## DODGE BROS. SELL OUT FOR HUNDRED MILLION

(By Associated Press)  
 NEW YORK, April 1.—News that Dodge Brothers Automobile Company, of Detroit, had been acquired by a syndicate headed by the banking firm of Dillon, Read & Co., of New York, was prominently published here today and referred to as one of the most important financial transactions in the history of the automobile industry.

The sale, it is said, involved more than \$100,000,000, practically in cash.

Representatives of the banking firm named in the deal declined to either affirm or deny the report of the sale. Clarence Dillon declared that while final negotiations had not been completed, some announcement relative to the deal would be made within a day or two.

DETROIT, April 1.—Officials of the Dodge Bros. Automobile Company today refused to confirm or deny the reports sent out from New York to the effect that the Dodge company had been sold to a syndicate of that city.

### Trick Voting Checkmated in Uruguay, is Believed

 MONTEVIDEO, March 27.—Uruguay believes it has put an end to fraudulent voting for public officers, a practice that flourished exceedingly, and with many ingenious evasions, in previous elections.

## FRANCE FLOATS MORE MONEY

 PARIS, April 1.—An increase in circulation from forty-one billion to forty-six billion francs is one of the several measures being considered by the French government to relieve the embarrassment of the treasury and to furnish an increased amount of ready money for commercial needs. This was announced by the ministry of finance today.

## RAIN PUTS LOCAL RISE IN STREAMS

Rain amounting to from light showers to two inches covered a strip across the county North of Ballinger Tuesday afternoon. The heaviest precipitation centered South and East of Winters, where it was said a regular downpour occurred. The rainfall at Winters was given in as 1.17 inches. Half an inch fell at Wingate and half an inch was reported from Crews. No rain was reported at Norton, and other points North and Northwest in Rannels county. Abilene, Coleman, Brownwood, nor any other neighboring towns received rain.

While Ballinger only received a light shower, the city secured a fresh water supply. Elm Creek came down with a six foot freshet, and the water poured over both dams. A rise of about one foot was reported in the Colorado River, coming down Valley Creek from rain which fell in the Wingate country.

The rain was light North of Winters and that city, which is experiencing a water shortage, received no water. The Winters municipal water supply is located Northwest of that town and it was said that the rain was not heavy enough in the vicinity of the lake, and along the watersheds which supply the lake, to stop farm work.

The partial rains were sufficient to give good planting season over a pretty good scope of country South and Southeast of Winters, and extending towards Crews. It was the first rain of any consequence to fall in this county since last December.

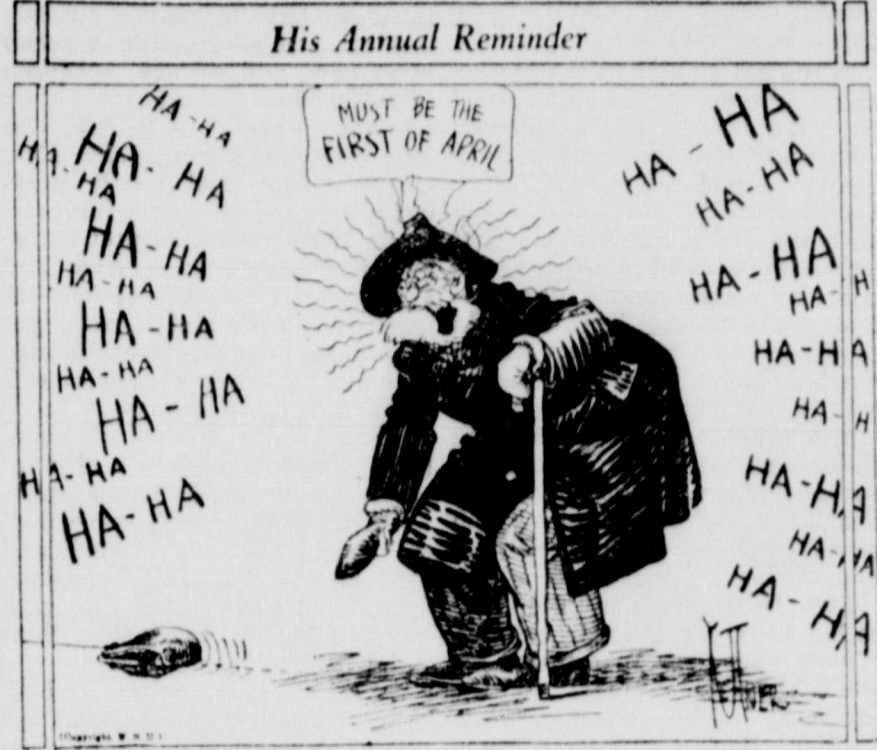

## OWNER OF WORLD'S LARGEST RANCH DIES

(By Associated Press)  
 KINGSVILLE, Texas, April 1.—Mrs. Henrietta King, age 93, owner of the world's largest ranch, died last night. Mrs. King was rated as one of the nation's wealthiest women. She was owner of a ranch bordering on the Gulf of Mexico for one hundred miles and comprising 1,280,000 acres of land which came to her at the death of her husband, Captain Richard King, a pioneer Texas

Mrs. King's fortune rose to an enormous figure through the advance in land values of from a few cents an acre to many dollars an acre. Her herds of cattle virtually were countless, more than 100,000 calves being branded each season. Her home was described as the finest farm house in America.

