## SEAPLANE AND CREW ARE RESCUED

### HUSBAND OF MURDERED DRY WORKER IS QUIZZED

(By Associated Press)  
**VINTON, Iowa, Sept. 11.**—C. B. Cook, whose wife, Mrs. Myrtle Cook, president of the Benton county Womens Christian Temperance Union, was shot to death in her home Monday night, will be questioned at a closed session of the coroner's inquest today. Sheriff Whitefield Ruhl said that Cook had not given satisfactory explanation as to where he was on the night of the killing. He was not at home when his wife was assassinated. Mrs. Cook was preparing a speech to be delivered at a convention of the temperance organization to be held the next day when she was shot through a window, the bullet crashing through her head. She had been active in the prosecution of bootleggers and liquor runners and it was at first the opinion of the authorities that she had been shot by a bootlegger.

Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Voss, of the Wingate country, had business in Ballinger last Thursday. Mr. Voss reported that trespassers were giving him trouble and he published a notice warning hunters and all others to keep off the premises of his mother and himself.

### AVIATORS KILL 100 RIFFIANS

**QUEZZAN, French Morocco, Sept. 11.**—American aviators in the bombardment of Shesham, a Riffian stronghold, are reliably reported to have killed more than one hundred warriors. It is said that the American's bombs also greatly damaged the Riffian military outposts established and disorganized tribesmen who were concentrated at those points.

### JAIL BREAKER IS ARRESTED

The local sheriff's department received a message Friday afternoon stating that Perry Todd, wanted in Runnels county, was in the Wichita Falls jail. The message was from the sheriff of Wichita county.

Todd broke jail here last spring, being one of three prisoners who sawed their way out of the local jail. He is wanted in this county on a charge of burglary.

Walter Mesecke, charged with bootlegging, who was one of the trio escaping from the Runnels county jail here, is still at large. The third man was Lang Iden, who is charged with violating the liquor laws. Iden's bond had been fixed at \$1,000 when he broke jail. While at large he arranged bond and voluntarily came back to town and surrendered, bringing with him his bondsmen.

Chief of Police B. W. Pileher went to San Angelo Friday to attend the sheriff's convention.

### 101 TO 19 FOR CHURCH UNION

**MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 11.**—Favorable action was taken today on the question of unification of the Methodist Episcopal Church North and South at the Eastern Wisconsin Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church here. The vote was 101 for and 19 against union.

**HONOLULU, Sept. 11.**—With their food supply exhausted for four days, burned by the tropical sun, with long beards and physically worn out, the five members of the naval seaplane PN-9 No. 1 were safely ashore today at Nawiliwili, Hawaii, sixty-four miles Northwest of here.

The crew and their seaplane were picked up yesterday at sundown by the submarine R-4 and towed to port. The seaplane and men were found fifteen miles North of Nawiliwili after being buffeted about for nine days.

The seaplane was forced down off the Hawaiian coast nine days ago while attempting to fly from San Francisco to Honolulu, when the fuel supply became exhausted. The navy department for several days held out hope that the men were safe, and all available vessels and seaplanes were thrown into the search for the missing craft.

The seaplane was under the command of John Rogers, and the other members of the crew were: B. J. Connell, of Pennsylvania, assistant pilot; S. N. Pope, of Tennessee, aviation pilot; William Bowlin, of Indiana, chief machinist; and C. G. Stantz, of Indiana, chief radioman.

Buoyed up principally by its empty gasoline tanks, the plane drifted approximately 450 miles due Westward from the point where it dropped to the water ten days ago. The wings of the plane were badly smashed by the rough seas, but the hull of the plane was intact. The fabric was torn off the plane while it was being buffeted about, and used by members of the crew in which to catch rain water to drink. "This saved our lives," said the men.

Messages broadcast by searching planes and ships were all picked up by the lost seaplane, but the crew of the seaplane could not respond because the drooping antenna was under water.

The aviators said they sighted a merchant vessel soon after they went down, but were unable to attract its attention.

After landing late yesterday, Commander Rogers gave out a statement. "We experienced rough weather for just one day,"

said Rogers, "and that was the third day after we were forced down. The rain and heavy seas made matters uncomfortable, but our seaplane was seaworthy and stood the rough weather well."

