HUSBAND AND STEP-DAUGHTER HELD IN MURDER

WAUKEGAN, Ill., Sept. 21.—Arthur Holt, age 50, and his step-daughter, Mrs. Clara Hareq, of Chicago, were charged with the murder of Mrs. Arthur Holt, wife and mother of the accused, in warrants issued today.

Arthur Hareq, son-in-law of Holt, was under arrest in connection with the killing. Mrs. Holt was shot to death yesterday in the family's summer home at Fox Lake.

TOM GREEN GOES 8 TO 1 FOR ROADS

SAN ANGELO, Sept. 21.—The road bond issue election in Tom Green county was approved by a vote of 965 to 138 Saturday. The citizens went to the polls and rolled up the big majority of about seven to one in favor of the issuance of \$500,000 road bonds with which to build hard surfaced roads to the county line on all highways leading out from this city. The state and federal highway commissions will supplement the county fund with a like amount.

In the election held Saturday only four boxes in the county gave a majority against the issue, three of these were small boxes and voted unanimously against the proposition. Mereta voted 14 to 0 against the proposition. Scherz voted two votes against and nothing for. Reed voted 5 to 0 against, and Byrd 6 to 0 against. Three rural boxes voted unanimously for the bonds, Ben Ficklin voting 4 to 0 for, Coneho 5 to 0 for, and Wall 25 to 0 for the bonds. The vote in the city of San Angelo was practically unanimous, the city vote being 705 to 32. The rural vote was about two to one for the bonds, the country vote being 204 to 106 for the bonds.

TWO FELONY CHARGES FILED

On the eve of the convening of the grand jury two felony complaints were filed in justice court Sunday. The grand jury convened at 1:30 Monday afternoon, and immediate action is expected.

The two complaints filed Sunday charge violation of the liquor law and forgery. No arrests have been made in the cases, the matter being passed up to the grand jury.

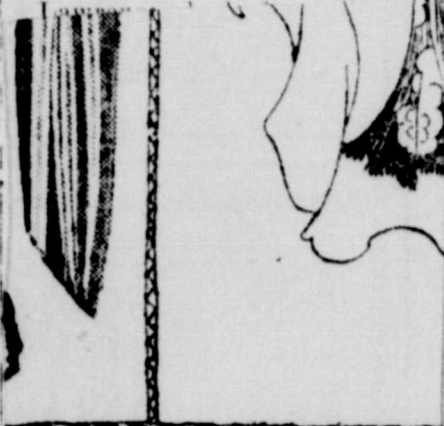
County Attorney C. P. Shepherd prepared his report to the grand jury last week, the report showing that twenty felony complaints had been filed in justice court, and the defendants either placed under bond or were in jail to await the action of the grand jury. The county attorney filed a supplemental report for the grand jury Monday showing the two cases which increase the total number of cases already docketed in justice court and passed up to the grand jury to number twenty-two.

ALL-STEEL TRAINS TO BE RUN BY SANTA FE

Beginning this week, about Wednesday, the G. C. & S. F. will operate trains Nos. 77 and 78 with all-steel equipment. The old wooden coaches will give way to modern steel coaches. Train No. 77 is the train which arrives from the East at 11:30 a. m. and train No. 78 is the train which goes East at 4:30 p. m. This will be quite an improvement in equipment on this branch of the Santa Fe, and makes safety for passengers.

The Santa Fe is operating big mallet type locomotives on this line in hauling oil from the Big Lake field. An average of about eight car loads of oil per day are passing thru Ballinger. Solid train loads of oil are moving thru the local yards daily, the trains pulling from 25 to 40 cars, according to the capacity of the locomotive.

The cotton movement has just begun, and train loads of cotton will begin to move out from Ballinger soon, and the Santa Fe will be operating many extra trains.

District Judge Declares "Parents Pen Livestock and Let Children Run Loose"

Out of a venire of sixteen only eight grand jurors qualified here Monday afternoon. Eight were either absent or offered legal excuses and were excused. The court instructed the clerk to enter a fine of \$25 against those who were absent. Court was delayed while the sheriff summoned additional veniremen from which to complete the grand jury.

Judge Woodward gave the grand jury a lengthy charge. He commented on the fact that Runnels county had climbed into first place in crime in his district, stating that a few years ago the county was the cleanest in his district, and now it takes the lead in criminality. He referred to the county attorney's report which showed that twenty two felony cases were being submitted to the grand jury.

The judge said the way to stop this was to enforce the law, and he declared that it was up to the jurors who heard the evidence to enforce the law. Judge Woodward complimented the county for having a splendid set of county officers, and declared that the county attorney's work was always in good shape and he had everything ready for the grand jury when it convened.

