## BRYAN THINKS SCOPES CLASS HURT TEACHERS

(By Associated Press)  
DAYTON, Tenn., July, 9.—William Jennings Bryan believes that John Scopes, the defendant in the Tennessee evolution trial, is doing more harm to the teachers of the country than any other class.

This harm, Bryan declared here this afternoon, would be indefinitely increased if Scopes' views as to the independence of the teacher were established.

"If the evolutionists can succeed in establishing the doctrine that the teacher can teach anything that he or she pleases," said the Commoner, "and teachers disregard the wishes of their employers, it will be necessary to find out before their appointment what the teacher thinks on disputed questions, because people who employ teachers will be just as certain to prevent teaching what is objectionable to those who employ teachers as bankers and business men are to prevent clerks from running banks and stores contrary to the instructions of their employers."

DAYTON, Tenn., July 9.—Dayton settled down today to the completion of final preparations for what has been termed a battle between fundamentalism and evolution.

Attorneys, witnesses, newspaper men and plain visitors arriving on every incoming train and bus are greeted by the monotonous clanging of hammers and saws as carpenters were applying the finishing touches to the concession stands springing up in every alleyway and leading sidewalks.

## INDICTED JUDGE KILLED IN AUTO

JACKSON, Tenn., July, 9.—Judge J. W. Ross, of the Federal Court, Western Tennessee district who yesterday was indicted in connection with the failure of the People's Saving Bank of Jackson, was killed in an automobile accident today.

The judge was killed when the automobile in which he was riding ran off a bridge about five miles east of here. The car turned over in the creek bed, pinning Judge Ross underneath, and it is believed, he was killed instantly. His body was discovered shortly after the tragedy.

## MOTHER AND CHILD MURDERED

NEW YORK, July, 9.—Mrs. Margaret Dianco and her six-year-old daughter were found murdered here today in their apartment in an East Thirty-Fourth Street tenement house. The heads of the woman and the child had been crushed and their throats slashed. The police said the murderer of the woman and child used a saw-like instrument which almost severed their heads.

Bodies of the two victims were found by a man who said he was looking for furnished rooms.

## COUNTRY CLUB LINE COMPLETED

The West Texas Utilities Co., has completed a three-mile electric transmission line to the Ballinger Country Club, and all lights and other connections will soon be in place, according to Chester Cherry, who is in charge of the detail doing the work. The cost of the line will be about \$2,700, which is considerable more than was at first estimated, partly due to the fact that holes had to be blasted in solid rock for the poles, and other expense items not at first evident.

The line is entirely constructed of new aluminum wire, used because of the length of the spans between poles, which in some cases as across the Club Lake are 1,900 feet long. The line carries 2,300 volts, the same as the city transmission lines, and at the club house will drive a half-horsepower air water pressure motor pump. This pump will give a pressure of 30 pounds, as much as is used in the city water works, and will furnish water for all purposes at the Club.

Shower baths, dressing rooms, etc., are now complete at the Country Club grounds. These conveniences will permit members to drive out, play a round of golf, take a dip in the lake, step in under the cover, and come feeling rejuvenated.

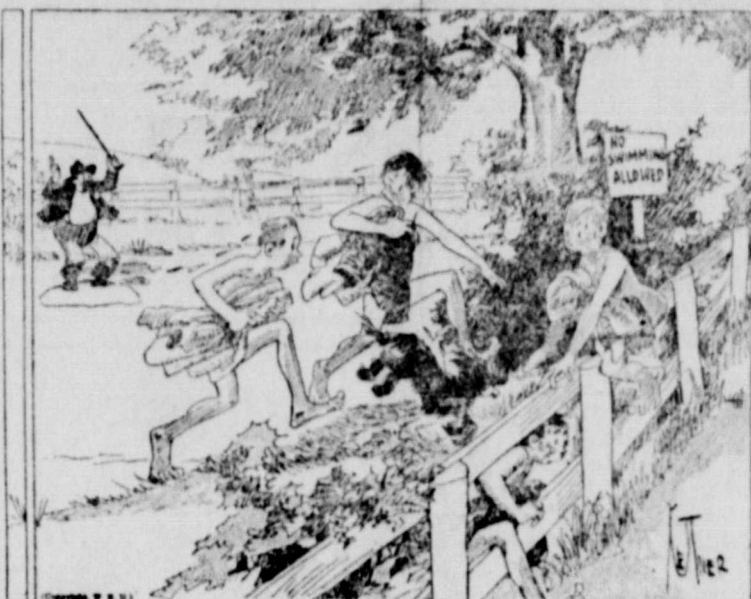
Five or six private subscribers will be tied on to the Country Club in the West End addition to the city, who have heretofore been without electric service, and it is thought that others will be given connections from this line as soon as necessary facilities are obtained.

## WORK ON NEW TOURIST PARK UNDER WAY; WILL BE MODERN

After rejecting the first bids because they were considered too high, the building committee of the Chamber of Commerce asked for and received additional offers for the construction of the new tourist park Wednesday. Several bids were received, and it was announced that Lonnie Parker had submitted the lowest contract.

