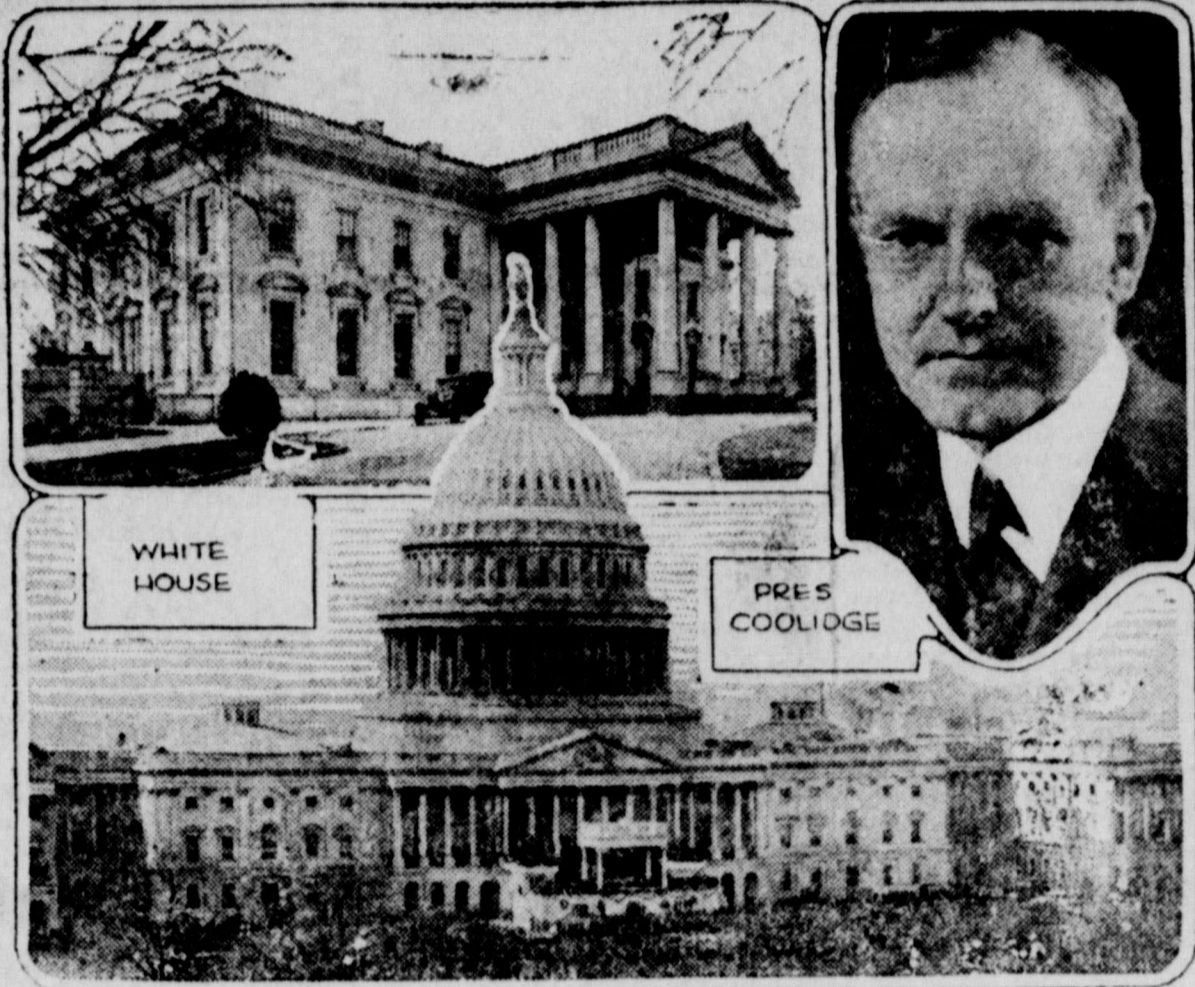

## COOLIDGE SIGNS SALARY INCREASE

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 4.—Several important bills were signed today by President Coolidge after he arrived at the capitol for the inauguration ceremony. Among the bills signed were the naval omnibus bill, the second deficiency bill which passed the Senate this morning, and the legislative appropriation bill with its salary increases for cabinet members and members of congress.

## STONE MOUNTAIN SCULPTOR BILLED

(By Associated Press) ATLANTA, Ga., March 4.—Indictments charging larceny from a malicious and simple larceny and malicious mischief were returned against Gutzon Borglum, the deposed sculptor of Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial, by the DeKalb county grand jury today. Larceny from the house constitutes a felony charge under the laws of Georgia. Two indictments were also returned against J. C. Tucker, Borglum's superintendent of construction.

