BALLINGER GOES "OVER TOP" IN LEGION DRIVE

Teams started the ball to rolling in the American Legion's \$5,000,000 Endowment Fund Wednesday morning at 9:30 a. m., and after a check up at noon it was found the Ballinger quota was already over the top. The amount assessed against Ballinger was \$540.00 and three teams turned in \$615.00 at noon with two teams still out and none of the teams completing the work allotted.

The State Department of the American Legion was notified that the Pat Williams Post was over the top with the Ballinger quota and the department extended their congratulations on the splendid effort. The residence section of the town is being canvassed this afternoon and two teams working out of town had not reported at this time. Leaders in the drive expressed their belief that the amount raised would double the quota before the work was completed.

The Legion post here will assist other towns in the county in raising their part of the money at a later date this month and it is expected that the county will be over the top within the month.

One Legionnaire remarked after the first check-up, "The job has been done in the real Ballinger way. We have received wonderful co-operation from everybody in Ballinger and especially the business men who we asked to go with us and raise the money. It is the first time the local post has asked for money and we feel good over the way our friends have helped with their time and with their pledges. They shouldered the burden with us and we are thankful to them."

EFFICIENT LIGHT AIRPLANE CAN BE SOLD FOR \$2,000

(By Associated Press) CROYDON, England, June 3.—A light airplane built by a young Dutchman has been here for a week at the disposal of any pilot who wants to fly it. Several have taken advantage of the offer and have performed stunts of rolling, spiral diving and upside down flying, proving that it can be handled very easily and is suitable for flying clubs.

The machine costs \$2,000. It weighs 420 pounds, uses 1 1/2 gallons of gasoline and 2 1/2 pints of oil an hour, and has a maximum speed of 75 miles an hour.

HOT WEATHER KILLS MANY

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, June 3.—The death list from weather disturbances which have been sweeping a large section of the country for the past few days was further increased yesterday and last night. Three persons were reported killed at Adair, Iowa last night when that place was struck by a tornado.

Buildings were demolished and trees uprooted between Adair and Casey, and three more persons were killed at North Bend, Nebraska as the result of a tornado in that section. A man was killed at Orchard, Nebraska, when struck by lightning. At Carver, Minnesota, a pavilion was demolished by a strong wind, killing two women, a man and injuring several others.

A number of deaths from prostrations resulting from the intense heat of the past few days was reported over a large area.

SHANGHAI IS ARMED CAMP

(By Associated Press) SHANGHAI, June 3.—Shanghai was an armed camp today. Two outbreaks this morning caused the police to open fire resulting in the deaths of two persons and the injury of many others.

All banks were closed and store fronts guarded. Food was being rationed out by shopkeepers and all hotels and stores were searched for arms while the troops of several nations attempted the task of restoring order after a series of uprisings started Saturday by Chinese students who were protesting against the prosecution of strikers in the Japanese owned spinning mills here.

Chinese students withdrew momentarily from their crusade against the foreign rule this afternoon and retired to their area of the city to bury several of their confederate dead who fell in riots. After the funeral service the student speakers in the Chinese section sounded a changed note and urged the throngs to avoid clashes with foreign defenders, pointing out the folly of inviting certain death by attacking empty handed the armed foreigners.

99 COUNTIES FIGHTING TICK

(By Associated Press) FT. WORTH, June 3.—Counties in the Texas tick eradication area are coming in rapidly in the fifty-fifty plan of co-operation to destroy the pests it was announced today at the offices of the State Livestock Sanitary Commission. There are 99 counties in the compulsory area and virtually all of them have agreed to pay half of the expense of fighting the ticks, the state to pay the other half.

CELEBRATION HERE JULY 4

The local American Legion post will celebrate July Fourth in Ballinger with an afternoon and night filled with good amusements. At a meeting of the post Tuesday afternoon plans were worked out and committees appointed to carry on the work.

