\$150,000 IN JEWELRY TAKEN IN HOLD UP

(By Associated Press)
ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 3.—Three bandits held up a New York wholesale diamond merchant and seven other persons in the Jagersburg Jewelry Store here this morning, and escaped with much loot. Precious stones taken by the robbers were valued at more than \$150,000.

INVENTION OF BLACK OPAQUE GLASS CLAIMED

(By Associated Press)
TOKYO, Oct. 3.—After several years' investigation, Jusei Sugiye, a scientist of the Industrial Experimental Station of Osaka, is reported to have invented a black glass of a special kind which is expected to prove of great military value. It is said the black glass is opaque to all but ultra-violet rays and, by its use, battle formations or the movements of an enemy can be easily photographed in darkness without detection. Moving pictures, it is claimed, can also be taken in the dark by the use of the black glass. Experiments with the new glass made recently in the presence of Rear Admiral Muto are said to have proved a complete success. The inventor declares the black glass will not only be important for military purposes, but that it will be found valuable in medical treatment.

T. S. Lankford, of Abilene, once a prominent resident of Ballinger, was on the streets today meeting old friends. He has not yet quite recovered from his partiality for this metropolis, but says he is doing well where he is. Mr. Lankford reports he had a very remarkable escape from death in an auto accident near Snyder recently. BELLEFONTE, Penn., Oct. 3.—Heavy clouds that have helped to hide the landing place of Charles Ames, pilot of the West bound mail plane which has been missing since Thursday night, lifted today, making the mountain tops visible and enabling hundreds of persons to make a more thorough search for the lost airman. All the mountains between Harleton and Bellefonte are being combed.

SHERIFF McWILLIAMS GETS ARIZONA MAN

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams received a telegram Friday night asking him to try to locate a man by the name of John Hamilton, who was wanted at Kingman, Arizona on the charge of rape. Mr. McWilliams soon located his man and Saturday went to Winters and placed Hamilton under arrest. The accused man was brought to Ballinger and lodged in the county jail and the sheriff at Kingman was notified to come and get him. Mr. McWilliams stated that when he arrested Hamilton he showed him the telegram and asked him if he was the man, and Hamilton answered that he was.

INSANE MAN KILLS SELF IN NEW COUNTY JAIL

NEED \$400,000 TO STOP DISEASE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 3.—Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson today sent messages to all members of the 39th legislature asking them if they would agree to vote for an appropriation to combat the foot and mouth disease in Southeast Texas. The governor estimated that it would require about \$400,000 to exterminate the disease and care for the \$150,000 already borrowed from Houston and Galveston banks.

LOCAL TEAM TIES CLYDE

The Ballinger Panthers proved true to their new name Friday afternoon at Fair Park in the football game with Clyde, and for four quarters fought the husky bunch from Callahan county to a standstill. The team looked entirely different from a few weeks ago when they played Eden on the local grounds and the entire game was filled with thrills that kept the fans on their toes. Twice the Clyde team had the ball on Ballinger's one-foot line with four downs to enjoy it over and each time they failed to gain an inch. Clyde's one touchdown came when Ballinger was kicking from behind her goal and the punt was blocked and recovered across the line by one of the Clyde men.

Ballinger's touchdown came after the ball had been carried the entire length of the field with end runs and line plunges. One pass was completed, getting the ball on Clyde's one-yard line and on the next play McCarver carried it over for the six points. Woodson failed to kick goal. Woodson, McCarver, McKenzie, Tuckey and Thomson were the outstanding stars for the locals, with "Chuck" Thomson playing the best defensive game and McCarver the best offensive. McCarver gained ground practically every time he was called upon. Circling ends he gained as much as 45 yards at a time and several times all but got entirely loose for an open field run to a touchdown. Thomson was in every play regardless of where it happened and several times followed the play, overtook the man with the ball and downed him behind the line of scrimmage for a loss. The entire Ballinger team looked good Friday, and they are going to make some other team hard to catch for the remainder of the season.

WASHINGTON, October 1.—A solemn warning by Elihu Root that controversies and quarrels between nations are certain to come and that mere agreements to not have these things happen are futile, was sounded today in his paper on codification of international law which was presented by Representative Theodore Burton to the Inter-Parliamentary Union's conference here. The paper held that codification held a special importance now because of the necessity of enlarging services rendered by the permanent court of international justice.

MITCHELL LIKES PRES. BOARD

WASHINGTON, October 1.—Col. William Mitchell ceased heaving verbal brickbats in the general direction of the war and navy departments long enough today to toss a few bouquets at the president's aircraft probe board. While momentarily expecting court martial proceedings for his previous utterances, Col. Mitchell declared that the board had made it easy for officers to express their real opinion which they had been afraid to do before. Major General Patrick, head of the air service, was described by Col. Mitchell as "a regular fellow," whose views differed from his own only to a degree.

HOUSTON, Oct. 3.—Max Fink, orchestra leader, is at liberty today on a bond of \$5,000 following the discharge of the jury in his case because of its inability to reach an agreement. Fink was charged by the indictment with an assault on a 15-year-old girl. In a previous similar case the jury found Fink not guilty.

AMERICAN TOURISTS SPEND BIG SUM IN CANADA IN 1925

(By Associated Press)
OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 3.—Tourists from the United States brought \$150,000,000 in revenue to Canada in 1925, according to estimates of government officials. This sum is equal to a quarter of the value of the Dominion's wheat crop and approximately the values of the annual mining output of Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia combined. More than 2,000,000 American automobiles, it is estimated, have crossed into Canada already this year. They carried approximately 2,000,000 tourists, or one tourist for every man, woman and child in the Dominion. Every province shared in the tourist business. Ontario received the larger traffic. Last year 1,376,988 cars from the United States entered Ontario, 163,878 of which stayed from two to thirty days, 1,645 from one to six months and the remainder shorter periods.

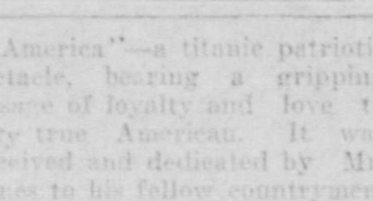

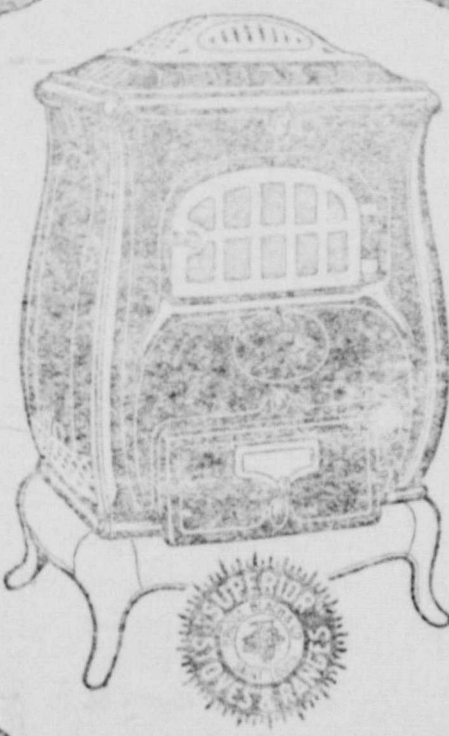