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.**—Commander John Rogers of the rescued seaplane PN-9 No. 1, was today appointed assistant chief of the United States navy's bureau of aeronautics, and will report to Washington as soon as possible to assume his new post. The appointment was made as soon as it was learned of the rescue of the seaplane and its crew.

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.**—The naval seaplane PN-9 No. 1 will make another attempt to fly from San Francisco to Honolulu as soon after September 21 as possible, Captain Stanford Moses, commander of the flight project, advised the navy department today. The flight will take place after the conclusion of the equinoctial storms on the Pacific, Moses said.

Sheriff Karnes, of Milles county, spent Thursday night in Ballinger. He was en route to San Angelo to attend the sheriff's convention.

Miss Mary K. Fleming, of Pittsburgh, arrived here Friday at noon, coming to Ballinger to take charge of the domestic

science department in the local high school. Miss Fleming formerly lived here, when her father was superintendent of the city schools.

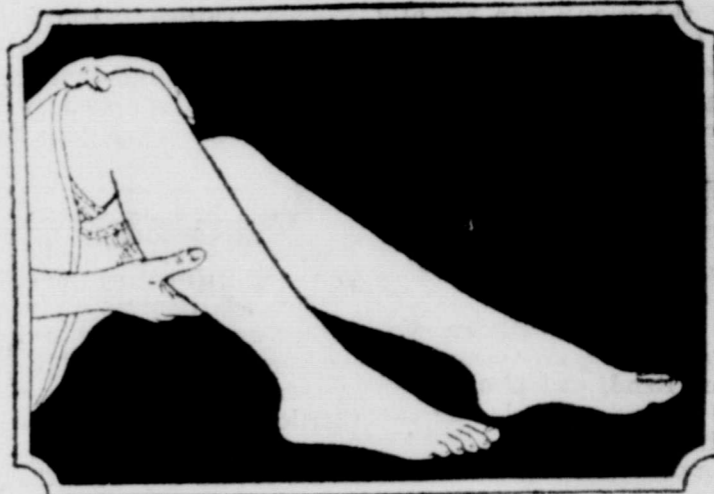

**FALSE SWEARING**

Down at San Antonio, where it has frequently been charged that booze is plentiful, a federal judge got mad at his jury for acquitting a bootlegger and fired them from his court. When the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty, the judge said: "Gentlemen of the jury, I cannot see how you could return a verdict of not guilty after the charge given you by the court. Your services are no further needed here," and the judge instructed the clerk to pay the twelve men off and let them go. Jurors who go into the box to try a man, taking an oath to return a verdict according to the law and evidence, commit perjury when they let sentiment override their oath. Such men do society an injustice when they qualify as jurors.

## WHO'S WHO

### Among Ballinger Teachers

In the selection of a faculty for our schools, the Board of Trustees and I used the utmost care and had in mind only the ultimate good and welfare of our children. We believe that we have a faculty that will compare favorably with any school in Texas, and feel that each teacher will certainly do their utmost to have the best school possible.

That the public may have some idea of our faculty, we shall speak briefly of each member.

In the high school we have twelve teachers, as follows:

Mr. J. B. Pace is principal of this group and has taught here in this capacity for the last four years. It seems almost out of place to speak of Mr. Pace since everyone knows him so well. He is a Winters product, finished high school there in the spring of 1917, and entered Southwestern University where he graduated four years later. During the past two summers he has been working toward his Master's degree at the University of Texas.

Mr. Ivan P. Oliver, who has taught science and is head coach of athletics, received his high

school training at San Saba except the last year, which was taken in Denton high school. He taught as instructor and coach at Riviera one year and lacks only one summer's work of having the Bachelor of Science degree from the State Teachers College at Denton. Mr. Oliver has taken active part in the athletics in San Saba high school, Denton high school, and also in college. He made letters in football and baseball for his last two years.

Mr. Robert M. Payne, who will have work in the social sciences and Math. department, comes to us from the University of Texas where he obtained his B. A. degree. He served one year as principal of his home school, Malakoff, Texas, and was elected there as superintendent since signing our contract. Mr. Payne has been on the University debating squads for the past two years and has the past year been leader of a 3500 student pep squad. He has had quite a bit of training in athletics under Doc E. J. Stewart, Billy Birch and B. M. Whittaker, we have asked him to assist Mr. Oliver in the athletics.

