## MONUMENT TO DEAD VETERANS

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, October 4.—In the presence of the veterans of the First Division of the American Expeditionary Forces, President Coolidge dedicated a monument to their dead here today, as a "lesson of supreme blessing and peace with the honor symbol of stern warning" peace is now established and must be nourished the president declared.

In this country international relations and the constitution itself must be defended, Mr. Coolidge said, to preserve individual freedom through non-interference with other courts and fair opportunity by prevention of government monopolies in business.

### STRAW VOTE ON THE PRESIDENTIAL RACE

The Literary Digest, in its straw vote campaign, reports that 33,860 votes have been sent in from Texas, and of this number Coolidge has 11,426; Davis 18,880; and LaFollette, 3,340.

The figures are only interesting to the extent that they show such change when compared with the 1920 poll made by the Digest. On the same date in the 1920 campaign, the straw vote gave the Democrats, 21,137; Republicans, 6,725; and the Socialists only 115.

## NO NEW CASES STOCK DISEASE

(By Associated Press)  
HOUSTON, Oct. 4.—No additional cases of foot and mouth disease have been reported today by Dr. Innes, federal inspector in charge of the eradication campaign.

### REV. YATES ARRIVES IN NOWATA, OKLAHOMA

"I wish to extend my appreciation to you for the courtesy you have shown my office. Yates and deputy arrived O. K. this morning."

The above is the text of a telegram received by Sheriff Flynt from Sheriff Gillespie, of Nowata, Oklahoma, Friday afternoon. The deputy sheriff who came here to get Yates left Ballinger Wednesday morning, going via Abilene, where he expected to catch the Sunshine Special, and he was due to arrive in Nowata Thursday morning. Arriving there twenty-four hours later, it is presumed that he stopped en route. The officer stated on leaving Ballinger that he would not take Yates direct to Nowata.

NOWATA, Okla., Oct. 4.—Declaring his love for the 14-year-old girl with whose abduction he is charged, the Rev. Joseph E. Yates, former minister of Alluwe, Oklahoma, asserted upon his arrival here that he "would fight every attempt of the law and the girl's parents to take her away from me." In the custody of a deputy sheriff Yates arrived here yesterday and was placed in jail and it was announced that a preliminary hearing would be arranged for the minister.

Yates claims that he and the girl, Georgia Fields, were married in Missouri on September 19th by the Rev. E. L. Yates, a brother of the prisoner. He declared that he obtained a license in Carthage, Missouri, on September 18th, stating at the time that he and the girl were of legal age.

## MOSLEM GATHER TO PREVENT WAR

JERUSALEM, Oct. 4.—The Moslem Supreme Council today telegraphed to all the Moslem states and all Moslem representatives and organizations asking them to send deputies to Jeddah to intervene in reverence to the holy Moslem places in an effort to avoid bloodshed.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Prohibition officials claimed to have uncovered a gigantic Anglo-American rum running conspiracy with ten million dollars involved, when they towed into harbor today the British steamer Frederick B. Withits and a crew of twenty-eight men and two women under armed guard.

The vessel is said to have on board \$500,000 worth of liquor. Government agents under William Walker made the capture after they had, according to Walker, dickered for the purchase of 25,000 cases of whisky from the ship's master, agreeing to pay \$100,000 for the contraband liquor.

Walker said that bankers of this country, England and Canada are concerned in the conspiracy.

## FIRST GAME WORLD'S SERIES PICTHERS DUEL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Batting for the world's championship in baseball, the New York Giants and Washington Senators entered the 12th inning of the first game of the series in a deadlock. The score at the beginning of the twelfth was 2 and 2.

George Kelly hit a home-run in the second for the McGrawmen, and Terry circled the diamond with a four-ply swat in the fourth. Washington scored in the 6th, and tied the score in the 9th inning.

Up to the twelfth inning neither team had made an error. Walter Johnson pitching for the Sens, had struck out thirteen men; and Art Nehf for the Nationals had four strike-outs to his credit. It was indicated at the beginning of the 12th inning that the game would be called on account of darkness.

WASHINGTON, October 4.—Love for the grand old game of baseball reached out today and brought together in the nation's capital, the most notable gathering ever assembled for a world baseball series.

The spirit of the old sand-lot apparently had filtered into all walks of life in making up the crowd which was on hand to see Washington's first American League pennant winning team clash with the New York Giants.

President Coolidge and members of the cabinet, and others high in official life, temporarily put aside the nation's business to turn out and join the thousands of just ordinary fans ready to cheer their respective winners.

Diplomats of foreign powers and notables in baseball circles, including Commissioner Landis and President Heydler of the National League, were a part of the colorful assembly that clamored for twice the number of seats Griffith's Stadium could provide. Many were unable to see the game

on account of a lack of standing room.

Just before the game was called a Lincoln limousine, loaded with cut flowers, was driven on the field, and presented to Walter Johnson, pitcher for the Washington Senators.

President Coolidge walked to the pitcher's box and threw out the first ball with Lindstrom for the Giants at bat. The stadium seats 36,000 people, and it was announced that 40,000 tickets had been sold when the game was called.

### LONDON-PARIS HALF HOURLY AIR PLANE SERVICE PLANNED

LONDON, Oct. 4.—An airplane to and from Paris every half-hour, for passengers and freight, is included in the program of development which the British air lines have drawn up for the future. Traffic by air for the past summer was greater by far than ever before, both on the Continent and between the Continent and England. Those who are operating the air service expect continued development. The British lines have several 16-seater planes under construction at present.

**PEOPLE IMMUNE**

Human beings are immune to the foot and mouth disease—that is the foot and mouth disease which has broken out among livestock in East Texas. The disease

is confined to animals and does not affect human beings.

The foot and mouth disease is perhaps the oldest disease known to the livestock industry. Records show that it prevailed in Egypt in ancient times. The disease cannot be cured and is highly contagious and extremely dangerous to livestock.

The disease is accompanied by a breaking out in the mouth of the animal and also a breaking out on the legs of the animal just above the fetlocks. Usually the animal affected dies after so long a time, but in the event the animal does not directly die from the effects of the disease it is left in a helpless condition.

Fortunately for Texas the authorities discovered the disease before it spread, and thus far it has been confined to one herd of cattle, or to stock in a small area. The quarantine is being made as rigid as possible, and the affected stock are being destroyed.

This is going to cost the state thousands of dollars, but it is essential that everything possible be done to prevent the spread of the malady, because the loss to the livestock industry and commerce of the state would be appalling should the disease spread.

The expense of combatting the disease will fall on the tax payers of the state, and it will be another item of expense the next legislature will have to deal with. However, it will be a just taxation, as what affects the livestock industry affects every individual in the state.

Regardless of expense the disease must be stamped out in the quickest possible time.

**Tokio's Modern Strides Eliminate Jinrikishas**

 TOKIO, Sept. 4.—The jinrikisha, inseparably associated with the Japan of song and story, is passing even in the land of its origin. Official figures prove this. Recently officials of the city's statistical bureau counted the traffic passing Owari-cho, Tokio's "Forty-second and Broadway." The average minute saw ten tram cars pass the intersection, eight passenger automobiles, four motor trucks, eight hand carts, 36 bicycles, 122 pedestrians and one lone jinrikisha. The comparatively higher speed at which Tokio now lives, and the high cost of manpower, are causes for the passing of the jinrikisha.

## Big Special "The Fifth Horseman" Coming Here
