THREE DEAD IN FIGHT AT TAYLOR

FORD DEALERS MEETING HERE

About seventy-five Ford dealers and salesmen connected with the Ford agencies in the territory extending from Lampasas to Ozona, met here Thursday in a dealers' meeting and to attend a demonstration conducted by H. C. Spillers, Ford representative from Dallas, Comanche, Brady, Brownwood, Lampasas, Coleman, San Angelo and numerous other towns were represented at the meeting.

The display room of the Harwell Motor Company furnished the meeting place for the dealers. Seats were arranged in the building and after Mr. Spiller addressed the meeting, one of the new model Fords was rolled in and the meeting converted into a demonstration meeting.

Mr. Harwell was host to the visitors in a watermelon feast after the meeting adjourned.

R. L. Harwell and Bud Gray went to Abilene Wednesday where a car load of the new model Fords were received and distributed out to dealers for demonstration purposes. Mr. Harwell returned home and left Mr. Gray to bring the new Ford home and he arrived later with the new Ford. It will be several days before the local dealers receive the new cars.

The late model Ford is quite an improvement over the old model, features having been added which give it a more finished appearance, and the car is more substantially constructed than the old model. When delivered here the new car attracted almost as much attention as the first model Henry Ford rolled out 20 years ago.

BOARD READY TO INVESTIGATE

WOMAN BURNED WHILE IRONING

R. M. Davis, of the Crews section, was in the city Friday afternoon and reported the serious injury of Miss Ila Campbell, who lives with her mother, Mrs. O. S. Clark, about three miles West of Crews.

Miss Campbell was painfully, if not seriously burned by the explosion of a gasoline iron with which she was ironing. The accident occurred about noon. Fortunately other members of the family were present to render aid.

According to the report brought to town by Mr. Davis, the young lady was burned about the arms, hands, face and breast. It had not been determined whether she inhaled the flames or not, and the full extent of the injuries had not been determined. The unfortunate young lady is a sister of Grady Campbell.

MERCHANTS TO DISPLAY AT FAIR

The new building at Fair Park will be completed within the next few days. The roof is supposed to be on by Saturday night and there will be very little else to do toward completing the structure. This building will house the merchants' exposition in this year's Runnels County Fair, and according to J. D. Motley, secretary of the fair association, the biggest and finest display of merchandise ever arranged here will greet fair visitors when the gates swing open on October 13th.

No space has yet been let to applicants, however many merchants have requested space and it now appears that there will not be enough booths to accommodate everyone.

Mr. Motley at an early date will prepare a floor plan of the house and each booth will be numbered. Any firm in Runnels county can then secure booths from the secretary by paying for booth space at the rate of \$1 per front foot, and will draw numbers for locations. This is done so there can be no preference given as to location.

Announcement will be made to the merchants of the county as soon as plans are perfected, and following the announcement it will be "first come, first served." The booths will be 10x10 feet.

SAYS PHILIPPINES GOOD FOR RUBBER PRODUCTION

AMARILLO, Sept. 18.—Because it has been found that one of the islands of the Philippines is unusually well adapted to the raising of rubber, the United States should not consider relinquishing control of the island, Marvin Jones, United States congressman from the 18th Texas District, who recently returned from a tour of the Orient, said. Congressman Jones said that the educated people of the Philippines do not desire freedom from the United States, and that only the untutored masses want this country to give up control. He gave it as his opinion that Japan has no designs on the Philippines. At the present there are only 5,000 Japanese in the Philippines, he said.

AN OLD SYSTEM

Old time business was built on the "come and take it" idea. A man opened a shop and waited for customers to come. If he waited many years and he gave faithful service, they got used to his presence and did come.

Modern business is built on the "go-get-it" or soliciting system. The retail dealer buys of the wholesale concern that solicits his trade. He rarely bothers with people who don't care enough about his patronage to come around and ask for it. He feels that they are so out of line with the modern tendency, that they are not likely to be up-to-date and enterprising.

