QUAKE AND SNOW STORM IN WEST

TEXAS AND OKLAHOMA TO GIN FIVE MILLION

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Sept. 19.—Texas and Oklahoma have encountered unusual difficulties in making a cotton crop this year, but together the two states will produce 5,000,000 bales or more than one-third of the estimated American production, according to the reports of the state boards of agriculture.

The Texas present selling price is declared to be below the cost of production. About twenty per cent of the crop is being withheld from the market, although 650,000 bales have been sold.

Approximately 1,000,000 bales have been ginned in Texas this year.

DIXIE SERIES TO OPEN WEDNESDAY

FT. WORTH, Sept. 19.—The Dixie series between Atlanta, Georgia, and Fort Worth, Texas baseball teams will open Wednesday at Atlanta. The second game of the series will also be played at Atlanta.

The teams will return to Fort Worth Saturday for three games, and then the final games of the seven-game series will be played in Atlanta, should further games be necessary to decide the Dixie championship.

The schedule of games was arranged today by the presidents of the two leagues. The receipts of the first four games will go to the players of the two teams.

MAN SHOT ABLE TO RETURN HOME

Ralph Baker, age 24, who was brought to the Halley & Love sanitarium suffering with a bullet wound in his hip Tuesday night, was reported to be improving Saturday, and plans were being made to take him to the home of his father, C. M. Baker, at Concho.

The young man was shot accidentally by a gun in the hands of R. T. Baker, at Fort McKavitt about 3:00 o'clock last Tuesday afternoon. The bullet from a .25 automatic pierced the man's thigh, the bullet ranging up and lodging in the hip bone. The man who held the gun is not related to the young man who was shot, although both have the same name.

Baker was carried to Menard for medical aid, and was later brought to Ballinger where after seven hours from the time the accident took place, the bullet was removed. He was on the operating table about two hours.

The young man was accompanied to Ballinger by his father, C. M. Baker, and brother, Roy Baker. He will be carried to his father's home at Concho as soon as he is able to leave the sanitarium. He was making his home at Fort McKavitt, where the accident took place.

SKELTON FOUND NOT AUSTIN MAN

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 19.—Frank Sampson, of this city, has received a telegram from Sam Service, mayor of Estes Park, Colorado, stating that the skeleton found on the top of Flat Top Mountain, is not that of Rev. T. F. Sampson, of Austin, Texas.

Sampson is the son of Rev. Sampson, and he got in touch with the Estes Park authorities immediately after the receipt of Associated Press dispatches here stating that the skeleton might be that of the minister who has been missing for several years.

Rev. Sampson mysteriously disappeared from Austin several years ago, and no trace of him has been found.

YOUTH KILLED STEALING GAS

HOUSTON, Sept. 19.—Johnny Guesmano, age 16, was killed early today on a road near here as a result of an alleged attempt by three boys to steal gasoline from a filling station.

Joe Dechara, owner of the station, in a statement to the police, says he was awakened by an alarm and fired three shots, and that later his neighbor found the dead boy in a ditch near the station.

Dechara is held on a charge of murder.

FIRE DESTROYS PARADE FLOATS

TULSA, Sept. 19.—Fire today destroyed fifteen floats which were to be used in the parade to be held here during the International Petroleum Exposition on October 1st to 10th.

The building in which the floats were housed and where they were decorated, was destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$30,000.

OTHER STATES PLACE EMBARGO

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, Sept. 19.—South Carolina has declared an embargo on livestock products from Texas, the state livestock sanitary commission advised today. The commission also reports that California is placing a similar ban on Texas products, but as yet has not issued Texas authorities a copy of the order.

The embargoes are a result of the outbreak of the foot and mouth disease in East Texas.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 19.—Pennsylvania today declared a quarantine against the shipments from Texas into this state of all commodities which might transmit the foot and mouth disease.

