## Amundsen Determined to Try for North Pole Again

(By Associated Press)

COPENHAGEN, June 19.—The newspaper, Social Demokraten published a report from Oslo today stating that Captain Roald Amundsen, who returned to Spitzbergen yesterday after his sensational arctic flight is dissatisfied with the results attained and is quite determined to resume the attempt to reach the North Pole.

The explorer is quoted as declaring that the experienced gained in his present attempt would enable him to attain his goal.

LONDON, June 19.—Capt. Roald Amundsen has once more come safely out of the merciless grip of the Arctic. He abandoned his seaplane frozen in the ice 100 miles from the North Pole, and it remains there as his farthest North marker, but the explorer and his five companions are enjoying the comforts of bunks and warm meals after 28 days of untold hardships during which they pried the other machine out of the ice and flew back to Spitzbergen. The details of the trip received here have been meager, but dispatches from Oslo say that all six men in the Amundsen party are safe. They arrived at Spitzbergen in their remaining plane and were conveyed by a fishing boat to King's Bay.

### STRIKERS ARE UNCONTROLLABLE

SHANGHAI, June 19.—According to reports from Chung Kiang the strikers in that city are beyond control and many foreigners have taken refuge aboard foreign gunboats. Two Japanese gunboats have left Ichang for Chung Kiang.

SHANGHAI, June 19.—The Chinese General Chamber of Commerce voted today to terminate the strike against foreign activities next Monday.

It was a question today, however, as to how the chamber's action would affect the shipping strike, which is largely controlled by communistic labor elements which are opposed to commercial and financial interests represented by the chamber.

While no official action has been taken it was believed here that Chinese banks would open not later than Monday.

### Ballinger's Building Program Maintains a Lively Pace

Ballinger continues to grow and improve despite the torrid summer weather, and while business may seem rather quiet down town there is much activity going on within the city limits.

At least three new houses are under construction at present with several others just completed and a number of others to be started within the next two weeks.

Jim Dankworth is building a new home on Broadway and it will be completed within a short time. Alex Yarnell has the contract on this job. J. E. Powell and son are doing the work on a home for Mr. Powell just across the street from the Mike C. Boyd home on Broadway. Alex Yarnell also has the contract and the work is nearing completion on the W. A. Forgey home on Broadway. E. T. Branham is building a new modern home on the Ballinger-Abilene highway. All four of these new Broadway homes are modern bungalows of from five to six rooms and will add much to the looks of that growing residential section when completed.

The lumber companies state that other homes are scheduled to start in different parts of town within the next ten days and the building program will probably continue throughout the summer without cessation.

Painters have been doing their share of the improvement work and a little paint always shows to better advantage in attractiveness than any other improvement. Among the houses being painted or just finished are those of: Clint Penn, J. W. Clayton, O. R. Lasater, J. M. Garlington, E. A. Jeanes, C. A. Watson, A. H. VanPlet, Troy Simpson. The Ballinger State Bank and the J. Y. Pearce drug store buildings are among business houses receiving a recent repainting. There are other residences which are getting their new coats of paint, but those enumerated were noted in a brief trip over the city.

A new garage is being built at the home of Will Doose on Seventh Street and another is going up at the home of W. L. Brown on Eighth Street.

The crew of men working on the new Runnels county jail are making wonderful progress and that structure is fast nearing completion. Work is also being pushed on Ballinger's new \$100,000 high school building, a day and night shift being used in rushing the work in time for the opening of the next term.

The Ideal Filling Station on the Ballinger-Abilene highway is building five tourist bungalows and a large automobile shed for the use of motorists. Free shower baths are being installed and other conveniences for the comfort and attraction of tourists passing that way.

Work of cleaning off the grounds for the new city tourist park at the end of South Eighth Street is well under way and building will begin at once on the car sheds, fence and other equipment needed for a first class park where tourists can camp in comfort.

