NEW HIGH LINE CREW ARRIVES

Henry Pippin, superintendent of the construction crew for the West Texas Utilities Company, arrived from Rotan Wednesday, and will begin at once the building of the high line from Ballinger to Menard, a distance of sixty-five miles, via Paint Rock and Eden.

Mr. Pippin is bringing with him twenty-five experienced high-line men, and will employ fifty local laborers for the job. The crew is being transferred from Rotan, where some construction work has just been completed, and headquarters are being established at Ballinger. Work will begin on the Ballinger end of the line, and this city will be headquarters for the work until distance makes it necessary to move further South.

The material for the new high line has been distributed over most of the right-of-way between Ballinger and Menard, and work will begin at once and be rushed to completion. The new towns just taken in by the West Texas Utilities Company and which are to be served with current over the high line will be included in Group G and be under the supervision of Earl Morley, Group G manager, for the present.

The territory to be covered by the new service are fortunate in that they will be supplied with electric current for all purposes, and enterprises which have heretofore been compelled to depend on makeshift methods for their power can now be assured of ample power to carry on any line of work they undertake where power is needed.

NEW YORK BANKER DIES FROM HURT

 NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Seymour Cromwell, former president of the New York Stock Exchange, and a widely known banker and broker, died today at his home at Barnardville, New Jersey. Death resulted from injuries sustained when Mr. Cromwell fell from a horse about a week ago.

Shank shot and killed his son Paul as the young man lay asleep, and then killed his wife and tried to kill his daughter, who escaped. Family friction is believed to have caused the man to commit the murders.

Shank's 18-year-old daughter, Ruth, escaped from her father by running from the house. Attracted by her screams neighbors came to her assistance and grappled with the father who broke loose and returning to the house attempted to end his life by drowning in the bath tub. He has been placed under restraint.

GROCERY STORE TO GO IN MAEROY BUILDING

Jim Jones and Hugo Vogel-sang, composing the Postoffice Grocery Store, closed a lease contract with Jno. A. Weeks this week for a portion of the building now occupied by the Maeroy Theatre, and will move their grocery store to the new location about the first of October. The Hardin & Carr tailor shop will occupy part of the building, a partition to be cut in the building.

The Maeroy Theatre will be closed on September 26th, at which time the Paramount Theatre on Eighth Street will open. The theatre proprietors have decided to operate the Paramount and the Queen, one on each side of Eighth Street. The Fo-to-sho is a thing of the past.

H. T. Hodge, who purchased the Hamilton shows, and also the building occupied by the Fo-to-sho, will lease the building which he owns and which was recently vacated by the Ballinger Electric Co. Parties were negotiating for leases on these buildings Wednesday, but no contract had been closed up to a late hour.

DRASCO COMING TO RUNNELS FAIR

County Agent C. W. Lehnberg and Secretary J. D. Motley were visitors to Drasco Tuesday night where they both spoke in behalf of the Runnels County Fair. The occasion at Drasco was a concert by the Winters Chamber of Commerce Band, who were accompanied by a large crowd of Winters boosters. Mr. Motley stated that a large crowd was present, there probably being as many as 1,000 people. Lights were strung in the open air for the band and speakers and the large crowd completely circled this space and many remained in their cars within hearing distance.

Several speakers were introduced and made talks along the line of community building and co-operation. Mr. Farrell, secretary of the Winters Chamber of Commerce assisted the local speakers in boosting the fair and Mr. Motley returned with the information that Drasco was already gathering their products for their community booth and that in addition many individual entries would be made.

This is one of a series of visits to be made by Messrs. Lehnberg and Motley. They plan to visit every community in Runnels county between now and the opening of the 1925 fair and to assist those communities in getting the interest started for community booths.

PLACES EMBARGO AGAINST TEXAS

LA FOLLETTE IS G. O. P. CHOICE

 MILWAUKEE, Sept. 16.—Robert M. LaFollette Jr., is the victorious candidate in the republican primary for the United States senatorial seat made vacant by the death of his father. He will be opposed by five other candidates at the final election on September 29th, according to the status of the political situation as it exists today.

Four of his opponents will run under the designation of independents while the fifth, a socialist, John Work, of Milwaukee, succeeded in polling enough votes yesterday to assure his party of participation in the election under their own party label.

