Chinese Students Demand China Sever Relations With Great Britain

(By Associated Press)
PEKING, June 20.—Chinese delegates representing 48 colleges today sent a deputation to the minister of war and the foreign minister, demanding that the Chinese government immediately sever relations with Great Britain.

MOSCOW, June 20.—Headquarters of the Russian Peasants Internationale today appealed to the Chinese women and peasants to overthrow the imperialistic powers and demand abolition of foreign jurisdiction and summon a Chinese revolutionary assembly.

TAKING ACTION TO PAY DEBTS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 20.—Further indications that France and Czecho-Slovakia are preparing to make formal moves towards negotiations of the war debt refunding agreements have reached Washington through official channels. The advice are regarded as too indefinite to permit any formal announcement however, the messages received presumably being from American diplomats at the two capitals. The messages are said, however, to contain information justifying the belief that both countries would soon set in motion some kind of debt settlement negotiations.

SAN ANTONIO STILL IS METROPOLIS CITY OF LONE STAR STATE

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Nearly 1,000,000 people, a fifth of the population of Texas, live in or within commuting distance of the state's "big five" cities, estimates by the department of commerce show. Actually within the corporate limits of these cities, according to the estimates, are as follows: San Antonio, 198,068; Dallas, 193,450; Houston, 164,954; Fort Worth, 152,394; and El Paso, 104,920. All of the cities have populous suburbs.

The total population at this time is estimated at 5,097,574. The total state population and the population of the five biggest cities are all that have been announced as yet. Late in July estimates of population of Texas cities between 10,000 and 100,000 will be announced.

The bureau estimated that since the 1920 census was taken Uncle Sam has gained 394,714 compared with the present estimate of 5,097,574.

Three Texas cities are not satisfied with the 1925 estimate of population recently made, according to the census bureau. These three are Dallas, Houston and Ft. Worth. San Antonio continues to sail serenely out in front.

21 NEGROES RECEIVE PARDONS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 20.—With the granting of 21 more pardons today Governor Ferguson cleared her desk of executive clemency orders for negroes in commemoration of June 19th, Emancipation Day; pardons which were recommended by James E. Ferguson, and brought the June 19th list up to 34.

The governor granted one full pardon to a negro who had been conditionally pardoned from a life sentence for murder by Gov. W. P. Hobby, and gave twenty conditional pardons. In the list were included 13 who were convicted of murder, 2 for criminal assault, 2 for burglary, one on a liquor charge, 2 for theft and one for forgery.

The full pardon was granted to Jeff Brimberry of Mitchell county. Included in the list of conditional pardons were Percy Coleman, of Ellis county; and Felix Brown, of Brazos county.

DEFENSE ATTACKS GIRLS' TESTIMONY

CHICAGO, June 19.—The defense attorneys for William D. Shepherd continued their fierce attack today on the testimony of Miss Isabelle Pope, a school teacher, who waited with a marriage license while Billy McClintock, foster son of Shepherd, died of typhoid fever.

Frederick Squibb, shorthand reporter, who recorded a portion of Miss Pope's testimony before the coroner's jury which held Shepherd for the murder of the rich youth, testified that the woman had not mentioned germs or the study of germs. On the witness stand against Shepherd, Miss Pope said that the defendant had informed her that he had studied typhoid and germs.