The public feels much the same way. They usually wait to see who will solicit their trade before deciding where to buy. If a concern does not ask for their business, they are likely to conclude that it is out of the game, or at least they forget its existence.

Soliciting business for a retail store from house to house might be all right if it did not cost so much. Newspaper advertising talks to a thousand or many thousands of people, while the solicitor is conversing with only one. Also advertising is studied by the people in their leisure time when they sit down to read a newspaper, so it approaches them at the psychological moment when they can be interested.

This week's issue of a well-

known magazine carried a four-page advertisement for a radio concern, and the advertisement began with the statement that the radio house was paying \$28,000 for the advertisement, or \$7,000 per page. Of course the radio manufacturers do not believe in advertising; they just donated \$28,000 to one of the largest publishing companies in the United States.

for cotton pickers. The itinerants pretended that they were looking for work, but when offered work declined to get busy. They informed the farmers that they would not pick cotton for less than \$1.25 per hundred.

Officers visited the camp Thursday morning, and after making an investigation gave the campers until noon to get busy or get somewhere else. They got somewhere else, giving the officers back an hour or two of the allotted time in which they were given to move on.

Farmers are calling for cotton pickers, and are paying a fair price. There is work for everyone who is able to work and Ballinger is an unhealthy place for "dead beats."

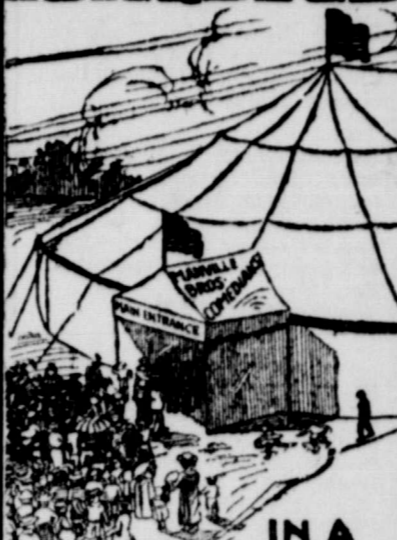

MAKES OFFER TO BUY BRADY PLANT

The West Texas Utilities Company has submitted to the city of Brady a proposition to purchase that city's light and power plant, and the Brady citizens have the matter under consideration.

Before taking any action on the proposition the city of Brady has appointed a committee to visit some of the cities in which the West Texas Utilities Company is operating, and the delegation will probably visit Ballinger within the next few days to investigate the standing of the utilities company here.

In substance the West Texas Utilities Company has offered to purchase the Brady electric plant at actual invoice value plus a bonus of \$10,000, and to supply current at rates which compare favorably with the rates the Brady light plant is now charging.

We are not familiar with conditions in Brady, and cannot say whether the proposition made to that city is a fair one or not, but we do know that if Brady fails to encourage such enterprises as the West Texas Utilities Company locating in that city the citizens will make a mistake.

The West Texas Utilities Company is one of the liveliest concerns in Ballinger. The management is progressive, and the company gets in the front ranks on every proposition of public interest. They are giving the citizens of this city first class service, and the enterprise is a credit to the city.

The company has started South with its high line, building from Ballinger to Menard, and eventually will no doubt connect with San Antonio.

WOULD STOP BOOTLEG OF LEGAL ALCOHOL

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—Chemists in the Bureau of Internal Revenue have been experimenting for many months to find some substance which, if put into commercial alcohol, will prevent its being used for beverage purposes when diverted into the hands of bootleggers. Quinine and other chemicals have been used, but it has been a puzzle to get a specific that cannot be taken out by chemical processes.

Patent medicine manufacturers utilizing alcohol in their wares are required to submit samples to the Internal Revenue Bureau, where chemists ascertain if the products might be used for beverage purposes, because of the alcohol that is in them. If the medicines might become available as passable substitutes for whiskey or wine, the government disallows the application. Inspectors in the field follow up the chemists' test by an inspection of the physical properties of the plant, to see that the manu-

facturer has the apparatus to turn out the quantity of product he intends and to insure that no alcohol might get into bootleg channels.