FRANCE MUST PAY WAR DEBT

(By Associated Press)
 PARIS, Sept. 16.—Finance Minister Caillaux left for the United States on his debt funding mission this afternoon.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—France's war debt to the United States must be settled without any reference whatever to any terms or agreement which that nation may have reached with Great Britain. This was asserted today by Senator Smoot, republican of Utah, a member of the American debt mission.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16

Coincident with the departure from Paris of the French debt mission to the United States, Chairman Borah of the Senate foreign relations committee, at a conference with President Coolidge opposed any terms for France that were more liberal than those given Great Britain. The senator declared that France should not be granted leniency as she has a greater capacity to pay than that of Great Britain.

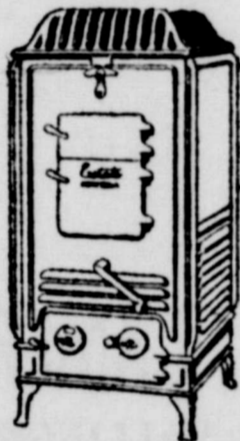

**MANY PEOPLE
VISIT NEW JAIL**

Hundreds of citizens of Ballinger
and Runnels county went to
jail for the first time last Satur-
day, but they all went volun-
tarily and were detained but for
a short time. Others went to
jail Monday and Tuesday.

The occasion was the opening
of the new Runnels county jail
here. The work had been com-
pleted, and before being occu-
pied the commissioners court
threw the doors open and invited
the public to come and inspect
the new prison.

Hundreds of people throughout
the three days filed through the
building. Part of the time some-
one was on duty to accompany
the visitors through the jail and
explain the new devices for con-
trolling the cell locking system,
and other modern features of the
method of handling prisoners.

The expressions from many of
those who visited the jail ap-
proved of the splendid way in
which the commissioners court
of this county has provided for the
prisoners. The building is not
only fireproof, but is sanitary
and arranged for the convenience
of the officers who have to
handle criminals.

The lower floor will be occu-
pied by the jailer, and the cells
are on the second and third
floors. The felony cells, misde-
meanor room, women's ward and
insane ward are all modernly
equipped and while heretofore
for several years the grand juries
which convened here from time
to time in their reports criti-
cised or recommended certain
changes in the old jail, it is ex-
pected that the grand jury which
convenes here next week will
place its approval on the new
prison and congratulate the citi-
zenship of the county.

The jail has been constructed
without a bond issue, and with-
out additional tax levy. The cost
was financed by issuing short
term warrants.

**TALKING WEST TEXAS
LEAGUE**

A story sent out of Waco and
carried on the sport pages of
state daily papers says that "The
West Texas Baseball League, in-
clude Amarillo, Plainview, Abi-
lene, Lubbock, Sweetwater, San
Angelo and Brownwood, is the
plan of Harry Dupuy, according
to advices received by Dupuy's
friends here and at Marlin." Du-
puy lives at Marlin.

Dupuy helped to organize the
Texas Association and served as
its president. He controlled the
Waco franchise in the Texas
Association, and it is expected
that Dupuy will head the pro-
posed West Texas League.

Only seven towns are named
in the tentative West Texas
League, and provided they
should all accept a franchise in
the new league, another club will
be needed. Ballinger is as good
a baseball town as some of the
towns named, and with smaller
towns and surrounding country
to draw from, would support a
club just as substantially as the
towns named. Ballinger may be
a smaller place than any of the
other towns proposed to make up
the league, but Ballinger has big
ways, and with proper backing,
and a large number of fans in
the rural districts to draw from,
would no doubt back a good team
to a successful finish. Mr.
Dupuy would make a mistake to
take in Sweetwater, San Angelo
and Brownwood and pass up as
good a town as Ballinger. Local
fans should put their heads to-
gether.

