INQUIRY INTO TAX QUESTION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 10.—A resumption next Monday of its inquiry into tax settlements was determined upon today by the Senate special investigating committee.

Chairman Couzens said the committee's decision was made without any reference to his charge yesterday in the Senate in which he alleged that the treasury department was seeking to discipline him by re-opening his 1919 return.

Since the Senate will not be in session during the remainder of the hearings, the testimony will be given in secret and will not be available to the public until the new congress assembles.

FERGUSON WINS AMNESTY MOVE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, March 10.—The opponents of the amnesty law proposed for the purpose of giving James E. Ferguson his political freedom, and removing the impeachment stain from his name, lost in the preliminary skirmish in the House today when a motion by Representative McFarland to suspend the rules and call up the Veatch joint resolution, proposing a constitutional amendment, was defeated. The vote was 54 to 64, while it requires a two-thirds majority to submit an amendment.

This is considered to be a test vote on the question, and it is believed that Ferguson will be given his amnesty and the question will not be submitted to a vote of the people.

Cecil Hodges, age 28, a farmer of the Wingate community, was brought to Ballinger in custody of Deputy Sheriff C. L. Harter, of Wingate shortly after noon Tuesday, and Vem Jones, age 38, also of the Wingate country, was carried to a local hospital suffering with a gun-shot wound in the shoulder, alleged to have been inflicted by a shot fired from an automatic 25 calibre pistol in the hands of Hodges.

KLAN ENEMIES BLOW UP HOUSE

HERRIN, Ill., March 10.—In what is apparently a renewal of the Klan and anti-Klan warfare in this county, Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Fowler were seriously injured and fifteen other occupants of the Fowler apartment were badly shaken up early today by a dynamite explosion which wrecked the front portion of the building.

Officers express the opinion that the explosion was set by enemies of Glenn Fowler, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Fowler and a strong supporter of the late S. Glenn Young, Ku Klux Klan liquor raider. Glenn Fowler, however, was not in the building at the time of the blast.

It will be recalled that S. Glenn Young was killed a short time ago in a street fight between Klan and anti-Klan factions.

The shooting took place at the farm of Stanley Harter near Wingate, where a number of men were at work threshing maize, and while details of the trouble were not available Tuesday afternoon, it was reported to have resulted from family trouble. The two men involved in the difficulty are brothers-in-law, Jones having married Hodges' sister. Hodges is also married.

According to parties who came here shortly after Hodges was brought to Ballinger, and who were at the scene of the shooting, it was ascertained that the shooting took place after Hodges and Jones had quarreled at the maize thresher about 10:00 o'clock Tuesday morning. Jones was shot in the shoulder, one bullet from the 25 automatic pistol taking effect.

County Attorney C. P. Shepherd began an investigation shortly after Hodges was brought here, taking the statements of a number of witnesses, preparatory to filing charges of assault and attempt to murder against Hodges, if the facts justified such charges. At 4:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon Hodges was still in the custody of the sheriff.

JEWISH RABBI IS ARRESTED

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, March 10.—Rabbi E. B. Browne, head of the American Jewish Seventy Elders, and pastor of the Temple of Zion in the Bronx, New York, was arrested today on a warrant in which the complainants are President Calvin Coolidge, Mrs. Coolidge and Frank Stearns.

Rabbi Browne is 72 years of age. It is charged that the rabbi inflicted upon the president an avalanche of letters demanding that he be reimbursed for one-half of \$25,000 he asserts the American Jewish Seventy Elders spent in the campaign for the election of Coolidge last fall.

SELL 250 ACRES AT \$50.00 PER

C. C. Carter was in the city from the Norton country Monday, and while here he entered into a deal for the purchase of the J. Sam Hall land two miles from Norton and adjoining Mr. Carter's 350-acre farm. The land was purchased through E. D. Walker, who is in charge of closing up the Hall estate. The consideration was \$50 per acre, which is not bad for land almost twenty miles from Ballinger, and about that distance from a railroad.

About 235 acres of the Hall place is in cultivation, and is all good land. The land is rented for this year, but Mr. Carter will receive the rent from the place. This gives Mr. Carter more than 600 acres of land near Norton.

PLEADS GUILTY ROBBING BANK

WICHITA FALLS, March 10.—Lewis Tilghman, of Wichita Falls, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of robbery with firearms at Jacksboro yesterday and was given a term of seven years in the penitentiary. The case grows out of the robbery of the Loving State Bank on November 24th.

PREMIER MARX IS RE-ELECTED

(By Associated Press)

BERLIN, March 10.—Docteur Marx, former German chancellor, and who was last month chosen premier of Prussia, was re-elected to the premiership today, receiving 232 out of the 443 votes cast in the Prussian diet.

Herr Marx resigned last month after failing to obtain a vote of confidence.