July 1st is the date set for the building committee of the Runnels County Fair Association to get busy on the new buildings, grandstand, stock sheds and other need structures for the Runnels County Fair. All these additions will be ready for use at the coming fair October 13, 14, 15, and 16. A bridge will also be built across what is known as the laundry ditch from the first enclosure connecting the ground immediately across the ditch with the enclosure. This additional ground will be used for the carnival and other such attractions for the fair.

While this list is not a careful survey of the building program at present it is just what the reporter can recall after riding over the city, and speaks well for a small town in the dull summer months.

### TWO KILLED; TWO WOUNDED IN GUN BATTLE NEAR SAN ANTONIO

SAN ANTONIO, June 19.—Two men were killed, two wounded and one taken as a prisoner in three gun battles last night in the St. Helwig road section where five separate ambushes occurred as the officers lay in wait for the reappearance of bandits. The outlaws are members of a gang which is alleged to have committed forty-six hold-ups and outrages in that sector in the past year.

The Bexar county grand jury is hearing evidence in the cases this afternoon.

At high noon the crowd filled the grandstand at Fair Park where the colored baseball teams of Ballinger and San Angelo met.

Following the baseball game a big barbecue dinner was served to all the negroes and special tables were provided for white people. Barbecued beef, pork and mutton was on the menu, with stew, bread, pickles and cold drinks.

Speaking and other amusements filled the afternoon program and the evening was given over to dancing and to public meetings of different kinds.

As soon as the baseball game was over the two teams left for San Angelo where they will play another game at 5:00 p. m. as the big afternoon feature of the San Angelo Juneteenth celebration.

The American Legion post an-  
nounced Thursday that Adjutant  
General Mark McGee would be  
the speaker of the day at the Bal-  
linger Birthday Celebration here  
on June 29th.

General McGee is very busy at  
this particular time of the year  
getting ready for the annual en-  
campment of the Texas National  
Guard and it took a great deal of  
persuasion to secure his promise  
to come to Ballinger and it was  
only after the boys had tried all  
over the state to get another  
speaker that he consented. The  
committee in charge of arrange-  
ments have kept the wires hot for  
the past ten days and could find  
no one of state or national promi-  
nence who could fill the date here.  
Telegrams were sent to Gov-  
ernor Ferguson, Jim Fergu-  
son, Congressman Tom Connally,  
Louis J. Wortham, Lynch David-  
son, and others, but all were sick,  
away from the state, too busy or  
had a previous engagement. After

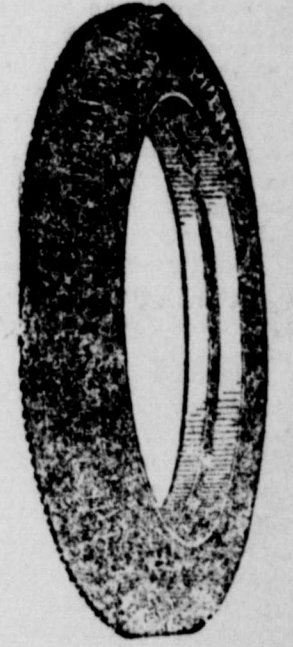

The final confirmation of the sale will be made on July 1st, and in case the deal goes through the Hughes Co. will take over the abstract business and will add loans to the other departments of the business.

The new firm will occupy the same office that has been occupied by the Guaranty Title Co. in the rear of the Ballinger State Bank building, and will make improvements in the way of a larger vault and a modern office. The Hughes Co. is old in the business and operates one of the biggest abstract offices at Brady in West Texas.