The program will start at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon with a parade through the streets and to Fair Park. Immediately following the parade a speaker of national reputation will be presented for an address on some subject of interest to West Texas. The committee is trying to secure Hon. Tom Connelly, and has hope that he will be able to be here on the date. A county championship baseball game will be called at 3:30 p. m. and followed by a famous rabbit chase. These rabbit chases are new to the people of Ballinger, but are proving to be great drawing cards at other places. The arrangements call for about 30 dogs to be in the races, and the rabbits will be shipped here from Wisconsin. These races will be run from 5:00 to 8:00 p. m. Immediately following the races all midway attractions will be open and the celebration will close with free fireworks at 9:30. There will be plenty of band music all day and all the drinks, doll racks, hot dogs, cream cones and other concessions that go to make up a good picnic will be provided.

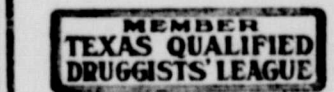

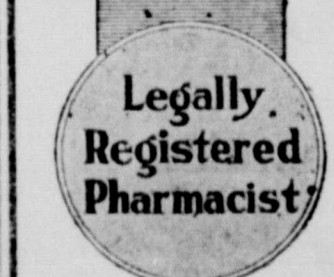

South America Starts To Build Skyscrapers
(By Associated Press)
BUENOS AIRES, May 30.—The cities of the River Plate, Buenos Aires and Montevideo, are entering into an area of skyscraper competition in office building.

The edifices are not comparable in height with those of some American cities, but a building in Buenos Aires of 22 stories, including its tower, finished during the past year, and then the highest in South America, has been surpassed by a 28-story structure just completed in Montevideo. The Uruguayan building rises 338 feet, and in addition to establishing a new South American skyscraper record, is claimed to be the tallest in the world ever built of reinforced concrete. It is a combined office building and hotel, with 250 rooms and baths. It is owned by an Italian immigrant who accumulated a fortune which had its beginning in a small hand-knitting mill.

RED CROSS NURSE MAKES HEROIC RECORD IN NORTH

(By Associated Press)

UNALASKA, Alaska, June 3.—News dispatches referring to Miss Emily Morgan, the Red Cross nurse, as the heroine of the Nome diphtheria epidemic, have reached remote Unalaska. But the people of this community are not surprised, for they recall her work here, where, as in Nome, she was the lone nurse working with the only doctor within hundreds of miles.

For 18 months Miss Morgan braved the blizzards of these Aleutian Islands to bring gladness into the dingy homes of the natives. Her skill and her smile always were at the command of the people, who found her unflinching in times of illness and distress.

One of her added duties here was that of matron in the Jesse Lee Home, maintained by the Methodist Women's Missionary Society for destitute waifs. Alice Devlin, one Aleutian tot brought

here, had an almost incredible history. While living in a hole in the ground with a sod roof, she saw her mother devoured by starving husky dogs. She was brought to the home with a scar on her sunken cheeks made by the dogs. Miss Morgan nursed her back to health.

Before she came to Alaska Miss Morgan had a heroic record as a

Red Cross nurse with the American army in France.

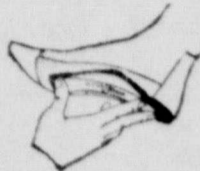

NEW LINE UP AT OIL MILL

Reports circulated some time ago that changes in the management of the Ballinger cotton oil mill would take place on June 1st were confirmed at a meeting of the stockholders of the local mill held here Monday. It was the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Ballinger Oil Mill.

E. A. Giesecke was elected as manager and succeeds Oscar Pearson, who resignation some time ago was responsible for the reports circulated, but which could not be confirmed until the stockholders came together.

Retiring from the mill with Mr. Pearson are also W. H. Schleyer, who has had charge of the bookkeeping, and Mrs. Schleyer, who has been assisting Mr. Schleyer in the office work; and also O. G. Schmickle, superintendent of the mill. Oscar Douglass, who has been with the Winters mill, succeeds Mr. Schmickle. Roy Mack, who has also been with the Winters mill as bookkeeper, succeeds Mr. Schleyer as bookkeeper, and he will be assisted by Herbert Sledge, who is at present with the Ballinger Printing Company. Young Sledge does not go on the job until July 1st, while the other changes have all been made.