Twenty Felony Cases are Ready for the Grand Jury

When district court convenes here Monday afternoon at 1:30, twenty felony cases will be submitted to the grand jury for investigation in the report of County Attorney C. P. Shepherd. Attorney Shepherd has prepared his report and it will be submitted to District Judge J. O. Woodward before he charges the grand jury as the first work of district court Monday.

The report speaks for itself, and is as follows:

"Honorable J. O. Woodward, Judge of the 35th Judicial District, and the Grand Jury of Runnels County, Texas, for the September term, A. D. 1925:

"Gentlemen: "I beg to submit herewith my report on the complaints for felony cases made since the last term of the District Court in and for Runnels County, Texas. Since that date I beg to advise you that I have filed twenty complaints for various charges, as follows:

"State of Texas vs. C. C. West and Arthur Townsend. Charged with felony theft. Both parties are out on bond awaiting action of the grand jury.

"The State of Texas vs. Henry Weddle, charged with selling intoxicating liquor. Defendant out on bond.

"State of Texas vs. D. E. Bynum, charged with transporting intoxicating liquor. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. H. Grundy, charged with forgery. Defendant has not been arrested.

"State of Texas vs. C. L. Dunning, charged with assault with intent to rape. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. B. J. Johnson, charged with transporting intoxicating liquor. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. B. P. Shook, charged with burglary and felony theft. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. Perry Todd, charged with burglary and theft. Defendant in jail.

"State of Texas vs. Andy Tindall, charged with burglary and theft. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. B. J. Johnson, charged with manufacturing, transporting, possessing for the purpose of selling, and selling intoxicating liquor. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. Ed Hendrick, charged with manufacturing intoxicating liquor. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. Ed Hendrick, charged with possession

for the purpose of selling, and the sale of intoxicating liquor. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. Lang Iden, charged with burglary and theft. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. Lang Iden, charged with selling intoxicating liquor. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. Walter Mesecke, charged with manufacturing, selling, transporting, and possessing for the purpose of sale of intoxicating liquor. Defendant, among others, broke jail some two months ago and now at large.

"State of Texas vs. Dennis Lawrence, charged with transporting intoxicating liquor. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. Frank Leach, charged with transporting, delivering and selling intoxicating liquor. Defendant in jail.

"State of Texas vs. C. M. Bertram, charged with embezzlement. Defendant in jail at Long Beach, California, awaiting indictment and extradition.

"State of Texas vs. Pete Davis, charged with manufacturing, selling and possessing for purpose of sale intoxicating liquor. Defendant under bond.

"State of Texas vs. John Borders, charged with manufacturing, selling, and possessing for the purpose of sale intoxicating liquor. Defendant under bond.

"It will appear from this report that I have filed twenty complaints since the last grand jury, or which one is for felony theft, twelve for violations of the liquor law, one for forgery, one for assault with intent to rape, four for burglary and one for embezzlement.

"In all of these cases I have taken the testimony of the material witnesses and have them in good shape for the grand jury to work on when they meet.

"I have no recommendation to the Court for a charge on any special subject."

TRYING TO STOP C. I. A. REGENTS CATTLE KILLING TO HEAR CHARGES

HOUSTON, Sept. 19.—Hearing on two injunction suits to prevent the slaughter of cattle by the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission in the foot and mouth quarantine zone, will be held today at Galveston.

A temporary injunction was issued recently by Judge Canty in district court here forbidding the government officials in charge of the clean-up from killing these cattle. The stockmen seeking to stop the slaughter of the cattle allege that their cattle are not diseased and have not been exposed to the disease.

**Japan Maps Out Extensive
Program of Road Building**
(By Associated Press)

TOKYO, Sept. 17.—Good roads
in Japan are as hard to find as
the proverbial haystack needle,
but if a bill which is being
planned is enacted by the next
Diet, automobiles in this country
will come in for their own. The
proposed plan is either to build
new highways or improve the
present ones at a cost of some
300,000,000 yen, one-third of
which will be furnished by the
government.

Under the proposed bill the
government grants would come
in ten yearly installments, the
first beginning next year. It is
planned to widen and pave the
important highways in rural dis-
tricts, which at present are unfit
for automotive transportation,
and to improve such public roads
over which railway construction
is projected.

