The seaplane was forced down off the Hawaiian coast nine days ago while attempting to fly from San Francisco to Honolulu, when the fuel supply became exhausted. 

F. W. Heckler committed sui cide last Sunday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Paul Haubt, who resides a few miles out the country.

He was sixty-two years of age and made his home with his daughter and it is thought that mental derangement was the cause of the tragedy.

The family left home early in the morning and Mr. Heckler re mained and on returning at night they found him dead and had probably been dead several hours. He had placed the shot gun between the pickets of the fence and fastened the trigger with a wire and pulled the barrel to his breast causing the gun to discharge, resulting in the tragedy.—Winters Enterprise.
