3,875,000 BALES TEXAS ESTIMATE

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, Oct. 10.—The production of the 1925 cotton crop in Texas was placed at 3,875,000 bales of five hundred pounds each, by the state cotton report issued today by the statistical section of the state department of agriculture.
This estimate is based upon information available on October 1st from ginning reports showing that 1,881,118 bales had been ginned in Texas up to that time, which is figured at 49.80 per cent of the present estimated production in running bales.
Up to October 1st last year the ginnings in Texas amounted to 2,276,603 bales and which was 46.90 per cent of the final ginnings in 1924. The total production for last year was 4,951,000 bales.

ANOTHER STREET CORNER CRASH

A crash between a Ford roadster and a Chevrolet roadster at the intersection of Eighth Street and Hutchings Avenue, was another common occurrence at that congested traffic center late Friday afternoon. The Ford was put out of commission by the smashing of a wheel, and the other car was slightly damaged, but the drivers got by with only the loss of a little temper.

RISING STAR, Tex.—The longest continuous asphalt highway in Texas extends from this place to Fort Worth. Asphalt is now being placed on the gravel highway from here to Coleman and by Jan. 1st the entire distance from Fort Worth to Coleman will be asphalt paved. The splendid highway has caused a stage line to route their busses from Fort Worth to San Angelo via Rising Star travelling over the Bankhead Highway to Cisco.

WILL EXPAND RED CROSS

(By Associated Press)
ST. LOUIS, Oct. 10.—Further expansion of the peace-time program of the American Red Cross, in which nearly 70,000 volunteers are enrolled, will be discussed at the annual convention here October 12-15.

Robert E. Bondy, national director of war service, will outline the \$3,000,000 Red Cross program for World War veterans. Henry M. Baker, national director of Red Cross disaster relief, will be present, and Earl Kilpatrick, an assistant, will tell of rehabilitation work after the great tornado last March in Missouri, Illinois and Indiana.

Major General Merritt W. Ireland, surgeon general of the army, and Rear Admiral E. R. Stitt, surgeon general of the navy, have promised to be present. Judge John Barton Payne, national chairman, will preside.

Speakers include Melville E. Stone, counselor of The Associated Press; W. R. Davies, president of the Chicago Association of Commerce; Dr. August O. Thomas, Maine superintendent of public schools; Col. Ernest P. Bicknell, vice-chairman of the Red Cross, who was Red Cross commissioner to Europe and directed many of the projects abroad after the World War; Dr. Arthur W. Dunn, national director of the Junior Red Cross; and Chancellor Herbert S. Hadley, of Washington University, St. Louis.

Round table conferences will be held on the subjects of home hygiene, public health nursing, rural programs, city and community service, war service, civilian home service, nutrition service, first aid, life saving, Junior Red Cross and chapter work.

TEXAS STATE FAIR OPEN

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Oct. 10.—The 39th annual State Fair of Texas opened here today under perfect weather conditions, with crowds from all sections of the state pouring into the gates of the fair park.
The great array of exhibits representing the state's wide range of industries greeted the visitors on a scale never before equalled. Dedication of the new \$500,000 auditorium this afternoon will formally mark the opening of the 1925 exposition.

Kirk Murder Case Goes to Jury at 3:40 O'clock

Argument was concluded in the L. P. Kirk murder trial at 3:40 o'clock Saturday afternoon, and the jury retired immediately to deliberate and return a verdict.

Five hours were consumed by attorneys in arguing the case before the jury, the court allowing each side two hours and a half. Judge J. F. Cunningham opened the argument for the state, with Judge E. T. Brooks opening for the defense, and Judge T. T. Crosson, for the state; Judge Jas. A. Stinson, for the defense; and Judge W. J. Cunningham closing for the defense, and District Attorney Walter U. Early closing for the state.

The district court room was crowded when the argument began at 9:30 Saturday morning, and the crowd increased until there was not standing room and the hallways leading into the court room were crowded before the last argument was made in the case.

Seated with the defendant were his wife, mother and father; while Mrs. Crawford A. Tabor, J. N. Wells, Mrs. Wells, and Miss Johnny Wells, who testified in the case, and J. E. Tabor and wife and son, parents and brother of the deceased, were seated together during the speaking.

