TEAPOT DOME CASE APPEALED

(By Associated Press)
CHEYENNE, Wyo., Sept. 28.—Clyde Watts, Deputy United States District Attorney for Wyoming, is due to arrive in St. Louis today with the record of appeal in the Teapot Dome naval reserve oil lease annulment suit. The appeal will be filed in the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals. Pending the decision of the court of appeals the Teapot Dome reserve continues to be under the charge of the government receivers.

PLANES START ON TOUR

DETROIT, Sept. 28.—The Commercial Airplane Reliability Tour of 1900 miles flight through the middlewest formerly inaugurated at the Ford air plant, started today when sixteen planes took the air on a signal from Edsel Ford.

ENGINE HALTS NONSTOP FLIGHT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The seaplane B1 which has been ordered to return from San Francisco to the builders factory at Seattle for alterations in the engine, after it had failed in its attempt in a non-stop flight to the Hawaii Islands and was forced down by engine trouble at sea yesterday 15 miles off the Iliwaoo, Washington coast. It was towed to shore today by a destroyer.

DECLARES RED TAPE HINDERS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Resuming its inquiry into the aircraft problems today, the President's special board was told at the outset that the army red tape hinders the work of the army air service and that the operation of the service should be entrusted to flying men. Major Walter Kilmer, executive officer of the air service, was the first witness. He declared that the difficulties confronting the service were not ones of personalities but of organization. The chief of the air service he held should at all times be empowered to direct the activities of his men.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Major Ralph Royce in charge of the primary school at Brooks Field, San Antonio, Texas, declared that a lack of higher ranking officers caused much dissatisfaction in the air service, emphasizing that Junior Officers could not carry sufficient weight in presenting air matters to their superiors.

In reply to a question he said that housing conditions at Brooks Field training school were inadequate and that living conditions were deplorable.

Major Horace Hickman former flying assistant commandant of the advanced flying school at Kelly Field, Texas was the next witness to endorse General Patrick's recommendations for a separate air corps.

S51 OFFICERS ALL EXPERIENCED

(By Associated Press)
NEW LONDON, Conn., Sept. 28.—When informed by the Associated Press today that the owners of the City of Rome had made an affidavit which stated that the S-51 which was sunk Friday by the steamer, was commanded by student officers, Lieut. Commander H. A. Flannigan, executive officer at the naval submarine base here, denied that any of the officers on the undersea craft at the time of the disaster was inexperienced.

NEW PORT, R. I., Sept. 28.—Divers have found that one of the interior bulkheads of the sunken submarine S51 was bent but not pierced, radio dispatches received here from the wreck today said.

Rough weather is being experienced by rescue parties. According to a message two slings were under the submarine and an attempt was to be made with a three hundred ton derrick to lift it above the surface.

DOOSE RESIGNS CITY COMMISSION

Will Doose who was elected to the position of city commissioner at the last city election held here, handed his resignation in Monday to Mayor S. B. Raby and asked for immediate action.

Mr. Doose has been serving with the present commission since they took office. Mr. Doose in tendering his resignation said that he had found that the job demanded too much time which he could not give from his business and that for that reason he was forced to retire from the present board. He wished to thank the people of Ballinger for the honor conferred on him in the election to the office and stated that it was with deep regret that he could not serve the entire time. Mr. Doose stated that at this season his own business affairs were heavier than usual and he would give his entire time to them.

The mayor and other commissioners have the power to appoint a man to succeed Mr. Doose or to call an election for the purpose of naming another man for the place. Mayor Raby stated Monday afternoon that he did not know just what course would be pursued in making the selection of a new commissioner.

HELIUM VALVES WERE REMOVED

LAKEHURST, Sept. 28.—All covers on automatic helium valves on the airship Shenandoah were removed on the first rapid ascent in the storm of Sept. 3rd, Lieut. Roland Mayer, construction officer on board, testified today before the Naval Court of Inquiry. The officer said that he personally removed the covers from two valves and ordered those on two others removed. The other four valves were uncovered before the ship left Lake Hurst. The Lieutenant denied that the purpose of the covers was to prevent the escape of Helium gas.

SCHOOL LAND SUIT FILED FOR \$600,000

BROWNSVILLE, Sept. 28.—Judge T. H. Miller, of George West, has been retained by Cameron county to represent it in a suit against Live Oak county to recover 6,632 acres of school land said to be valued at approximately \$600,000.

The suit is to be based on questionable title arising out of a passage of title on an abrogation of former sales contract by a succeeding commissioners' court.

FRENCH OPEN DEBT ARGUMENT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The French position in regard to her \$4,000,000,000 debt to the United States was argued again today by Finance Minister Caillaux in the third meeting of the French and American debt commission. The meeting at the treasury of the two missions went into joint session and less than thirty minutes was required to complete the business on hand.

