MEXICO READY TO PAY DEBT

Mexico will begin paying her while away, but is now about his \$500,000,000 national debt, owed usual self and doing fine chiefly to the United States, about September 1st, according to A. N. Elias, consul general for Mexico at New York, who passed throught here today.

Mexico discharged her domestic debts on August 13th when 20,000,000 pesos were paid to private institutions of that country, Elias said.