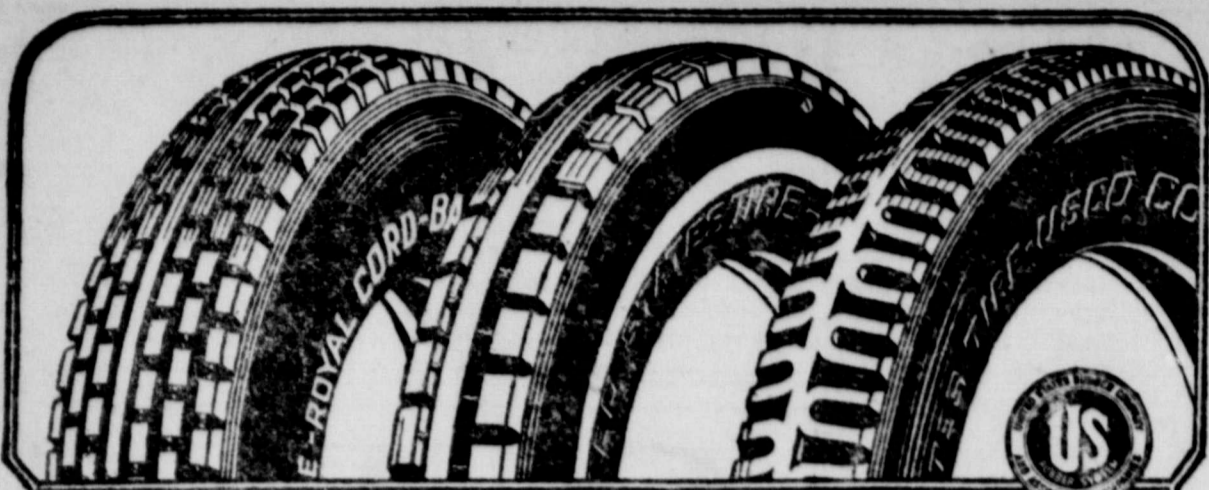

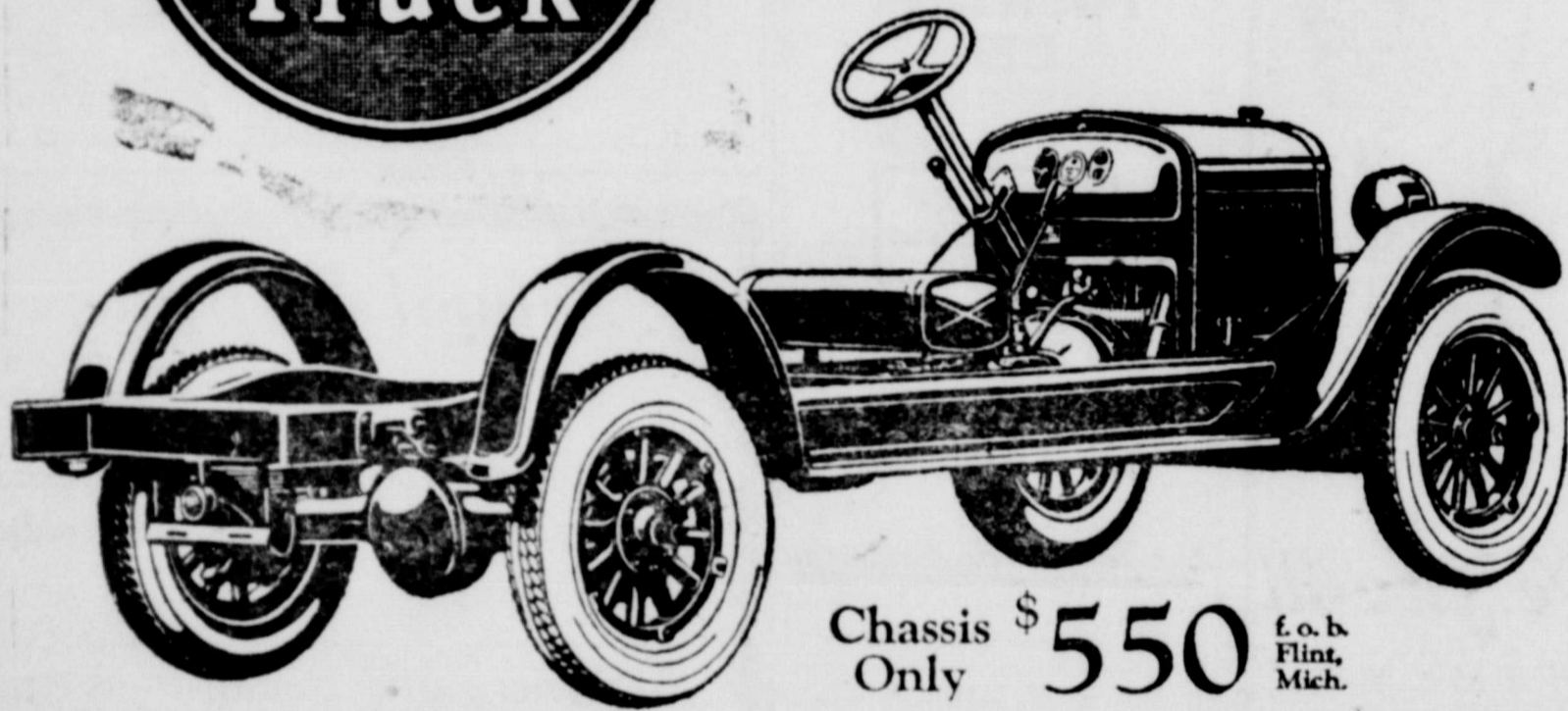