Almost unknown to the outside world, Mrs. Henrietta M. King, lived out her life upon a vast estate in Southern Texas, the town of Kingsville, population 2,250, being the center of and largely supported by the industries of her ranch. She was born near Corpus Christi in 1841. As a bride, she went to live in a blockhouse, the ranch then being in constant danger of Indians and bandits.

Following the death of her husband, many years ago, Mrs. King undertook the management of the ranch.

Adopting modern methods, the great estate was fenced, a portion of it placed under cultivation and the breeds of livestock improved. For many years, Mrs. King employed from 600 to 1,000 Mexican workmen throughout all seasons, they living on the ranch in comfortable houses provided by the owner. In addition to maintaining a large tract of valuable land for the founding and support of an industrial school for Mexican boys and girls, that being but one of her many benefactions.

In 1911, the residence, which had many of the features of a castle, built by Captain King, as a substitute for the early blockhouse, was destroyed by fire. Mrs. King thereupon, constructed, of concrete and marble, what has been termed the finest farm house in America. The rugs and tapes

tries provided for this mansion, woven from designs furnished by Mrs. King by the most skillful rugmakers of Austria, recount allegorically the romantic history of Texas and the cattle ranges. Aside from occasional visits to the large cities, Mrs. King spent her entire time at the ranch, her constant companion in later years being her daughter and only child, Mrs. R. J. Kleberg. She went much among the families of her employes and the people of Kingsville, administering to those in distress and studying to improve conditions in general. She was an ardent prohibitionist, stipulating that no liquors should ever be sold upon her property or in the town of Kingsville.

Many noted guests were entertained by Mrs. King, both before and after the death of her husband. The original residence of the couple contained twenty guest rooms, and they were nearly always filled. The new mansion has every facility of a modern hotel for guest comfort, the care of it employing the time of scores of servants.