The parties retiring from the mill have been associated with the institution almost since the Year One. Mr. Pearson has been manager of the mill for twenty-two years, and Mr. Schmickle had a hand in installing the machinery in the mill when it was constructed. Mr. Schleyer has been in charge of the bookkeeping for seventeen years. When quizzed as to their purposes for the future both Mr. Pearson and Mr. Schleyer stated that they were unsettled. Both have propositions under consideration, and it is expected that they will remain in Ballinger. At least their friends trust that new business relations may be formed which will keep them here.

In organizing the new crew, Mr. Giesecke stated that the entire organization would be put to hard work during the summer months in overhauling the mill plant, and getting it in shape for the next season's run. The mill will be motorized throughout, electric power being substituted for steam. This move has been planned for some time and will be pushed to completion as rapidly as the electricians can do the work and the mechanics can place the machinery necessary in making the change.

The seed house which was destroyed by fire last winter will be rebuilt during the summer. The new house will be twenty feet wider than the one destroyed and the same length, and will occupy practically the same location as the old building. With an optimistic outlook for a bumper crop the mill will prepare to make a successful run.

REVIVAL GROWS IN INTEREST

The revival now in progress at the Eighth Street Presbyterian Church is rapidly reaching a very exalted plane of spiritual power. The crowds are growing larger at each service. Extra chairs have been placed to care for the large crowds. All who attend leave with a feeling that the services are helpful because genuinely religious. One man was heard to remark as he was leaving the church "I tell you folks had better not come up here if they do not want religion. I am going to tell the people to come up here and get religion. This is the most spiritual revival I've been in in many a year." The speaker was not a Presbyterian. Many from the other churches are attending.

The happy high-heartedness of Dr. Irving, the preacher, is so infectious that to hear him is to be lifted from the plane to the peak. There are no barbed-wire entanglements of formal rhetoric or ambitious style. One feels that he is in the presence of God, as Dr. Irving, with his mellow, quaint, versatile and original mind, moves on in great sweeping strides to his many climaxes.

Many have been heard to remark that Ballinger has never had such powerfully spiritual preaching as Dr. Irving is doing. With a frank and full introduction he then launches out into a re-interpretation of the scriptures. He is a Bible scholar and truly a Bible preacher. Whether you agree with him or not in all of his statements there is one thing certain, viz, he makes the great affirmations of the scriptures live not by rationalism, but by presenting them in all of the power and earnestness of his soul. He pours contempt upon the vicious and iniquitous habits and sins of today. But he stresses the pure, holy and good; and urges the people to live nobly and cleanly.

Higher and higher the preacher rose last night as he presented the details and lessons of the healing of the paralytic as it is found in Mark's gospel chapter two. The vast audience was held in rapt attention and in deep reverence throughout. Many were heard to say "Amen" as the speaker drove home the vital truths with which his sermon was replete. Here and there were flights of poetic imagery, bursts of oratorical magnificence and passages of graphic pictorial power. But above all and

lying behind all, life, holy and radiant, was seen through the burning vision of a true servant of God. One has the feeling, as he sits and worships, that here is grim reality grappling with naked truth, and in that grasp is revealed the secret of Christ's power to transform and transfigure broken and defeated humanity.

The intellectual content of Dr. Irving's message is of a superior type. The preacher has no patience with shame and compromise on the part of the Christians. He argues that it will get them nowhere. "What we need," said the preacher, "is the grace and power of Jesus Christ in our lives, and a living, working, vital faith in His power to save the lost. This would lead us out to do His work as servants of Him. Then we would be happy and useful in this life. Religion is not an insurance

company to insure us against hell and for heaven, but it is a life-lived every day, truly and faithfully for our Lord. I tell you that the curse of the churches is dead formalism. Let us live the Christian life and work for our Christ, then the churches will begin to have a powerful influence on those who are not in the fold." "REPORTER."