McCormack Attracts Two Record Audiences in Dublin

DUBLIN, Sept. 16.—John McCormack's two concerts in the Theatre Royal, Dublin, recently were attended by the largest audiences ever assembled in the city for similar events. Not only was every inch of available space occupied, but parts of the building in which no place had previously been found for the public were used and sold at high prices.

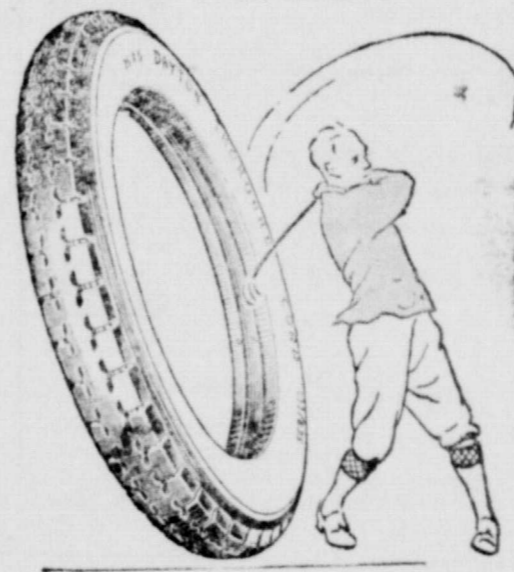

BROWNSVILLE APPROVES S. P. EXTENSION PLAN

(By Associated Press)

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Sept. 18.—Motion of the Brownsville Chamber of Commerce in approving the plan of the Southern Pacific Railway to build an extension into the Lower Rio Grande Valley from Falfurrias, has been duplicated by several similar organizations in the valley. The LaFeria chamber recently approved the plan and civic organizations at Edinburg, McAllen, Pharr and San Juan took like action.

The Brownsville chamber adopted a resolution endorsing the plan following a visit to W. R. Scott, president of the system, by a committee of members. Mr. Scott did not tell the committee the road would build to Brownsville.

The Southern Pacific is seeking permit to build from Falfurrias, South to the Rio Grande at Hidalgo, 50 miles West of Brownsville, and from Edinburg,

Hidalgo county to Harlingen, Cameron county, 25 miles North of Brownsville.

SHOWS HEADED THIS WAY

Shows making Texas this year will play in West Texas towns, and it is probable that the smaller companies only will come in. Al Hicks, advance man for Cooper Bros. Shows, a dog and pony and trained animal show, was here Friday billing the town for his show which plays here on October 2nd, and is authority for the first statement.

Mr. Hicks stated that his show was skirting through the Western portion of the state, cutting out East Texas on account of the foot and mouth disease and Central Texas on account of the drought.

A good portion of the state being effected by the drought and short crops, and with the foot and mouth disease prevailing in East Texas, it is probable that the larger shows will pass up Texas this fall. Other states have

WOMAN SCIENTIST STUDIES NEW RACE IN WEST SIBERIA

(By Associated Press)
 Leningrad, Sept. 18.—Madame R. P. Mitsova, a plucky collaborator of the Russian Academy of Sciences, after 12 months' residence with a new race of people discovered in the Arctic wilds of Western Siberia, has collected much interesting information about these strange people, who are organized into five clans and number only about 6000. The members of this race call themselves "Neshen," which means merely men or people. Their nearest neighbors, the Samoyeds, called them "Pyan-Ha-Sovo," or forest people. These strange people are quite unlike the Samoyeds in that they have very dark hair and complexions and their language is wholly different, lacking entirely the "R" sound which is very prominent in the speech of the Samoyeds. Until 1923 no civilized person had been known to have set foot in the territory of this new race, according to B. N. Gorodkov. He has just published a report of an expedition sent to Western Siberia by the Russian Academy of Sciences in the latter part of 1923, which found these aborigines on the River Pura.