Work on the buildings commenced Thursday morning, and will be pushed to completion. The main structure will be 24 by 60 feet, and will have a wing 12 by 60 feet which will be used for a dining hall. The dining hall will be entirely screened in. There will be six screened sleeping rooms, each 10 by 12 feet in dimension.

The new park will be equipped with all modern conveniences, including shower baths, men's and ladies' toilets, and other separate apartments. Water connections will be installed in every necessary spot in the camp grounds. The buildings and grounds will be electrically lighted.

## Late Rains in California Upset Outdoor Movie Plans

LOS ANGELES, July, 9.—Unusually late rains in southern California this spring not only damaged fruit and grain to some extent but also retarded film crops. Movie producers of Hollywood report a loss of more than \$500,000 due to the unseasonal rainfall.

After the middle of April film producers, expecting clear days, prepared for outside scenes. The late rains upset all calculations, forced important "takes" to be suspended and, in some cases, compelled the use of expensive indoor sets for pictures which could have been made more economically out or doors.

## Japanese Have Air Bomb Test

TOKYO, July, 9.—A three-day air bombing exercise recently was held over Tsujido a suburb of Kangawa. Two planes were employed, each carrying 32 bombs weighing 300 to 400 pounds.

The object of the exercise was to study various relations between the reaching point of bombs thrown from airplanes, and the speed as well as direction of the winds, also to improve bomb throwing devices aboard flying machines.

**THE STATE ON A CASH BASIS**

The State of Texas is on a cash basis, the first time in several years, according to a financial statement recently issued. Discussing the probability of the State again going on deficiency, Gregory Hatcher, state treasurer, predicts that there will be from four to five billion dollars more in the treasury at the beginning of the next fiscal year, September 1st, 1924, and it is his opinion that the State will not go on the deficiency during the present administration.

During the month of March the state treasurer paid to the county and independent school districts over \$8,000,000, and the school apportionment was paid about thirty days earlier than in previous years. Mr. Hatcher also announced that there had been an increase of \$1.00 in the pension to be paid to each Confederate veteran, since he had assumed the duties of office, and that he hoped that the State finances would soon permit of an additional increase in the amount to be received by each Confederate veteran.

The administration is without doubt making good, as shown by this statement. And the question naturally arises, where are the wise men who said we would soon run the old ship of state on the rocks under the rule of the first lady governor? Cash on hand amounts to \$11,799,639.29.

In Dayton, Tennessee, they are putting on a regular circus for the visitors to the Scopes trial. Concession men are lining the streets to furnish the thirsty with pop and the hungry with hot dog.

Work has begun on the new tourist park, and better accommodations will be afforded the motor traveler in Ballinger as soon as completed.

**RURAL SCHOOLS BONDS CARRIED**

Two bond issues which were voted on in rural school districts Tuesday, were carried unanimously, not a single vote being polled in either district against the issuance of bonds. The districts were Dry Ridge and Blanton, who were previously reported in The Ledger to hold their elections next Saturday. However, the Puckett and Stone consolidation election will be held on Saturday as before published.

In the Dry Ridge election a bond issue of \$2,000 was carried by the vote of 31 to none. In addition the 75c maintenance tax, a separate item, was carried unanimously. As soon as the necessary red tape can be gone through with, a new school building will be put up at Dry Ridge.

The Blanton school district election for \$1,200 in bonds to construct an addition to the present school building, was carried by the vote of 10 to none. Another room will be added to the Blanton school by reason of this election.

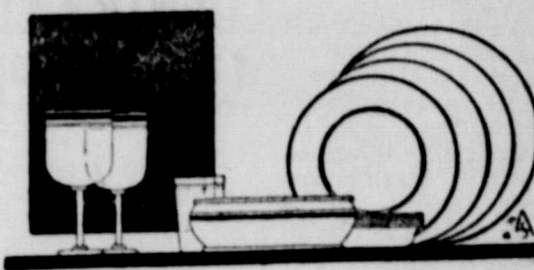

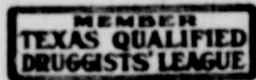

**Of Automobiles in Canada Ontario Has Nearly Half**  
(By Associated Press)

OTTAWA, July 8.—Automobiles in Canada have passed the 600,000 mark for the first time in history, the Dominion bureau of statistics announces.

Motor vehicles registered in Canada January 1st numbered 652,121, compared with 593,323 on Jan. 1, 1924.

Ontario was the leading automobile owner among the provinces with 309,683 cars to its credit. The prairie provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta combined accounted for 166,234 automobiles. More than 60 per cent of the cars in that area are owned in rural districts.

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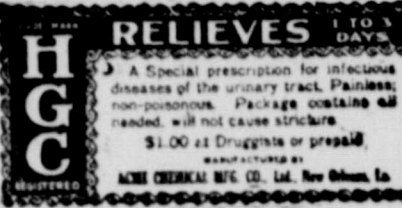