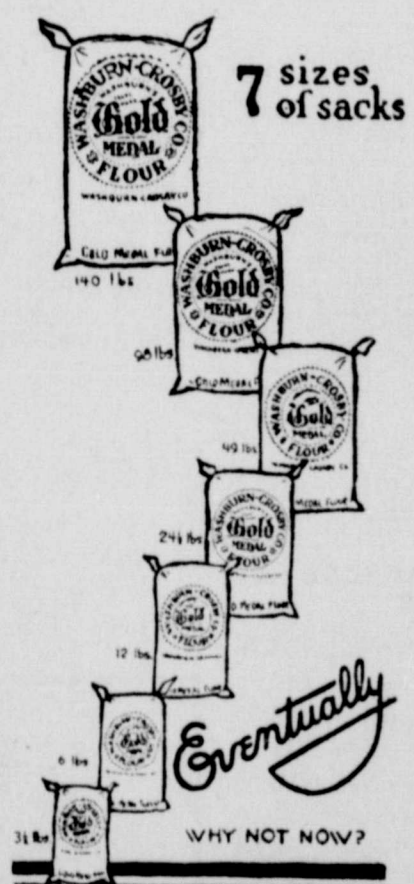
Mr. Miller states he will not leave Ballinger, but will have an office on Hutchings Avenue and will engage in the insurance and land business. More details of the deal will be made when the business changes hands.

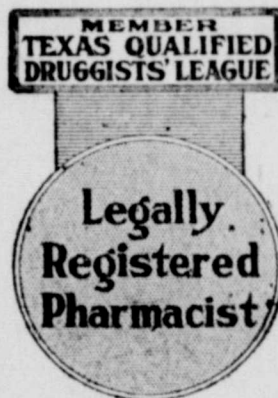

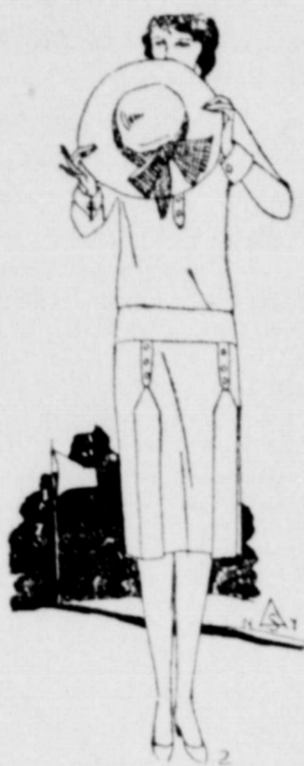

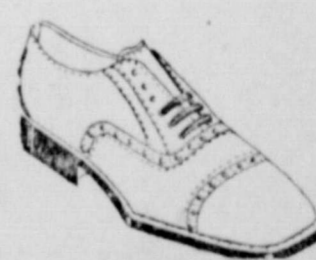

**HIGHER NEGRO DEATH RATE FROM T. B.**

(By Associated Press)  
MINNEAPOLIS, June 19.—Disclosing the fact that communities with the highest death rate from tuberculosis show the smallest ratio of known cases of the disease, Alice M. Hill, statistical field secretary, National Tuberculosis Association, told delegates to the annual meeting of the organization here today, that her researches also showed higher negro death rates were accompanied by a lower ratio of known cases, than among white persons in the same cities.

This apparent contradiction is due, stated Miss Hill, to the fact that where only a small proportion of the total of actual cases are known to the authorities, persons afflicted are beyond the reach of health measures and the high death rate results. Where the greatest number of cases are known, the individual can be sought out and modern methods of tuberculosis prevention applied.

The speaker urged the establishment of tuberculosis clinics for discovering unknown cases, and emphasized the need for more thorough reporting of cases to health authorities by physicians.

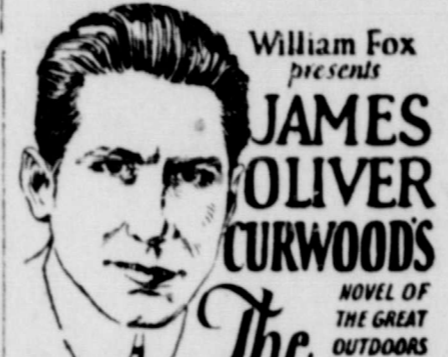