The county attorney's report shows that thirteen bootlegging cases have been filed since the last term of court, and Judge Woodward charged the grand jury particularly concerning liquor law violations. "The man who goes out and makes whisky and sells it to your boy and my boy is the sorriest man on earth," said Judge Woodward. "If any man makes chow beer for beverage he is violating the prohibition law and is just as guilty as the man who goes down the street with forty quarts of liquor in his car," continued the judge.

AUTOS KILL 115 IN PAST WEEK

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—Six members of one family were wiped out near Dayton, Ohio yesterday. One was killed and 38 injured near Ft. Wayne, Indiana in a collision between interurban cars and automobiles Sunday.

Other accidents in which automobiles figured brought Sunday's death list from this cause in the Middle West to seventeen. Six persons were shot to death, two died in airplane crashes, and two were drowned.

One hundred and fifteen persons were killed in automobile accidents in eleven Middle West states during the entire week. Eight motor car fatalities occurred in Texas.

FEEDS AND DOCTORS PIGEONS AS A HOBBY

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—Feeding peanuts to pigeons in Grant Park on busy Michigan Boulevard costs him approximately \$150 a year, but to Harry J. Lane, the benefactor, it is a small item in his recipe for kindness.

Four or five times daily Mr. Lane, who is treasurer of the Orchestra Hall Association in a skyscraper overlooking the park, crosses the avenue with bulging pockets of peanuts to ration the birds, many of them of four years' acquaintance. His appearance causes a winged offensive.

Mr. Lane carries a knife with a small sharp blade which, as the birds feed, he uses in removing strings entangled in their feet and to perform any small bit of surgery. Wherever he travels Mr. Lane feeds pigeons in the parks. He is never feared, whether friend or stranger.

The city allows feed for the pigeons, but frequently the caretaker is absent. Mr. Lane fills the breach as provider.

MUCH MILEAGE ADDED TO STATE ROAD SYSTEM

AUSTIN, Sept. 21.—More than a thousand miles of new state highways have been designated during the past few months by the State Highway Commission, bringing Texas highway mileage to 20,000 miles, it was announced by state highway officials. The report read:

TOKYO, Sept. 19.—Scientists of Keio University are reported to have made important discoveries in a shell mound which they recently excavated in the forest of Koyasu, near Yokohama. 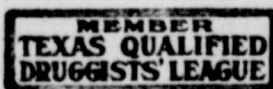
Previous Tampering Indicated in Ancient Tomb Recently Found

(By Associated Press)

MOSCOW, Sept. 19.—Discoveries made by Koslov, the explorer, in the excavation of an imperial tomb near Urga, Mongolia, has intensified the interest of archaeologists in that part of Asia. The tomb which Koslov excavated apparently had been tampered with in past centuries, but contained many interesting objects which led to the conclusion that the burial took place 2,000 B. C.

Two pieces of thick carpet were ornamented with pictures of an elk, a winged lynx, a bull and a leopard. There were traces of varnish and paint on the tomb, and the interior was draped with silk, richly ornamented with the figures of winged riders and reindeer. A corpse was found in a sitting posture in the corridor of the tomb and the fragments of clothing smelled strongly of camphor.

trial with the Wood and Wright case.

Among the visiting attorneys in court were: J. A. Ward, of Mt. Pleasant; M. R. Wilkinson, of Mt. Vernon; C. S. Perkins, of Sweetwater; Judges Sedberry and Upton, of San Angelo; Woodward, of Coleman; Jennings, of Miles; Strother, of Winters; and Whiteman, of Fort Worth.

Judge Woodward and the attaches of his court arrived here Monday morning. Quite a number of out-of-town attorneys were also here for the opening of court and to get a line-up on cases in which they are interested.

The first week will be devoted to civil matters. The most important case due for hearing is the Wood-Wright case, a suit of many ramifications growing out of the settlement of the estate of W. C. Wright. There are several minor suits pending, including quite a number of divorce petitions.

The big week of the present term will be the third week of court, commencing October 5th, when the Kirk-Cope murder cases are scheduled for trial. This is the case in which the defendants are charged with murder in connection with the death of Crawford A. Tabor, and which took place on the J. N. Wells farm fourteen miles Northwest of Ballinger on the night of December 19th, 1923. The Klan question has been injected into the case, and no case was ever docketed in the local district court with as many attorneys forming the counsel on both sides. There are many witnesses in the case and a special venire of a couple hundred men will be summoned from which to make up the jury.

It is expected that the grand jury will return bills out of twenty-two cases which have been referred to them from the justice court in time for trial at the present term of court. On account of inability to make bond in some of the cases, it is expected that speedy trials will be called for.
