AKRON CONSTRUCTORS ARE BUSY ON SEVEN NEW MODERN AIRSHIPS

(By Associated Press)
AKRON, Ohio, Jan. 31.—Work on the seven semi-rigid airships being constructed here by the Goodyear-Zeppelin Corporation for the United States government is being pushed as rapidly as possible. The RS-1, largest ship of its kind ever built, is practically completed and is being shipped to Scott Field, near St. Louis, for assembly and test flight.

All of the ships are to be used by the United States army for training purposes. Each is equipped with the latest improved photographic and radio devices.

Major Norman W. Peek of the United States army is superintending construction for the government, and will fly the RS-1 on its test flight.

Of the six smaller ships being constructed, three are of the 3 TC type, with a gas capacity of 200,000 cubic feet and propelled by two 140-horsepower motors, and three are of the 3 TA type, powered by two OX Curtis motors.

The RS-1 is the first semi-rigid ship to be built here. It is 282 feet long, 70 1-2 feet in diameter and has a helium gas capacity of 719,000 cubic feet. The ordinary cruising speed will be 55 miles an hour, but the vessel will be capable of making 70 miles when the occasion demands.

VIENNA, Jan. 31.—Vienna is about to erect a municipal radio sending station which is to cost 1,000,000 crowns. It is to be used solely for official business. The fire department especially is to use it extensively.

U. S. BUREAU'S TESTS PROVE GERMICIDAL POWER OF THE SUN

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, February 2.—In tracing out the reasons why sunlight has power to destroy germ life, a fact long known and put to use by every housewife who has "aired out" things, the Bureau of Standards and the Public Health Service have produced positive germicidal results.

A public document now in course of publication, by W. W. Coblentz and H. R. Fulton, research men assigned to the work, recounts findings in the field which will be of special value to professional and scientific workers.

It was long ago established that the germicidal power of sunlight came largely from its actinic or invisible rays, and for the sake of the experiment, these were produced in measured quantities and characteristics by heating mercury vapor, and screened through quartz lenses. The Public Health Service furnished large quantities of germs for the testing, one type, bacterium coli communis, being that which is most frequently encountered in sewage tainted water.

CHICAGO—Hair has been dyed as long as woman has existed, according to Neal K. Andrews of New York, in an address here.

"Venus, Goddess of Love, was originally a brunette, according to tradition and bleached her hair to blond," declared Mr. Andrews.

"After an invasion of northern Europe by the Romans Germans prisoners were brought back, and for the first time Rome saw blond women. These women were so much admired that Roman women bleached their hair with quick lime to compete with the fair ones. Thus through all the ages hair has been dyed through one process or another.

"Since there is no chemical charm more attractive than abundant, beautifully colored tresses, thousands of women are dyeing their hair. Fashion recently imported from Paris prescribes hair colored to match the gown and stockings. The style has been taken up by girls as well as older women.

"Until recently the majority of hair dyes contained injurious chemicals, the most poisonous of which was paraphenyline diamine, which damaged the scalp. Discovery by chemists of a preparation, harmless in its action on the hair, and lacking para, has removed all risks in hair dyeing, and the most fastidious women now use it, for it is impervious to water, curling and sunbathing."

MOTOR TRIPS ABROAD
At Banbury Cross
SIXTH OF A SERIES OF TRAVEL TALKS

IN the public mind Banbury, England, is chiefly associated with the famous Banbury cakes and with the Banbury Cross of nursery rhyme—

Although the original Cross has long since disappeared, its site, shown above, is marked by a modern one, following in its main lines the original structure.

The famous Banbury Cakes have been made in unbroken tradition from the early years of the 17th century when this confection was first invented and are still to be seen in the bakers' shops of the old world town of Banbury as American motorists in England so well know.

Banbury is 68 miles from London and the highways are excellent.

The decorative cross which now stands in the Horsefair is no older than the year 1859 when it was erected to commemorate the marriage of the Emperor Frederick III of Germany with the Princess Royal of England. It stands near the original site of the cross erected by Edward I as a memorial to his queen. The original Banbury Cross was demolished by the Puritans in 1602.

At the age of 81 years, 4 months and 26 days, Mrs. J. M. Mackey, one of the pioneer women of the Norton country, passed away at her home near Norton Sunday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. Mrs. Mackey located in the Norton country with her husband when that section was thinly populated, and has been a factor in the development of that part of the county, raising a family of children, who are today numbered among the best citizens of that community. She is survived by her husband and eight children, all of whom were with her at the last. Three children are dead. Parties were here Sunday arranging for the funeral, and it was announced that Mrs. Mackey would be laid to rest at Norton at 2:00 o'clock Monday. The Norton country has lost a good mother, and the aged husband and father and the children have the sympathy of their many friends.

MILLIONS OF U. S. DOLLARS ARE SENT BACK FROM BERLIN

 BERLIN, Feb. 2.—American currency went back to the mother country at a record rate in 1924. During the inflation period American banknotes and silver certificates and all sorts of other American paper money were hoarded. Friends and relatives remitted money to Germany in the form of bills and it was tucked away for a rainy day. While the German paper money was fluctuating so wildly nobody wanted to hold it. Consequently all sorts of foreign stable money was in great demand and American money was the first choice as it fluctuated less even than English pounds. Now that the rentenmark has been fairly firm for nearly a year and Germans have general confidence in it, they are letting go of their foreign money at a rapid rate. Germans who hoarded foreign gold or silver are out of luck, as the exchange rate on it is extremely bad. Nobody wants hard money and the quotations on foreign gold coins in small sums is often 20 per cent below the official rate for paper money.

Foreign silver is an absolute drag on the money market. Small money-changers who will accept it often shave it 40 per cent.

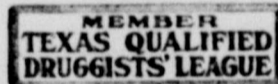

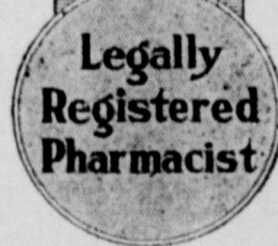