**Free State to Spend Millions
in Improvement of Highways**
(By Associated Press)

DUBLIN, Sept. 17.—A new
scheme for the improvement of
Irish roads has been decided on
by the Free State government at
a cost of nearly \$20,000,000, to
be spread over three years.

It is proposed to bring 1,500
miles of the country's 4,000 miles
of trunk roads to a standard
which will give a road life of
eight to ten years. The laden
weight of new motor lorries will
be restricted to nine tons, under
the plan, and owners of horse
drawn vehicles will be compelled
to use wheels with wide rims.

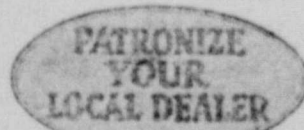

**Italy Building Great Tunnel
Under Apennine Mountains**

FLORENCE, Italy, Sept. 17.—
Italy soon will be able to boast
of one of the world's greatest
railway tunnels. The double
track tube under the Apennines,
part of the electrified direct line
between here and Bologna, now
in process of construction, will
measure 18 kilometres (slightly
more than eleven miles).

The tunnel will rank next to
the famous Simplon tunnel
through the Alps, which is 12 1/2
miles long, and ahead of the

Mont Cenis tunnel connecting
Italy and France, which meas-
ures eight miles in length.

**Heidelberg Builds Many Homes
to Help Solve Housing Problem**
(By Associated Press)

HEIDELBERG, Sept. 17.—This
celebrated old university town
has set the pace among German
cities in its efforts to solve hous-
ing conditions. During the last
three years the city has erected
1,500 municipally owned houses
and has provided an additional
1,000 single rooms by partition-
ing off garrets.

The houses have been con-
structed almost without excep-
tion on the quadrangle plan, with
the interior square made into a
park and playground. Each
quadrangle accommodates from 15
to 25 families.

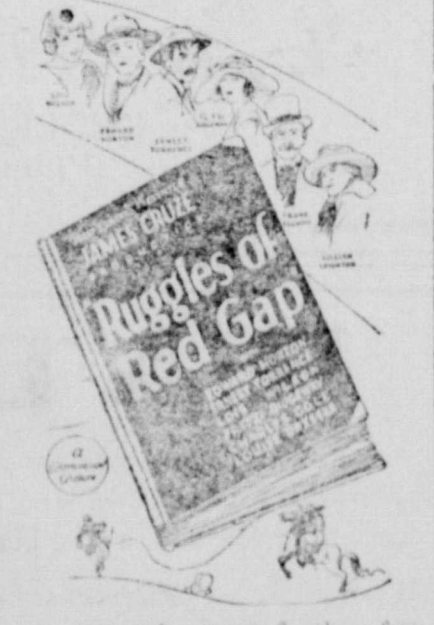
**SHOW TENT WILL BE

**FRANCE MAY CHANGE
NATURALIZATION LAWS**

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Sept. 19.—Easier naturalization is the latest remedy for France's dwindling population.

A bill has been drafted by Deputy Charles Lambert removing most of the formalities and expensive fees attendant to becoming a citizen of the republic. Among other facilities provided, foreigners marrying French women may claim naturalization at once, while others will have the qualifying period reduced from ten years to three.

The bill abolishes the right now enjoyed by children born in France of foreign parents of choosing between French nationality—and military service—and

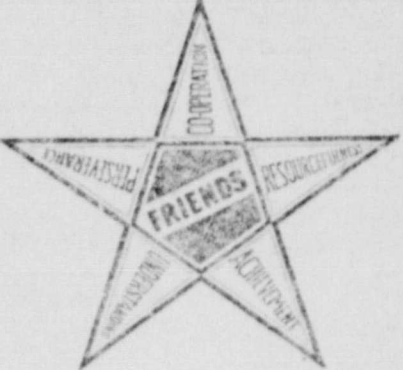
the nationality of the parents. It is expected that the bill will be taken up by parliament as soon as the session opens.
