CHINESE QUESTION TO BE TAKEN UP

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 1.—Instructions for Minister McMurray, who will arrive at his post in Peking on July 4th, are expected to indicate a desire by the United States government that the whole question of extra-territorial rights in China be taken under consideration at the earliest possible date.

If other world powers concur in that viewpoint the international commission authorized during the Washington arms conference to deal with extra-territorial rights probably will take up his functions together with that of representatives of all nations who have natural interests in Chinese questions.

R. R. COMMISSION CLERK INDICTED

AUSTIN, July 1.—Earl Calloway, who was to have assumed his duties as chief clerk of the oil and gas division of the Texas Railroad Commission, is today being detained here in connection with reported indictments filed against him. The bills were said to have been returned in Shackelford county charging him with committing three felonies.

Calloway said today that he was sure the indictments had grown out of a suit for \$100,000 he had filed against the Earl Calloway Petroleum Company. He predicted that he could clear himself if the case against him ever comes to trial.

Calloway was formerly president of the Earl Calloway Petroleum Co., he said, and in two years he had been unable to get a settlement out of the concern.

Mrs. Rogers was elected in a special election for the Fifth Congressional District of Massachusetts yesterday over former Governor Ross of Massachusetts. Mrs. Rogers succeeds her husband, Representative John Rogers, who died last March.

EFFICIENT WORK IS BEING DONE BY MCWILLIAMS

That the local sheriff's department is functioning efficiently is evidenced by the following report, made up from records at the court house. Sheriff R. E. McWilliams has been on the job since January 1st, 1925, and in that time there have been thirty-five felony cases docketed as follows:

Burglary and theft, nine.
Bootlegging, eight.
Forgery, five.
Transporting liquor, two.
Manufacturing liquor, two.
Felony theft, one.
Murder, one.
Assault to murder, one.
Seduction, one.
Assault with intent to rape, one.

Misdemeanor cases that have been placed on the docket in the six-month period from January first to June thirtieth, number one hundred and twenty-two. One hundred and sixteen fines have been collected on these cases.

Misdemeanors are classed and numbered as follows:
Gaming, four.
Drunkness, seventeen.
Affray, fourteen.
Petty theft, eleven.
Cold checks, sixteen.
Aggravated assault, four.
Carrying pistol, two.
Disturbing peace, six.
Vagrancy, five.

There are four felony cases that have not made bond. Only one of the cases listed above has never been arrested. Three broke jail June 26th, that are still at large. The jail break, however, was due to the condition of the old jail, as the steel had been removed from the prison to be used in the new structure, leaving only a rock wall between the prisoners and liberty.

It is the duty of the sheriff and his deputies to make arrests and to run down crime whenever it happens, and that the Rumsels county sheriff's department has been doing its full duty is shown in the above report. In addition it might be recalled that Sheriff McWilliams has taken part in two chases after desperate criminals in other counties, that of a Mexican desperado who killed two officers at Big Spring, and the negro bandit who killed Sheriff Dick Pauley of Coleman county.

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GETS 25 YEARS FOR UXORICIDE

Nat'l Guard Company Leave For Camp Mabry Thursday

Company C, 142nd Infantry, Texas National Guard, will entrain at Ballinger Thursday afternoon on the regular East bound Santa Fe passenger train for Camp Mabry, Austin, where the local unit will take part in the regular annual encampment. Two commissioned officers and forty men comprise the Ballinger company, which is said to be the best and most efficient Guard organization ever to leave this city for the summer camp.

A baggage car was switched on to a siding East of the Santa Fe passenger station Tuesday night, in which will be carried all camp equipment, field ranges, and excess baggage. The men will ride firstclass all the way to Camp Mabry and back, a special train being made up at Brownwood. The Ballinger outfit will be joined before arriving at Brownwood by companies from Santa Anna and Bangs.

"I believe this is the best company we ever took to an encampment," stated Capt. W. C. McCarver, company commander Wednesday. "The men are intelligent, efficient and there are no 'roughnecks' in the present outfit. We expect to do the best work ever done at Camp Mabry by a local Guard company." Captain McCarver will be assisted in officiating the company by First Lieutenant Chas. E. Lowry, while Clinton Clark is first sergeant.

SANTA BARBARA, July 1.—The death list from the earthquake which destroyed the greater part of Santa Barbara Monday, is described as the heaviest to visit the Pacific coast. The casualty list stood at ten persons this afternoon.

No exact estimate of the property loss has been announced, but it has been described as being between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000.

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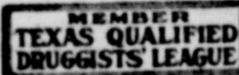
