



The Board of County Commisoce s met in edjoarned eession: Jan. 13, 1379, Mr. Samuel Baker, the new member being in his seat. Mr. N. J. Swayze was elected Charman of the Board.

J. C. Dwelle and 21 others preseated a petition for the location of a county road in Cottonwood townhip. The bond was filed and approved and v ewers were appointed, 10-wit: F. P. Sayre, E. S. Sauble and Wm. Se'f.

John K. Patison and Miss L. M. Ridgeway were appointed to assist the County Superintendant in the examination of school teachers, vice Messrs. Nesbit and Myser, whose terms have expired.
