## COTTON UP \$17 PER BALE

(By Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Cotton took another jump of one hundred points today, carrying October quotations to 25.45 and December to 24.62.

This represents an advance of practically seventeen dollars a bale since the federal government report was published last Tuesday.

## FIVE CENT CUT IN CITY TAXES

The city commission was in session a short time Friday morning for the purpose of approving the work of the board of equalization and fixing the city tax rate for the present year.

After balancing books, and making up the budget the commission fixed a rate of \$1.20 on the hundred dollar valuation. The rate last year was \$1.25. The five cent cut will come off the interest and sinking fund account which was neglected in years past, and which has been replenished to some extent.

The city set aside about \$2,000 for the old sinking fund and interest debt last year, and this year about \$1,000 will be set aside for that purpose.

Property valuations of the city amount to \$2,840,000 in round numbers, and with a rate of \$1.20 the commission expects to finance all branches of the city government.

## RUSSELL RENEWS HELD FOR AIDING GAS FRANCHISE IN JAIL DELIVERY

(By Associated Press)  
DALLAS, Sept. 26.—Four men and one woman are under detention for questioning today in connection with an attempt last night to smuggle twelve saw blades into the Dallas county jail in a box of fruit.

The fruit was consigned to William Crawford, who is in jail under indictment for slaying Paul O'Day, a young Dallas attorney. Crawford was recently denied bond for killing O'Day.

Crawford tipped off the officers that an attempt might be made in his name to smuggle saws into the jail, because he is well known to the jail officials and the package would be permitted to come in to him without being inspected.

## ROOSEVELT OUT OF NAVY DEPT.

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, September 26.—Theodore Roosevelt, who was nominated as the republican candidate for governor of New York, and who will make the race against former Governor Al E. Smith, called on President Coolidge today to formally present his resignation as assistant secretary of the navy.

Mr. Coolidge accepted the resignation, but Mr. Roosevelt's successor has not been named.

ROCK ISLAND, Ill., Sept. 26.—William Chatterton, age 15, today confessed to wrecking the Golden State Limited fast passenger train on the Rock Island lines, at Fairport, Iowa, last night. The wreck resulted in the derailment of two sleepers and the injuring of a number of passengers.

The boy removed a bolt from a switch which caused the trucks under the sleepers to divide, derailing the Pullmans and tearing up considerable trackage.

The lad said that he did it "just to see the cars pile up."

## BANDITS WRECK TRAIN; MANY DIE AND MANY HURT

(By Associated Press)  
MOSCOW, Russia, Sept. 26.—Fifteen persons were killed and twenty-five mortally injured and forty-three seriously hurt today in a train wreck which was caused by bandits.

A train operating as a passenger and express carrier from Moscow to Odessa was derailed by bandits about 300 miles south of Moscow.

Five women were among those who lost their lives in the wreck. The bandits disconnected the rails, causing the locomotive and ten coaches and baggage cars to jump the track. With the exception of the last three coaches the entire train travelling at a high rate of speed, was completely wrecked. The engineer, fireman, and conductor were instantly killed. The rails were torn up for a distance of nearly one thousand feet.

The bandits made their escape after witnesses the train wreck.

## Once Royal Coach Shelters Homeless Family of Prague

(By Associated Press)  
PRAGUE, Sept. 26.—There is, in the outskirts of Prague, a settlement of poor families living in discarded railway carriages. Among these coaches is what remains of the luxurious private car of the late Empress Elizabeth of Austria, who was murdered at Geneva in 1898.

## RUSSIA READY TO COMPROMISE

(By Associated Press)  
MOSCOW, Russia, Sept. 26.—All facts indicate that a compromise between the interests of the United States and the Russian soviet government is to be desired and that it is quite within reach.

The foreign minister of Russia declared today in a belated reply to the pronouncement of the American policy towards Russia as was made by Secretary of State Charles Evans Hughes, that the soviet government was ready to compromise on all questions with the United States' interests.