PURE SEED

Efforts to produce more cotton, or more of any other crop, on fewer acres, must begin with the selection of pure seed. Pure seed as a basis for better crops is just as important as pure bred stock in breeding purposes. It requires just as much work to cultivate a crop germinated from inferior seed as it does to cultivate a crop planted from better seed.

Farmers throughout the country are realizing this more and more each year, and it is the wisest farmer who selects his seed at harvest time, and stores them away for planting. The farmer who plants seed taken from the feed bin without testing them, and without culling, not only gets a poor stand, but will harvest a short yield.

Seed growers' organizations are being formed in many counties. The purpose of the organizations is to secure better seed for individual use, and through a method of co-operation they can dispose of their surplus selected seed at a much higher price than the common varieties of seed will bring.

Runnels county is in the heart of the cotton region of West Texas. Cotton produced in dry land here is equal to the best dry land cotton to be found anywhere. This being true the farmers of this county should breed out seed which will be in demand and which will bring a high price in other West Texas counties.

The steady stream of applications from Texas state banks seeking national bank charters continued Saturday. Comptroller of Currency McIntosh granted a charter to the First National Bank of Rowlett with a capital of \$25,000. It succeeds the Guaranty State Bank of Rowlett. The Security State Bank of Alvord asked for permission to convert itself into the First National Bank of Alvord with a capital of \$25,000. The First State Bank of Hamlin applied for permission to

convert itself into the Farmers & Merchants National Bank of Hamlin, with a capital of \$40,000. The First State Bank of Sylvester sought permission to convert itself into the First National Bank of Sylvester with a capital of \$35,000.

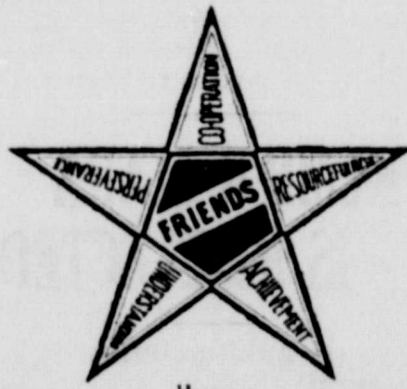

Copy for the new directory is ready to be turned over to the printers and a contract with the Ballinger Printing Company to print the new directory has been closed. The book will be issued

early in April.

The directory will be the largest ever issued by the local exchange, having 102 more names than the largest one ever issued, and shows a gain of thirty new phones within the last two months. A gain of fourteen stations was made in January and a gain of sixteen was made in February, bringing the total number of stations on the local exchange up to 1029.

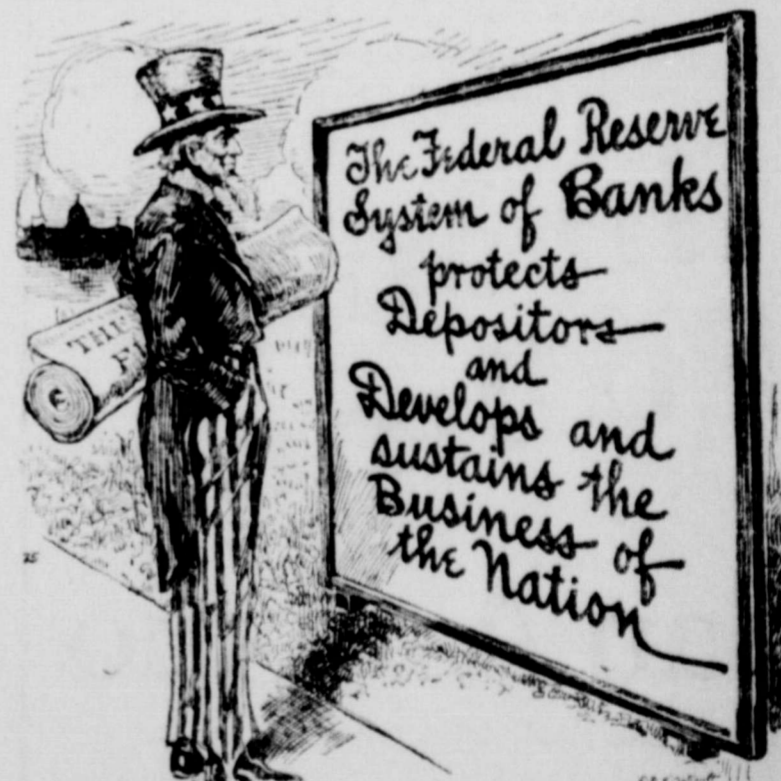

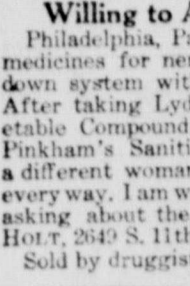