FAIR MEETING IS BEING HELD

Almost every community in Runnels county is holding fair meetings this week and next, under the direction of J. D. Motley, secretary of the Runnels County Fair Association.

A meeting is to be held Monday night at Hatchel, and Tuesday night the Crews citizens will gather to discuss fair plans. Miles, Wingate, Norton and other points in the county have asked that the secretary and County Agent C. W. Lehnberg visit them as soon as possible to assist them in explaining the score cards and arranging for their booths.

Last year only one side of the agricultural building was filled with community booths and from the present indications the whole building will be crowded this year to take care of community and individual exhibits. Many communities which have never entered the county fair before are making plans to come in and material is being assembled for displays.

The old building will be given over exclusively to agricultural booths this year, and it is hoped to take care of all community exhibits as well as individual entries in this building. The ladies department and the merchants' exposition will occupy the new building which has just been completed.

Messrs. Motley and Lehnberg will hold meetings wherever they are asked to come and lend every assistance possible to the communities in getting together their best displays and which will meet the requirements of the score cards governing these exhibits.

30 NEW VEGETABLES RAISED IN VALLEY

MERCEDES, Tex., Sept. 28.—More than 30 varieties of vegetables not heretofore growing in the lower Rio Grande valley are being tried out on the experiment farm of Richman and Samuels near here. Celerae, broccoli, romaine, fava beans, sorrel, sourdock, and many other unusual vegetables are being given a test and those which produce well and find a ready market are to be introduced on a more extensive scale on Valley truck farms. Importance of the truck industry in the Valley is shown by the fact that 13,000 cars of fruits and vegetables left this section last year.

BABY SHOW DATES SET

The date for the "baby show" at the 1925 Runnels County Fair was set for Friday, October 16th at 2:00 p. m. by officials of the fair association in a directors' meeting held in Ballinger Monday morning. The show will be held in the new ladies' rest room between the agricultural building and the merchants' exposition building.

Any baby, boy or girl, under two years of age, is eligible for entrance, and will be judged by competent judges on appearance only. Three suitable prizes will be offered to boys and girls each and they will be judged separately. There will be no entrance fee charged and mothers from anywhere are invited to enter their tiny tots so that as big a show possible can be presented. Following the judging it is hoped that every mother will consent to have their picture made with their baby.

Babies will not be subjected to a clinical examination but competent judges will consider their general appearance as well as healthy looks, etc. Special prizes will be arranged for twins and triplets entered in the show.

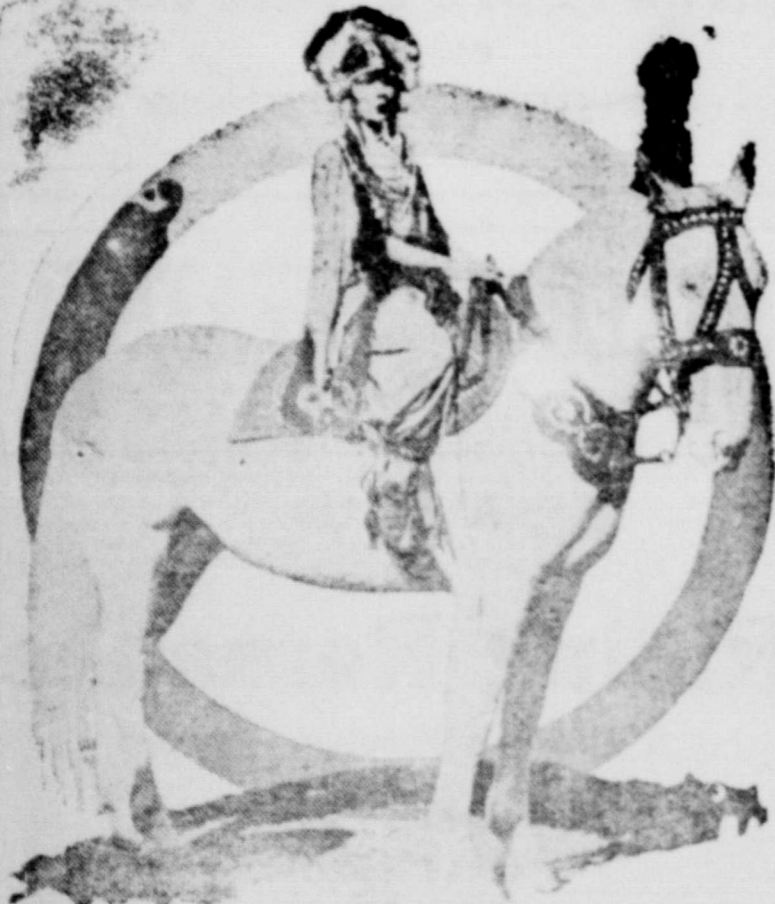
