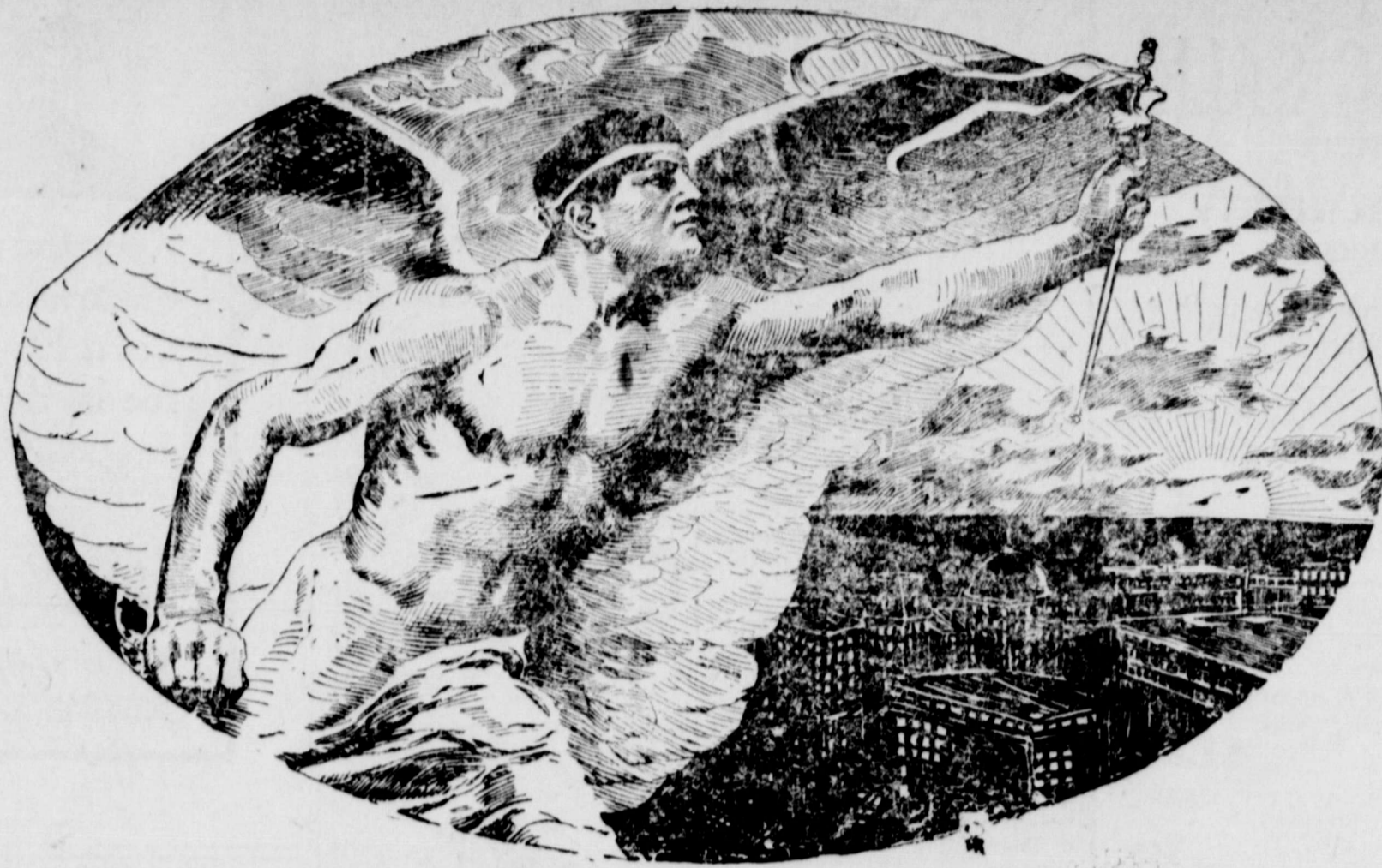

KANSAS CITY, April 25.—A new American distance record for free balloons was established in the face of unofficial estimates. The army balloon S-14 traveled approximately 1200 miles in the race which started from San Antonio Wednesday.

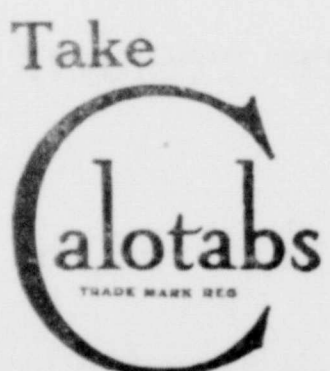

KANSAS CITY, April 24.—Another of the seven balloons which entered the national elimination race from San Antonio Wednesday, was counted out early today when the army entry S-14 was forced down by an electric storm near Saint Ansgar, Iowa, leaving only three participants in the running. The S-14 had traveled 1200 miles.

Major Norman Peck, pilot of the S-14, and his aide, Lieutenant A. Gray, were uninjured.

The balloon, Goodyear No. 3, is reported to have passed over Volga City, Iowa, having covered a distance of about 1150 miles from San Antonio. Others still in the air are the Honeywell, the Kansas City Co-operative Club

entry; and the Detroit, entered by the Detroit Aviation Society; piloted by Capt. S. E. Honeywell and Herbert Von Thaden, respectively.

DUBUQUE, Iowa, April 25.—The balloon piloted by Lieut. Herbert Von Thaden landed in a field five miles southwest of here early today. The balloon was forced to land after being trapped by a severe electrical storm. This entry by the Detroit Aviation Society had traveled about 1,000 miles undamaged.