The warrant on which Borglum was arrested and on which are based the indictments returned today involve the destruction of models of Confederate figures to be used in the memorial and the alleged removal of other models from the studio at Stone Mountain.

## Bogus Check Law and Local Measures Signed

AUSTIN, Feb. 28.—House bill No. 80, known as the bogus check law, was signed by the governor Monday. Under the bill a person who gives a check when he has not sufficient funds in bank to cover would be guilty of a felony if he does not make the check good within thirty days. The fact that the checks is not covered is prima facie evidence of intent to commit fraud, according to the bill.

The passage of this bill was urged by numerous business organizations of the state, the Texas Hotel Keepers' Association taking the lead.

## PRISON PROBER HIT WITH BRICK

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, March 4.—Representative Irwin, chief prosecutor in the legislative prison investigation was struck and knocked unconscious by a brick hurled from an automobile as he was walking to his hotel last night. He was confined to a hospital today, but was reported to be recovering from the blow on the head.

Mr. Irwin was unable to give a description of the occupants of the car, and said that he could assign no reason for the attack made on him. He could not say whether it had any connection with the prison investigation in which he took a leading part or not.

## SIMPLE CEREMONY FOR COOLIDGE INAUGURAL

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 4.—Calvin Coolidge came today to the beginning of a four-year term as president of the United States by direct and overwhelming mandate of the people. With him came Charles Dawes to fill the office of vice-president, which was left vacant nineteen months ago when solemnly and sadly Mr. Coolidge first took the presidential oath in the family homestead in Vermont upon the death of President Warren G. Harding.

The inauguration ceremony, exemplifying tastes of both men and the frugal policy they have pledged themselves to pursue in the conduct of the nation's affairs was arranged at the president's direction on the simplest scale in a century, and began about 11:00 o'clock a. m. with the 68th congress entering its last hour and continuing almost four hours.

The inaugural program excluded all extravagant pomp and costly display, but omitted none of the ideals of this mighty republic and the responsibilities of the world's most powerful office. A few more than 10,000 persons were allotted places in the traditional parade to make the historic pilgrimage along Pennsylvania Avenue. But among the throng were included many ranking officials and many states' high dignitaries in civil and military life.

The oath of office was first administered to Mr. Dawes, who was sworn in as vice-president at 12:14 p. m.

After the inauguration of Vice-President Dawes in the Senate chamber, the crowd moved to the East portico of the capitol where the oath of office was administered to President Coolidge at precisely 1:00 p. m.

Standing at the historic spot where a long line of predecessors had taken the oath as president, Mr. Coolidge bent and kissed the Bible in the hands of Chief Justice Taft and delivered his inaugural address.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—President Coolidge was inaugurated today with one of the simplest ceremonies of a hundred years. Almost at the same time, only a few minutes before, Vice-President Dawes also took the oath of office.

For the first time not only the thousands who gathered in Washington heard a president deliver his inaugural address, but millions throughout the United States and probably many elsewhere, heard the address by radio. President Coolidge spoke to probably the greatest audience, seen and unseen, that ever has been addressed by any man in the history of the world.

With all its studied simplicity and lack of display, which was at the express direction of the president, the ceremony was in marked contrast with the event of 19 months ago, when roused from sleep by news of the sudden death of President Harding, Mr. Coolidge took the oath of office administered by his father in the glow of an oil lamp in a Vermont farm house.

The only vice-president since

Roosevelt to succeed to the office by popular election, President Coolidge renewed his oath before Chief Justice Taft, the only president to take it before a former president. The ceremony was the traditional one, and was carried out on a platform, built at the East front of the capitol, before the great steps leading to the entrance at the middle of the building, a spot selected in the historic compromise of generations ago when the House and Senate each contended that the inauguration should take place within its own precincts.

The prelude to the inaugural procession, for the president's journey to the capitol is always the first part of the actual ceremony, was quite different from that of four years ago, for President Coolidge had no outgoing president to accompany him. Four years ago, Warren Gamaliel Harding, a picture of robust health so soon to pass away, rode with the pathetic figure of Woodrow Wilson and with deprecatory gestures to the crowd stilled cheers intended for him, out of consideration for the already dying man who rode in the carriage beside him. Little did anyone dream that before another inauguration had rolled around, Harding would have preceded Wilson to the great beyond.