## OIL FIELD FIRE LOSS \$125,000

(By Associated Press)  
LITTLE ROCK, Sept. 26.—Fire, said to have started from a gas stove, destroyed nearly two blocks of buildings in the business section of Smackover, in the center of the South Arkansas oil field today, according to reports received by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company here this afternoon.

The loss is estimated at \$125,000.00.

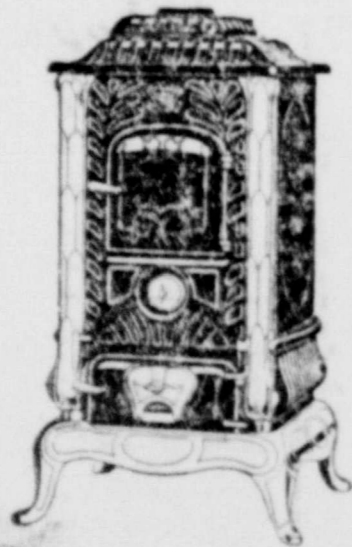

### TO DISTRIBUTE NEW HIGHWAY MAPS

FT. WORTH, Sept. 26.—Preparations to distribute 10,000 large highway maps, 43x60 inches, throughout Texas are being made by the Texas Highway Association, it was announced here today by W. T. Wheeler, Secretary.

The maps show at a glance the progress of highway construction in this state, as well as the huge amount of work yet to be done before Texas can boast of a "connected, comprehensive highway system."

Eighteen thousand miles of designated highways are shown in four colors, each color representing the stage of improvement which has been reached. The designated highways are a part of the 180,000-mile good roads program of the federal government.

The maps are now being printed and distribution will start as soon as deliveries are made. They will be sent to all chambers of commerce, banks, court houses and other places, and to others who desire them.

## \$100,000 GAIN IN CITY VALUES

The property valuation of Ballinger as fixed by the board of equalization and passed up to the city commission, shows an increase of about \$100,000 over that of last year.

The board of equalization was in session this week, completing their duties Wednesday. There were few "kicks," and adjustments were made satisfactorily to most of those who were notified to appear before the board.

The city commission was scheduled to meet Thursday and approve the assessor's report and fix a tax rate. The present tax rate is \$1.25 on the hundred dollars valuation. The commission has the authority to raise the rate to \$1.50, but it was announced that the rate would probably remain at \$1.25, with some possibility of a cut of five cents on the hundred.

The 1924 values in round num-

bers amount to \$2,834,000. At a rate of \$1.25 this will create revenue amounting to \$35,425.00, or \$1250 more than the 1923 tax bill.