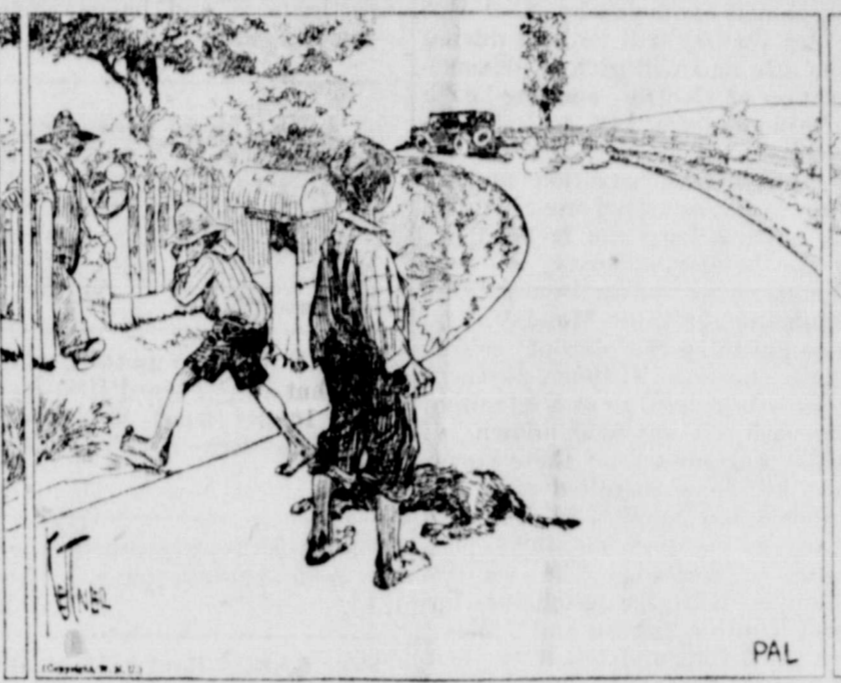
Chipas Women May Vote

**INTEREST GROWS
IN M. E. REVIVAL**

Last night at the Methodist
church the preacher, Dr. Hunt,
presented his pre-announced sub-
ject, "What the Bible Teaches
about Hell," and to say that he
handled the subject "without
gloves," would be expressing it
mildly.

In the language of the judge on
the bench, Dr. Hunt certainly
"made not his case," and those
whose privilege it was to be pre-
sent had many new thoughts pre-
sented and to those who believe
that this subject is very much
neglected would have been and
were abundantly satisfied that
hell is no myth and those who are
inclined to soften the horrors of
this place are very much in error.

Dr. Hunt after announcing his
subject and reading his main text,
read from many passages in the
Bible describing hell and its
horrors and conditions, thus offer-
ing his hearers all the proof
necessary of hell and its horrors.

Dr. Hunt is logical and once you
accept his premises, he drives you
to his conclusions. He is an able
reasoner and presents many facts
to support his propositions, at
times he grows eloquent and he
is master in presenting tragedy.

**CUBAN DIGGERS UNCOVER
 RELICS OF BYGONE DAYS**
 (By Associated Press)
 HAVANA, June 19.—Relics of
 Cuba's past are being constantly
 brought to light thru exploration
 or preparation for new buildings.
 In Maceo Park, now near the
 center of the city but years ago
 one distance from the city walls,
 workmen uncovered a store of
 hand grenades and war material
 believed to have been buried
 about the time of the ten year's
 war in the '60s.
 Repairs to the old Santa Clara
 Convent, completed in 1643
 brought discovery of a secret tun-
 nel which led to a catacomb in
 which more than one hundred
 skeletons were discovered.
 Near Majagua a farmer dis-
 covered a lump of wax in a hol-
 low tree. He cut it open and
 found inside a revolver perfectly
 preserved, gold-mounted and
 carved. It was of a model popu-
 lar in the United States about
 1865 and was of the obsolete .36
 calibre cap and ball type.



COST \$20,000 TO EXECUTE TWO ESKIMOS, SAID

(By Associated Press) EDMONTON, Alta., June 20.—Authorities here have placed \$20,000 as the cost of the trial and execution of two Copper Eskimos, Ahkoniak and Tatamizana, on Herschell Island a year ago. Knud Rasmussen, arctic explorer, dif-

fers from this estimate and puts the cost between \$50,000 and \$75,000.

Commenting on the Copper Eskimos, Rasmussen expressed the opinion that before law enforcement is undertaken efforts should be made to educate them to an understanding of the law of civilization. He pointed out that the Copper Eskimos were in a state of primitive savagery. During hard times killing of female children is customary, and the slaying of a husband to obtain his wife is not regarded as a serious wrong.

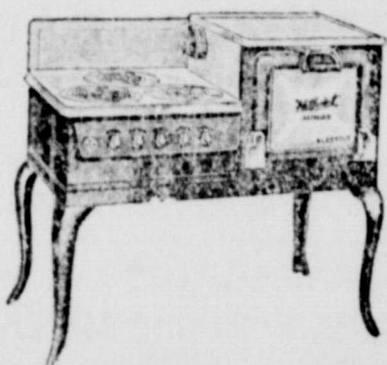