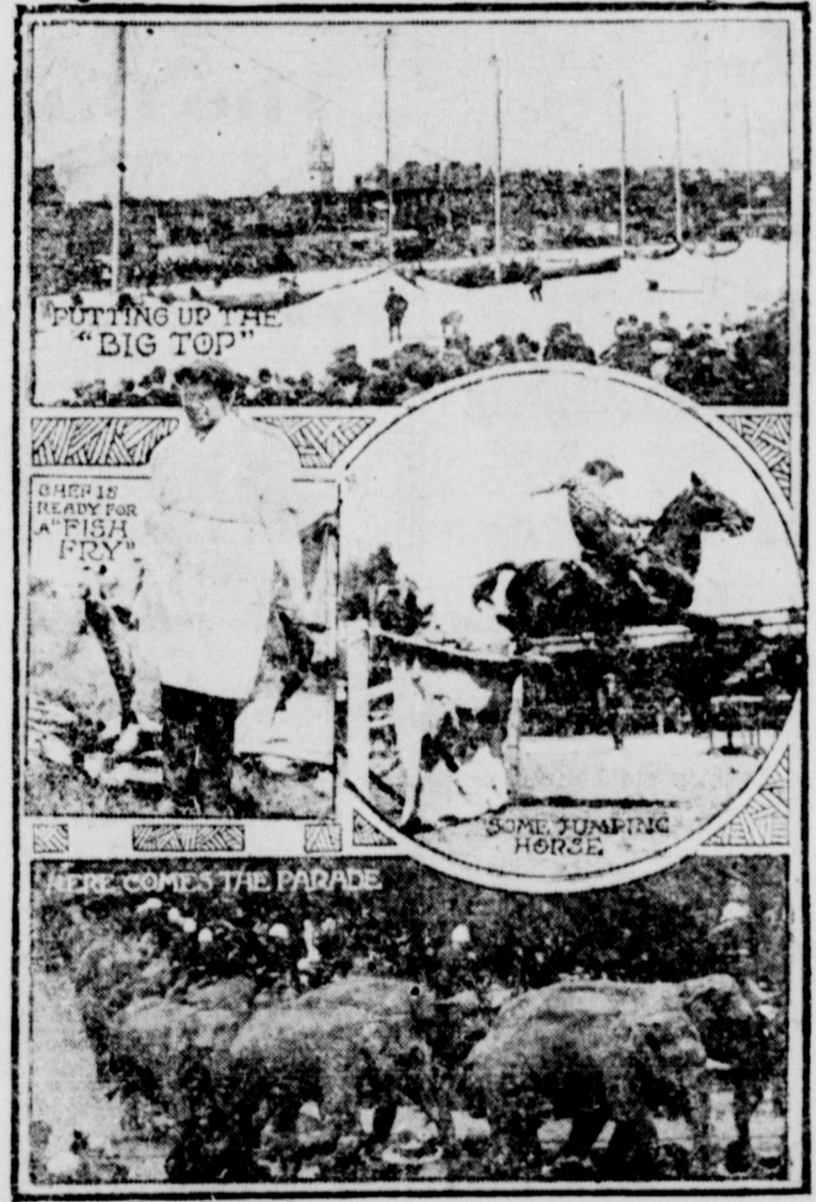

TEXAS CATTLE AT CRITICAL STAGE AT THE PRESENT

HOUSTON, April 1.—Cattle are holding their own better in 'Presidio' county than most any other county in the state, a department of agriculture and livestock reporter at Marfa informs H. H. Schultz, government statistician here.

'What they are holding up on, I don't know,' he adds. 'The grass is about gone, the winter had been devoid of moisture, no weeds up, no snow and no rain but still cattle look fairly well. Ranchmen, however, are beginning to stock up on cotton seed cake to be ready for the worst if it comes. Quite a sprinkling of baby calves are on the ground and are looking well considering range conditions.'

Another West Texas reporter at Toyah, in Reeves county, asserts 'there is very little life left in the cattle industry in this section. The calf crop will depend largely upon the spring rains but the outlook is that it will be short. There has been no moisture all winter but cattle are holding up remarkably well. If it does not rain soon, some feeding must be done. There is no talk of restocking and there are no cattle left for the spring movement as only young breeding cows have been left in this section. When it rains there will be a surplus of range.'

Two reports from the central portion of the state regarded as outstanding say:

Bryan, Brazos county—Continued drouth last summer has been a great detriment to the cattle industry in this locality. As a result, many good stocker cows had to go to market and sell in the canner class. The calf crop will be short, as cows have been very thin since fall. There will be very little restocking through this section. If the market picks up many stocker cows will move. Steers are scarce because so many calves have been shipped to slaughter.

Valley Mills, Bosque county—The range is very dry; cattle are very scarce. Should the season continue dry there will be plenty of cattle. If it rains everybody will want to buy and there will be none for sale except at high prices.

From Central West Texas comes these reports:

Stamford, Jones county—Grass shorter than usual but cattle doing fairly well. Only small loss so far but rain is needed to start grass and weeds. The prospect is for about 90 per cent of the usual calf crop. No restocking will be attempted until grass comes.

Brownwood—The calf crop is much larger than last spring at this time. Very few stocker cows are wanted or being sought. Steer shipments to Oklahoma and Kansas will likely be about 75 per cent of the number shipped last spring.

Mason, Mason county—Cattle in this vicinity have wintered exceptionally well in view of the fact that the last rain fell in September and that was the only rain since June. Cattle are getting very thin and a number of stockmen are beginning to feed cake. The calf crop is earlier and the percentage is higher than in several years due to the splendid condition of cattle in the spring of 1924. This section is well stocked. There is a tendency on the part of cowmen to dispose of cows and buy sheep and goats.

it will be almost impossible to clean cattle of ticks for movement North on account of the condition of the range, the cattle and the shortage of water.

Brackettville, Kinney county—Calf crop will be normal if the cows can be saved. All cattle are being fed on cake. Spring movement all depends upon the time the range gets rain.

Nixon, Gonzales county—A general rain would improve the cattle industry immediately. All classes of cattle are very short in this part of the state. The calf crop will be about normal. Very little restocking is in prospect because of dry weather. There is no spring movement to speak of unless it is to grass somewhere, as no cattle will be fat before summer.

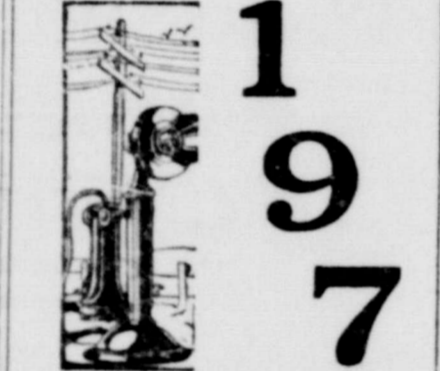