Tears trickled down the cheeks of the defendant when Judge Stinson appealed to the jury to return a verdict of not guilty and send the young man home to his two year old baby girl who was waiting to put her arms around daddy's neck, and the mother of the defendant sobbed as the attorney paid a tribute to the character and reputation which he said Kirk enjoyed among the people of Abilene where he resided.

The relatives of the deceased, including the widow of the murdered man, broke down and wept when District Attorney Early painted a picture of their happy home on the night that Tabor was called from the Wells' home and met his death. The district attorney drew a contrast between the home before the killing and after the killing.

Offering of testimony in the L. P. Kirk murder case was concluded at 5:00 o'clock Friday afternoon. The defense rested at 4:00 o'clock, and the state offering three or four witnesses in rebuttal completed its case an hour later, the defense also announcing a final close at that hour.

Judge J. O. Woodward stated that he would deliver his charge to the jury at 8:30 Saturday morning, and court recessed until that hour, when the charge was delivered and argument by attorneys began.

In rebuttal the state placed W. T. St. John, a deputy sheriff of Abilene, on the stand. The witness testified that he saw Kirk on the streets of Abilene a few days after the killing and told

WAR ON MASONS CHARGES MARTIN OPENS IN ITALY

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Oct. 10.—The W. A. Martin murder case went to the jury shortly after noon today. Court room opinion was that a verdict would be reached during the afternoon.

DALLAS, Oct. 10.—W. A. Martin was pictured today by the assistant district attorney, John Tipps, as deliberately planning the slaying of R. B. Parson, former deputy sheriff of Denton county, for which Martin is on trial here.

Continuing the argument today for the prosecution Tipps declared that Martin's motive for killing lay in the knowledge of Parson had collected and which might connect Martin with certain bank robberies, and for which Martin has been indicted.

Argument in the case got underway at a night session of the court last night, and is expected to be completed this afternoon.

School Notes

LETTER TO PARENTS OF SCHOOL CHILDREN

In order that parents may know just what their children are doing in their studies, reports are made for them at regular intervals.

On Thursday of this week Mr. Pace mailed out a number of special notices, stating that the student was low in a certain subject or subjects. He asks that the parent help him and the instructors in bringing up these low averages. When the parents have seen in what studies the student is failing, he asks that you sign the notice and return to him for his records. The object of these reports is to let you know how your child is getting along so that you may co-operate with him and the teachers.

On next Wednesday all children in grades below the high school will be issued a monthly report, provided they have been in school as much as ten days of the twenty. We shall appreciate it very much if each parent will study this report card and should there be any grades below the passing mark, 75 per cent, co-operate with the teachers and the principals in raising these low grades. At the end of each six weeks period, report cards will be sent out by the high school. If your child does not bring a report card home at that time, investigate, for they should have a report.

In regard to home study, allow me to suggest, that we think no high or junior school student can do his work well with less than two hours home study for each day's school. This we consider the minimum and we know that there are students that it will be necessary for them to study much more than the minimum of two hours.

I am certain that even in the lower four grades, children advance much faster and do better work when they are required to do some home study. Of course, in the first grade, at the beginning, the little tots can do no study at home, but after they

learn to read and spell, together with handling numbers, a little study in the presence of their parents will encourage them and can certainly do them no harm.

We are very anxious that the progress of your child be as great as possible for the whole school year. Will not each parent co-operate with us in making school worth while for each individual child?

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 9.—The newcomer in the City of Mexico usually is stung once before he discovers that 20 cents, not \$1.50, is the proper price for having his shoes shined.

A band of more or less gentle grafters operates in the Alameda, a beautiful park in the center of the city, where every visitor is known to stroll. He is almost certain to sit on one of the many benches and just as surely as he does he will be surrounded by a flock of boot-blacks clamoring for his custom. The shine completed, the boy is given ten or twenty cents, but he demands \$1.50. The visitor registers astonishment. The boy insists.

The boy, by now reinforced with such of his companion pirates as are not similarly engaged, produces an "official card" showing that the "duly authorized" scale of prices of the "Syndicate" of shoe-shiners of the Alameda includes \$1.50 for a "special shine." A special shine consists of an extra dab of something that looks like varnish.