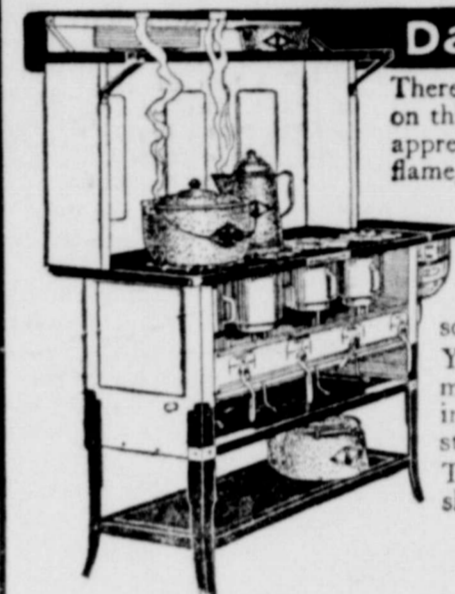

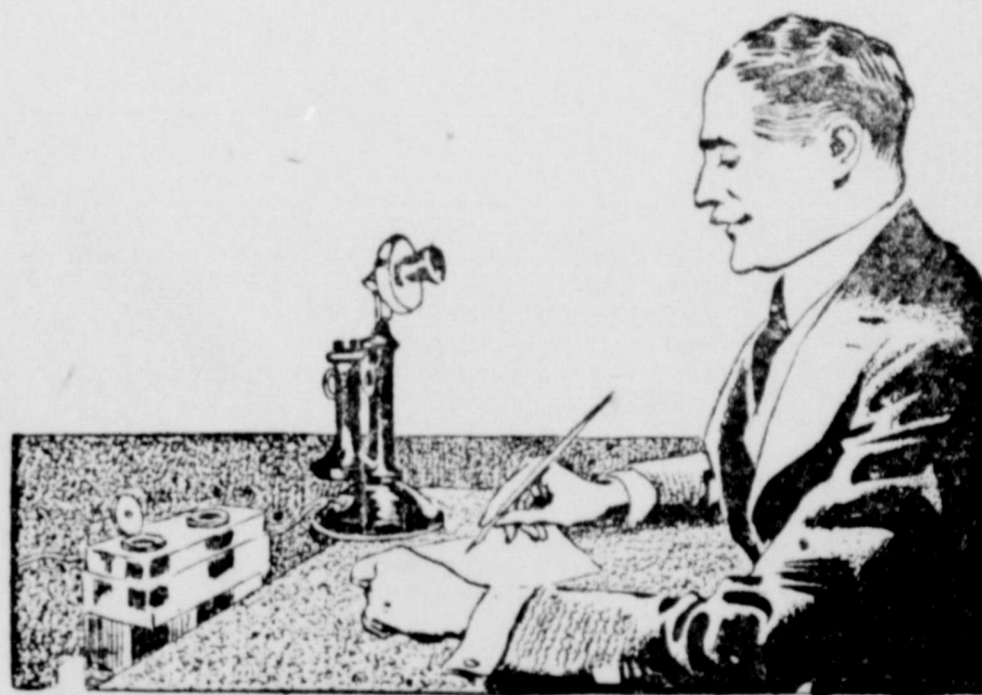

**A LESSON IN THRIFT FROM ANTIQUITY**

Once upon a time there was a king named Croesus who ruled over Lydia, one of the richest provinces in Asia Minor. Croesus was the wealthiest man in the entire world at that time. He possessed countless storerooms filled with gold, rubies, sapphires, and all kinds of precious stones, and he had no congress to annoy him by telling him what he should do with his treasure. But Croesus instead of using his wealth to provide for the moral, social, economic, and military welfare of his state, squandered it in the pursuit of idle pleasures. While most of the states surrounding Lydia were spending what money they had building fortresses for defense, erecting public works and similar structures for the good of their inhabitants, thus insuring progress and safeguarding against attack, Croesus was wasting vast sums drinking, reveling, gambling and carousing.

At the same time that Croesus was extravagantly presiding over Lydia, Cyrus was thrifily ruling Persia, a country at that time unheralded. Years before Cyrus made his first famous military adventure, he had been occupied in placing Persia on a rigid economic basis, in developing an army, and in advancing the city along cultural and political lines. When the time came for Cyrus to spread the glory of Persia, he first attacked the wasteful Croesus, easily subjugated him, and deprived him of his vast fortune.

We tell the above story at this time because there is a lesson involved which every American citizen would do well to learn. No man, no matter how much wealth he possesses, and whether he gained it through inheritance or his own effort, is safe against disaster or likely to retain his money indefinitely unless he applies scientific management to the direction of his affairs. Croesus and Cyrus still battle, but they no longer have armies behind them, and their meeting place now is usually somewhere in the realm of business. And the thrifty and patient Cyrus is apt to gain ascendancy in the end over the spectacular but wasteful Croesus.

Many men who started out as Croesuses through the bestowal on them of money earned by their fathers or through unusual ability on their part are now selling shoe-strings on Broadway, or dependent upon some alms society for their existence. These men had so much money that they did not think it was necessary for them to manage shrewdly their affairs. In most cases they did not invest, but speculated.

Just being thrifty will not take many men as far as Cyrus went. He was a great general. But it will insure any man against financial depression and contribute towards his happiness. In the beginning wastefulness may be popular and fascinating, but the waster usually goes the way of the transgressor to misery. Thrift is seldom spectacular, but in the end it invariably wins.



**Skeleton of Mastodon is Found Under City Street**