Miss Helen Brewer, who is to be head of the English department, is a Ballinger lady, having graduated from Ballinger high school in 1922 with highest honors. She entered Southwestern University in the fall of 1922 and secured her B. A. this June with which she received the distinction of securing the record of Cum Laude, lacking only 1.2 point of making Magna Cum Laude average. She was a leader in her school in all worthy activities, having been a member of Delta Delta Delta sorority, the Y. W. C. A., the Writers Club, vice-president of the Spanish Club, secretary of the Womens Building Honor Council, and secretary of the Scholarship Society. She also was student assistant to Dr. Claud Howard in the English department for two years.

Miss Gladys Peeler, who taught for us last year, will have the Spanish again. She took her high school training in Oak Cliff high of Dallas, attended the Den-

ton Teachers College two years, Southern Methodist University one summer, and one year in the University of Texas, where she took the Bachelor of Arts degree in 1924. During the past summer Miss Peeler has studied Spanish in the National University of Mexico, as well as observed the customs and people of the Spanish nationality in order that she may teach the subject even more efficiently than before.

Mr. H. C. Kennedy, who will have charge of our Manual Training department is a degree graduate from State Teachers College of Commerce, Texas. Mr. Kennedy has one year of experience in public school work. In addition to his degree, he has a diploma from Paris Commercial School for completing the work of bookkeeping, banking, shorthand and typewriting. Mr. Kennedy's principal work will be directing the classes in woodwork and mechanical drawing.

Miss Mary K. Fleming will have charge of our Home Economics department and comes to us from the greatest girls school in the South, some of us think, C. I. A. of Denton, Texas. She secured a part of her elementary education in Ballinger while her father was superintendent of the Ballinger public schools. The remainder was obtained in Austin and Pittsburgh. Miss Fleming specialized in Vocational Home Economics at C. I. A. and stood among the first in her classes. In addition to her studies there, she was student assistant in Biology for five terms. She received her Bachelor of Science degree from C. I. A. in the spring of this year.

Miss Marryatt Smith will continue to serve Ballinger high in the capacity of head of the Latin department, in which capacity she has worked for the past several years. She at one time had charge of the German department also, securing credit for three units of work—all that was offered in that department. She also directed and taught the Latin work that secured our four units of affiliation in that department. She graduated from Ballinger high and attended the state university for a while, transferring from there to St. Mary's College where she graduated with Summa Cum Laude honors. The last year in this college she obtained a \$500 scholarship for her superior scholastic attainments. She is also working

toward her Master's degree, having spent two summers in the University of Chicago, and is this summer preparing her Master's thesis. She served as student assistant in Latin and German during her senior year in college. She also served as principal of Ballinger high school one year.

Mrs. Bessie Liddell Lowe will be teacher of English for us again this year. She has five years experience besides her four years of work here. She graduated from the state school at San Marcos in 1919 and since then has studied in the University of Texas and Baylor University, taking work under Dr. Armstrong in the study of Browning. Mrs. Lowe taught in the Cameron public school the five years previous to coming to Ballinger.

Miss Lucille Copass, A. B., graduate of Baylor University, will be head of the History department of our school. She received her high school education in Dallas high school and San Marcos Baptist Academy—two years in each. While attending Baylor University, she was an active leader in student activities, having won the distinction of "University Favorite," an honor voted on her by the student body and faculty. While there she also served on the judicial council, served three years on the Baylor University paper, "The Lariat," and was a member of the religious council, an organization that deals with the religious life of the student body. She taught last year at Harold and was re-elected there and resigned to accept our position. While there, she also contributed a page weekly to the local paper in giving the patrons and student body interesting news of their school. She also coached the debating teams for Harold the past year.

Miss Ulis Newton, Mathematics instructor, is an A. B. graduate of Howard Payne College of Brownwood. She also attended and graduated from Brownwood high school. She has specialized in math. and was assistant in that subject. She is a member of the Scholarship Society of Texas

schools. She has one year of experience and has the past spring taken charge of teaching the higher classes in math., such as Calculus, etc., while the instructor was away on sick leave. The Commercial teacher has just asked the board to accept her resignation, and her successor has not been elected, though we have several applications.