While President Coolidge was at work in the president's room at the capitol Vice-President Elect Dawes and his party arrived and took their places in the vice-president's room, where they were greeted by Senator Cummins of Iowa, who since Mr. Coolidge became president has presided over the Senate. There Mr. Dawes and his party awaited the beginning of the vice-presidential inaugural ceremonies in the Senate chamber, which preceded by a few minutes the inauguration of President Coolidge in the open air outside.

The Senate galleries early had been filled by those fortunate enough to get cards of admission. Many women scarcely less well known than their husbands in national affairs shared places with members and families of the diplomatic corps and the official set.

Just as the 68th congress died by constitutional limitation at noon, the Senate of the 69th congress came into being, called in special session to consider executive appointments, and incident—

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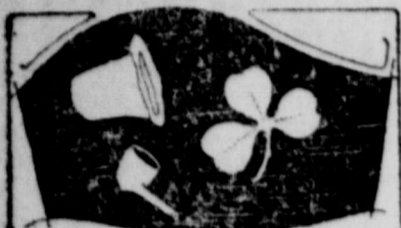

**CITY MAY CALL MASS MEETING**

Following further conferences between representatives of the West Texas Utilities Company and city officials here Wednesday, it was stated that the mayor would issue an order calling a mass meeting to be held Friday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock for the purpose of presenting to the citizens the proposition to sell the city light plant.

Grady Kinsolving, traffic manager of the utilities company, returned to his home at Abilene Wednesday afternoon, and stated that he would return here Friday to attend the mass meeting, and would have drafted the definite proposal as a basis upon which his company proposes to negotiate with the city for the purchase of the city's electric properties.

The final proposition as made to the city will amount to about \$85,000 cash net to the city. The original offer was for \$81,000, but this did not include the street lighting system. The utilities company proposes to take this over also and pay the city a total of \$85,000.

Plans were being made Wednesday to circulate a petition asking the city commission to order an election and submit the question to the voters, when it was suggested that a mass meeting be held, the proposition presented to the citizens at that time in a definite form, and if the city commission desired it, a petition for the election be circulated.

It was at first suggested that the election be called for the same date of the election of city officers—mayor and two commissioners, but as all those who are qualified to vote in the regular city election are not qualified to vote on the question of selling the light plant, it was deemed wise not to ask for the light plant sale election on that date, but the city commission will be asked to call the election on a date soon after the city election.

It is necessary to give a thirty days notice of the election, and if the city commission acts upon the proposition within a few days, the election can be held and the question put up to the people within a few days after the regular city election.

The sale of the light plant is a question which should not enter into politics, or be injected into the campaign which is now on for the election of a mayor and two commissioners. One of the arguments now being made in favor of the sale of the plant is that it can not be kept out of politics.

Every tax paying citizen interested in the welfare of Ballinger should attend the mass meeting, learn in detail what the proposition is and then be in a position to cast an intelligent vote on the question.

Before leaving for Abilene Wednesday afternoon Mr. Kinsolving stated that the above consideration (\$85,000) was their final offer for the city's electric properties, and that this included the street lights which were not figured in the original offer of \$81,000. He stated that his company would either pay this amount in cash, or pay cash and the assumption of the bonds which remain to be paid by the city.

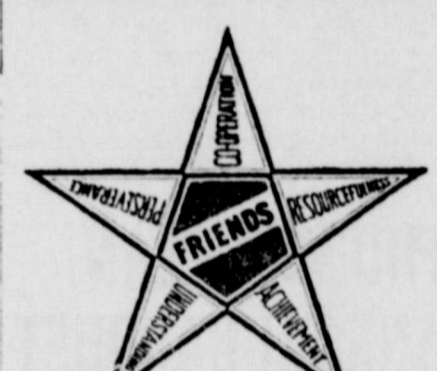

ally, to inaugurate the vice-president. A special session of the Senate is really not necessary to inaugurate the vice-president; he could take the oath of office before a justice of the peace if he chose, and then meet with the Senate when it assembles in regular session next winter, but it is the custom.

The diplomatic corps, all invited to the ceremonies, assembled in the marble room which adjoins the chamber.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Reform in the rules of the Senate is demanded by American public opinion and by the conscience of the individual senators, Vice-President Dawes declared today in his inaugural address.

Under the present rules, Mr. Dawes said that the rights of the American people are overlooked. He referred especially to present rules which permit senators to delay proceedings indefinitely by holding the floor.

Under this rule Dawes said, a minority of even one senator can prevent a vote on a measure which two-thirds of the Senate had agreed to bring to a vote.
