17 ARE KILLED IN ACCIDENTS

CHICAGO, Sept. 14.—Seventeen persons met death throughout the country over the weekend in accidents or violence with automobile mishaps and fatalities leading the casualty tolls with six.

Deaths from automobile accidents alone for the entire week in nine middle Western states totalled 85, with two meeting death in this manner in Texas.

Large Crowd Present at Opening of City Schools

The lower floor and the balcony of the Baptist Church were filled to overflowing by pupils, patrons and friends of the Ballinger schools when an interesting program making up the opening exercise was carried out.

Following the program at the church the pupils were directed to report at the various school buildings, where it was predicted that a record breaking enrollment would be recorded.

While somewhat handicapped on account of the new building not being ready for occupancy, the schools open under the most favorable conditions, with the largest faculty in its history. Thirty-two teachers have been employed, and it is probable that this number will have to be increased as soon as the new building is open.

The increase in faculty is due both to the increase in enrollment and the addition of a number of courses of study.

The meeting Monday morning at 9:00 o'clock was called to order by Superintendent W. A. Cain. Standing, the large audience sang "America." Rev. W. H. Doss, a member of the school board of trustees, offered the invocation.

J. D. Motley made a brief talk, announcing the reception for the teachers and football club which will be held tonight. A string trio, composed of Herbert Preston, Edwin Swindell and Robert Lee Maddox played a couple of numbers. Miss Louise Doss sang a solo, Mrs. J. M. Skinner playing the accompaniment.

The principal speaker for the morning was Scott H. Mack, Mr. Mack spoke on "The Needs of the Schools." Mrs. Estes Lynn, president of the Parent-Teachers Association, was presented and made a short talk concerning the work of the association and asking for the co-operation of the parents.

Miss Pauline Jones, the new

expression teacher, was introduced and favored the audience with a couple of readings. Herbert Preston rendered a couple of selections on the violin with piano accompaniment by Mr. Baum, of Waco.

Rev. E. W. McLaurin discussed briefly the importance of Bible study as a part of the public school course, pointing out that it was just as important to train the heart as it was to train the mind.

Superintendent Cain reviewed the work of the school board and enumerated the things the school had accomplished since he was elected superintendent. He stated that the Mexican and negro schools had been provided for, and that the standing of the Ballinger schools had been raised. He told of the improvement made in the old school buildings, and of the success of the school board in their program of building a new high school building.

Mr. Cain stated that 1191 pupils were enrolled in the Ballinger schools last year. Thirty-seven Mexican and 84 negro children were enrolled. He predicted an increase for the present term, and stated that the school board had planned the new high school building on the unit basis so that in future years it could be added to in order to take care of the possible increase.

The children will be banded in the best way possible until the new building is completed. Monday morning the high school pupils were instructed to report at the old high school building. The fifth, sixth and seventh grades were sent to West Ward, and the four lower grades sent to Central and South ward schools.

The first day was taken up in organization work, it being announced that the text books would be issued as rapidly as possible.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—The court of inquiry to investigate the Shenandoah disaster, with Rear Admiral H. H. Jones, chief of the navy's general board, as its president, was appointed today by Secretary Wilbur.

The work of this board will supplement that of the special board of nine men appointed by President Coolidge to delve thoroughly into the question of the nation's air policies.

At the same time Secretary Wilbur was announcing the personnel of the Shenandoah board, the war department made plans to have Col. William Mitchell, the chief figure in the whole controversy, available as an expert witness for the president's special board when that body begins its inquiry.

100 MEMBERS TO BE BAPTIZED

He left at 4:00 o'clock Monday morning for McKinney, where he has been engaged to hold a meeting, and stated that he expected to preach at McKinney Monday night.

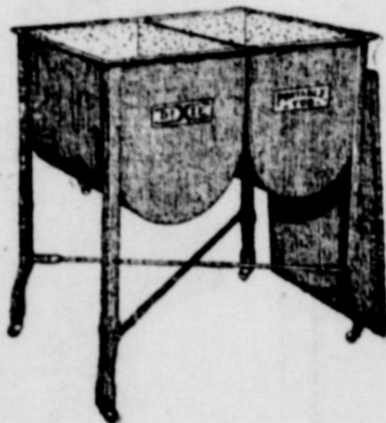
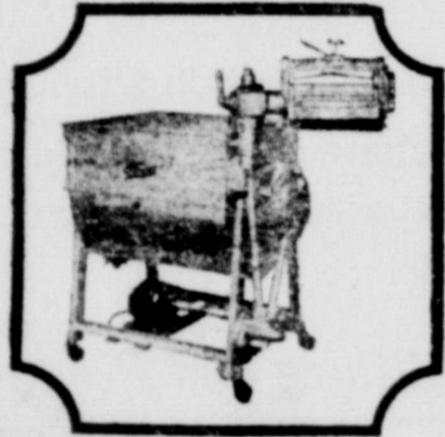