#### Junior High

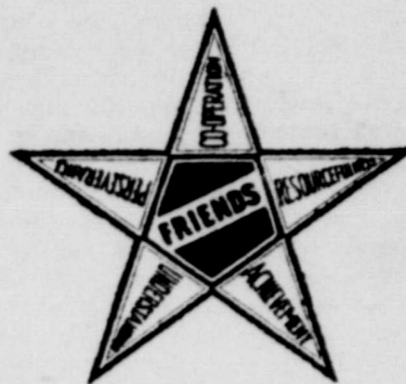
Mr. Horace Oliver, who was principal of the Central Ward school last year, will be principal of the Junior school. Mr. Oliver is a Ballinger product, graduating from the local school several years ago. After graduating here, he attended the State Normal at Denton and secured his permanent certificate. He has

eight years experience, having taught six years in this county and two years as principal of Rotan high school.

Miss Patricia Reynolds will be one of the Junior school teachers. She graduated from the Troup high school and attended Sam Houston Teachers College at Huntsville for two years. She has four years experience; the last two years she taught English in the grades at Santa Anna.

Miss Willie Collier has a permanent certificate from the Denton Teachers College, having completed three years work there in that institution. She has specialized in public school music and will have three classes in this each day in the junior school besides her other work. She has

three years experience in Justin, Texas, where she was reared.  
 Miss Irene Trousdale is from Bay City where she graduated from the high school with the honors of salutatorian. She has attended Rice Institute two years and has one year of experience in public schools, having taught at Fabens, El Paso county.  
 Miss Gladys Stevens, who recently has been elected to take Miss Tucker's position, is from Howard Payne College, having completed nearly two year's college work there. In addition, Miss Stevens has taught three years.  
 Miss Annie White, the other teacher in the Junior school, has had two years training in Howard Payne College and has four years experience. Besides this, she has attended Baylor University one summer term.

**Central Ward School**

In Central Ward there will be eight teachers, with Mr. R. B. Lee principal. Mr. Lee, who was principal of South Ward last session, is a graduate of the North Texas State Normal and has several years of successful experience besides the year that he worked with us.

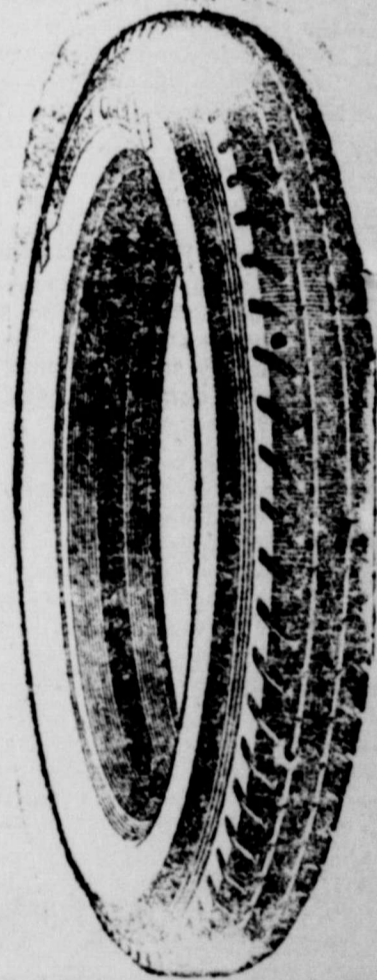

## OUR TERRITORY GETS GOOD RAIN

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Sept. 11.—Reports from West and Northwest Texas said that rains beneficial to crops fell in those sections yesterday and last night. In some localities the rains were continuing today. No moisture whatever fell in the drought stricken section of Central Texas, the reports said.

Rain Thursday night and Friday morning was general over Ballinger's trade territory and over Central West Texas, according to telephone reports.

More than half an inch slow rain fell at Ballinger, and as much as two inches fell at some places reporting. The Pony community, eight miles Southeast of Ballinger, reported two inches.

The rain fell slowly and will be of benefit to late feed crops and helpful to the range. The only probable loss will accrue from washing off poison put out for cotton worms, and further damage may result from the leaf worm.

Cotton picking was getting under good headway in some sections of the county. The rain will suspend operations for a few hours.