The lobby of the local post-office resembles a negro day in the Brazos bottoms of East Texas, or a little Mexico. The negroes and Mexicans throughout a greater part of the day thronged the lobby and were lined up waiting their turn at the window to get their mail, or buy stamps. The country is full of Mexican and negro cotton pickers and they gather here by the hundreds on Saturday.

fense used probably forty or fifty witnesses. Neither side used one-half the witnesses who were subpoenaed in the case, most of whom were present.

The Ku Klux Klan issue is involved in the case, Kirk claiming that he went by to get Tabor to take him to a Klan meeting to be initiated and at Tabor's request. The State asked quite a number of the witnesses placed on the stand if they were members of the Ku Klux, some few of whom unhesitatingly answered "yes," while some refused to answer, and the court did not force them to answer the question. Counsel for defense objected to the question, and the court sustained the

objection, stating that he would decide later whether to permit it and whether he would compel witnesses to answer it, but the question was not raised for a final ruling.

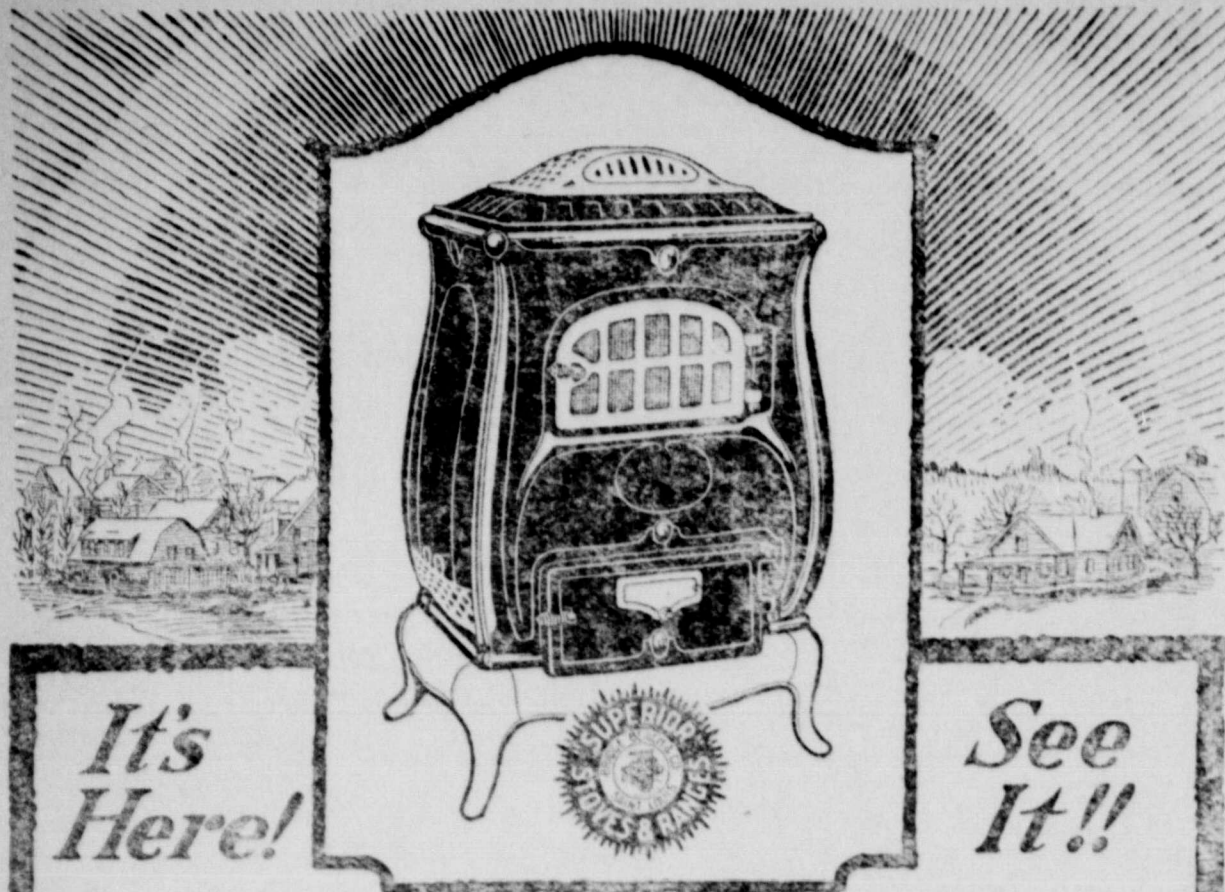
